# **Railroad Hearing Is Underway**

The Interstate Commerce Commission hearing on a proposal by Missouri Pacific Railroad to abandon the 37 miles of track of the Abilene & Southern Railway from Winters to Abilene will be continued to a later date, specifically to hear cost studies evidence. grounds that such evidence comprised "surprise" evidence, inasmuch as the railroad had purportedly stated in pre-hearing notices that cost studies would not be included in the evidence. Robert E. Joyner, Administrative Law Judge for the Interstate Commerce Commission, rejected the evidence as being nonadmissible at this time, and said that a continued hearing date would be set for the purpose of examining such evidence.

State Attorney General. Representatives of the Railroad Commission, and railroad employee unions representatives also were present for the beginning of the hearing. The railroad is proposing to abandon 39 miles of track from Winters to Abilene, and at the same time propose to keep 7.31 miles of that mileage as industrial trackage in Abilene. Leon H. Miller of Fort Worth, assistant general manager for Missouri Pacific, described the present tracks from Winters to Abilene as being in "fair condition" for a branch line railway, including tracks, ties, and roadway. He said shoulders of the roadway would require restoration to retain ballast; and that bridges were 40-50 years old. Bridge pilings in some instances were deteriorated, and would require replacement under continued usage. Miller said tracks from Winters to Abilene had been updated during the past several years, and at the present time 90-pound track is in place, replacing the lighter trackage. The track from Winters south to Ballinger was abandoned some years ago, and was torn up. It was brought out early in the proceedings that railroad officials had asked local people "not to protest" that abandonment, because See RAILROAD Page 10

Meanwhile, the hearing on the abandonment proposal continued, with the railroad attorneys presenting witnesses Tuesday morning. As of midday Tuesday, there was no speculation on the length of time the hearing would last.

The hearing had been scheduled to begin Monday morning, but was postponed to Tuesday morning because of several circumstances. An estimated 450 people turned out for the first scheduled day of the hearing, and about 300 came back Tuesday morning. Spectators on both days included about 50 members of Winters High School classes, on study assignment. Judge Joyner commented that he was "pleased" with the interest shown by the school and the students. Representing opponents in the hearing were attorneys Frank Brooks and Barry Brooks. It has been said that "one picture is worth a thousand words" and when the picture is labeled with some pertinent facts it tells the complete story.

Although I knew that Dr. Fred Tinkle's Antiseptic Healing Oil was a popular item when I was growing up, I didn't know to what extent it was used until a picture dated June 7, 1915 was found showing a day's shipment by parcel post of the Healing Oil on a wagon driven by Homer Butts. W. F. Flynt, postmaster, is on the sidewalk.

Dr. Robert Cooke was standing by the wagon and he is labeled Prof. Cooke, manager. I knew my grandfather had returned to Winters and was preaching, but I didn't know that he was also manager of the Healing Oil business.

Dr. Tinkle not only prescribed for patients but he dispensed his own medicine, said Mrs. Tinkle.

In his early practice, when

Mrs. Tinkle couldn't remember what was in the healing oil except that castor oil was used as the carrier and that it smelled like carbolic acid.

Ralph Lloyd found the old formula and it contained only three ingredients: creolin, carbolic acid and castor oil. Since the healing oil was also used for animals, Ralph thought the creolin, an antiseptic, was used to keep flies away from open sores and that carbolic and castor

oil did the healing. Ralph recalled that Dr. Tinkle also made a very fine baby medicine that contained bismuth. It was called Dr. Fred Tinkle's Baby Bowel Remedy and was a safe efficient medicine for diarrhea, indigestion, cholera, infantum, sore stomach,

vomiting, bloating or gases

accumulating in the stomach

Miller said on questioning that a weight limitation of 220,000 pounds had been placed on the line because of the condition of bridges. This prohibits use of "jumbo" hopper cars, it was pointed out. It was also brought out that engines used to pull trains on the line weighed 265,000 pounds.


At midday Tuesday, witnesses were being questioned on the total carloads and tonnage moved over the line.
