## Seen and Heard

For the benefit of the large number interested in the opening of dove season September 1, I urge you to read the article in this issue signed by Austin Aulds, Game Warden of this district. The warden is out to protect our birds and with just a little help can insure some good hunting this year and in the years to come.

I could write a whole column about soft ball after seeing that masterful exhibition Tuesday night when the Red Birds defeated Lubbock Poultry & Egg 16 to 15.

Link & Epps received a shipment of 450 sheep from Del Rio a few days ago. Probably the largest shipment of sheep ever received at Spur. The sheep were placed on pasture and will be kept for next summer's market.

The writer was told a few days ago that it was useless to continue asking the Commissioners Court to print a financial statement of the county's condition, either now or later. From that view point they must be almighty and responsible to nobody, not even to the folks that cast the vote or to the property owner who pays the bill in the form of taxes. Also, we have read the law covering this particular feature and know that the law says they shall print the report following the first regular meeting in January and are not required to print a quarterly report as a large number of counties are doing.

We have heard lots of discussion recently relative to the difference between a county commissioner and a precinct commissioner. What is yours?

These remarks are not personal as I think we have five high type men who make up the Commissioners' Court. I am just trying to convince them that they are due the electorate a report on the financial status of the county and as the governing body are responsible. Another thing, the financial status of the county is not a result of this particular group of men but goes back through the years. The Commissioners Courts of the past erred in my judgment in not placing before the public by the judicial use of printers ink the condition of their county's business.

I heard this statement last Saturday by an influential taxpayer: "The more people ask for the higher taxes go." More truth than poetry.

M. Garcia, tenant farmer on the Jim Foster place, was in town Tuesday and stated he had 15 open bales of cotton on 100 acres and planned to start pickers Wednesday morning. If the weather man don't prevent looks as though there will be a lot of cotton picked in the south end of the county in the next few days. Spur gins are tuned up and ready to go and a few whistles have blown this week indicating the fall season is about here.

## COUNTY AGENTS TO MEET AT COLLEGE STATION

A state wide meeting of county agricultural agents and home demonstration agents has been called for September 6 to 10 at College Station. The meeting was scheduled following cancellation of the Short Course last year. G. J. Lane and Miss Jean Day will attend from this county.

## Special Election Next Monday

Voters of Texas will go to the polls again Monday to change their Constitution or to retain it as is. Six amendments to the Texas Constitution will be voted upon. Five of the amendments are of general interest and the other applies to Harris County (Houston).

The predictions are for a very light vote over the entire state as very little interest has been aroused except of those interested in some particular amendment.

The regular general election clerks will conduct the election with every box in the county open.

## Roby Man Accepts Position At Spur Bank

Hobert Lewis, formerly of Roby, has accepted a position with the Spur Security Bank, beginning work last Monday. He is in the exchange department. He was added to the staff of the local bank following the resignation of M. D. Ivey, who has accepted a position at Rotan.

Mr. Lewis has had about ten years experience, being connected with the Peacock Bank before going to Roby five years ago.

## TRENCH SILO—THE ECONOMICAL WAY TO STORE FEED

Experimental results show that feed from one acre of land put in a silo will go as far as feed from two acres of land cured in the shock. The main reasons for this are that there is a considerable loss of feed value in curing in the shock. Also there is much waste in feeding dry fodder. The average cost of growing and storing the silage crops in 1936 was \$2.31 per ton. This is cheaper than the same feed could be cut and stored in the shock.

Farmers of Dickens County are showing increased interest in trench silo construction. Bill Middleton of Afton, this week, has dug a trench silo that will hold 100 tons of silage. Mr. Middleton constructed and filled a trench silo last year, and is thoroughly sold on this method of storing feed. Information regarding trench silo construction is available at the County Agent's office in Dickens.

## Lubbock Fair Adds Two New Divisions

Lubbock—The expansion program for the 24th annual Panhandle South Plains Fair was given a further boost this week when fair officials announced two new divisions in the swine department and a separate department for dual purpose cattle (Milking Shorthorns).

The two divisions added to the swine department were for Chester Whites and Spotted Poland Chinas. Divisions in the department last year were Poland Chinas, Duroc Jerseys and Hamshires.

A separate division for "Dual Purpose" cattle was provided because, of the expectation that exhibits in that group would be the largest in the history of the fair as Milking Shorthorn Breeders over the state have shown considerable interest in having this particular breed shown to the best advantage possible. Frank J. Weil of Hale Center, President of the Northwest Texas Shorthorn Breeders Association, has accepted the appointment as superintendent of this division, and Miles Milhoan of Wildorado, Texas, will be the judge.

Enlargement of the swine department was made in response to the many requests received from farmers and other interested citizens throughout the South Plains and is expected to fill the swine building overflowing Douglas Ponds of Lubbock County is superintendent of this division.

Judge for the Hereford division of the cattle department will be D. L. Stevens of Brownwood, one of the most prominent breeders of that type of cattle in the Southwest. Superintendent W. L. Stangel expects a large increase this year.

## Boy Scout Troop 35 Wins Second Place in District Swim Meet

Displaying power in the relay events Troop 35's Scout swimming team stroked to a second place victory in the South Plains Council Swimming meet held at Lubbock City pool Thursday night.

The local troop, recent winners of a sub-district meet held at Spur where they ran up 240 points, placed second to defending Champion Troop 2 of Lamesa at the Lubbock event. Lack of senior swimmers and divers proved the difference between Lamesa's 111 points and Spur's 91. Troop 4 of Lubbock was third with 78 counters.

In the individual contests Wade Gilbert was second in the junior backstroke; Billy Ray Barrett, who was high point man in the junior division for the entire meet, swam to a second place win in the breast stroke and was second in the distant plunge. Bob Weaver, Spur breast stroker, was third in the junior breast stroke race. Charles Christensen was first in the distant plunge, senior division, and Fike Godfrey also plunged to a second place win in both intermediate and senior plunging events. Lloyd Barber took third honors in the intermediate back stroke.

Winning one first, four seconds, and a third in as many relay events, the Spur swimmers scored 65 points in the relays. The junior team of Gilbert, Barclay, Weaver, and Barrett, was second in the medley and free style relays. Intermediates, Barber, G. J. Lane, Bill Laine, and Christensen won the medley event and was nosed out by Lamesa for the free style championship. Seniors, Raymond Ince, Jeff Smart, Eugene Taylor, and V. C. Smart, was second to Lamesa in the medley relay and ran third in the free style competition.

A number of Spur fans accompanied the troop to Lubbock. The Scouts enjoyed a watermelon feast after the races. Ribbons were awarded winners of first, second, and third places. The Troop 35 swimming team was coached by Richard Godeke, Morris Laine, and Scoutmaster Blackie Wadzeck.

## District Court To Convene Monday

## To All Sportsmen And Those Interested

Several persons have asked me recently if the dove season will be changed this year. I wish to inform all parties that unless the law is changed before September first it will remain as it has been: opening on the first day of September and closing on the last day of October.

It is a violation of the law to, have in ones possession more than fifteen doves at any one time, and a further violation of the law to kill more than forty-five in one week. I believe that most people are aware that the law is being violated when one shoots doves, or quail, from an automobile or any vehicle, or from a highway or any road maintained by the county.

Shooting doves with a rifle of any kind is a further violation of the law; and if an automatic or pump is used, it must be plugged so as not to hold more than three shells.

We have an abundance of doves and quails this season and there, of course, will be lots of hunting. But I want to ask each of you to obey the law explicitly, as it will be my duty to investigate all hunters and I, as well as my deputies, intend to work hard to protect the game this year. So if you are hunting out of season, or disobeying the game law in any other way, don't blame us if we catch you. Now lets all be good sports as well as citizens and protect our doves and quail so that we can have a big hunt together and each get our share of the game.

## FEDERAL DEPOSIT INSURANCE CORPORATION WASHINGTON

July 2, 1937

Your attention has been called to the proposed amendment to the constitution of Texas to be submitted to voters in an election to be held Monday, August 23, 1937, which provides for the elimination of double liability on stock of State banks in Texas. The Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation favors the proposed amendment.

Inasmuch as more than 98 percent of the depositors in insured banks are stockholders in most national banks has been eliminated. Passage of the proposed double liability will not affect their interests adversely. Double liability of stockholders in national banks has been eliminated. Passage of the proposed amendment to the constitution of Texas will put stockholders of State banks in Texas on a par with stockholders of national banks, thus avoiding discrimination.

kind. We have driven over highways as well constructed and maintained as any in Texas, yet in fields adjoining they still plow with oxen; and peons trudge alongside the road plying whips over the backs of burros loaded with wood or cargoes larger than the beasts themselves.

The history of Mexico is as interesting as that of any nation. The struggles of the people for liberty and freedom have been just as brave, if not braver, than our own. It has been such a privilege to us to journey over the very ground travelled by Cortez, the Spanish Conqueror, hundreds of years ago; to see the palaces and the churches he built. One of the most inspiring and stupendous things we have seen was driving over the mountains to Puebla, looking out upon a valley where Cortez had built a church for everyday of the church year—260 of them, beautiful, massive things of stone with shining burnisher domes; one built on top of a pyramid.

I shant tell you of the bull fight they staged for us. I am glad I saw one—in fact, I enjoyed it, but I can't say that I want to see one again. One of the nicest entertainments given us was yesterday at the Department of Communications. First, of course, a nice luncheon; then young ladies who worked in the department paraded before us dressed in the colorful native costumes of each of the 28 Mexican states. Then they entertained with music, songs and dances. It was better than a professional show since those who played the parts actually came from the states they represented.

We will, of course, be back in time to vote at the election Monday, August 23rd. Six constitutional amendments are to be voted on: All of them are important, and I hope my friends will vote for them. I am particularly interested in seeing the one adopted which will authorize the legislature to provide for payment of county officers by either salaries or fees. The present salary system hasn't worked as satisfactorily as the old fee system. It costs the taxpayers of the state as a whole 70 per cent more—and I'm interested in trying to save that money!

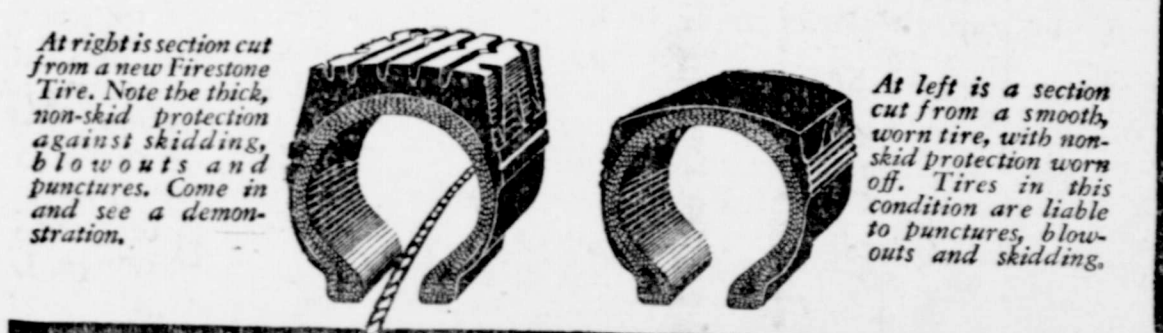

### Northwest Texas Farmers Prove Value Of Trench Silo

Northwest Texas farmers have learned from the experiences of their neighbors that the trench silo is the safest and most economical way to store feed. Many county agricultural agents in that section are estimating that the number of trench silos in their counties will be doubled by the end of the year.

At the beginning of 1935, only 4 trench silos were in use in Lamb county. During 1936, 118 trenches were filled, and the county agricultural agent expects that the number of trench silos in the county will be increased to more than a hundred by the end of the current season.

"I have one mul, that I have not seen pick up in several years but he began kicking up his heels and having a good time soon after I began feeding him silage," C. Z. Ratliff, Wellington farmer, recently told the agent. "My cows increased their milk production 25 per cent two weeks after I started feeding silage. Ratliff, who operates an 80 acre farm without native pasture, filled two small trench silos last year and will refill them this fall.

In the fall of 1936 Houston Ward of Stonewall county put down 500 tons of cane silage in two trench silos and used it as roughage to feed out 300 steers. The silage, when marketed through the steers, brought him \$9.20 a ton. He has already put down 788 tons of silage in three trench silos, and plans to fill three more trenches with an additional 700 tons.

In 1936, Swisher county farmers and dairymen dug and filled 22 trench silos. The results have been so good that the county agricultural agent estimates that as many as 100 trenches may be constructed in the county this fall.

30,000 children—Citizens of tomorrow.

Shall they grow up with strong bodies and trained minds or weak bodies and a warped outlook on the world?

The Community and State owe them: A fair chance to grow from childhood to useful adulthood. Good food, decent clothing, shelter and education.

Passage of the Amendment for Aid to Dependent Children will mean that one-third of the cost of granting monthly payments to the mothers or relatives of these children will be available from the Federal Government. #### Security to the Needy Adult Blind

Texas has between three thousand and five thousand blind persons over the age of twenty-one. Of this number, a large percent are dependent. The percentage of this number who are capable of learning some useful occupation for making a living must have sustenance until such time as they are able to enjoy a living from a definite occupation.

The amendment to be voted on Monday, August 23, giving assistance of \$30.00 per month to the blind, will give sustenance to those who are capable of being rehabilitated and take care of those who cannot make a living. If the amendment passes, the Federal Government will match the appropriation of the State. Do your part in making the blind secure by voting for the amendment for aid to the needy adult blind.

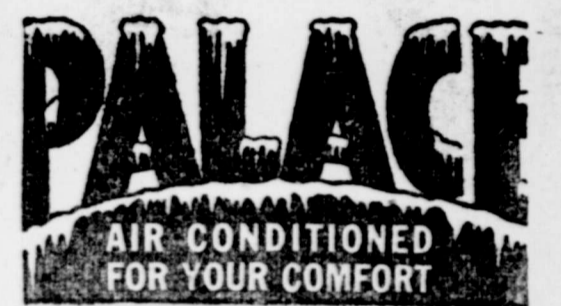

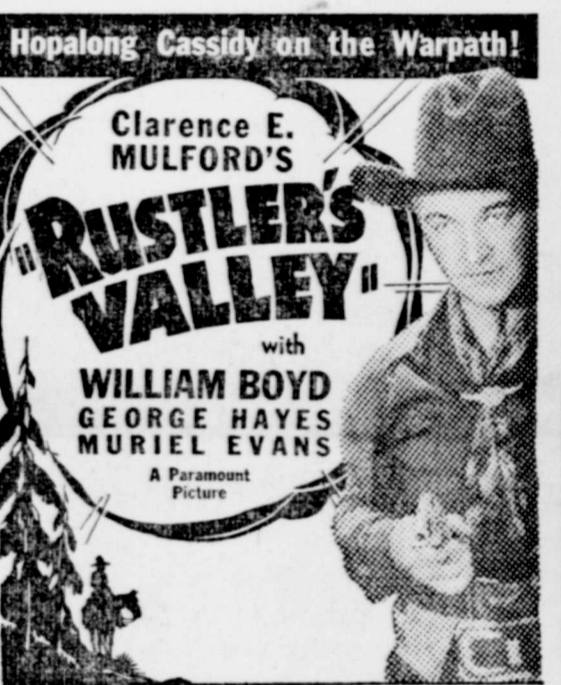
