

WHEN WILL LITTLE JULIUS **GROW UP?**

The sacrifice of human lives on our highways seems to grow, rathar than diminish, as "safety schooling" is publicised. Only last week-end two men were killed a few miles from Spur, near a neighboring city. This is not transportation's big advancement price-most wreeks could be avoided by careful driving. Precautions would leave unchiseled many headstones.

For two cents Little Julius can be hired to be good for a day—well, for an hour if not for a whole day. The question in mind is, just when is Little Julius going to grow up?

It is interesting to note that many of the large insurance companies have decided he isn't everto be a grown man and cease to require hiring for his behavious's sake.

In the past, motorists have paid the same price, based upon the accident experience in the localities where they live and the type of car they drive, for Automobile Bodily Injury and Property Damage Liability Insurance. This has penalized the careful motorists-though he might operate his car year after year without a mishap, his insurance costs him as much as it did the driver who was periodically involved in accidents. Now member companies of the National Bureau have decided to write insurance on entirely new basis.

The new basis is the the "safe driver reward plan," which guarantees to automobile policyholders a fifteen percent return of hteir annual premium provided no claims are brought under policies during the twelve months after the effective date of the plan. The reward will be payable thirty days after the expiration of the policy year through the agent orbroker. All private automobiles covered with bodily injury and also property damage insurance by the member companies will be eligible, with the exception of those which are subject to the automobile fleet plan, the experience rating plan, or some other special

It will be highly interesting to watch the effects of this new plan on the accident rate.

FARMERS WOULD LIKELY CONSENT

Now that Congress has a tense moment, it is quite fitting to break the monotony by hunting a manner of diversion. The cotton farmer is much of a problem, they undoubtedly think-but Congress is something of a problem to the cotton farmer as well. Millions of farmers, in Dickens County the averages can be totaled, are windering if Congress is wondering what farmers are wondering. It is just "maybe."

This breaking of the monotony is the fact that Congres has spied another job. If it will help to get that 2c a pound penalty out of mind, most any farmer would be willing for the whole show, House and Supreme Court not excluded, to trail off to capture the gregale of Malta.



Attractive And Efficient!

Here's a big little house! Spacious, attractive, but without an inch of waste space, the interior offers all of the advantages of a home wany times the size of this little vlace. The front entrance opens directly into the large living room, which contains a naturalfireplace, French doors lading to the private porch (which might be enclosed to forw an extra Room), and doors leading to the rest of the house.

A short hallway separates the two bedrooms and bath from the living room, and at the other side of the house the dinette boasts abuilt-in china cabinet and an attractive bay conveniently planned to provide the window. The kitchen is small and work tables, cupboards, refrigerator and range and sink. A grade entrance at the rear gives access to the basement and kitchen. Both of the bedrooms have cross ventilation, as has the living room.

Adequate closet space is provided in each of the bedrooms, the living room and the hall. Hall space, ordinarily wasted in a small house, is here cut to minimum, although for the purposes of privacy and quiet the bedrooms are carefully separated from the living rooms, an advantage usually associated only with houses having more than one floor.

The plan lends itself equally well to either of the two elevations illustrated. Whether the English or the colonial exterior is selected, the stock millwork and fixtures can be selected to harmonize perfectly with the architecture. Special attention should be paid to the handling of the roof line, the attractive porch and the deep embrasure at the front

Outside dimensions of the main building are 27 by 30 feet. Ceiling heights throughout the house are 8 feet and 4 inches, and the total cubage (from which the local building costs can be estimated) is 14,000 cubic feet.

A variety of exterior finishes may be used on a home of this type. While it is shown in shingles and wide siding, brick or stone veneer or stucco would prove equally as attractive and in keeping with the architectural style. The first cost of some of thee latter finishes might prove somewhat higher, although the








The Capitol information, forwardthrough the County office, in sub- afield. stance states that all farmers who have not signed 1937 worksheets must do so immediately in order to set up base production figures for subsidy payment, and also in compliance with the 1938 Crop Goals. The matter should be taken up with the nearest, or the local community committeeman, or else taken directly to the county office.

Viewing the matter from a financial standpoint, farmers will materially benefit by being prompt in classifying in harmony with the rules. Detailing the information, the county department shows approximately 24,000 bales to be the base production figures, and further points out that 65 percent of this volume, or about 16,700 bales, will come in for this 3c subsidy payment. Eligible poundage for the county would entitle agriculturalists to approximately \$250,000.

Present division of crops, on the "third and fourth" basis, was declared inaquitable. "On good land it is usually to the disadvantage of the landlord, and on poor land, to the disadvantage of the tenant". the report declared, urging that "a fairer distribution should be made, based upon the respective contributions of the landlord and tenant". However, the committee condemned the "bonus" or "privilege rent", now being used in many counties of Texas and Oklahome. It recommended that payment for special privileges be made in labor. It was also recommended that county Farm Debt Adjustment Committees act as conciliation boards, to settle landlord-tenant differences.


