



FULL LAKE—Heavy rains over the weekend on the watershed of Elm Creek filled Lake Winters to overflowing. As this picture was taken Monday midmorning, the water level

in the spillway was still rising. Many months' water supply now is on hand, according to city water officials.

Rains Came

Rain clouds hovered over most of North Runnels over the past weekend. They dumped large amounts of water on some areas, and light showers skipped over some. Most of the creeks were out of banks—or close to it—by Monday morning.

In most instances, the rains were a blessing, although there have been some reports of highly damaged milo crops where the combines had not been in action during the past weeks.

In the northeast section of the country, upwards of 7-8 inches of rainfall was reported, sending Elm Creek down to fill Lake Winters to overflowing. Water started over the spillway at the lake early Monday, and by noon not only the concrete spillway, but the emergency spillway was covered with several inches of water. On the north end of the lake, water was over the Novice highway, stopping traffic for a few hours.

Bluff Creek, which heads north and west of Winters, was running out of banks by midmorning Monday, flooding bottomlands.

On the west side of Winters, the small creek which lies between the main section of town and Sunlawn Addition was out of banks, and flooding into yards.

Most stock tanks in the area have been filled, for the first time in several months. The July rains failed to put much water into tanks.

Many terraces in the area, especially east and north of Winters, were damaged, as water from heavy rains late Sunday night washed over. Water probably will remain behind terraces for several days.

Milo cutting in the area, which had been going full blast for several days, was brought to a halt as the rains started Saturday. It is not known to what extent the grain has been damaged, but most can be retrieved, it was said.

City Water Department spokesmen said there is now adequate water for several months, with the lake overflowing.

Blizzards To Eldorado Friday

The Winters Blizzards, beset with injuries and other problems which have slowed them down this season, will travel to Eldorado Friday night. This will be the last pre-conference game of the year, before the Winters team takes a week off before going into District 6-AA contests October 8 against Stamford on the home field.

The Blizzards have been able to chalk up only 25 points this season, with opponents marking 61. The

closest decision was in the opening game with Clyde, when the Bulldogs squeaked by 22-19. Then the Blizzards took a 27-6 loss at the hands of Junction, before going against the Coleman Bluecats last week, when they again came up on the short end of a 12-0 score.

The Blizzards have been dogged with injuries and problems—drop-outs—this season. Of the 22 positions to be filled (offense and defense), 16

have had to be filled by second team players, without starting experience, because of injuries, etc., this season.

History Tour Set

A tour of historical sites in the Norton area of Runnels County has been planned for Sunday, September 26, by the Runnels County Historical Commission.

Those making the tour will meet at the Norton Community Center at 2 p.m., and visit sites around Norton.

One of the sites will be the Post Office at Norton, which was established Nov. 27, 1894. The first homes were built in 1901 at Norton. There were a number of business buildings, a bank, gins, school and several churches and dwellings. Today, two churches, a service station, Masonic Lodge building, a gin and several dwellings are what is left of a one time thriving little town of Norton.

The second stop on the tour will be the Old Bob Taylor farm that at one time had a dug-out that was built before the turn of the century, with a hand dug well, walled with rock and which is more than 65 years old.

The Shannon McWilliams Ranch will be the third stop. It was settled in the 1880's by Henry Wylie who ran cattle

on the open range that extended to Buffalo Gap, some 25 miles. The old home was torn down and the present home was built in 1911.

Fourth stop will be the Gus Redman farm. The first settler on this farm was J. Sam Hall, in 1890, and the Hall family had a private cemetery which is still intact today.

The Ed Gentry Barn, which was built in 1914, will be the fifth stop. The barn has stalls for horses and is one of the first barns built in this area.

Marie Townsite will be the sixth stop. Walter C. Bass established the first Post Office on May 8, 1906, in the small town of Marie. He also operated a general store built in 1902. The town also had a gin, blacksmith shop, barber shop, school that was built in 1901. There also was a Baptist Church, and three homes.

Rankin Pace, chairman of the Runnels County Historical Commission, will make the tour, and Neuman Smith will narrate the history of the sites visited. Tour committee includes Mrs. Clarence Lee, Arnold Alcorn and Neuman Smith.

POE'S CORNER

Hello Central! and Happy Birthday to Winters first telephone girl, Mrs. John Curry, the former Viola David who will be honored with a reception at the home of her daughter Betty John Byrns on Saturday.

Mrs. Curry was born Sept. 22, 1886 near Eagle Lake in Colorado County, and came west with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Robert David, and brother, Leslie, in 1902.

The Winters Independent Telephone Co. had been established the year before in his home by R. H. Nesbitt, whose wife became ill and he wanted to move in interest of her health.

Leslie was blinded by an accident in his early youth and in Sept. Mr. David bought the telephone office for him. And the family moved into the house which was located just south of Mrs. Curry's present home.

"We all helped Leslie," said Mrs. Curry. "There were only seven or eight phones and my father began to work the town for more subscribers."

She also recalled that Dr. Tinkle had telephone No. 1

and Will Murray had the second.

The old switchboard had drops, or connections, for 25 telephones and as the customer list grew there was need for enlargement.

A two room office was built where Mrs. Grover Davis' home is now located, and a larger switchboard installed. One room was made into a bedroom for Leslie. Later if was necessary to hire another operator. Monthly service was \$1.50 and it cost 25 cents to talk to Ballinger.

The list of patrons had grown to about 300 when the telephone office was sold to another company in 1910.

Mrs. Curry recalls many incidents in connection with the early telephone system. When someone's number was called all those on the line took down their receivers, this interfered with the service. When four men from the Pumpfrey Community were killed by lightning at Garden City, while on a prospecting trip, everybody who had a phone got the news first hand. Other calls needed to be made but nobody would hang up a



receiver because he was ashamed to be caught listening.

There was a telephone "soap opera" going at one time with everybody from Ballinger to Winters listening in on the conversation of young lovers. When the young drummer, now called salesman, reached Ballinger he called his sweetheart in Abilene. If they were having a quarrel their conversation was most entertaining.

On an extremely cold night when the ground was covered with snow and ice, someone in the country called for Dr. Grant, who lived across the street. Leslie tried and tried to ring him with no success and his father decided to walk over and see what was wrong. When he waked the doctor, he asked, "Why didn't you answer the phone?"

"I didn't hear it," was the reply.

Mr. David looked and saw the receiver dangling. "Here's your trouble, Doctor," he said.

The doctor apologized for causing trouble by leaving his phone off the hook. He harnessed his horse to the buggy and made the call.

Not only was Mrs. Curry the first telephone girl, she was one of the first to finish the Winters Public School in 1905. The three-room building was located in the middle of the block across the street from the present First Baptist Church educational building.

"There were no report cards and no graduation exercises but I finished just the same," said Mrs. Curry. "I don't remember the others but my teacher was Professor Rotrammel."

Her classmates still living are Mrs. Wallace Oliver, nee Helen Sherrill and Mrs. Ben Guion, the former Myrtle Chapman.

Mrs. Curry entered T.C.U. in Fort Worth that fall and took a business course.

The only activities the young people had were candy pullings and sometimes they played games such as "drop the handkerchief" and "post office." Mrs. Curry recalled walking to the creek on Pete Speer's farm to a Methodist Sunday School picnic. If it was too far to walk they rode in the community brass-band wagon.

"Two of our friends, Maggie and Frances Holliday, invited us to a candy pulling at their home near Hatchell," said Mrs. Curry. "We went in the band wagon and a "blue norther" struck. It became so bad that some of the boys had to help the driver and we almost froze to death."

Mrs. Curry could count on her fingers all the houses in Winters in 1902. On Main St. there was their house and the John Eoff house just north. Across the street were the Springfields, Murrys and Dr. Grant, and the Methodist parsonage was a street or two over to the west. There were no houses north of the Truett intersection until the old school house was torn down in 1908 and the street straightened. Then a two room house was built where the Frank Brown home is located and another built by John Dale, Winters third mayor, at the site of John Norman's house.

The small town was not without its problems. The inconvenience of going to Ballinger to deposit money was met by Frank Pierce who put a small vault, or safe, in the back of his dry goods and grocery store. Mrs. Curry worked for him some but it was closed when John Q. McAdams realized the need of a bank and established the Winters State Bank in 1906.

Another problem was the lack of a fire department. When there was a fire everybody formed a bucket brigade to fight it. There was a big fire once and several stores burned said Mrs. Curry.

Viola and John Curry married on June 5, 1907. At one time they lived in a four-room house on the corner of Truett and Main.

The Currys moved to the farm in 1916 and returned to town in 1923 for John and his brother, Bill, to enter the grocery business. They built a new home in 1925 where Mrs. Curry now lives. They returned to the farm in 1932 and stayed four years. Mr. Curry died in 1960 and her brother, Leslie, who lived with them, died in 1962.

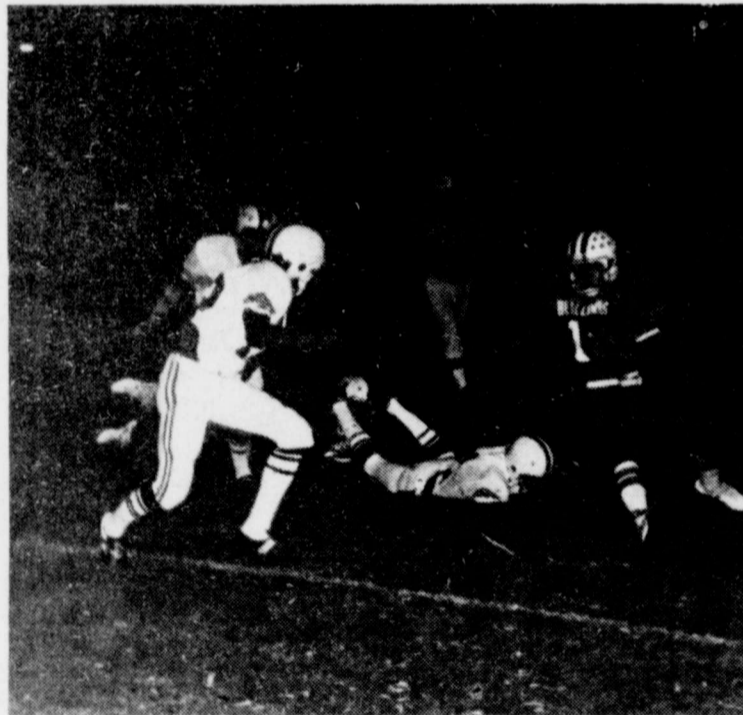

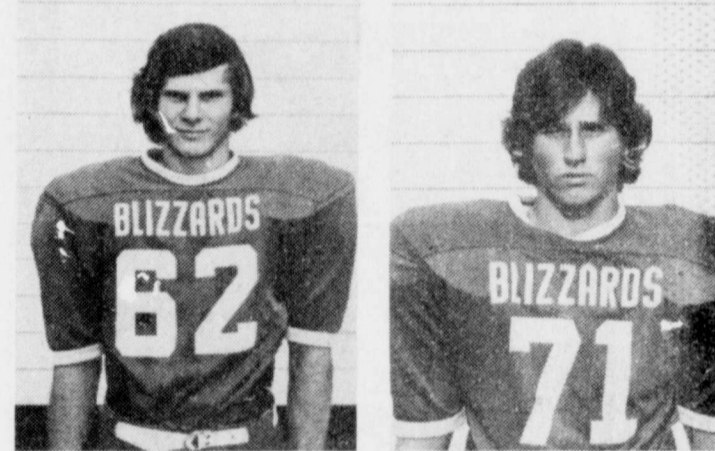
4-H Members Attend A&M Career Day
