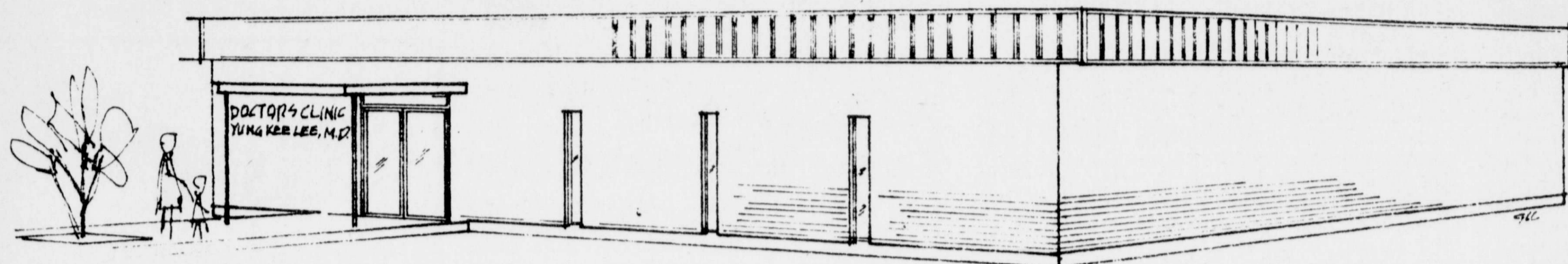


## Doctors' Clinic Will Be Built Here



Plans for expansion of Winters Medical and Health care facilities were revealed this week, as Dr. Yung Kee Lee announced completion of planning and contract negotiations for construction of a doctors' clinic here.

As planned, the new clinic will be located immediately west of North Runnels Hospital, on Highway 53, in the southeast section of Winters.

Dr. Lee said he expects to have all plans finalized within another three weeks or a month, and construction to be completed and the facilities to be ready for occupancy within about five months.

Rose Construction Co. of Abilene will have the construction contract, Dr. Lee said. Rose Construction built the new North Runnels Hospital.

The clinic will have room for two doctors' offices, six treatment rooms, and a spacious reception, medical record room, two nurses' rooms.

The building will match the North Runnels Hospital building, and will be 50'11" square, with parking on three sides.

Dr. Lee said the new clinic will provide more additional medical facilities than are now available, and its proximity to the hospital will add to its usefulness.

## Pony Show Saturday

The 12th annual Shetland Pony Show, sponsored by the West Texas Shetland Pony Breeders Association, will be held at Lazy "N" Stables in Winters, Saturday, July 12.

There will be no admission charge for the pony show.

The show will begin at 1 p.m. at Norman's Lazy "N" Stables show grounds.

Classes will include shod stallions, unshod stallions, halter classes, miniature classes, unshod mare classes, shod mare classes, and performance classes. Performances classes will include western saddle, ladies' roadster, children's roadster, and fine harness.

## Revival Will Begin Sunday At Drasco Church

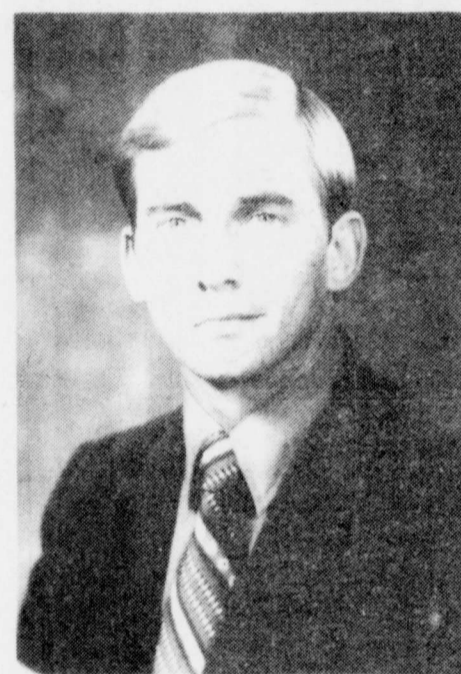

## Plans Are Being Made To Bury Time Capsule

Sometime during the celebration of America's Tricentennial—in the year 2076—the people who are then living in Winters, Texas, will have an opportunity to learn just a little more about the people who inhabited the Winters area and celebrated the Bicentennial.

Winters' Bicentennial Committee is making final plans to bury a "time capsule" in the center of the stone and mortar Lone Star which has been built near the water storage tower on

North Main Street. Date for sealing the time capsule will be announced next week.

The committee plans to seal in a waterproof and decay-proof container, many items representing this age. Documents and pictures, as well as metal items of the era will be sealed in the capsule, and a metal marker installed instructing those people of 2076 to open the vault.

Those who wish to contribute small

items to go into the capsule may contact Charlsie Poe or Rankin Pace, of the Bicentennial Committee. Space will be limited, but the committee plans to include as many items as possible.

The Lone Star was built of stone and contributed by George Davis, as his contribution to the Bicentennial celebration. The stones are from the old Higginbotham Building on West Dale.

## Belitz Bakery, Second Oldest Business, Now Officially Closed

Pelitz Bakery, which has served Winters for 67 years, is officially closed.

Mrs. Adolph (Minnie) Belitz, who has continued to operate the bakery on a limited basis since the death of her husband in 1962, recently retired, and the building on South Main has reportedly been acquired by Spill Bros Co.

Adolph Belitz opened the bakery in 1909. He was born in 1879 in Germany, and came from Ellenberg, Germany to America in 1891 with a friend, a Mr. Lawrence. He stayed in Winters with a sister, Mrs. Richard Gottschalk, for a while, and then went to work in the Baker Hotel bakery in Dallas. He returned to Winters and opened the bakery in 1909. The land

on which the bakery building was built was acquired from m Spill, who operated the furniture store adjacent.

Mrs. Belitz was born in 1892, in Milam County, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Frederick Bredemeyer. She came to Winters in 1899 with her parents.

Mr. and Mrs. Belitz were married May 12, 1912.

The bakery burned in 1912, and was immediately rebuilt.

Mr. Belitz died in January, 1962, and Mrs. Belitz continued to operate the business.

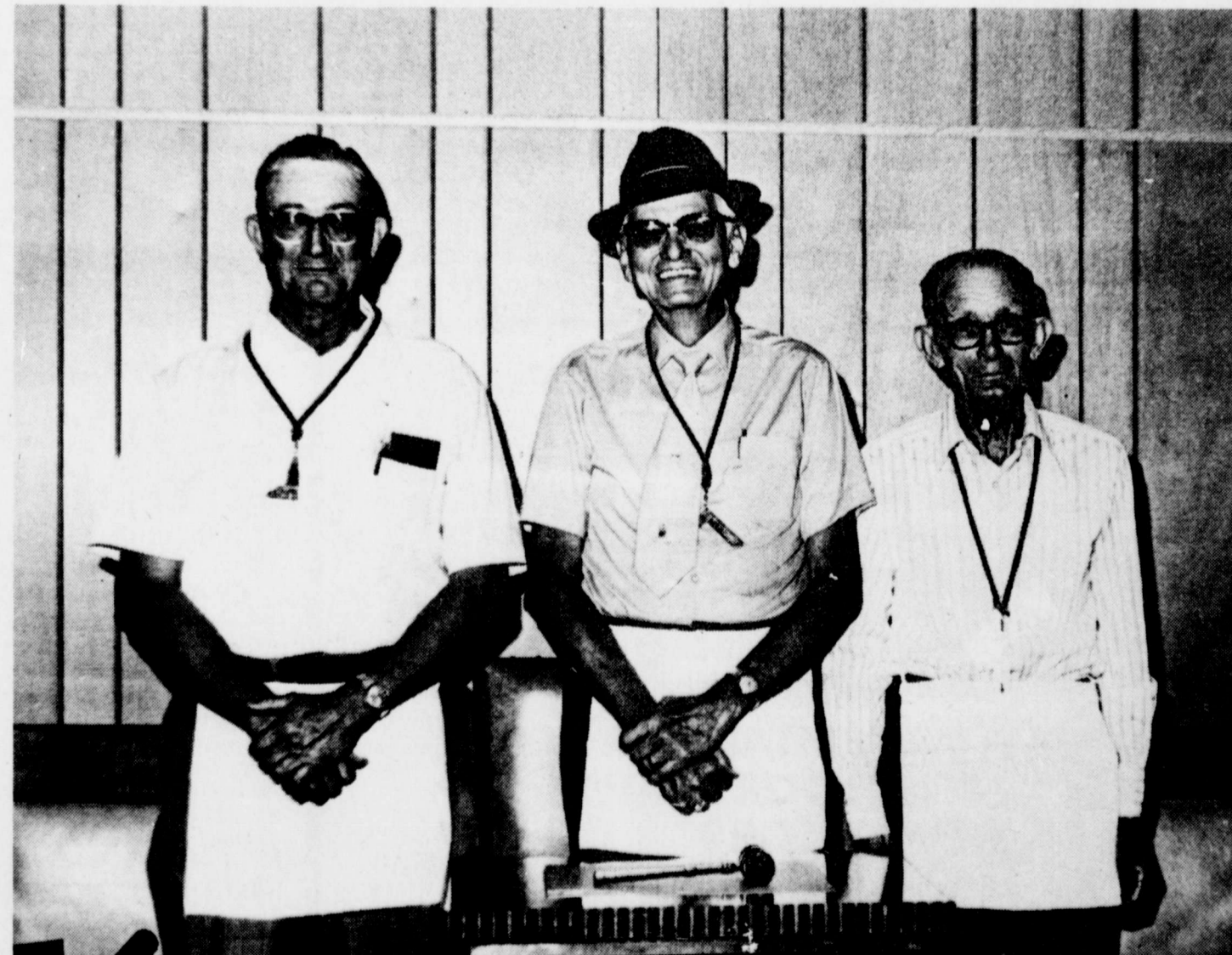

T. A. Smith R. Springer For "rescue breathing": Clear victim's throat of water, mucus, food. Tilt head back to open the air passage. Hold jaw in jutting-out position. Pinch nostrils to prevent air leakage unless victim is a child. Blow into mouth (and nose, if victim is a small child) until you see the chest lift. Remove your mouth; listen for air return from victim's lungs. Repeat about 12 times a minute for an adult, about 20 times a minute for a child.

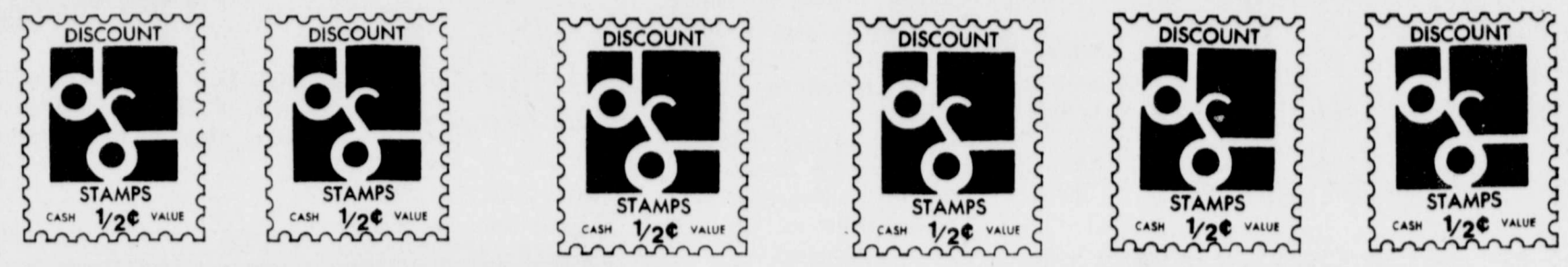

A big fireworks display at the football field ended the celebration, which was only one of thousands which took place throughout the nation on this 200th birthday of the United States.



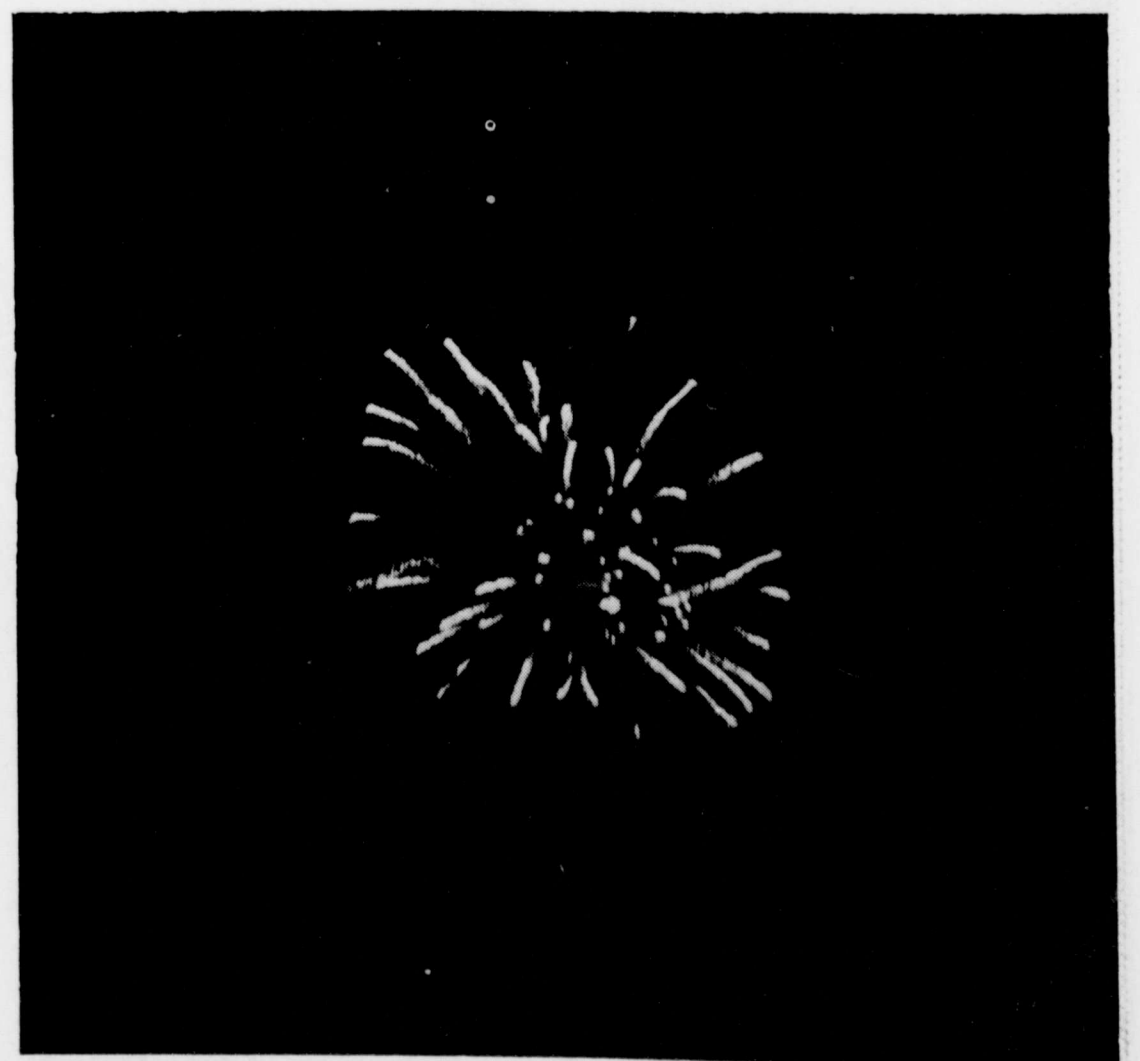

## County Commission Presents Awards For Historical Essays

Awards were presented Sunday evening to the top five winners in the Bicentennial historical essay project sponsored by the Runnels County Historical Commission, for members of the American History classes of Winters High School.

John G. Key Jr., history teacher, made the presentations.

First place plaque was awarded to Darrell Kurtz, son of Mr. and Mrs. R. C. Kurtz, for his "Adolph Belitz" essay. Kurtz' paper was the story of Adolph and Minnie Belitz and their bakery. Until a few days ago, it was pointed out during the presentation program, the Belitz Bakery was the second oldest operating business in Winters. It had been operated by Mrs. Belitz since the death of Mr. Belitz. Within the past few days, Mrs. Belitz retired and the bakery is now closed.

Second place award plaque was presented to Malcolm Bredemeyer, for his paper, "My Great-Grandfather." It was a history of Gustav Adolph Pruser, an early Winters pioneer instrumental in the success of the German community and the building of the Lutheran Church here. Malcolm

is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Freddie Bredemeyer.

Third place plaque was awarded to Sarah Parramore, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. R. C. Parramore. Her paper was a well-documented history of "The Parramore Ranch." She is the great-granddaughter of Col. Parramore, founder of the ranch.

Receiving honorable mention were Randy Davis, son of Mr. and Mrs. Robert E. Davis, for his paper, "Maverick," the story of Samuel Maverick and the town of Maverick.

Also receiving honorable mention was Diane Baize, for her paper, "Not So Long Ago," recorded interviews concerning the communities of Shep, Grassbur, Coyote, Cedar Knob, Spring Creek, and Happy Valley. Miss Baize, is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Paige Baize.

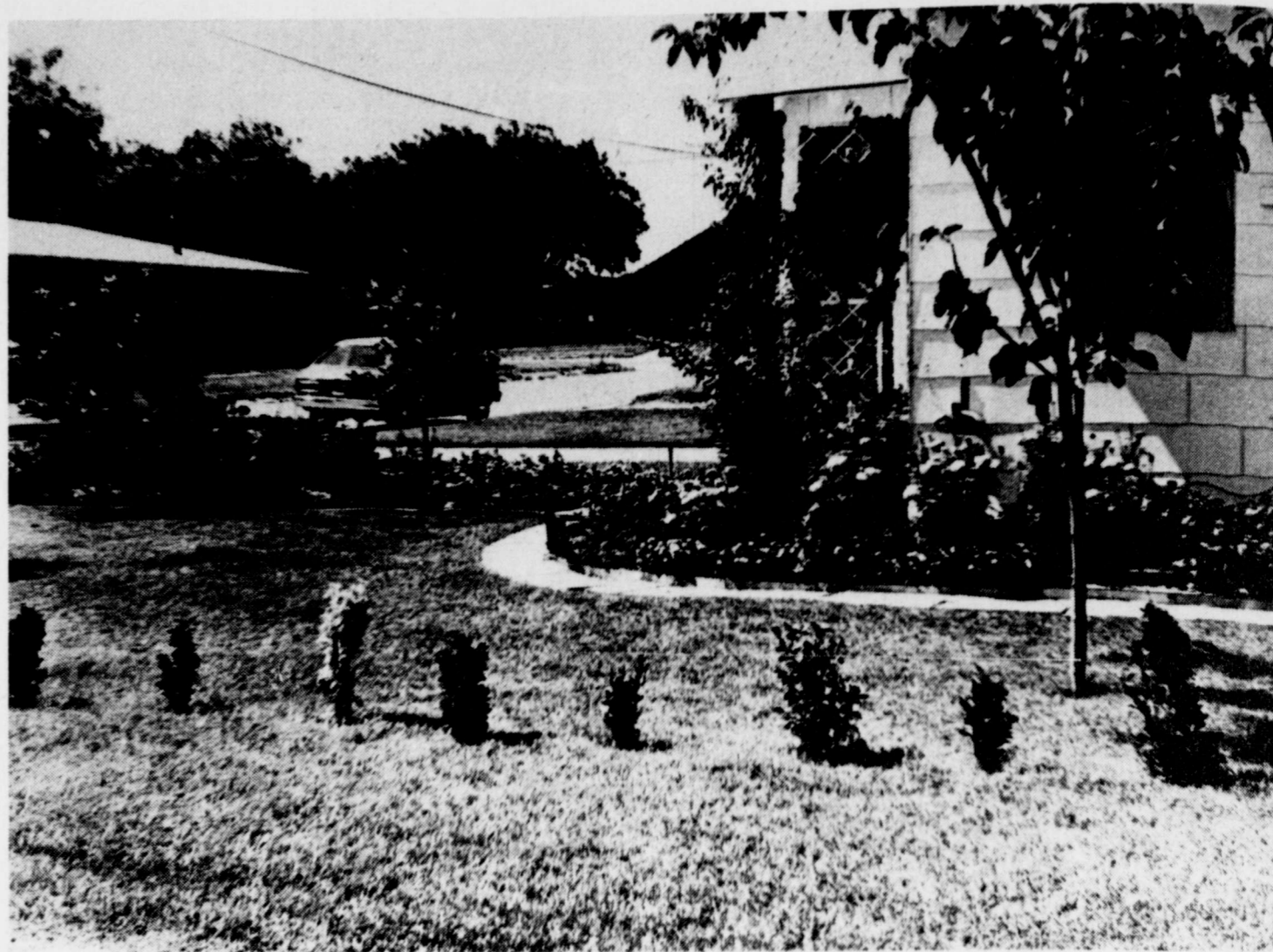
kept on display in the Chamber of Commerce office during the week before the July Fourth weekend.
