







# "The Plainsman" Coming April 4-5-6

**Greatest Historical Picture Ever**  
**Filmed To Be Shown At Palace**  
**Sunday, Monday and Tuesday**

The genius of Cecil B. DeMille is turned to his native America in "The Plainsman," a tensely dramatic and inspiring epic of America in the making, which will be shown at the Palace Theatre for three days, Sunday, Monday and Tuesday and at the special mid-nite preview Saturday night.

Heretofore concerned mainly with periods in world history which marked the beginnings of tremendous changes through the rise of Christianity, the influences of ancient Rome, the pivotal meeting of the East and Western Europe engendered by the Crusades, and other forces of equal import in world history, DeMille now turns his unique talents to the ten important years between the end of the Civil War and Custer's dramatic stand at Little Big Horn, the decade that marked the beginning of Western expansion. "The Plainsman" is a

masterful tribute to the men who made this possible.

### Famed Characters Recreated

All the colorful characters, known and loved by America for the past two generations come to life again in this pageant of empire-building. "Wild Bill" Hickok, masterfully portrayed by Gary Cooper; "Calamity Jane," played by lovely Jean Arthur; "Buffalo Bill," enacted by James Ellison; General George A. Custer, played by John Miljan, the famous Indian Chiefs "Sitting Bull" "Yellow Hand" and "Painted Horse" President Lincoln and his wartime cabinet, are all included in this film.

There are also hundreds of Cheyenne Indians, borrowed from the Tongue River Reservation, several troops of cavalry, provided by the U. S. Government and the State of Wyoming; gamblers, frontier characters and settlers, all assembled and masterfully merged into a film

## CALAMITY JANE JOINS HOST OF HISTORIC BELLES



"Calamity Jane," famous frontier-woman of the early '70's, joins the glamorous array of gorgeous women who made history, and whose lives were glorified by the genius of Cecil B. DeMille, in "The Plainsman," a saga of the West.

Thus, "Calamity," who packed a pair of six-guns like the best of 'em, handled a six-horse stage-coach over what then passed for roads in the West, and operated a saloon, joins such elegant company as Cleopatra, Queen Berengaria, Nero's wife, Poppae, and a host of others whose smiles sent thousands to their deaths and whose charms were so largely responsible for the course of history.

"Calamity Jane" is played by beautiful Jean Arthur, and it is her romance with "Wild Bill" Hickok, famous peace officer in the lawless wild, portrayed by Gary Cooper, which forms the basis of the broad

It has been ascertained that "Calamity Jane" received her name from a troop of soldiers who found her as a babe, beside her dead parents after an Indian massacre—a true child of calamity. A real product of the West, she was "tough and hard-boiled" only in the sense that all women of the west were hardened to suffering and toil. In this she was the typical woman of the West and is thus glorified by DeMille.

Other famed frontier characters who come back to life in the DeMille saga are "Buffalo Bill," played by James Ellison; his wife, Louisa, by Helen Burgess; General George A. Custer, by John Miljan, and a host of other noted soldiers, gamblers, pioneers, Indian chiefs and frontiersmen.

### War Starts Story

The story of "The Plainsman" begins with the end of the Civil War and the unscrupulous gun-running among the Indians engineered by arms manufacturers eager to get rid of their surplus stocks. Heading out of Leavenworth, the "jumping off place" for the West, is Cooper, as the colorful "Wild Bill" Hickok. The stage to Hays City is driven by "Calamity Jane." The two fall in love but Cooper resents the girl's familiarity with other men, and conceals his emotions.

Before they reach Hays City the party runs into Indian trouble.

Cooper takes a hand at once, directing his efforts mainly against John Latimer and Jack McCall, who are selling the guns to the Indians. The roles of these two notorious frontier characters are carried by Charles Bickford and Porter Hall.

### Custer's Army Falls

After Custer's army is wiped out by the Indians, Cooper goes after Latimer and McCall. They contrive to make him a hunted man but he captures some of their teamsters. While waiting for the army to come up, Cooper engages them in a poker game. The climax comes with the arrival of the troops and a tensely dramatic scene between Cooper and Miss Arthur.

### On Warpath

Two nephews of the famous Cheyenne Chief, "Roman Nose," who was killed at the battle of Beecher's Island in 1868, ride again at the head of the Cheyennes against the United States Cavalry at the island in "The Plainsman." Cecil B. DeMille's stirring tribute to the men who made the West.

They are "Little Coyote," present Chief of the Cheyennes, and "Medicine Bird," and they ride at the head of 2,000 Cheyenne braves, hired from the Tongue River Reservation.

### What? . . . No Tub?

Cecil B. DeMille offers no bathtub sequence in his latest picture, "The Plainsman." Instead, hundreds of Indians ride their horses through a river. It's practically the first time a DeMille picture was included no tub.

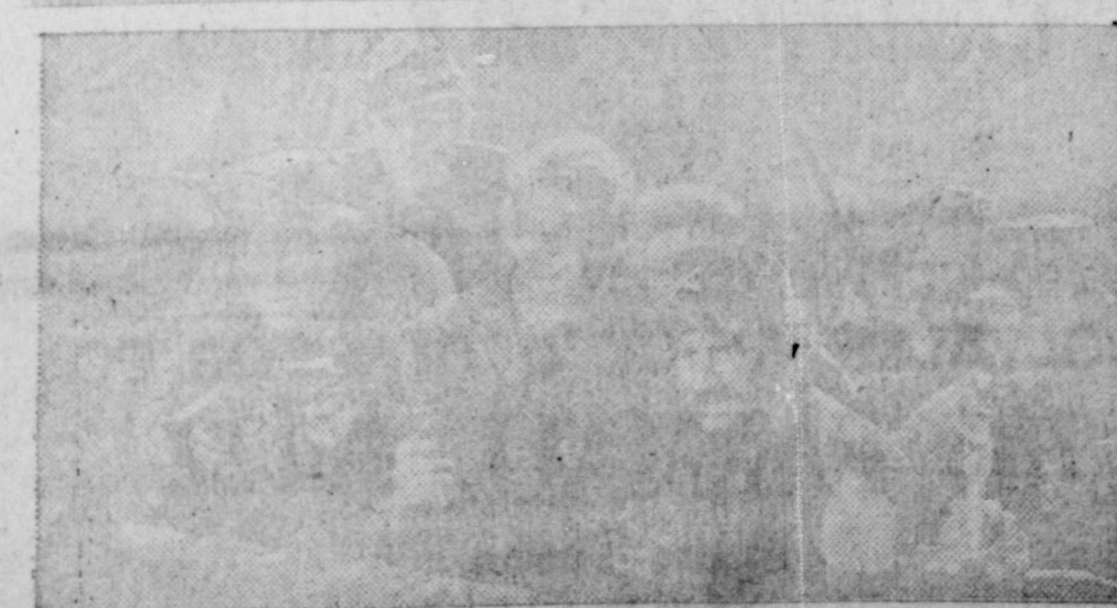

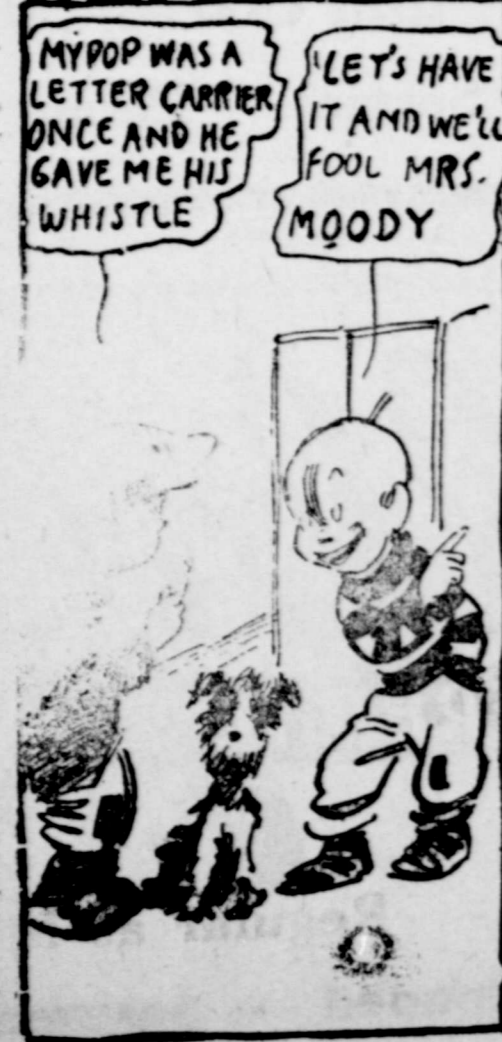
