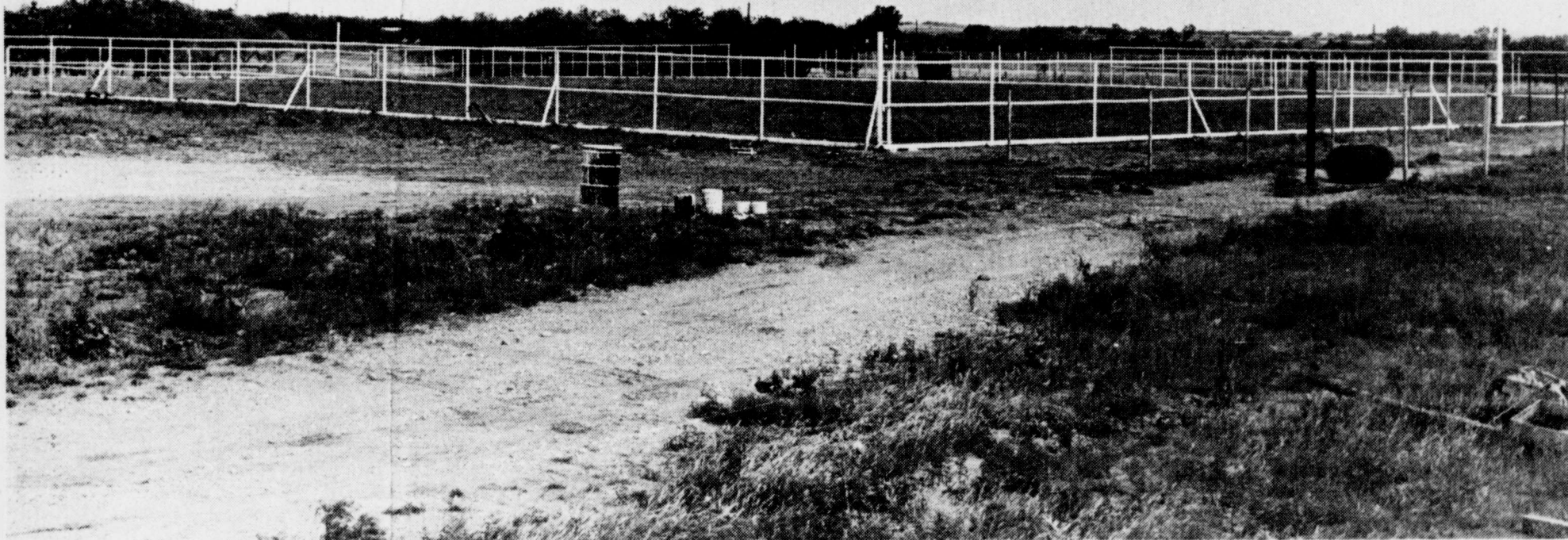


## "Play Day" At Winters Arena Saturday



**PLAY DAY SITE**—This is the new rodeo arena being built by the Winters Rodeo Association, northeast of Winters. Although not completed at this time, the fencing of the

arena has been installed, along with some of the other facilities. The first Play Day for young cowboys and cowgirls will be held here Saturday, June 26. Plans of the Rodeo

Association call for construction of chutes and pens, and bleachers, and to organize regular rodeos, roping contests, as well as other horse activities.

About 200 young contestants are expected to take part in the first "Play Day" sponsored by the Winters Rodeo Association, Saturday, July 26.

All activities will be held in the new arena northeast of Winters, which is still being constructed.

Young people will enter six events, including barrel racing, pole racing, goat tying, flag racing, boot racing, and goat sacking. Entry fee will be 50 cents for each event entered.

Contestants will be divided into two divisions, for those 13 and under, and from 14 through 19. Except in events where there is only one entry, the association will combine age groups.

This will be strictly a "co-ed" play

day, with girls and boys competing in the same divisions, said spokesmen of the association.

Although most events will require horseback riding, two of the events will be performed on foot, and those young people who do not have horses may enter the boot race event and the goat sacking event.

Deadline for entry in the events for 13 and under young people will be 9 a.m. Saturday. Deadline for 14-19 year old competitors will be 12 noon.

Ribbons will be presented to the first six places in each event, and belt buckles will be presented to the All-Around Cowboy or Cowgirl in each division. These top awards will go to the contestants with the highest number of points.

A concession stand will be operated by wives of members of the Winters Rodeo, with sandwiches, and drinks.

Admission will be \$1.00 per person, contestants included. However, entry fee will be refunded to those young people entering the contests.

James West is president of the Winters Rodeo Association, and LaDell Davis, secretary. Mrs. Jimmy Smith will be show secretary.

### City Receives \$7,173 From Sales Taxes

The City of Winters has received \$7,173.52 net rebate from the one-cent sales tax collected. State Comptroller Bob Bullock said his office had mailed checks totaling \$48.9 million to 846 cities and towns for the June rebate.

City rebates for 1976 are running 12.5 percent ahead of 1975, he said. Rebates through June of 1975 totaled \$129.2 million, while they total \$145.4 million through June of this year.

The parade will begin at 4 p.m. Saturday, July 3, and will not be divided into divisions or categories.

Entries in the parade will be judged individually, and cash awards of \$25, \$15 and \$10 will be given.

## Clean-Up Campaign Now Underway

A special "Clean-Up Winters" drive was to have begun Thursday of this week, with first-day emphasis on cleaning up the downtown area of the city, and expanding to the residential areas in following days and weeks.

All businesses and concerned citizens were asked to participate in this effort by the sponsoring Chamber of Commerce, by mowing and cleaning vacant lots, and general premises clean-up.

Merchants were asked to pick up trash and unsightly debris in or around their places of business and deposit the trash in pickups or trailers which were to be provided.

The special drive was to begin at 3 p.m. Thursday, June 24, and continue

until 8 p.m. The Ladies Committee of the Chamber of Commerce provided free refreshments for all volunteer workers.

Maintenance personnel from the school system and the city, the county, and various businesses were asked to lend assistance in the first-day efforts, Bill Graves, president of the Chamber of Commerce, said.

The "Clean-Up Winters" campaign will continue during the following weeks, with presentation of awards for the "Yard of the Month" and a special commercial "Winters Improvement Award."

The residential award will be in the form of a \$10 gift certificate, which

can be redeemed by any Winters business. This award will be given to the homeowner with the most beautiful yard and/or garden in town. Selection will be made by a committee representing the three women's clubs of Winters.

The commercial award will be presented by a committee from the Chamber of Commerce to the business which does the best job of beautifying or facelighting their building or premises during the month. This award will be in the form of a plaque which can be displayed for a month after the presentation is made.

There will be free swimming at the Municipal Pool from 1:30 to 6 p.m. Saturday.

The wedding will be August 6 at Willow Meadows Baptist Church, Houston.

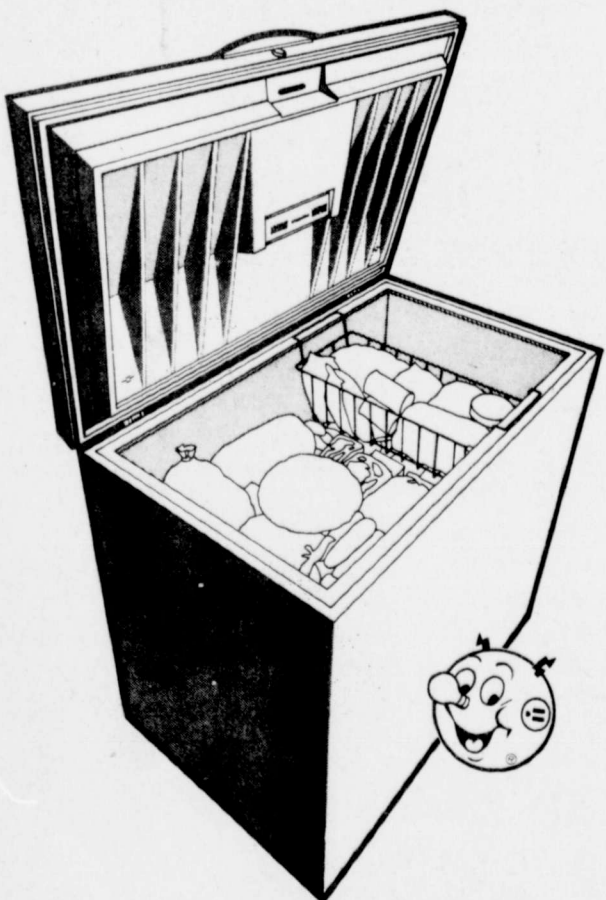

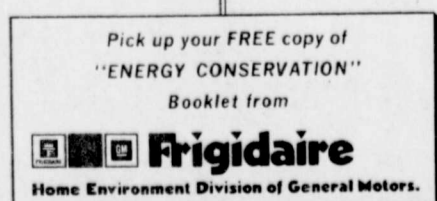

## O'CONNOR'S COLUMN

### Pressure Canner Safety Important

Home-canning season is at hand, and consumers should be sure their pressure canner produces a product safe to eat, Mrs. O'Connor stated.

She stated that a temperature of 240 degrees F. is necessary to destroy bacteria spores present in low-acid foods, which include vegetables other than tomatoes and rhubarb and most fish and poultry. If the bacteria is not destroyed, it grows in jars or cans of food in the absence of air. It produces a toxin that causes the deadly botulism poisoning, she explained.

"When selecting a pressure canner, look for features that assure adequate pressure can be safely reached and maintained," she said.

Look for these features: —an accurate dial or weighted gauge that gives 10 pounds pressure at sea level and up to 15 pounds in areas of Texas with 2,000 feet and above sea level.

—rubber gasket or lugs that enable the canner to be airtight to help maintain pressure.

—a vent tube or petcock for exhausting air from the canner prior to sealing. Air is a poor conductor of heat.

—petcock or other safety device for allowing steam to escape automatically if pressure goes above the level for which the canner was developed.

—metal used that is strong enough to withstand adequate pressure needed.

—handles on lid and kettle that enable safe handling.

—rack to hold jars off bottom of canner to allow for steam circulation.

Canned fruits and vegetables, followed closely by tuna fish and peanut butter, head the list of grocery specials at Texas stores this week. And at fresh vegetable counters, cabbage is an excellent choice, with good quality and moderate price. Fresh asparagus is still available, but quality and supply are on the decline now.

"Other economical buys in fresh vegetables include carrots, green beans, tomatoes, corn, zucchini and yellow squash, green peppers and cucumbers."

Topping good fruit bargains are oranges, grapefruit, cantaloupe, honeydews and watermelons. Also, features can be found on bananas and pineapples, she added.

But supplies are limited and price levels relatively high on peaches, cherries, nectarines and grapes, Mrs. O'Connor said.

"Good values on dairy products include milk, sour cream, yogurt and a variety of cheeses.

"Beef supplies are adequate, with prices about the same as last week. Features, generally, are on chuck roasts and steaks, round steaks, beef liver and a variety of steaks for broiling," she said.

The perennial outdoor cooking favorite—frankfur-

ters—is being featured, too.

"Poultry counter specials feature whole bird and mixed parts.

"Pork specials are scarce, but consumers can find an occasional good buy in quarter-loins cut into chops, Boston butt roasts, bacon and liver.

**CONSUMER WATCH-**WORDS: Make a main-dish omelet, plain or filled, to relieve mealtime monotony and pressure on the food budget.

When the price of eggs is 79 cents per dozen, the price per pound is 53 cents, and the cost of a two-egg serving is only 13 cents—a real saving compared to other main-dish foods.

### CHUCK WAGON SALAD

1 cup wagon wheels macaroni (or elbow macaroni)

2 Tbsp. tarragon vinegar

1 can (6-1/2 oz.) tuna, drained and flaked

1 can (15 oz.) chopped spinach, drained

1 apple, shredded

1 cup sliced celery

2 Tbsp. chopped parsley

1/2 cup mayonnaise

1/4 tsp. salt

1/4 tsp. pepper

Cook macaroni as package directs. While still hot, toss with vinegar and refrigerate for two hours. Add remaining ingredients; mix well. Chill one hour or more before serving. Garnish with tomato wedges, if desired. 8 servings.

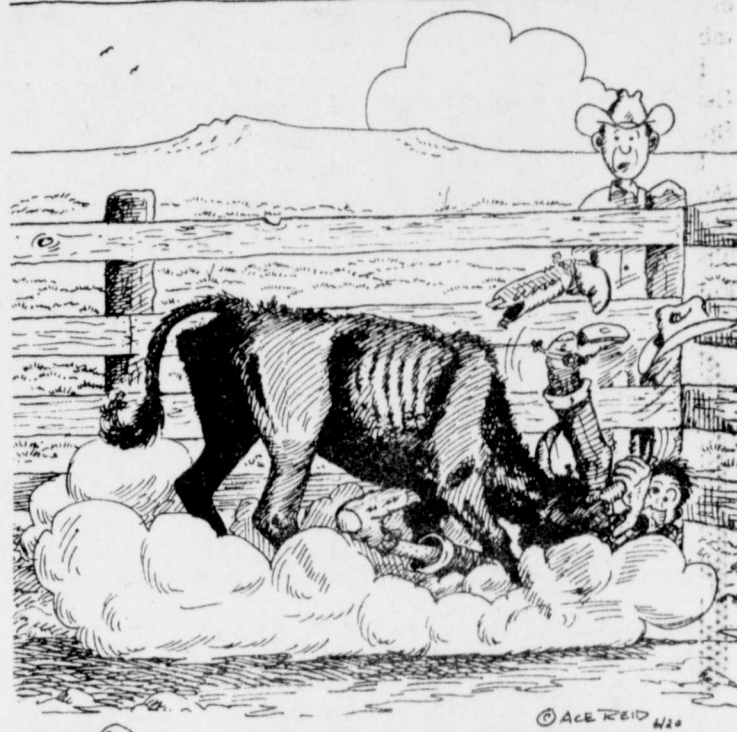

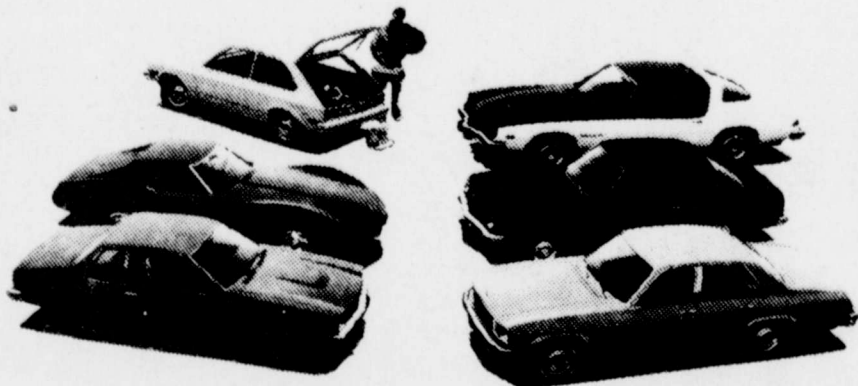

He was a member of the Woodlawn Church of Christ in Abilene.

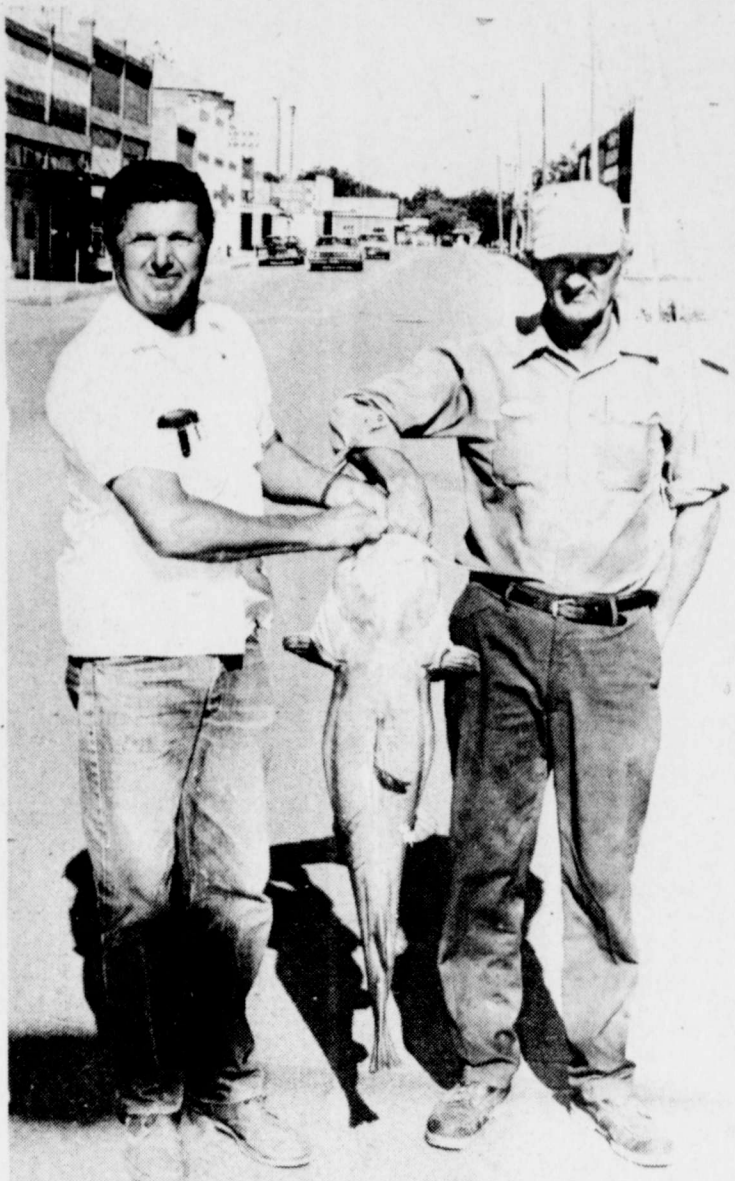

**C. T. Parker's Weekly News Column**

**SCREWORM STORY IS "BAD NEWS"**

It's "bad news" as far as the story on the screwworm situation in Texas is concerned. The year got off to a bad start with early outbreaks of the flesh-eating pest in South Texas, and things have gotten progressively worse, points out C. T. Parker Jr., county agent for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

"Right now, screwworm cases in Texas are running ahead of the record setting pace of 1972," notes the agent. "The main concern is that the cases are spreading rapidly to the north, west and east. Through May 29 more than 60 counties have reported one or more screwworm infestations."

A primary reason for the higher infestations this early in the year is that the past winter was quite mild, thereby allowing more of the screwworm flies to overwinter in southern Texas and northern Mexico. And the number of overwintering flies was larger than usual due to the screwworm explosion last fall in South Texas that was triggered by a massive infestation of Gulf Coast ear ticks.

Webb County has been the screwworm hotspot this year with three times as many infestations as in 1972. Other heavily infested counties

have been Zapata, Starr, Hidalgo, Jim Hogg and Dimmit.

Screwworm cases have already been confirmed as far north as Baylor County, as far west as Pecos and Terrell counties, and as far east as Colorado County. Runnels County has had one confirmed case.

All counties with confirmed screwworm cases have been bombarded with sterile flies to break up the reproductive cycle of the female screwworm flies. Screwworm flies that mate with the sterile one will not produce fertile eggs, explains Parker.

"Although the situation looks bleak, some help appears on the way although it may not arrive until this fall," notes Parker. "That's when the new insectary at Tuxtla Gutierrez in southern Mexico should be in operation to produce sterile flies to wage the war against the costly screwworm throughout the country of Mexico. This will mean that more of the sterile flies produced at the Mission Lab will be used to battle screwworm infestations north of the Rio Grande."

"In the meantime, the burden is on livestock producers to keep a watchful eye on their stock, to follow a regular spraying program to control flies and other

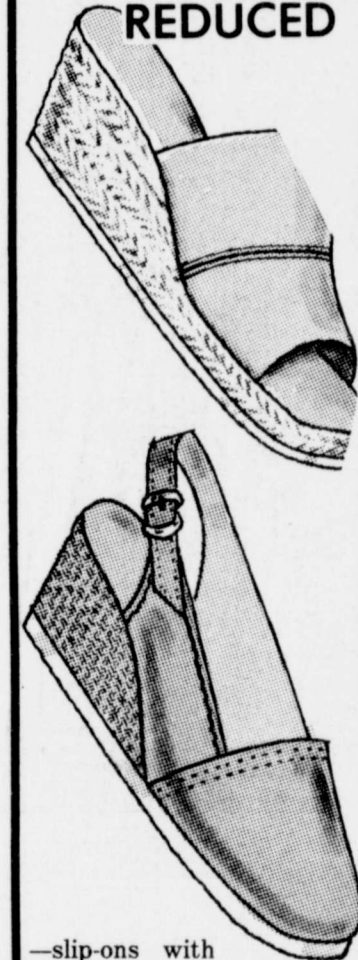
