Wind-Driven Fires Keep Firemen Busy

Conditions created by the prolonged dry weather have kept Winters Volunteer Firemen busy during the past few weeks, but they were more in demand than usual last Friday afternoon.

The local firemen answered three calls last Friday afternoon, the second coming while they were working to extinguish a fire on the first call, and the third coming while they were working of the second fire—then they returned to the scene of the second fire to kill flames which started up again after they had departed.

Firemen have answered about 10 grass fire calls in the rural area during the past month—as their counterparts in most towns and cities throughout a wide section of West and West Central Texas have done during the past many weeks.

The first fire call Friday came about mid-afternoon, as firemen were dis-

patched to a house on North Trinity. The house, owned by Mrs. Isaiah Strambler, was gutted, with only part of the walls left standing.

While they were fighting the North Trinity blaze, the alarm was sounded again, and some of the firemen and equipment was sent to a grass fire at Bradshaw. At Bradshaw, a fairly large area of grass was burned, along with a building.

While still on the job at Bradshaw, the firemen were called to a fire in Winters—this time, a home on East Dale Stree. Most equipment and firemen returned to Winters to fight this third blaze.

The East Dale fire destroyed a home owned by Domingo Vidaurri, along with a shed owned by Horace Fry on an adjoining lot. Firemen were hampered by the high winds, and all know-how and experience was called upon to keep the blaze from jumping the street to other homes.

Some young children were in the home on East Dale when the fire broke out, but their mother returned just in time to take them to safety. This house was completely destroyed by the wind-fanned flames; little was saved. Some of the utility service lines leading to the building burned, endangered fire fighters to a great extent. Winds, gusting to an estimated 40 MPH, fanned the flames to a house to the east of the burning home, but firemen were able to control the small flareups which were discovered on the second house.

Many bystanding non-firemen were put to work helping fight the blaze, and several former members of the Winters Volunteer Fire Department came from retirement to help out.

Fire Chief Marvin Bedford said it took all the know how and efforts of the firemen to prevent the fire from spreading. If the wind had been directly out of the north, Bedford said, there would have been no way to prevent the flames from jumping the street and causing damage to homes on the south side of the street.

After firemen had the East Dale fire

under control, some of them returned to Bradshaw to check the fire there. However, even though it appeared that the Bradshaw fire was out Friday night, it blazed up again early Saturday morning and finished destroying a building.

Because of the dry, tinderbox conditions which exist in this area, due to the long dry period, firemen are warning residents of the area to be very careful about burning grass or weeds, and trash. With high winds which are normal this time of the year, a small fire can turn into a big fire and destroy much property within a short time. All fires should be treated as threats to the safety of the entire area, they said, and should be reported, firemen said.

Two Candidates Thus Far For School Trustee

Prospective candidates for trustee of Winters Independent School District have only a few days remaining before the filing deadline, March 5, with only two candidates for two places signed up as of this week.

Billy Joe Colburn has filed for re-election to Place 6, and Don Vinson has filed as a candidate for Place 7.

The school board election has been called for April 3.

Few Days Left To File For City Election

With filing deadline drawing near, six persons have filed as candidates for three seats on the Winters City Council. Filing deadline will be March 5.

Incumbent Aldermen James West, Clifton Poe and Buddy Miller have filed for re-election to the Council. Also signed as candidates for the three seats are E. J. Bishop, Michael Briley and Frank Arroyo.

Blow-Out!

High winds which hit the North Runnels area Friday may have presented many problems for fire fighters attempting to extinguish grass and home fires, but the "ill wind" blew a little good in the oil patch.

According to J. R. Jennings, an independent oil man of Abilene, the gusty winds worked to the advantage of crews attempting to cap a gas well which had blown out Tuesday afternoon, keeping gas away from the area where men were at work, and lessening the danger of explosion.

It all began Tuesday about 2 p. m., as drilling crews were doing a recompletion on the old well on Harry Jonas No. 4. Jennings said his crew

perforated a new gas formation stronger than expected, and the well blew. There were no injuries, but the well spewed gas and water high into the air at an estimated rate of six million cubic feet per day.

After the well blew, some families living in the vicinity were evacuated as a safety measure, in the event the gas ignited. How dangerous was the situation? "Damn flammable," a worker said. The well was kept wet to minimize the danger of the gas igniting.

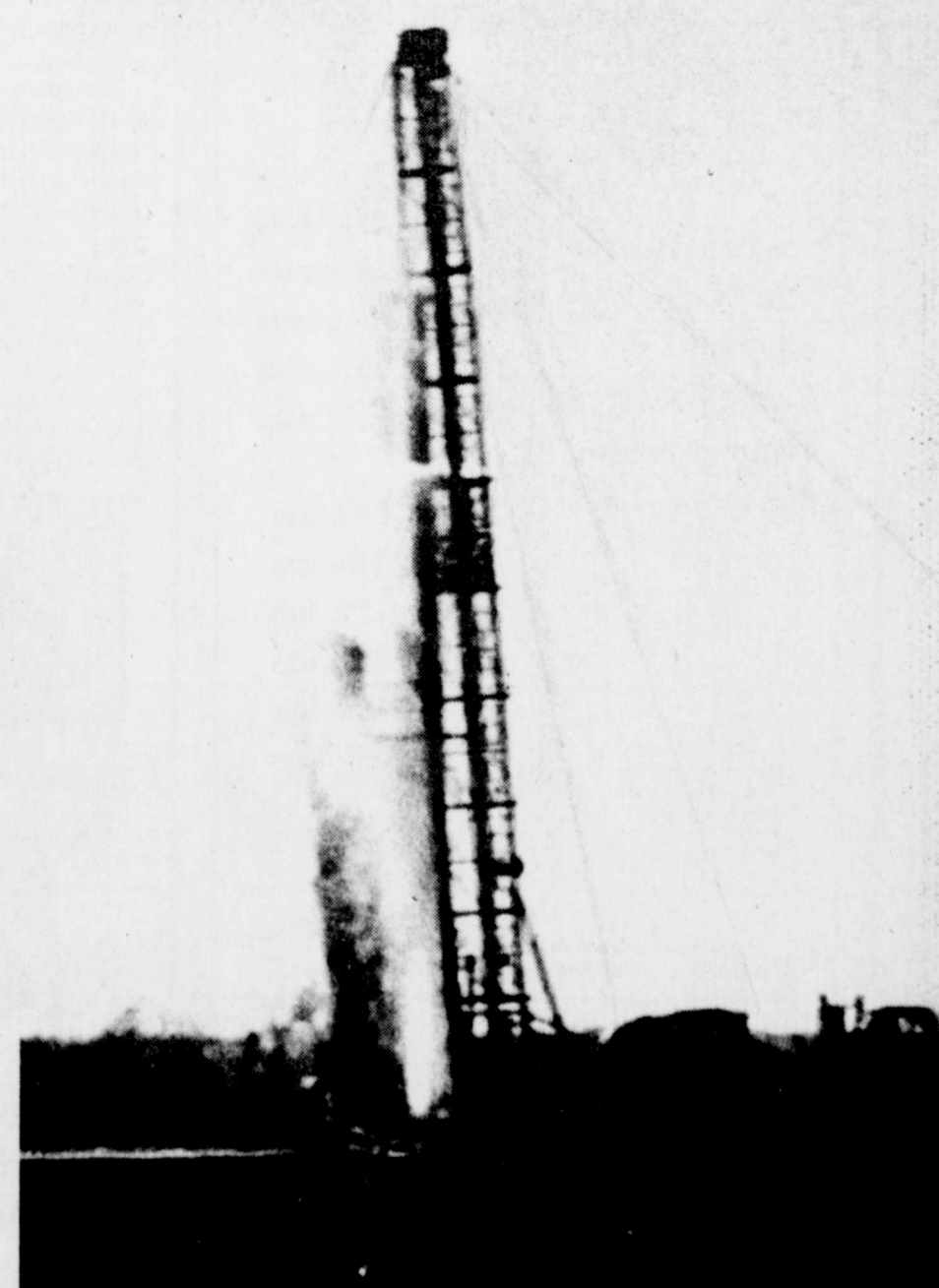
After looking over the situation, operators called world-famed Red Adair Oil Well Fires & Blowout Control Co. of Houston. Adair's two men, Boots Hansen and Richard Hamburt, arrived early Wednesday and began work on the well at 8 a. m.

Late Wednesday afternoon, Farm Road 1677, about half a mile from the well, was roadblocked to prevent danger to any traffic.

Adair's men worked many long hours to stop the spurting gas and water, earning praise from the Abilene oil man. Jennings said, "I have never observed braver men. They were just great."

And then the high winds came Friday, and assisted in the capping operation, blowing the gas away from the well area and lessening the danger, and men were able to work closer to the main blowout.

Adair's blowout experts installed specialized pipe cutting equipment to the well pipe and a hydraulic ram blowout preventer was attached. As the pipe was cut, it was anticipated,

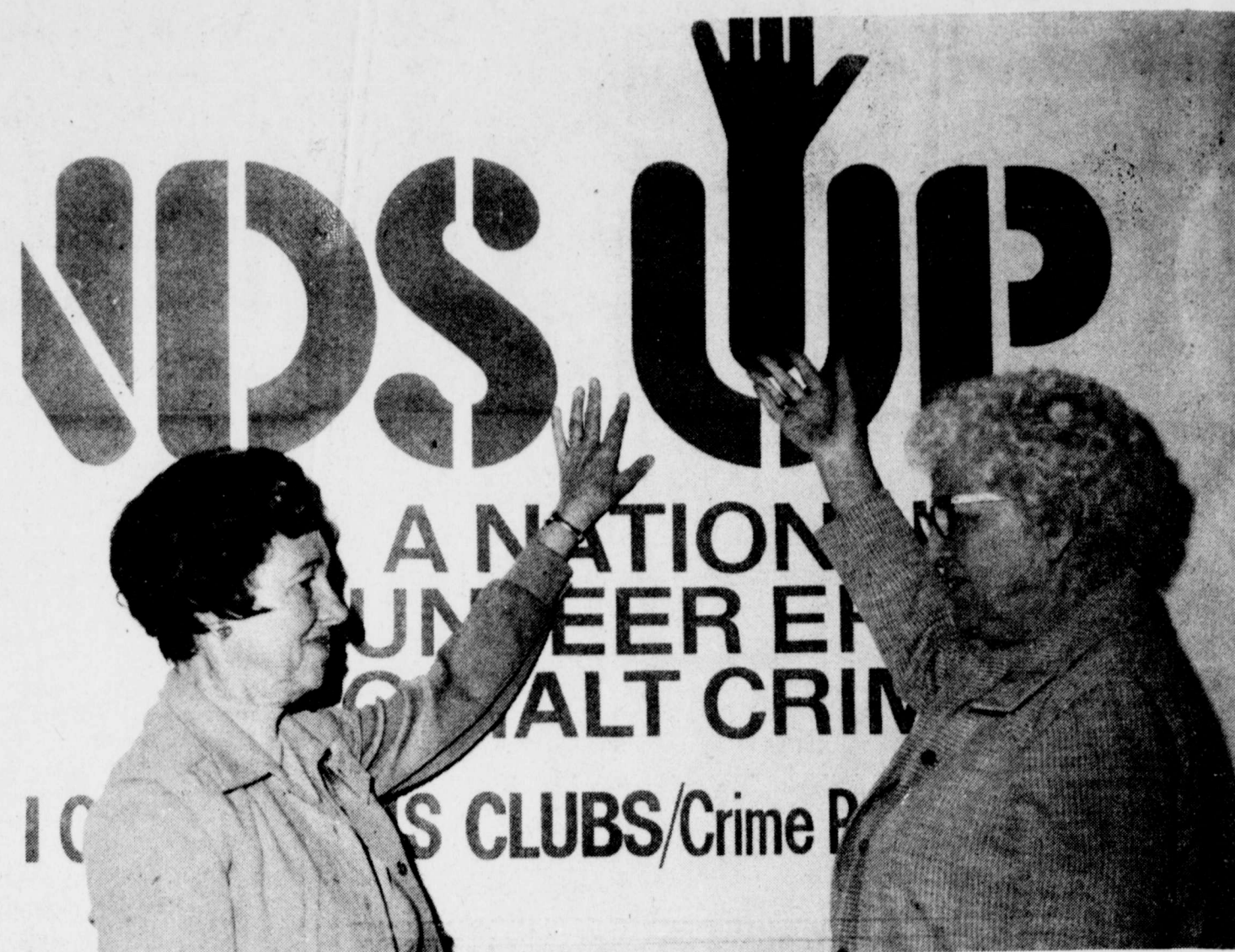

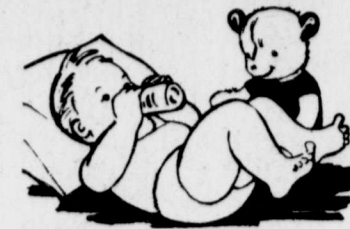

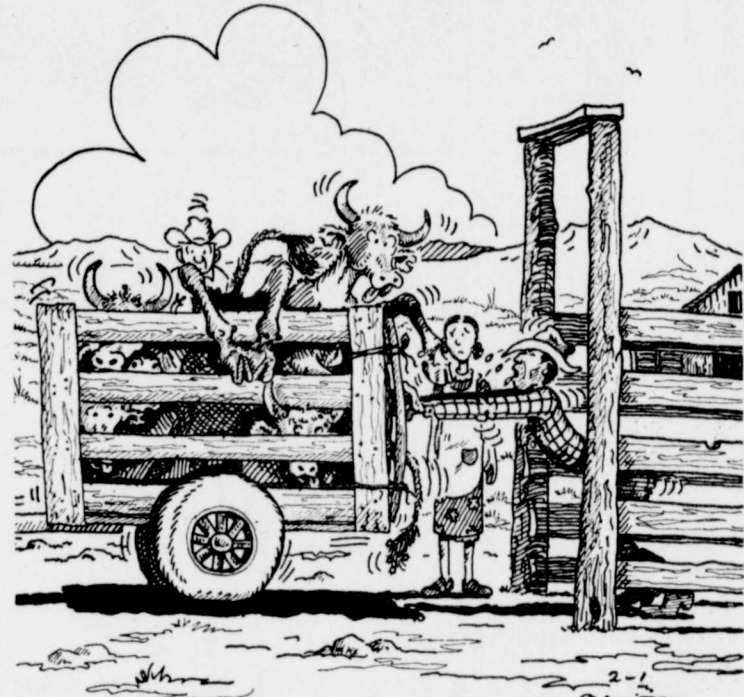
