John's International Changes Ownership has undergone many expansion per-Official announcement was made

Monday afternoon of the sale of John's International, Inc., a Winters manufacturing company, to a group of private investors. Sale was effective November 17, and culminated November 22.

Name of the company will remain the same, it was announced.

Principal stockholder of the new company is Livingston Kosberg, of Houston. Irvin Kaplan, also of Houston, is another principal stockholder.

James West, who has been general manager of the company, is president and chief executive of the company.

J. P. Dry, founder and president of the company, has sold his interest.

The new principal stockholders will not be in residence in Winters, it was stated.

West announced Monday there would be no changes in policy of the company, and no change in personnel. John's International, Inc., manufac-

tures tool boxes for pickup trucks, and other metal products. The company was started in 1970 by J. P. Dry, and

iods in the past several years. Products manufactured by the company are distributed over a wide area, and the Winters company is one of the largest manufacturers of this particular metal product.

Kosberg is president of National Living Centers in Houston. Kaplan, also of Houston, is chairman of the board of Marlin Associates, an electrical equipment manufacturing company in Houston.

West, the new president of John's International, Inc., has been with the company for seven years.

Dry made no announcement of personal plans for the future.

J. P. Dry was reared in Winters, and was principal founder of much of Winters' present industrial community. He was a principal factor in organizing and building J. P. Dry & Sons, manufacturers of evaporative air coolers, in the 1940's. That company was later known as Winters Manufacturing Co., and was sold several years ago. It presently is known as Wintex Industries, and

manufactures metal store fixtures and other metal products.

Not long after disposing of the air cooler plant, Dry organized Dry Manufacturing Co., making cigarette vending machines. The company eventually switched to the manufacture of metal registers, grilles and diffusers used in air conditioning and heating systems. Dry Manufacturing Co. was sold several years ago to a nationwide company, Wallace Murray Corporation, and became Dry Division of that corporation. Dry Division continues manufacturing registers, grilles and diffusers, and ships their products to almost every section of the U.S., and to some foreign markets.

Dry seven years ago again entered the metal manufacturing business, in a small building in the western section of Winters-the same building which was the first home of the air cooler manufacturing company many years ago. Within the past few years, many large additions have been made to the manufacturing plant, and several hundred people are employed.

City Gets \$5,857 From Sales Tax

City Council Approves Local Gas Rate Increase

Winters City Council last week approved a request from Lone Star Gas Co. for authorization to increase consumer rates within the city. effective after December 15.

Fixed rates for residential and commercial consumers are as follows: -First 1000 cubic feet or fraction thereof, \$3.000.

-Over 1000 cubic feet, \$1.875 per thousand cubic feet.

An ordinance setting the above rate is being published this week, stating that the rates will be "effective with the first gas bills rendered from and after 30 days from the date of final passage of this ordinance," which was November 15.

The ordinance sets forth "the amount of each monthly bill computed at the above-state rates shall be subject to the following adjustments:





"My Gram Hewitt had a Model A Ford roadster and it was really fun to spend the night with her. She would drive out to the red top filling station and buy me penny candy, black stripe with peanut butter inside. "In the Spring we went to Papa Virdens for the roundup. All day long the men branded and worked on calves. The women were busy cooking dinner and my sister and I spent the morning running back and forth from barn to house. I wished I could grow up to be a cowboy and do all the fun things like roping and branding," said Dollie.

Mr. Virden broke his last horse when he was 80 years old. Mrs. Virden rode horseback until 1963, when her horse was killed by a snakebite. She never found another to suit her. The Virdens raised polled Hereford cattle for years and kept the herd as a hobby when they were no longer able to work. He died in 1972 and she in 1975. His father, W. D. died in 1936, a pioneer in the county since 1905.


Dollie said that later she did help her Dad with the branding, but it was never as exciting as at Papa Virdens, when the old cowboys talked at dinner about trail drives they had made.


