# Red Cross Accepting Changes Made In . Basis For Government Cotton Loans

The Department of Agriculture issued new orders Monday changing the basis for making loans on cotton. The new orders provided for loans

One of the difficulties in this section in the way of securing loans on cotton has been on the grade and staple. The government would not F. accept the report of the local grad-A meeting was called at Lubbock Saturday by Congressman George Mahon and delegates from South Plains counties met there and urged the government to place one man at each warehouse to grade and set the staple on the cotton submitted and let his word be final. The Congressman immediately submitted this report last week to the Department. Judgo Marshall Formby was appoint ed by County Agent Grady Lane to represent Dickens County at this

The County Agricultural Conservation Committee met at Dickens last Friday and asked County Judge Formby to wire Lloyd Croslin, Secretary to George Mahon, requesting the Department of Agriculture to make loans on short staple cotton. John Reed, Johnnie Gage, Geo. Mr. Croslin wired Judge Formby Monday of the change to be made in loan by the department.

> Under the new regulations cotton shorter than seven-eighths of an inch, grading strict low middling or equivalent, will be eligible for a loan of 7 cents per pound. Cotton shorter than seven eighths of an inch grading low middling or equivalent, will be eligible for a 6-cent loan. Neither grade was eligible under the initial program, which covered aof an inch and above in staple and strict low middling or equivalent grade was increased under the new regulations to 8 1-2 cents.

There was no change in the higher grades of cotton eligible for 9 cent

"The objective of the modifications," the Commodity Credit corporation announced, "is to afford uniform protection to all producers throughout the belt and to enable them to market their cotton in an orderly manner.
