Emergency Crop and Feed Loan Applications Being Taken Here Now

Applications for emergency crop and feed loans for 1937 are now being received at Spur by D. H. Sandidge, field supervisor of the Emergency Crop and Feed Loan Section of the Farm Credit Administration.

These loans will be made only to farmers who cannot obtain credit from any other source, as provided by regulations issued by the Governor of the Farm Credit Administration. The money loaned will be limited to the farmer's immediate and actual cash needs for growing his 1937 crops or for the purchase of feed for livestock and in no instance may exceed \$400.

Farmers are not eligible for these loans if they can borrow from an individual, production credit association, bank, or other concern. Emergency crop and feed loans will not be made by the Farm Credit Administration to standard rehabilitation clients of the Resettlement Administration whose current needs are provided for by Resettlement.

As in the past, the security for these loans will consist of a first lien on the crop financed if the loan is for the production of crops, and if for the purchase of feed for livestock, then a first lien on the livestock to be fed. Landlords, or others having an interest in the crops or the livestock to be fed, will be required to waive their claims in favor of the lien to the Governor of the Farm Credit Administration until the loan is repaid.

Delinquent Tax Collections Go Over \$6600

A report of the county tax collector shows that the special collector contracted for by the Commissioners' Court and the State Comptroller collected \$6639.42 up to February 1. This was divided as follows: County \$1481.39, Polls \$139.50, Property \$3729.96, common school districts \$1195.03 and road tax \$24.54.

The special collector received \$1153.33 as his per cent for making the collection, that is, sending out notices, etc. It should be understood that the special collector does not receive payments but these are made through the sheriff and collector of the county who receives no remuneration for this labor.

Up to this report only a small per cent of the outstanding delinquent taxes that have been running in many instances for several years, have been collected. The office is receiving some collections from the delinquents each day which is gradually increasing the totals.

GRAPE CUTTINGS STARTED

Eight hundred eighty-four grape cuttings demonstrations in the girls' clubs in the county by the home demonstration agent this month. These 884 cuttings added to the 300 given to the farm fruit plot demonstrators by the Lubbock Experiment Substation plus some 300 cut by girls have been heeled out in trenches, but ends up, to allow the cuttings to callus over before setting out. About the middle of March the cuttings will be removed from the trenches and planted in rows about five feet apart in the row and the rows ten feet apart. With ordinary care at least 50 per cent of the cuttings will live and with a reasonable amount of care the girls should have a better percentage growing. Each girl expects to grow four grape vines for each member in her family.

The Lubbock Experiment gave 200 cuttings of the six varieties they have proved are good in this section. The varieties are Fern Munson, Edna, Cloeta, Beacon, Catawaba, and Wananuka. The demonstrators are to keep a record of these cuttings and next year the cooperators will be given cuttings from the ones grown this year. The farm fruit plot demonstrators are Virginia Crockett, Espuela; Alva Butler and LaRue Holmes, McAdoo; Lou Wana Dunlap, Billie Collier and Fannie Lou McAllister, Patton Springs; Adaline Bvans, Prairie Chapel and Stella Mae Cowan and Bobbie Minix, Wichita.

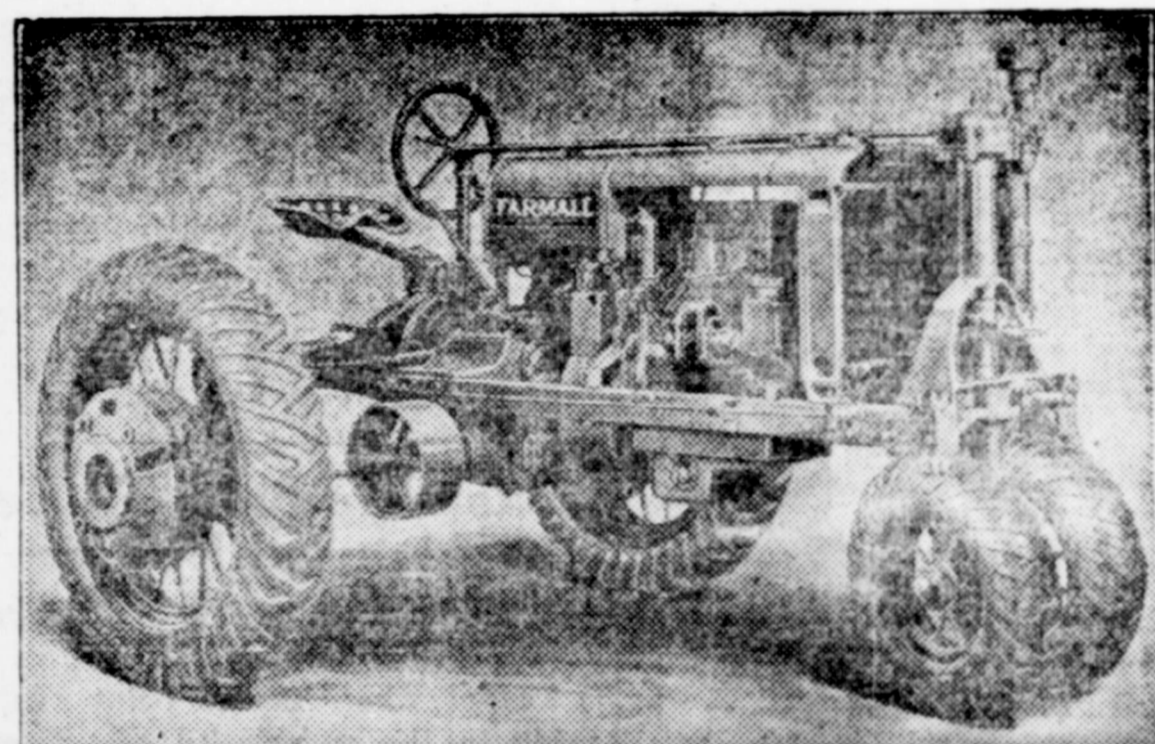

Gasoline is, of course, in comparison with No. 1 distillate, a very volatile and easily vaporized fuel. Little heat is required on the intake manifold to change the gasoline from liquid to vapor.

Distillate

Distillate, being a heavier fuel than gasoline, requires more heat on the intake manifold to vaporize it.

Kerosene

Kerosene requires considerably more heat to change it to a vapor than gasoline. Its heat requirements in this respect are approximately the same as in No. 1 distillate.

Heat Control

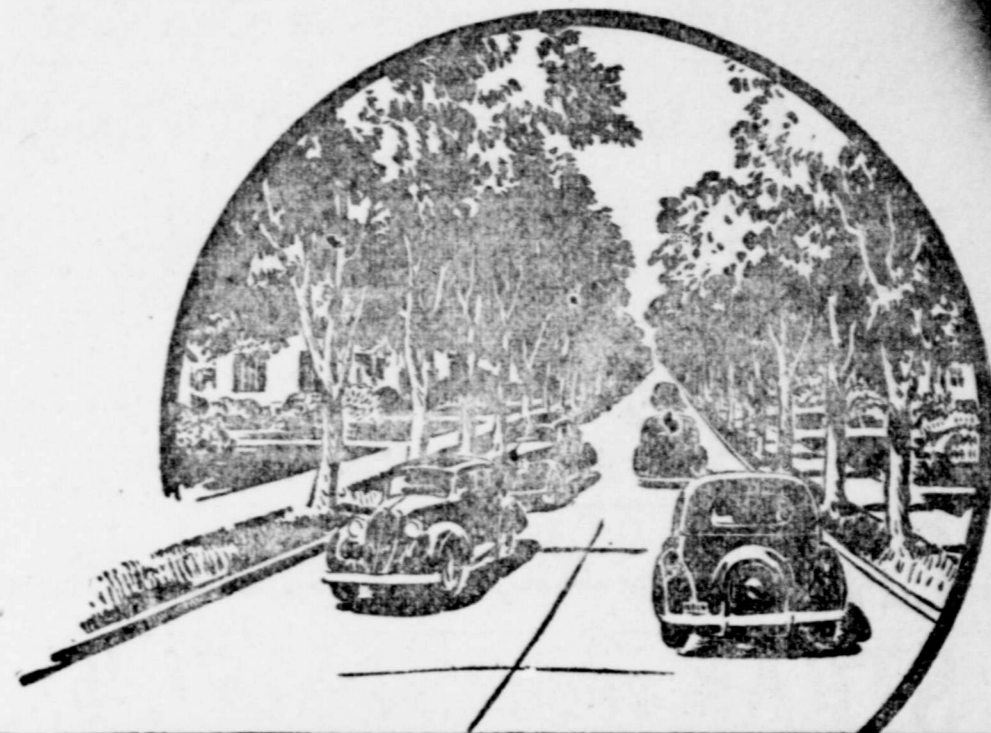

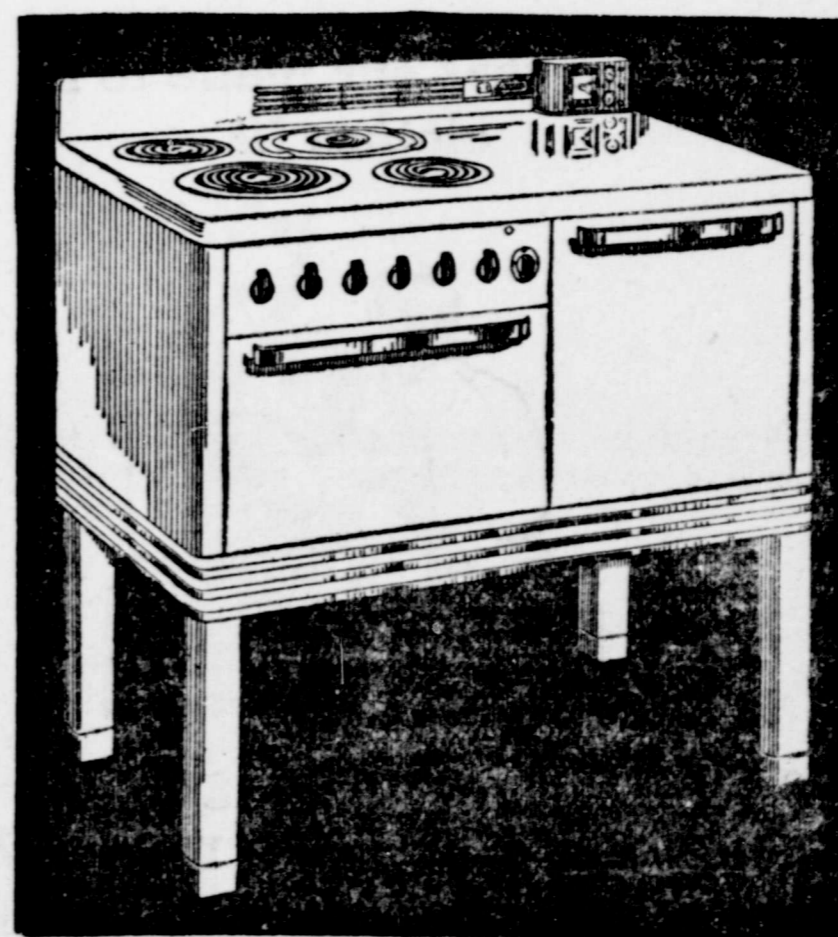

ORCHARD DEMONSTRATOR IS BUSY

Fannie Lou McAllister, farm fruit plot demonstrator in the Patton Springs 4-H club is getting a nice start in her orchard work. Recently 24 trees were set including three varieties of cherry plum, two varieties of cherries, two of plums, and four varieties of peaches. These added to the peach, apricot and apple trees in the old orchard will more than supply the fruit needs of the family.

But the McAllisters are not depending entirely upon trees to furnish their fruit needs for they know they can not expect a fruit crop more than once in three years. They have a 50 by 60 foot plot of black and dewberries and are starting a vineyard from cuttings. The vine and bush fruits do produce fruit every year, that is late freezes do not get them as they do the tree fruits.

Fannie Lou decided to try the grapes from cuttings and has 30 cuttings heeled in which she will set out next month. She heeled them in, butt ends up, to give the butts an opportunity to callus over before planting then they will be ready to send out rootlets as soon as planted. Two varieties of the grapes are Fern Munson and Edna and she received the cuttings from the Lubbock Experiment Substation; the other ten came from neighbor's vineyard. With care she expects to grow at least 20 grape vines from her cuttings.

There are six people in the family and Fannie Lou has made her orchard plans to provide four grape vines and ten berry vines for each member in the family. The tree fruits will be that much more toward her complete orchard.

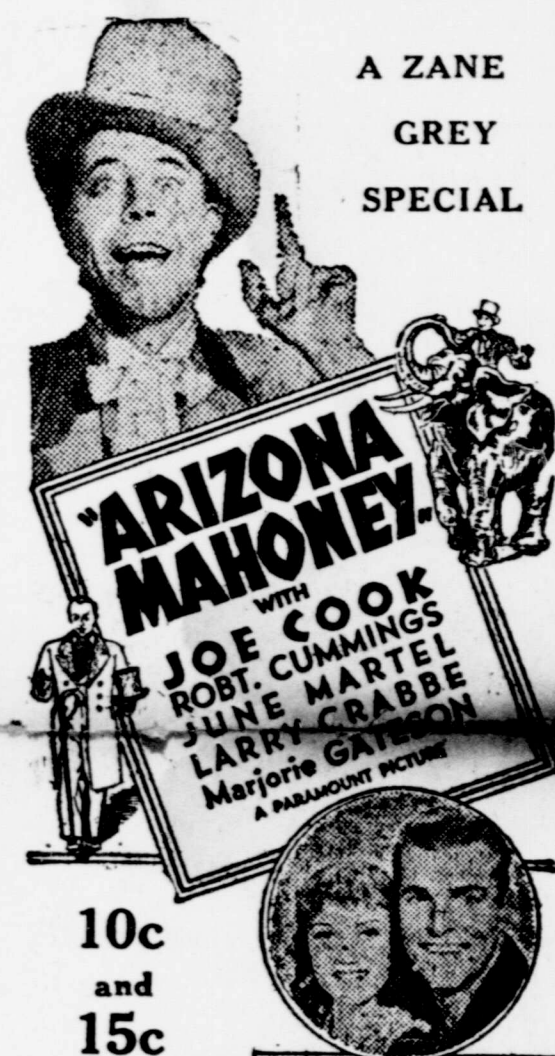

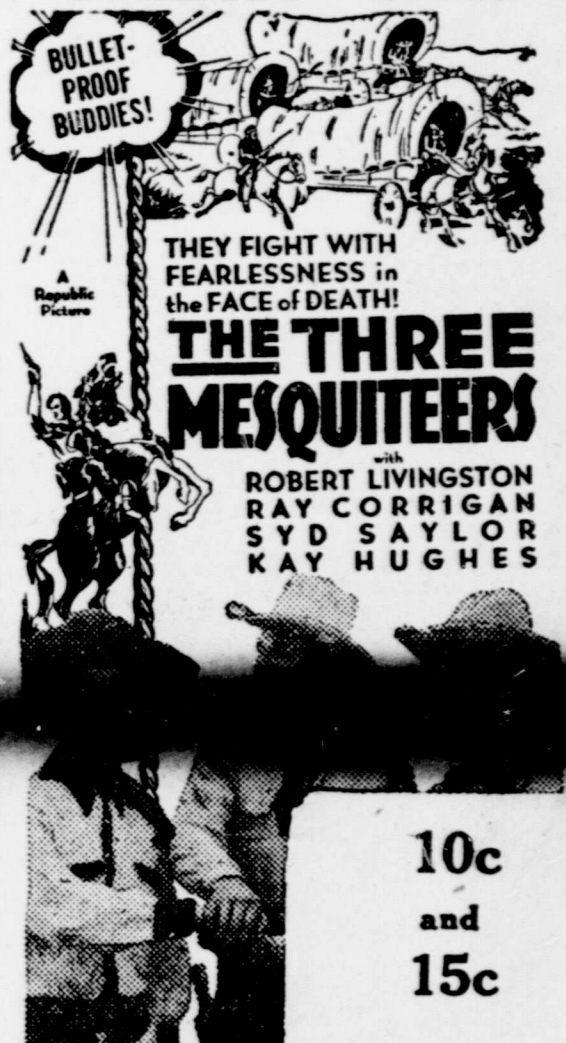
