

Contract For **Topping Highway 18** To Be Let Jan. 16

The first notice of letting of . contract to top Highway 18 from Spur to the Kent County line is being printed this week on order of the State Highway Department. The notice calls for letting of the contract in Austin January 16, which means that the work will be done in the spring and early summer months.

A crushed conglomerate gravel base with two treatments of sealed double asphalt will form the top of this road. This will not only be a road with a smooth top but the heavy base and double treatments of asphalt will give a road that will last a number of years with a minimum of maintenance. The mileage under this contract will be 11.311 miles which will be from a point in Spur to the Kent County line. E. W. Mars is the resident en-


