## City Council Passed Tax Ordinance

Winters City Council Monday night passed the ordinance setting the tax rate for 1976. The rate had been set previously, but the ordinance was a necessary legal move.

Tax rate for the year was set at 75 percent of true value, at \$1.20 per \$100 valuation. Of the \$1.20, .46 cents per \$100 has been designated for debt retirement, and .72 cents for general fund purposes.

There was no change in the tax rate from the previous year's rate.

In other business, the Council approved an increase in pay for all city employees, amounting to about 5 percent.

## No Date Set For Swine Flu Shots

It may be three weeks, or even longer, before plans are completed and dates set for the government's flu vaccination program in the Winters area, it was learned Monday.

Rosemary Bennie, who will serve as coordinator for the program here, said Monday that no date has been set for receipt of the vaccine here, and that public announcement will be made as soon as definite dates can be established.

Dr. Myron Woltjen, who directs the 44-county Public Health Region 14 based in Abilene, of which this area is a part, said Monday that most area physicians have requested the vaccine; so, persons wanting the free shots are advised to call their private physicians.

That will be the only way a person can get the shots until the free clinics begin in about three or four weeks, it was said.

Dr. Woltjen explained that physicians cannot charge any fee in connection with administration of the shot, whether for bookkeeping, the office visit, or nurse's or secretarial fees, much less for their own services, unless the doctor wishes to assume full liability for any ill effects from the vaccine. As long as he charges no fees at all, the government maintains liability, Dr. Woltjen said.

Until Monday, some physicians had believed that they might be able at least to charge a nominal fee for bookkeeping or other services related to the vaccinations.

A public vaccination clinic will be established and dates set as soon as word is received from the Public Health Region 14, Mrs. Bennie said.

Dr. Woltjen explained that the influenza vaccine is of two types, each of which has different age groups for which it is recommended.

The first is A/New Jersey (the swine flu) only. This is called the "monovalent" category.

For persons who are not chronically ill, the youngest age recommended for shot is age 18 while the oldest is age 64.

The second category of vaccine is "bivalent," which means it combines A/New Jersey with A/Victoria flu vaccine. It is recommended for the chronically ill from age three through 64, and for all persons in the 65 year and above age group.

The government said the chronic illnesses referred to are: broncho pulmonary disease, such as asthma and cystic fibrosis; heart disease; renal disease; diabetes and other chronic metabolic disorders; neuro-muscular disorders and malignancies and immunodeficiency states.

## Blizzards Meet Stamford

The Winters Blizzards, after a week of rest, will enter District 6-AA competition Friday night on Blizzard Field, hosting the Stamford Bulldogs. Kickoff at 7:30 p.m.

The Blizzards have been victims of hard luck this season, with only one win in four games, all non-district affairs. Key positions have been affected as players received injuries during non-conference contests, but the pendulum seems to be swinging back in favor of the Blizzards. Coach Jimmy Stubblefield said Monday

"we're the healthiest we've been" in some time, and probably will have everyone out Friday night.

In looking at Friday night's encounter, the coach directs a lot of respect to the Stamford team. The Bulldogs "will be the team to beat," he figures. "They do a good job throwing, and have good speed."

For that reason, Coach Stubblefield said, the Blizzards will be working on pass defense this week. Stamford uses the sweep a lot, and relies on passes to get down the field.

Stamford defeated the Ballinger Bearcats last Friday night 9-7 in the first conference game for each team.

The Bulldogs own a 3-2 record for the season, while the Blizzards have a 1-3 record. Stamford lost to Hamlin 13-7; beat Anson 28-0; lost to Sweetwater 21-20; and took Haskell 28-20 in non-district, and then hit Ballinger last week 9-7.

Winters lost to Clyde 22-19; lost to Junction 27-6; lost to Coleman 12-0; before taking Eldorado 14-0 before last week's open date.

## School Cafeteria Will Observe Special Week

"All American Circus comes to lunch" will be the theme of National School Lunch Week, October 11-15, and the Winters school cafeteria will observe this week with a special "universal" menu for October 13, Mrs. Ernest Haupt, supervisor, has announced.

The Universal menu for next Wednesday, Oct. 13, will include: Main attraction hot dogs on a bun, ring master's vegetable beef soup, side show orange wedges, happy clown tutti fruttu crisp, and midway milk.

The National School Lunch program gives growing children a nutritious meal every school day of the year, Mrs. Haupt said. The well-balanced lunches have become a part of the American learning scene since 1946, with the enactment of the National School Lunch Act. In recognition of this vital role that the program plays in feeding the nation's school children, Congress passed a joint resolution in 1962 designating the 7-day period beginning with the second Sunday in October each year as National School Lunch Week.

The universal menu will be served at all schools October 13. Last year the lunch program helped offer noon meals to about 19.9 million children in nearly 76,000 schools in all parts of the country.

## Tax Collector Explains Lateness of Tax Statements

Due to the many property changes, and an increase in oil values in excess of \$3,000,000, County tax statements are a few days late this year, Jack Farmer, Runnels County Tax Collector, said this week.

Farmer said the L5000 computer purchased by the County Commissioners in 1973 is not fast enough to turn out the work load caused by these increases.

The Tax Collector listed the increase in tax revenues as follows:

—1973, \$327,922, rate .95 per \$100 value.

—1974, \$400,324, rate .68 per \$100 value.

—1975, \$470,795, rate .80 per \$100 value.

—1976, \$504,452, rate .80 per \$100 value.

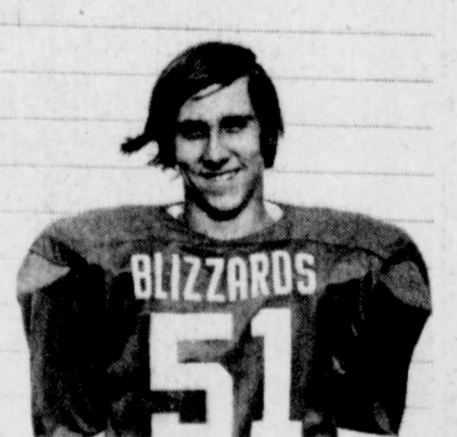
Farmer explained that in addition to the tax money, the county has received approximately \$683,441 in revenue sharing money since 1973. Of this, he said, \$334,157 was used by the Commissioners to upgrade heavy equipment and rolling stock in their respective precincts.

Approximately 50 percent of the revenue sharing money received from the federal government has been used in the four county precincts. About 10 percent has been used for equipment and other expenses in the other county offices. The remainder has been used for various service programs in the county, Farmer said.

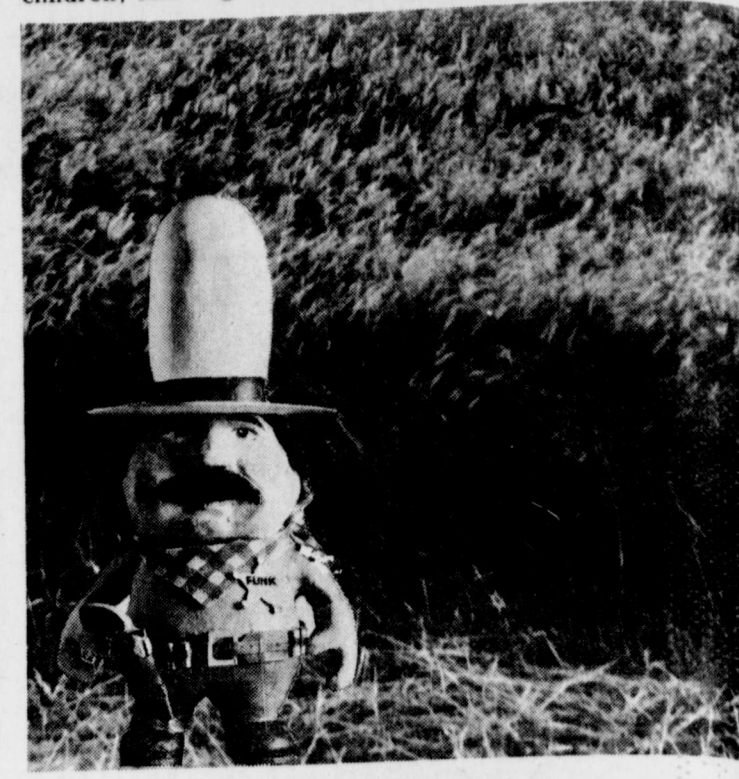

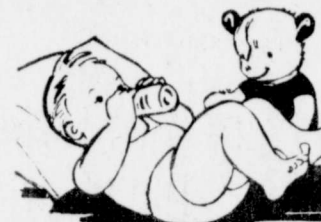

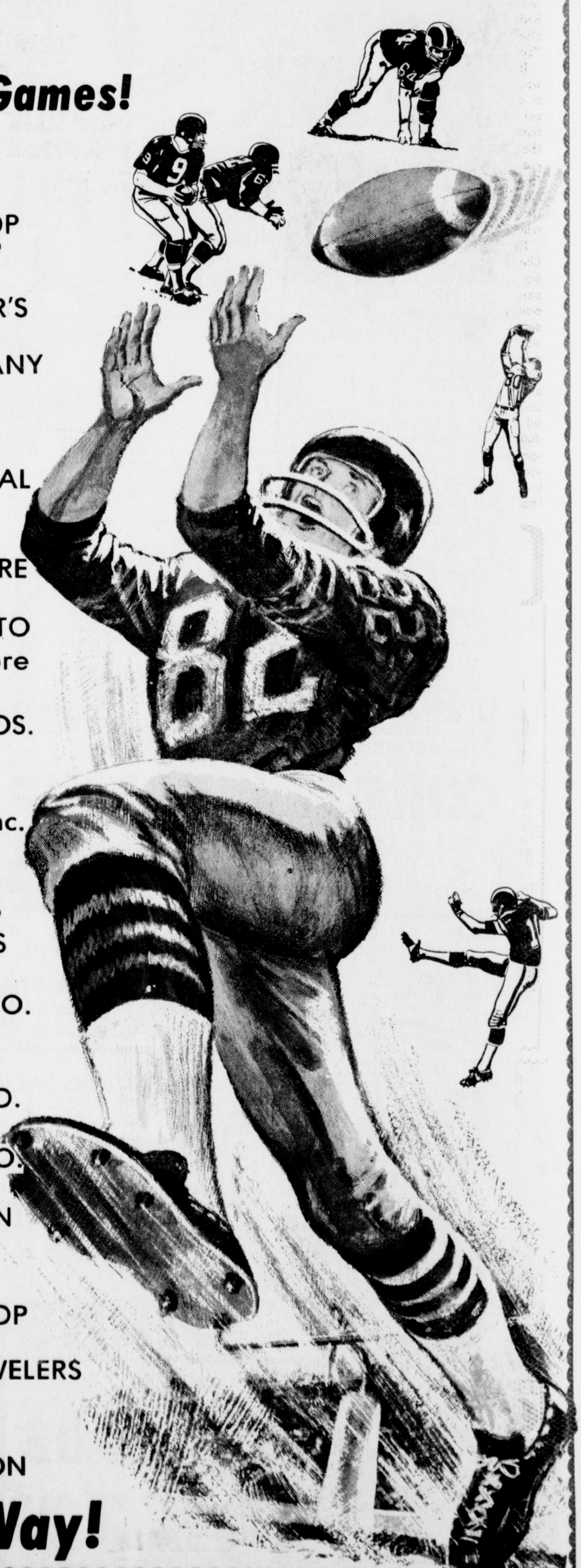

# POE'S CORNER

BY CHARLES POE

Life was never dull in Winters, not even in the good old days. Vivid memories of my childhood include exploring every inch of the C. L. Green Milling & Grain Co. on Sunday afternoons with Dorothy Green, the oldest daughter.

And joy of joys when Harley Sadler pitched his tent once a year on the vacant lot in front of our house. My sister, Gladys, and I listened to the orchestra play and attended the show every night if we could persuade our parents. Mrs. J. W. Tanner would pass by on the way to her husband's store and remark in her crisp Canadian accent, "Tis the music of the devil a calling his own."

When the tent show left we built a stage in our storm cellar and produced Harley Sadler shows for months afterwards, especially the "Toby" plays.

In warm weather we walked across the vacant lot to my Dad's grocery store to get a soda pop. But on Saturdays when we went to the movie matinee it took pop corn and pink divinity from the corner confectionary to sustain us through the Perils of Pauline or the trials of Elmo the Mighty.

Even going to school was filled with excitement. Walking on the old board walk, I passed by Cleveland's Second Hand store, where the domino hall is now located. It was always fun to peep in and watch Mrs. Cleveland sitting in the store, wearing a bonnet, dipping her snuff and crocheting some beautiful piece of work such as a doily, chair cover or bedspread. I looked every day to see if she had removed her bonnet, but I don't recall that she ever did.

In addition to the used furniture, Mr. Cleveland put in a line of new furniture, a small line of hardware, paints, and stringed instruments such as guitars, banjos and fiddles. On Saturday afternoon the musicians from the area would gather in the store and provide good music while trying out the instruments. "I remember John Hancher, his brother, Ray, and Rube Virden were there most every Saturday. What a joyful time it was for everyone except my Dad, we did no business while they were playing," said Hugh.

Mr. Cleveland continued to sell sewing machines along with a complete housekeeping stock in the store. Mrs. Cleveland was very superstitious and did not believe in giving anyone a knife, but when an account was paid, she opened the case and told the person to pick out a pocket knife. "My mother also believed it was bad luck to turn around and go back. She walked backward to the house when she had forgotten something. She would not start anything on Friday nor would she open an umbrella in the house."

"I remember some of my mother's favorite things: the Eastern Star, the Rebeccas, and her flowers and garden. Then there was the singing on the front porch on Sunday afternoons from an old gospel song book, with shaped notes. Several people would gather and without any musical instruments they enjoyed the old songs. Sometimes they did not sing the words, only the notes, Do, Ra, Me, etc."

Hugh set up a repair shop in the back of the store where he worked on bicycles, guns, furniture and sign painting and decided not to go back to college. His 3 brothers were school teachers.

Hugh Cleveland, the youngest son and only living member of the family, now lives in San Angelo. He wrote me a letter concerning some of the early family history.

James Edward Cleveland, known as Jim, moved to Runnels County with his wife and son, Hugh, in 1909, and settled on a farm near Wingate. Mrs. Cleveland's name was Martha, Ella, Texas, Funderburk, and she was called "Mattie."

Mr. Cleveland took up freighting and moved into Wingate about a year later.

He hauled baled cotton to Winters and Ballinger, and brought groceries and other freight back to the stores in Wingate.

In 1915, the family moved to Winters where he bought a second hand store that was owned by one of the other Cleveland sons. Before leaving Wingate, Mr. Cleveland began selling Singer sewing machines and continued to do so after purchasing the store.

This store was located in an old plank building on North Main Street. In the front of the store was a Mr. Hood who repaired shoes. All work was done by hand on a shoe last. He sat in his chair behind the last from early to late and most always some visitors were around telling yarns, said Hugh. All soles and heels were nailed on with shoe nails, and sanding was done with a file and sandpaper stick. The edge of the soles were rubbed with a stick called the polishing stick.

Just north in the same block on the corner was a blacksmith shop run by a Mr. Faulkner. "During this time, about 1918, the war was on and everyone was hurting for money, so my dad bought junk iron. People would bring in farm implements and sell them as junk iron. I have seen many a good plow or planter go down under a 16 lb. sledge hammer," said Hugh.

"My father bought a one ton truck and was picking up sewing machines in San Angelo. On one of these trips he picked up a Mexican hitchhiker. He did not make the approach to the Colorado River and ran off the road, turning the truck on its side. He called me and I went down and helped get the truck back on the road and loaded the sewing machines. There was very little damage, but I had to take the cab off the truck and ride the gas tank back to Winters. This was rather bad because the weather was real cold. My Dad never saw the Mexican again."

P.S. One of the leading citizens in Winters says that some boys tore up the old board walk on Halloween back in 1924, and it was replaced by a cement walk. He swears he was out of town that night.

#### "The Judgment of the Lobbies"

There seems to be a trend afoot in Washington for every special interest or lobbying group to have its own "rating system," that is, a method of attributing a certain score to a Member of Congress on the basis of how often that Representative voted in accord with the

wishes of the leadership of that organization. For example, The Americans for Democratic Action typically represent the liberal point of view, while the Americans for Constitutional Action typically represent the more conservative. There are consumer groups, represented by the Consumer Federation of America, which issue

ratings, and organized labor functions through the AFL-CIO's Committee on Political Education (COPE).

Such groups and their rating systems do have a valid function, that is, of focusing public concern on the issues they think are important. Unfortunately, the issues often seem to be chosen with little attention to the larger issues involved, and often seem to be at the whim of the organization's leadership.

For example, last year I was given a low rating from a very liberal "consumer group." Although it claimed to be in favor of consumer interests, it rated me low because I had voted to keep spending down on a number of issues, worked for deregulation of natural gas prices at the wellhead, and voted against unwarranted government regulation. Clearly, those votes were in the best interests of consumers in my judgment and that of my constituents. Yet this group, claiming to represent consumers, disagreed.

Similarly, one group subtracted points from my score because I had supported my own amendment to an energy bill. Recently, a conservative group, on the other hand, rated my support of the FEA (Federal Energy Administration) extension bill as a "wrong" vote. What they did not take into account, however, was that I worked hard to include in this bill a "stripper well" provision which freed oil wells with relatively low production from government controls. They overlooked the fact that this means millions of dollars to the

Texas treasury, that it is a step toward freeing ourselves from foreign energy supplies, and that it may forestall a tax increase in our state. In other words, in order to get a "right" rating from this group, I would have had to vote against a bill I helped write and which will help Texas immensely over the next few years.

I voted this year to allow negotiations to take place in Panama to avoid a blood-bath. This was counted as a "wrong" vote, although they did not take into account the fact that I co-sponsored a bill which is firmly against our relinquishing U.S. control of the Canal Zone.

I have done my best to pursue an independent course in Congress; and although the ratings systems help us all to keep the various issues in perspective, it is wise to know who has chosen the issues to be rated, and what was involved in the formulation of a final position or piece of legislation. As bills come before the Congress, I will continue to examine them on their own merits, avoiding the kinds of pressures these groups attempt to bring upon a Member's decisions. That type of approach, it seems to me, is the intellectually honest one, and one which best reflects the varied interests of our district and state.

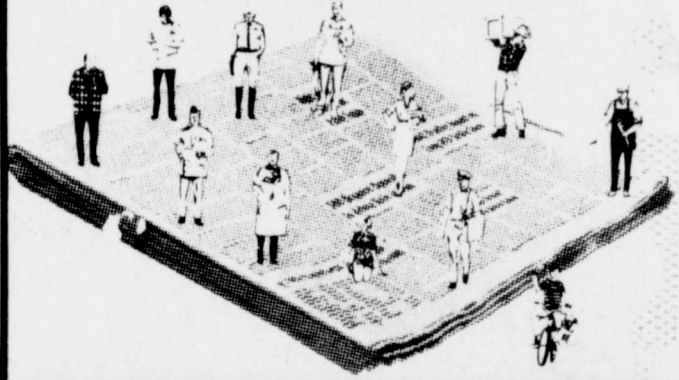

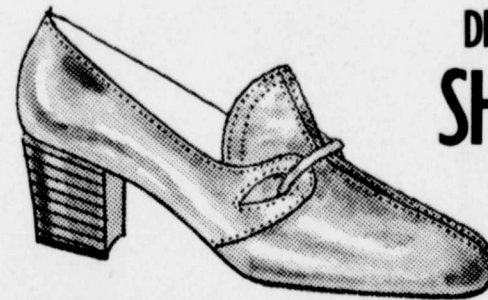
