There were over 600 women who attended the convention. 398 were voting delegates and 395 voted. That reveals the fact that when the house

Morris, Dawson County, was elected State President; Miss Ruth Lundy, Jefferson County, Vice President at Large; Mrs. Ernest Fincher, Liberty County, Secretary; Mrs. W. W. Mitchell, Runnels County, Treasurer; Mrs. J. O. Henderson, Smith County, Auditor; Mrs. W. G. Kennedy, Bailey County, Vice President of District Two.

There were many interesting talks given by Texas Extension Service officials, especially Miss Mildred Horton, Extension Service Assistant Director. She explained why we were sent as delegates, what our duties were and what we had accomplished that we could carry back home.

All twelve districts were represented at the convention. Miss Horton stated that she never saw a happier group of women gather together from all over the state. Everyone seemed to have a smile for each other. And they responded so readily to the convention dule work and play. They were really there when time for work and time for play. They saw San Antonio some would go sight seeing in buses and some in their own cars.

The convention was held in the Gunter Hotel, the largest in San Antonio. We received much kindness from the hotel officials as they were ready to render any service possible. The business meetings and banquet were held in the beautiful crystal ball room.

The delegates of this convention voted that we have an annual district meeting at College Station and the association meet every two years at some advisable city I hope that the next meeting will be held in San Antonio and all the women attending will enjoy the occasion as much as I.

Held scoreless the first half by an air tight defense, the Bulldogs took the opening kick off in the second half and marched 65 yards on running plays to score the first time.

Playing heads up football, big George Murphy, guard, intercepted a pass and raced two thirds the length of the field to score the second counter.

Taking the offensive in the third quarter the locals again went to pounding away at the line until the third touch was counted. All tries for extra were blocked.

Superb line play by Spur kept the Flomot backs behind the line of scrimmage and held the first downs for the champs down to five. The best blocking ever done by a Spur team played a big part in the victory.

Bingham and Haralson were the outstanding ball carriers with Harrell and paving the way with some fine blocking behind a forward wall that was charging hard and fighting every inch of the way.

Amonette was the outstanding star for Flomot and clearly proved that he was all-district half, awarded last year. Outstanding for Flomot in the line were Wedeman at end and L. Gilbert, guard.

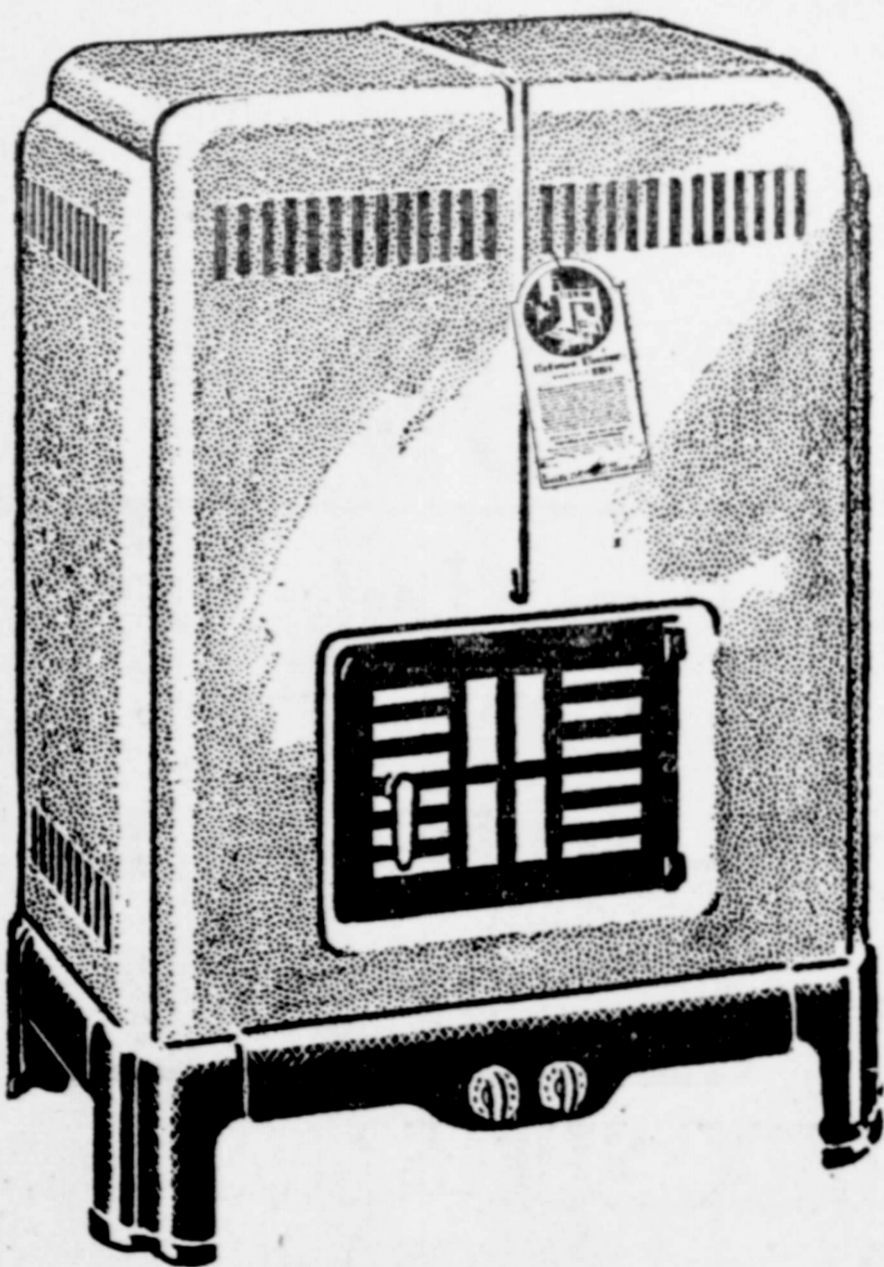

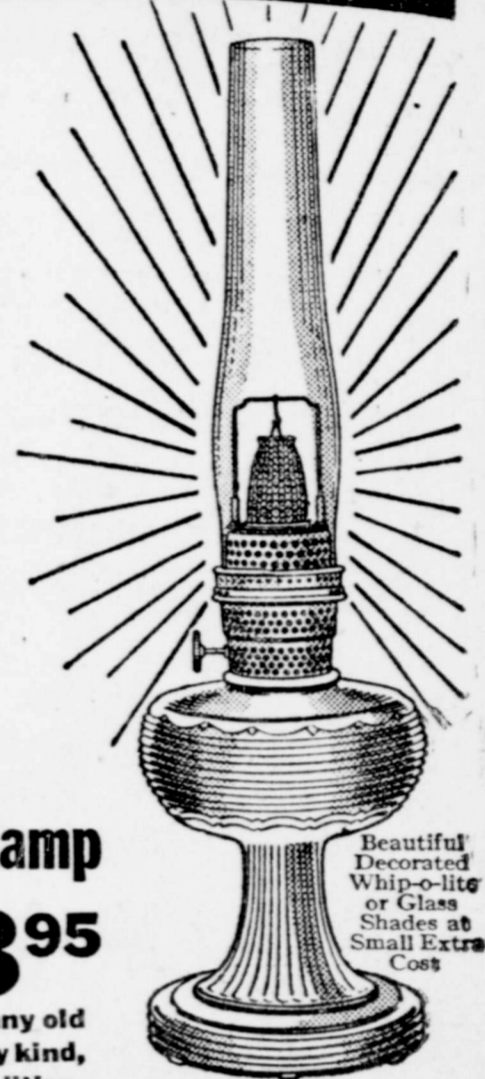

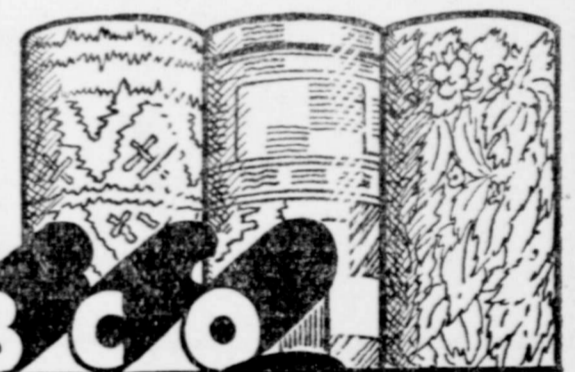
