## C of C Membership Meeting Held Tuesday Evening

The first membership meeting since reorganization was held by the Chamber of Commerce Tuesday evening in the basement of Bryant-Link Company. About 35 members enjoyed the lunch prepared by Dr. Bob Alexander's committee.

President M. C. Golding presided and in his introductory talk gave a report of the two months work since he had been elected president. Under his able leadership an organization has been built that is already at work as was attested later in the evening by the reports of the committee chairman, Mr. Golding expressed his appreciation to the membership and especially to the other two members of the executive committee, C. V. Hardwick and O. C. Arthur, in getting the reorganized body off to the right start.

Secretary H. P. Gibson gave a financial report of the two months showing that all accounts of the old and new organization had been paid with a small balance left in the treasury. O. C. Arthur gave an organization report, naming the new directors and the committee members selected by the chairman, also outlining the duties of the committees. W. H. Atkinson was added as a member of the Trades Day committee, and L. E. Lee to the Roads and Transportation committee.

Mr. Arthur also discussed the changes in mail service inaugurated last Sunday. He also announced the change in bus schedules which will improve facilities in and out of Spur. A letter of thanks was voted Joe Bowman, manager of South Plains Coaches, for the improved schedule.

Pat Levens, in the absence of W. F. Gilbert, chairman, gave a report for the roads and transportation committee. This committee has been active on the road to Post and other matters referred to them. Bill Putman supplemented the report and told the organization about the hearty cooperation of Commissioner Walter Foreman.

R. E. Dickson discussed the agricultural exhibit at the West Texas Chamber of Commerce Convention. This was the best exhibit prepared in many years and was so regarded by visitors to Brownwood during the Convention.

Judge Marshall Formby stated that the Chamber would have the cooperation of the Commissioners' Court on the development of feeder roads and urged a community spirit between all the towns of the county.

C. V. Hardwick, Vice President, gave a report on the Trades Days planned for June stating that plans were going forward for handling large crowds June 1 and 2 with the opening of the Spur Swimming Pool and the giving away of the car by the Palace Theatre. Mr. Hardwick expressed the hope that a regular trades day program could be planned and asked W. H. Atkinson to explain the plan being used at Haskell. Mr. Atkinson discussed this merchant cooperative plan where a trades day is held every Wednesday using a treasure chest as the promotion feature. The cost of this plan will be known in a few days and definite announcements will be forth coming.

Rav Taylor discussed plans of the Wichita Valley relative to handling this year's wheat crop. He stated that adequate facilities would be had at Spur if the large crop materialized.

C. V. Allen gave a report of the publicity committee advancing a number of worthwhile suggestions relative to advertising and publicity for Spur and Dickens County. Spur merchants have for years advertised quality as well as competitive prices and this feature will be stressed more in the future.

L. R. Burrow discussed the plans for the opening of the swimming pool and the bathing beauty revue being sponsored by the band club June 1. Mrs. A. Moore urged that alleys be cleaned up in order that adequate parking facilities be made available.

## Rotary Assembly To Be Held Here In July

Announcement was made last week by Cap McNeill, President elect of the Spur Rotary Club, that the annual Assembly of the 41st District Rotary International would be held in Spur in July. The new District Governor, Mr. McLaughlin of Ralls, awarded the Assembly to Spur before sailing this week for Europe to attend the International Convention at Nice, France.

The assembly will bring approximately 100 men here for a business meeting of the organization. The president, secretaries and heads of committees from all clubs in the district will meet to plan the work of the year. The Spur Rotary Club will be hosts and special entertainment is being planned.

## Chapman Appointed District Judge

Alton B. Chapman, District Attorney of the 110th Judicial District for the past two and a half years, was named District Judge of the same district last Thursday by Gov. James V. Allred. The vacancy was created when the Governor appointed Judge A. J. Polley of Floydada to the Seventh District Court of Civil Appeals as Associate Justice. Judge Polley was named to the post of M. J. R. Jackson who had been appointed Chief Justice succeeding R. Walker Hall, deceased.

John Hamilton, former County Attorney of Motley County, was named Saturday by the Governor as District Attorney to take the place held by Judge Chapman. Mr. Hamilton is a young attorney of Matador and son of Judge G. E. Hamilton, pioneer of this section.

Judge Chapman is probably the youngest District Judge in the State. A son of the late M. W. and Mrs. Chapman, reared on a Dickens County farm, Chapman graduated from Spur high school and entered Hardin-Simmons University for his pre-law studies. He finished his law course at the University of Texas and returned to his home county to practice and was elected County Attorney in 1930 and served four years. In 1934 he was elected District Attorney and in 1936 was re-elected without an opponent. He was considered a possible candidate in 1938.

Judge Polley has been a resident of Floydada for 12 years. He was appointed District Attorney of the 110th District by Gov. Dan Moody when the district was created and served two elective terms in that position being elevated to the bench as District Judge in 1934 and was serving his first term.

### LEE WATSON KILLED IN OIL FIELD ACCIDENT AT ODESSA

Funeral services were held Tuesday, May 11, for Lee Watson, 41, former McAdoo farmer, at Marquez, Texas. He was a nephew of Mrs. C. D. Copeland and Will Watson. Both attended the funeral.

He is survived by his father, three brothers and one sister, brothers and one sister.

Mr. Watson was killed at Odessa on Saturday, May 8th by electrical shock. Mr. Watson, Bob Sullivan and Gale Harvey, all former Dickens County residents, and other members of a crew, were moving an oil derrick to a new location. The derrick had to pass under some electric high lines but failed to clear. Mr. Sullivan and Mr. Harvey felt the shock first and told Mr. Watson to stay away from the truck, apparently he misunderstood and went to the truck and received the full load of the high line causing death instantly. The other two men were burned slightly and will recover. The power had to be turned off before Mr. Watson's body could be removed from the truck.

Mr. Watson had been a resident of Dickens County for fourteen years.

Veterans of the World War are urged to pay tribute to their fallen comrades on Poppy Day, Saturday, May 29, in a message issued today by Ernest Hale, Commander of the Boyd M. Williams Post No. 161 of the American Legion.

Commander Hale called upon all members of the Legion and other veterans to observe the day by wearing memorial poppies in honor of the war dead. His message stated:

"On Saturday, May 29, our comrades who gave their lives in defense of the country will be remembered and honored by the wearing of their memorial flower, the poppy. We who served by their sides can never forget the great patriotic sacrifice they made. All Legionnaires and other veterans will, I am sure, be among the first to wear the flower of remembrance on Poppy Day.

The poppies will be distributed by the women of the American Legion Auxiliary, our wives, mothers, sisters and daughters. They are giving their services on that day to bring everyone in the city an opportunity to honor the war dead and help the disabled and fatherless families. The poppies have been made by disabled veterans unable to do other work. Contributions received for the flowers will be used in the welfare activities of the Legion and Auxiliary.

"Twenty years have passed since the call to war came, but we of the Legion have not forgotten. We are still devoted to the ideals for which we fought and hold high the memory of those who died in service to country. We hope that all patriotic citizens will join us in wearing the poppy on Poppy Day.

A new mail service was inaugurated Sunday at the Spur post office that will greatly facilitate the receiving and dispatching of first class mail. Mail arrives at Spur from Lubbock at 6:00 A. M. and 10:45 A. M. and leaves for Lubbock at 6:05 A. M. and 4:30 P. M. This includes first class mail and insured parcel post. Mail must be in the post office at 5:30 A. M. to catch the early morning service and by 4:00 P. M. for the afternoon route.

The above schedule makes it possible to mail a letter early in the morning and get it into Fort Worth that day. The other mail services in and out of Spur are: The Post star route mail is received at 12:00 noon and departs at 2:00 P. M. The Roaming Springs star route, arrives at 12:30 P. M. and departs at 1:50 P. M. The train arrives at 12:45 P. M. and departs at 3:15 P. M. Rural carrier on Route 1 leaves at 8:30 A. M. and returns at 11:30. On Route A the carrier leaves at 2:30 P. M. and returns at 4:30.

### HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION

proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas to be known as Section 20 of Article VIII, providing that no property of any kind shall be assessed for ad valorem taxes at a greater value than its fair cash market value; and giving the Legislature power to provide that the State and all governmental or political subdivisions or taxing districts may allow a discount for payment of ad valorem taxes before the date when they would otherwise become delinquent; and providing that this Amendment shall become effective January 1, 1939; providing for an election on the question of adoption or rejection of this Amendment; providing for the proclamation and publication thereof; and making an appropriation therefor; and prescribing the form of ballot.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding a new Section to Article VIII to be known as Section 20 and to read as follows:

"Section 20. No property of any kind in this State shall ever be assessed for ad valorem taxes at a greater value than its fair cash market value nor shall any Board of Equalization of any governmental or political subdivision or taxing district within this State, fix the value of any property for tax purposes at more than its fair cash market value; provided that in order to encourage the prompt payment of taxes, the Legislature shall have the power to provide that the taxpayer shall be allowed by the State and all governmental and political subdivisions and taxing districts of the State a three per cent (3%) discount and ad valorem taxes due the State or due any governmental or political subdivision or taxing district of the State if such taxes are paid ninety (90) days before the date when they would otherwise become delinquent; and

the taxpayer shall be allowed a two per cent (2%) discount on said taxes if paid sixty (60) days before said taxes would become delinquent; and the taxpayer shall be allowed a one per cent (1%) discount if said taxes are paid thirty (30) days before they would otherwise become delinquent. This amendment shall be effective January 1, 1939. The Legislature shall pass necessary laws for the proper administration of this Section."

Sec. 2 The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at a special election to be held throughout the State of Texas on the 23rd day of August, 1937, at which election all voters favoring the proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the following words:

"FOR the Amendment to the State Constitution providing that property shall never be assessed for taxes at more than its fair-cash market value, and providing that in order to encourage the prompt payment of ad valorem taxes, the Legislature shall have the power to permit a discount for the payment of same before they become delinquent."

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Those voters opposing said proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words:

"AGAINST the Amendment to the State Constitution providing that property shall never be assessed for taxes at more than its fair cash market value, and providing, that in order to encourage the prompt payment of ad valorem taxes, the Legislature shall have the power to permit a discount for the payment of same before they become delinquent."

If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said Amendment, the same shall become a part of the State Constitution.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution for Amendments thereto.

Sec. 4. The sum of Eight Thousand Dollars (\$8,000), or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State, not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expenses of such publication and election.

### HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION

proposing an amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adopting a new Section to be known as Section 51-c which shall provide, that the Legislature shall have power, under such limitations and restrictions as may be deemed by the Legislature expedient for assistance to the needy blind over the age of twenty-one (21) years, and for the payment of same not to exceed Fifteen Dollars (\$15) per month each, and providing for payment of such assistance or aid only to actual bona fide citizens of Texas and providing that the requirements for the length of time of actual residence in Texas shall never be less than five (5) years during the nine (9) years immediately preceding the application for such assistance and continuously for one year immediately preceding such application; and providing that the Legislature shall have the authority to accept from the Government of the United States financial aid for assistance to such blind; providing for an election on the question of adoption or rejection of such amendment and making an appropriation therefor; providing for the proclamation and publication thereof and prescribing the form of ballot.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas, as amended, be amended by adding thereto a Section to be known as Article 51-c which shall read as follows:

"Section 51-c. The Legislature shall have the power by General Laws to provide, under such limitations and regulations and restrictions as may be by the Legislature deemed expedient, for assistance to the needy blind over the age of twenty-one (21) years, and for the payment of same not to exceed Fifteen Dollars (\$15) per month per person; such assistance or aid to be granted only to actual bona fide citizens of Texas; provided that no habitual criminal and no habitual drunkard and no inmate of any State supported institution, while such inmate, shall be eligible for such assistance to the needy blind over the age of twenty-one (21) years; provided, further, that the requirements for the length of time of actual residence in Texas shall never be less than five (5) years during the nine (9) years immediately preceding the application for assistance to the needy blind over the age of twenty-one (21) years; and continuously for one year immediately preceding such application.

"The Legislature shall have the authority to accept from the Government of the United States such financial aid for assistance to the needy blind as that Government may offer not inconsistent with the restrictions hereinabove provided."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at a special election to be held throughout the State of Texas on the fourth Monday of August, 1937, at which election all voters favoring the proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the following words:

"FOR the Amendment to the State Constitution providing for assistance to the needy blind over the age of twenty-one (21) years, not to exceed Fifteen Dollars (\$15) per month per person, and providing for acceptance from the Government of the United States of America financial aid for such payment."

Those voters opposing said proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words:

"AGAINST the Amendment to the State Constitution providing for assistance to the needy blind over the age of twenty-one (21) years, not to exceed Fifteen Dollars (\$15) per month per person, and providing for acceptance from the Government of the United States of America financial aid for such payment."

If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said Amendment, the same shall become a part of the State Constitution.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution for Amendments thereto.

Sec. 4. The sum of Nine Thousand Dollars (\$9,000), or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State, not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expenses of such publication and election.

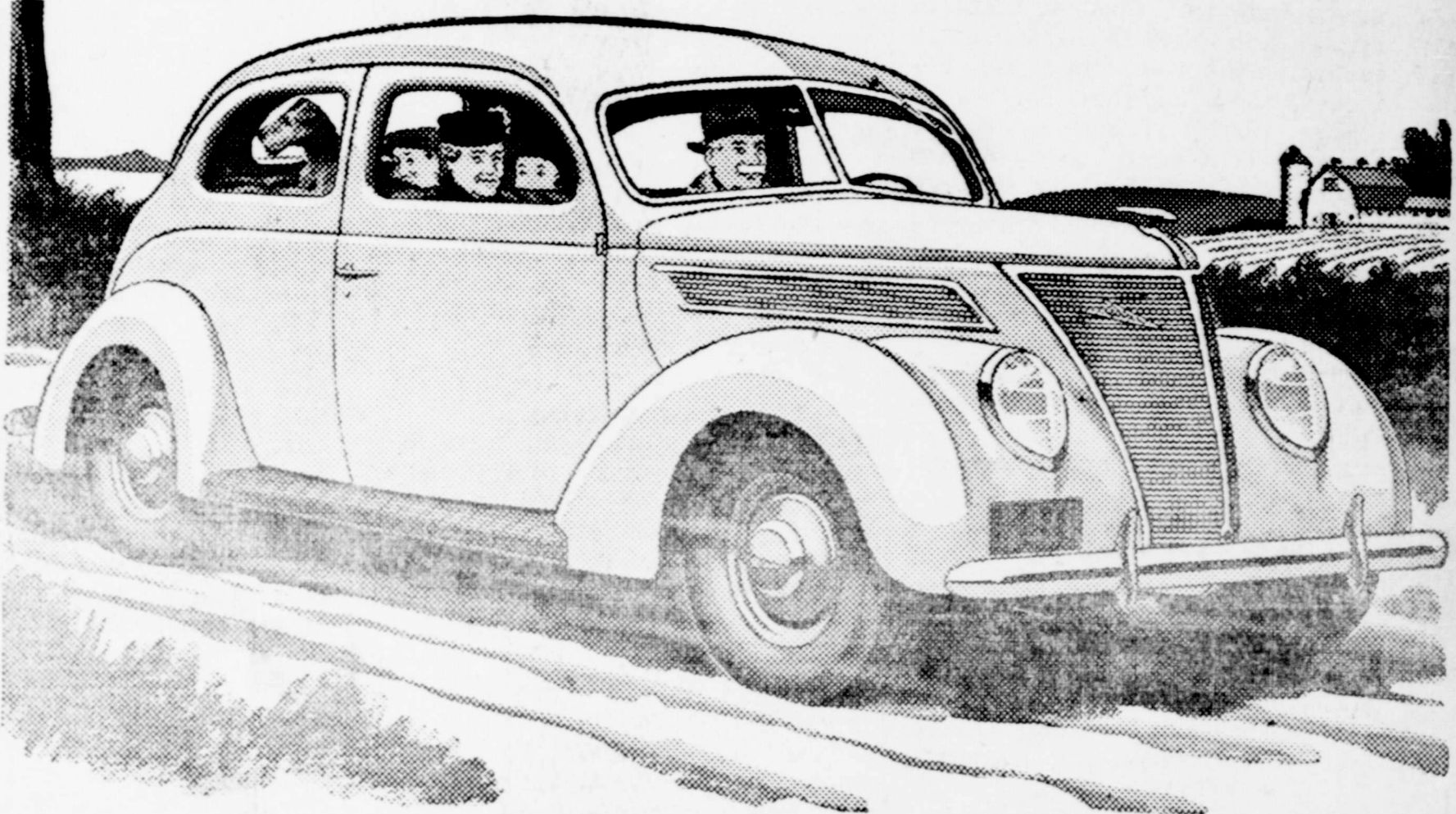
