

#### Actor's Ability To Take It Comes In Handy In Sea Film

Except in the matter of flying, in which he iss an ultra con servative, Wallace Berry will take more than his share of the bumps that appear so necessary in thhe career of any movie villain. The actor dosen't claim to be a daredevil, nor does he aspire to ape cinemaland stunt men. It just happens that he likes the going rough and tough.

Berry, who recently endangered the soundness of his limbs scrambled up the shrouds and schooner masts for "Slave Ship," the Twentieth Century-Fox sea drama showing at the Palace Preview Saturday Nite, Sunday and Monday, has risked his neck more than any other player now prominent on the screen.

From the low slapstick fall which distinguished his early comedy efforts, Berry advanced to rougher going. In "Old Ironsides" he fell twenty feet from a mast to a deck that wouldn't give, shook himself twice and started up again. In the early comedy days he fell from fast moving motercycles, and once stuck to the cab of a locamotive as it crashed into a pile of rocks and timbers.

In "A message to Gorcia" he became impatient with a stunt man who held the company up while bickering for \$500 to wade through a pool of aligaters. Berry finally pushed him aside and did the job himself.

In flying, he is more cautious, refusing to take chances. "I'll only fly when birds are in the air," grounded in heavy rains,

snow or excessive winds Perhaps of the fact that he refuses to fight the elements, he can boast that he never has had an accident in more than ten years of continous flying, some of it over the roughest terrain in the country.

In "Slave Ship," a dramatic sea film dealing with the slave trade, Berry, who is co-starred with Warner Baxter, willingly risks his health and peace of mind in five minutes of the wildest rioting and mutiny ever staged for the screen. 
