A covered dish luncheon will be held at noon. Those attending are asked to bring a covered dish.

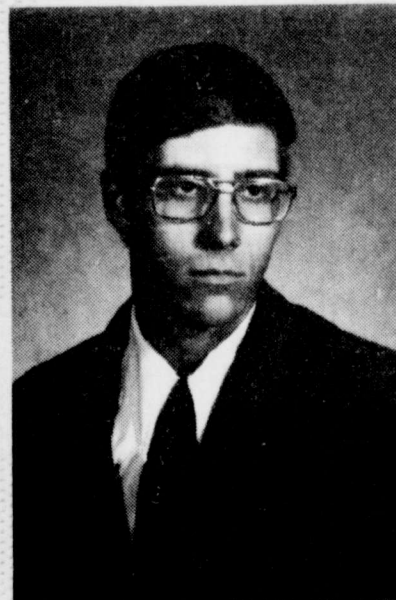
## 5 Receive Scholarships From Wallace Murray

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## KRUEGER'S KOLUMN

**The Packers and Stockyards Act**  
Congress is a body that usually responds to crises, acting after some disaster has occurred, rather than in anticipation of potential future problems. A recent case in point is the Packers and Stockyards Act that passed the House of Representatives last week on a voice vote, being supported by major national farm organizations and national banking groups.

The impetus for passage of this act clearly comes from the recent bankruptcy of a large Iowa stockyard. That bankruptcy hit many farmers and ranchers severely. After their animals had been sold and slaughtered, they were unable to collect for their animals. Undoubtedly, many farming families in the area suffered substantial loss and hardship. A relevant question, however, is whether future loss and hardship of this kind can be best prevented by appropriate local or state action, or whether the federal government should pass laws to try to solve the problem.

The bill which the House passed to deal with the problem has the following provisions: (1) Packers whose annual purchases exceed \$500,000 must be bonded (that is, have a financial insurance policy to cover losses in cases of bankruptcy); (2) packers must pay for livestock by the day after purchase; (3) packers cannot use animals for which they have not paid as inventory for borrowing from banks.

No doubt these provisions will give added protection to beef producers. But there may very well be offsetting disadvantages of this bill. We must ask whether it is necessary for the federal government to try to solve this problem for farmers, ranchers and packers.

In the past 17 years only \$43 million has been lost because of such bankruptcies; that is an average of less than \$3 million per year. There can be no doubt that the new bill will require far higher expenditures than \$3 million per year in bonding costs. These costs will be paid both by higher prices for consumers and by lower

receipts by producers. Moreover, there is a real danger that a number of small stockyards and packers will be put out of business by these additional federal governmental restrictions. If that happens, both producers and consumers will suffer.

As painful as an average loss of \$3 million is, that loss is relatively small compared to the billions of dollars a year paid out by stockyards to beef producers. In short, the record of the stockyards is good. This new federal program, like so many others, will wind up costing the American people a great deal.

Very often the nation has problems in smoke, which will soon blow away. But we legislate solutions in stone, that stay on long after the problem which they were intended to address has disappeared. I hope that I am wrong, but it appears to me that the House has just passed an unnecessary bill. If we are to avoid the constant growth of federal programs, as so many Americans indicate they want our government to do, we must try to use our local organizations as fully as possible and turn to the federal

The Wingate Security Bank has been one of the most burglarized banks in the state of Texas to yield as little actual money to criminals.

Why does the bank look to be such an easy target? Perhaps it is because Wingate is a little off the beaten track on FM 53, 12 miles west of Winters, and is too small to afford a nightwatchman.

But why do they need one? With every citizen a straight-shooter, and a 3,800 pound safe that have combined to ward off serious loss in two daylight holdups and countless burglaries at the bank.

Duncan Hensley, bank president, was the hero when the bank's first holdup occurred in 1929. He and Leila Harter, assistant cashier and bookkeeper, were in the building when a lone armed man entered. Hensley ordered him out and the man responded by firing at the bank president. The bullet struck some grillwork.

Hensley then reached for his own gun and shot the man in the leg as he was leaving the bank. He was soon apprehended and placed in the Runnels County jail at Ballinger.

The 1932 holdup occurred on a rainy day; the mud was thick for at that time Wingate had no paved streets.

Miss Harter was at work, alone in the bank when she noticed a car stop in front of the bank and began feeling uneasy. Later, the car was driven

away but it returned to park near a side window.

Miss Harter's uneasiness turned to apprehension. As she was preparing to call for help and lock the back door, two men entered the bank's front door.

They approached Miss Harter and asked her for a check book. "I bent over to get one and I just couldn't pick anything up," she recalled.

When she straightened up "each man had a gun in my face." They ordered her to give them all the bank's money, which she did except for \$400 in gold.

The men planned to take Miss Harter with them but finally agreed not to it she wouldn't turn in the alarm. But they made sure she didn't by shutting her in the vault where she remained until Hensley returned and released her.

As the bandits left the bank, a handful of armed citizens were waiting. A barber, whose shop was across the street and who kept a gun for such an occasion, shot and killed one of the men. The other man was wounded and died in a Ballinger hospital the next day. Who shot the second man was not determined, although all who were there shared in the reward. All of the \$1,700 stolen was recovered.

The fifth time the bank was burglarized on April 14, 1956, also ended in failure for the two men who had moved the small money safe to the porch early Saturday morning, when they were frightened

away by two residents of Wingate going to work. The two men were captured at widely separated points several hours apart.

There had been four other breakins since 1951, but the last one was the only time it netted anything for the bandits. This was when a bucket holding \$500 in dimes was taken from the vault and never recovered.

The last attempt ended in another failure as burglars tried to cut their way into the vault of the bank in December of 1963.

The bandits knew what they were doing, according to the sheriff, but evidently they had misjudged the thickness of the inner vault door which prevented loss of any money.

However, the paper money was so badly charred that it had to be sent in for replacement. "And the silver stayed hot all day," said Miss Harter.

When this last attempt failed, there were three men already in jail awaiting grand jury action of charges of burglarizing the Security State Bank about two months before. The bank was also broken into about a month prior to that, according to police reports.

Miss Harter, bookkeeper from 1926 until she retired in 1970, said that she lost count of the breakins. "Seems like we were being robbed all the time. We couldn't get cleaned up from one until we had another—and they made the biggest messes!"

While she more or less learned to accept the attempted robberies as routine, Miss Harter recalled a day of horror that was lived through during the

Bonnie and Clyde days in the early 1930's, when it was reported they were headed for Wingate. The town was swarming with armed men and officers carrying machine guns, while she walked the floor all Saturday afternoon. It turned out to be a prank. She still wishes she knew who did it.

After 41 years as a privately owned institution, the Wingate Bank obtained a state charter and became the Security State Bank in September of 1958. Duncan Hensley retired in

1970 and sold the bank to George M. Crews of Brownwood and Press Galloway of Farmington, N.M. In 1972, Galloway sold to Bobbie Airhart of Brownwood, who is now president. Crews is vice chairman and president of the board. Edna Ruth Self is Cashier. The bank now has more than 2 1/2 million in deposits.

The Security State Bank at Wingate remains secure. And evidently criminals have finally learned this for there has been no attempt at robbery since 1963.

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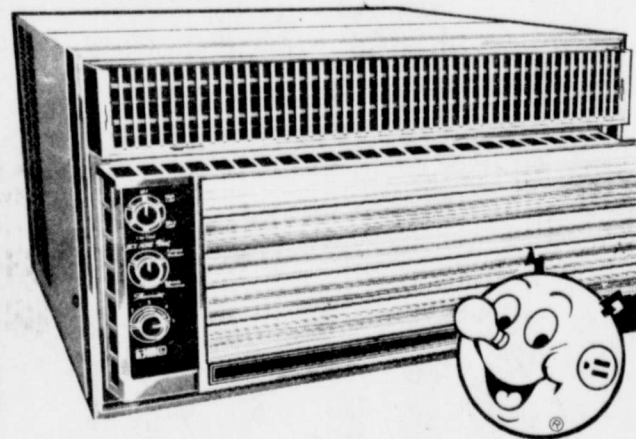
