Last Phase Water System Contracted

Contract for construction of the second and final phase of the pipeline for the North Runnels Rural Water Supply Corp. distribution system was let last week, to R. T. Snelling & Sons of Whitney, contractors for the first phase of the project. There were eight contract bidders for this phase.

The second phase of the project, which covers a big part of North Runnels, and reaches into South Taylor County, is just a bit more than one-half of the entire project. Bid for construction of this phase was

Laying of pipeline for the first phase of the distribution system is about completed, according to LaDell Davis, manager for the water supply corporation, with only about 5 miles of pipe to be laid.

The second phase of the project will have about 132 miles of water line, serving 246 customers, Davis said. Contract calls for completion in 300

In addition to the miles of pipeline, the second phase will include four pumping stations-one north of Crews, one north of Wingate, one at Pumphrey, and one at the Ballinger water treatment plant. The system, when completed, will draw water from both Winters and Ballinger city

This second phase of the rural water distribution system is being financed by a \$505,000 grant and a \$530,800 loan from the Farmers Home Administration. For the first phase, a grant of \$307,000 and loan of \$337,600 was received from the FmHA.





Consumers should find lower pork prices, as reports indicate more pork supplies for the rest of the year. Lower pork prices are likely because of increased supplies-and because of competition with beef and poultry products, explained Mrs. O'Connor. The pork spotlight is mostly on smoked cutsnamely, semi-boneless hams, picnics and some brands of

A few kind-to-your-budget buys will appear also on Boston butt roasts, end chops and quarter-loins cut into chops. At beef counters, Mrs. O'Connor termed the following cuts "economical": chuck roasts and steaks, round steaks, ground beef and liver.

At poultry sections, she reported some "specials" on fryer chickens-along with many features on turkey.

Also, "fish continues to offer an excellent protein value on a cost-per-serving basis," she said.

Egg prices are about the same as in previous weeksand probably they will remain stable until time for Christmas baking, when prices usually trend upward, she predicted.

"Grade A, large-size eggs generally offer the best combination of economy and quality."

At vegetable counters, economical buys include carrots, cabbage, snap beans, soft and hard shell squashalong with eggplant, sweet green peppers, dry onions and potatoes.

Improved Management **Techniques**

Consumer demand for more livestock products have initiated improved management techniques says Joe Chapman, Range Conservationist with the Soil Conservation Service.

One management tool which has gained approval of livestock producers is the Planned Grazing System. Using planned grazing farmers and ranchers have been able to increase the efficiency of their operations says Chapman, but the establishment of a system of planned rotation and deferment should not be taken lightly.

When considering a system for operation the landowner or manager should evaluate his resources and then develop his goals. One goal which might be considered is amount of forage

By using a grazing system producers have been able to increase the amount of usuable forage, but forage quality also plays an important part of success. Livestock will generally consume the better forage first said Chapman, but when grouped into herds they are forced to take some of the lower quality forage. This will result in a more uniform grazing of all grass species.

Other results may be improved wildlife habitat, reduced erosion and reduced labor.



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


