Educational Event-Tea George Mahon To Visit Spur Soon

Colorado —Congressman George Mahon returned from Washington Friday and opened his Colorado office Saturday. His Secretary, Lloyd Creslin, will remain in the Washing ton office in order to maintain direct contact with the Government Deabout ten days in his Colorado ofvarious portions of the District conferring with the people.

In referring to the past session of Congress, Mahon stated that his chief concern had been farm legislation. He said that Congress was still friendly toward agriculture and the next Congress would no doubt enact a substitute law for the present AAA. He pointed out that this year Congress appropriated \$500, 000,000 for AAA payments to farmers who cooperate in this year's act the injury done agriculture by the tariff which for many years has accorded special privileges to indus try and raised the prices to the consumers. This will be in addition to the subsidy payments on cotton, provided in the closing days of the session, which will tend to guarantee pound for cotton.

In adopting a substitute for the present farm program, Mr. Mahon stated that great care would have to be exercised in order to prevent discrimination against West Texas because the problem here is different from that of the old South.

Mahon said that the farm tenancy program which was adopted would but he praised the expansion of the vocational education program in the schools which was made possible this session.

In commenting on the probabilities of th United States becoming involved in war, he said, "I join others in deploring the treatment accorded American citizens in Shanghai and other paarts of the Orient, but I have no fear that we are going to rush into war. The cost is too great for us to go to war to protect the Shanghai dollar of the American investors. We learned something from the last war, I am confident that the President, the Congress, and, above all, the people are determined to keep out of war."
