## Junior Livestock Show Scheduled Monday

One of the biggest single-school livestock shows in this part of the state will get underway Monday morning, January 10, in the vo-ag stock barns, prelude by a horse show scheduled for Sunday afternoon.

The two-day event is sponsored by the Winters Livestock Association, with FFA and 4-H Club members residing in the Winters and Wingate Independent School Districts eligible to exhibit livestock.

Opening event of the annual livestock exposition and horse show will be a barbecue dinner served in the Winters Community Center following church services Sunday. The horse show will be held Sunday afternoon, following the barbecue dinner. The dinner is being sponsored by the Livestock Association.

T. C. Jenkins of Rotan will be judge of the horse show, and about 30 horses will be entered in this event.

Stanley Blackwell and Charles

Allcorn, vo-ag teachers in Winters High School, said about 44 steers will be shown, 80 swine, 80 lambs, and about 30 horses.

The concession stand in the show barn, which is being remodeled this week, will be operated this year by the 4-H Clubs.

Money to be used to pay cash awards to young FFA and 4-H livestock exhibitors is being raised by sale of "shares" to local businesses and individuals, instead of sale of stock following the show. This manner of cash awards has been in effect for the Winters Junior Livestock Show for several years.

There will be no admission charge for the livestock show or horse show.

Paige Baize is superintendent of the horse show, and Jim Williams, assistant superintendent.

Judging in the livestock show will begin Monday morning, with Eddie Puckett, vo-ag teacher from Sweetwater, as the judge in all divisions.

R. W. Marks is general show superintendent, and Raymond Schwartz, assistant.

Edward Bredemeyer is superintendent of the lamb show, with R. T. O'Dell, assistant.

Joe Pritchard is swine show superintendent, and Richard Schwartz, assistant.

Steer show superintendents will be Joe Bryan, with Hollis Dean, assistant.

Bob Webb is poultry show superintendent, and Mrs. Dan Miller, assistant.

Frank Carter will be rabbit show superintendent.

### Former Judge In Airplane Crash Monday

Elliott Kemp, 59, a former Runnels County Judge, received minor injuries Monday afternoon when his single-engine airplane made a crash landing at the Ballinger airport.

Kemp was the only occupant of the plane. "I was coming in for a landing and pulled up to go around for a second approach and the engine quit. It didn't bother me because I had plenty of room and plenty of time. When I approached to land," he said, "a gust of wind apparently caught me and nosed the plane right into the ground. I have no explanation for it except for the wind."

Kemp, who has been "flying for 35 years," said "this is the first time I ever had an accident. Never even scratched the paint on one."

He walked away from the crash and was treated and released from the Ballinger hospital with "a gash above my eye," where apparently struck the dash when the plane crashed. The accident occurred about 2:30 p.m.

### Alien Reports Due In January

All aliens must report their addresses to the Immigration and Naturalization Service during January. Forms on which to submit the reports are available at any Post Office or office of the Immigration and Naturalization Service.

Joe F. Staley, district director of the San Antonio Immigration and Naturalization Service office, announced that information furnished by aliens in reporting their addresses has been declared confidential by statute.

Persons who are unable to pick up report forms because of illness, or other reasons, may have a relative or friend obtain a card for them. The card should have a 13 cent postage stamp affixed before mailing.

Parents or guardians of aliens under 14 years of age submit reports for children.

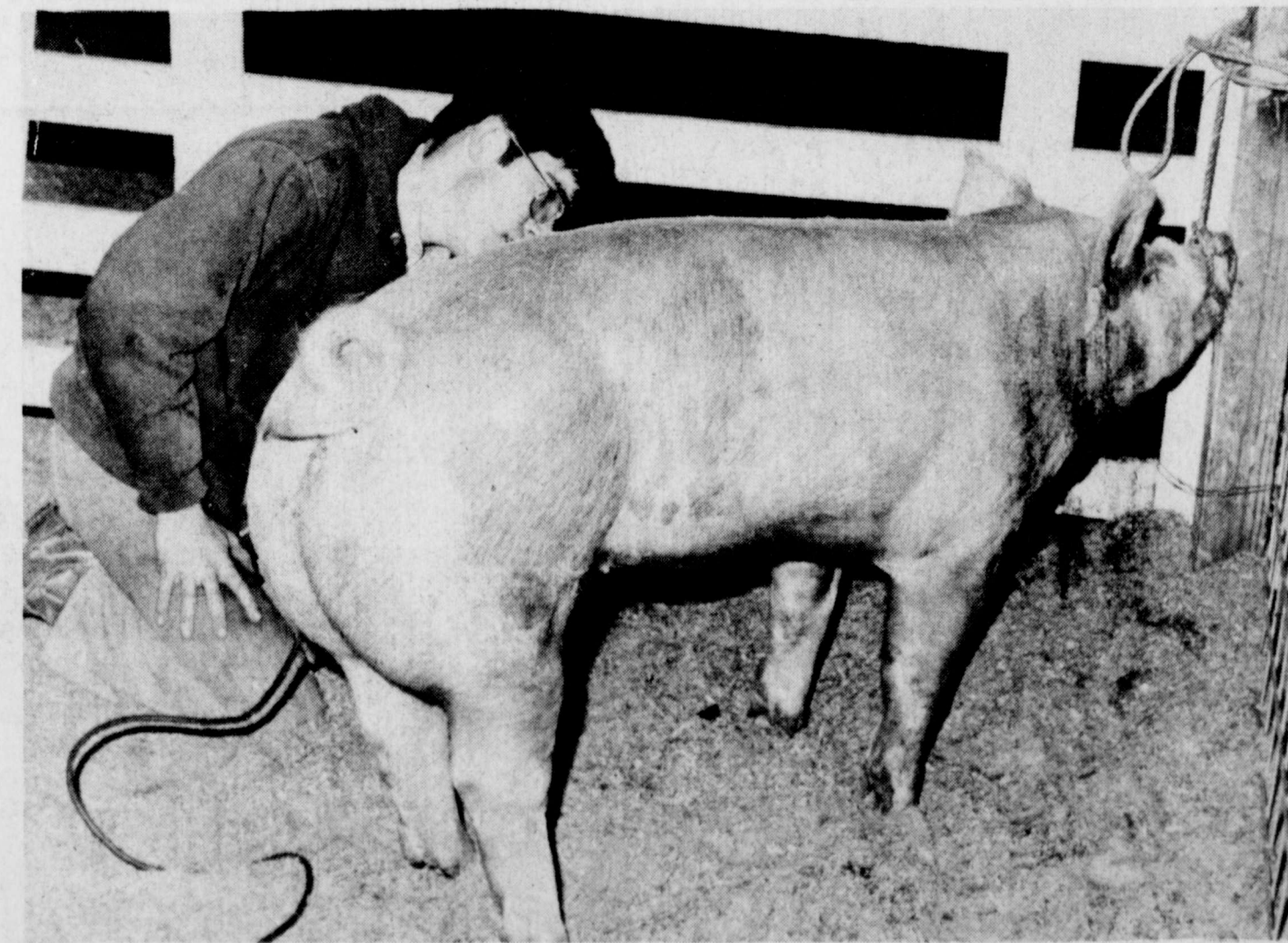

### Rifle Range At City Lake Being Closed

The rifle range at the new Winters City Lake east of town is being closed, and facilities will be torn down.

Winters City Council Monday night moved to rescind authorization for the rifle range, which was built on the west side of the lake several years ago.

Council members explained that closing of the rifle range is being done for safety purposes. Some persons using the range had been missing the earthen backstop, allowing bullets to travel a great distance, creating a hazard in the area. It was also reported that a window on the Walter Spill place in the lake vicinity had been knocked out by rifle fire.

Council also reminded the public that an ordinance forbids firing of rifles of any type on City Lake property, setting fines of from \$10 to \$200 for violations. Firing of shotguns on lake property is allowed only during bird hunting season, it was stated.

### Emphysema In Cattle Causing Problems, Says County Agent

Acute bovine pulmonary emphysema, which affects both beef and dairy cattle, is causing problems in Texas again this year reminds C. T. Parker, county Extension agent.

The Texas Veterinary Medical Diagnostic Laboratory has diagnosed several cases recently in mature beef animals grazing dry Bermuda grass pastures, however the precise cause of the problem is still unknown.

Affected animals find it difficult to breathe due to a rupture of the air sacs in the lungs, allowing the air to escape. This interferes with the normal exchange of air between the lungs and the atmosphere, and severely affected animals may die quickly. Other become chronic cases which do poorly, says the agent.

Ranchers should be on the lookout for this disease. Some of the symptoms to watch for include: a cow may be seen standing in a field with

her neck stretched out and muzzle elevated. She may breathe with her mouth open and emit a grunting sound on expiration of air. In some cases, a froth is seen around the mouth or nose. Digestive processes slow down or cease and bloating may occur.

Cattlemen can help prevent losses by closely observing cattle individually and watching for early signs of the condition. If a dead animal is found, an autopsy by a veterinarian to determine the cause can be helpful in preventing additional losses.

If cattle are found showing signs of difficult breathing, other animals should be carefully moved to another pasture and fed hay until the cause can be determined. Animals should be handled with care, since undue excitement or rough handling can intensify more respiratory distress, Parker adds.

### Council Sets "Priorities for '77"

During the first meeting of the Winters City Council Monday evening, the council listed and discussed a set of "priorities for '77"—projects and plans which will receive added attention during the year.

High on the list of priorities is demolition of old houses and buildings within the city. Council indicated that

a thorough study will be made of this problem, with a view toward tearing down of some old buildings and houses which are no longer in use, within legal boundaries, to provide a cleaner environment, along with safety precautions.

Upgrading of the city's streets also is at the top of the list, to receive

The W. S. Davis homestead established east of Winters in 1902 was designed by the famous architect, Oscar Roffini, and was quite a show place in its day. Remodeled many times, it was being rented and we thought its active days with the Davis family were over.

But the old house has been renovated once again and its walls ring with the happy voices of the fifth generation of Davis children growing up in an atmosphere of happy memories.

They are Bryan and Gena Denise, children of Mr. and Mrs. Don Davis. Fortunately, Don's position as biologist with the Parks and Wildlife Department permitted him to live in this area.

Of course, Grandpa Wilma C. (Bud) Davis was happy to use his carpenter skills to once again repair the old home. This included paneling, painting, finishing closets and adding floor covering.

Don has purchased the farm from his uncles, R. S. and Foy Davis. Bud also built an office on back of the garage where Don can carry on his business.

Basically, Don says that he and the men who work with him are responsible for setting the seasons and bag limits on wildlife species in 41 counties.

"We work an eight hour day but some of it is early and late and scheduled ahead of time—a lot of it is at night. It is quite detailed work, and it took 14 ounces of paper to mail in my last report."

"Deer is inventoried in the day time. We have to know what we've got before we can set the seasons and bag limits. We work a line from Concho County to the Pecos River on the south; from Concho to Knox County on the east; from Knox County to the New Mexico line on the north and from New Mexico line to the Pecos River on the west," said Don.

Work is started with the deer inventory in the latter part of August or September to determine the antlerless deer permits. After the season starts the hunter camps and lockers are checked to determine antler measurements and age on bucks, also to check age class—from 25 to 50 deer were classified in Taylor County as to antler measurements and age on bucks.

Ducks are usually trapped in January, they are banded as to age, sex and species and released. In this area it is mostly mallards and pintails. The next procedure is to inventory antelope and set the seasons and bag limits, and this is by permit over this 41 county area. After the season starts the weight, age and horn measurements

of the antelope are all checked at the same time.

Prairie chicken season comes in the fall and hunters and bag limits are also counted. They are found only at Plains, Texas. "The males will come into an area and make booming sounds. We go into this territory of over 30,000 acres and count the male birds," said Don.

"We're in the process of trading whitetail deer to Mexico for desert big horn sheep—a state wide deal. "Turkeys, we will inventory on the roost this winter to get numbers. And in the spring and summer we will count the hens and poults we see to get a reproduction ratio."

Don and his family had been living at Matador where his main function was to conduct research on wildlife species. He and four other men managed 44 sections where male deer, whitetail deer, antelope, wild turkey, Bob White and blue quail were found. They also took care of 80 miles of roads, 75 miles of fences, 21 windmills and all improvements.

Don and the former Nolo Gene Virden were married in 1958 while he was in A&M. At College Station. After his graduation in 1959, they moved to Clarendon and were living there when Don was recalled into service during the Berlin Crisis in 1961, and was sent to Alameda, Calif. Two weeks after Nolo Gene joined him he was shipped to Christmas Island, 1000 miles south of Hawaii, and she stayed there until his return in 1962. They then moved to Miami, Texas, where Bryan was born in 1963.

The Davises built a new home at Miami and lived in it two months when they learned they were to be transferred to Claude. While at Claude, Gena Denise was born in 1966. Don worked for the Soil Conservation Service until moving to a game reserve north of Paducah in 1968. He moved from there to Winters in Oct. of 1975.

Don has been trying to catch up on the Davis family history. Only two of the W. S. Davis family are living, Pete and Mrs. John Q. (Clara) McAdams, also Grover's wife, Ida Maude. The deceased are Willis, Mrs. J. M. (Mamie) Nichols, Grover, R. S. (Manchie) and Mrs. W. A. (Mattie) Forgey of Ballinger.

There are still a few cousins in the county. They are Willis Davis' daughters, Mrs. Loyd Compton and Mrs. C. O. Rodgers and a granddaughter, Mrs. Dennis Poe, formerly Rhuenell Compton; Grover's son, La Dell and Mrs. Nichols daughter Gena Mathis lives in Ballinger, a daughter-in-law, Mrs. W. T. (Bill) Nichols lives here.

## STACKED ENCHILADAS

1/2 cup finely chopped onion  
2 Tbsp. cooking oil  
1 Tbsp. flour  
1/2 cup milk  
1 (4 oz.) can green chili peppers, drained and chopped (not jalapeno peppers)  
1/2 tsp. salt  
2 cups diced cooked beef or 1 lb. ground beef  
2 medium tomatoes, peeled and chopped  
8 corn tortillas  
1/4 cup cooking oil  
1 cup shredded Monterey Jack cheese (4 oz.)

Cook onion in 2 Tbsp. cooking oil until tender but not brown. Blend in flour. Add milk, chili peppers and salt. Cook, stirring constantly until thick and bubbly. Stir in beef and tomatoes; heat through. Keep warm. In small skillet, heat tortillas in 1/4 cup oil until limp, about 15 seconds per side. Drain on paper towels. Place a hot tortilla in a 9x9x2-inch baking pan. Top with about 1/4 cup beef mixture and a small amount of cheese. Repeat with remaining tortillas, beef mixture and cheese. Bake at 350 degrees for about 20 minutes, or until enchiladas are hot. To serve, unstack or cut into wedges. Garnish with avocado, jalapeno peppers or onion, if desired. Yield: 4 servings.

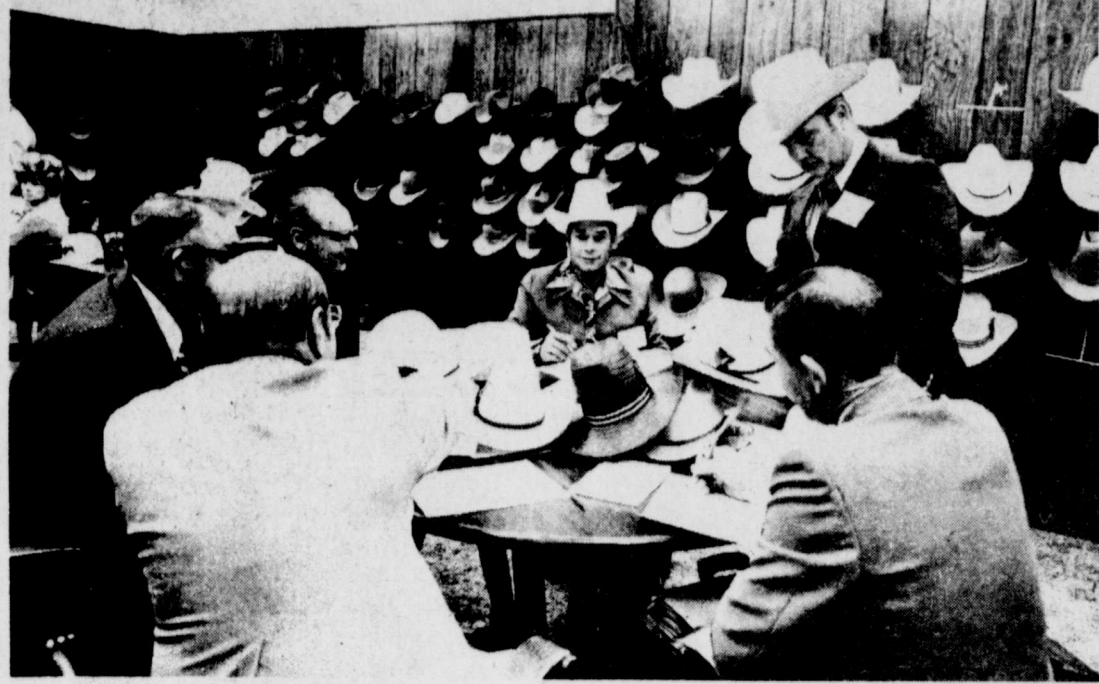

  - 2 small green peppers, diced
  - 2 medium onions, sliced
  - 2 cans (16 ounces each) tomatoes
  - 2 cloves garlic, crushed
  - 1/2 cup corn oil
  - 2 teaspoons salt
  - 1 teaspoon dried basil leaves
  - 1/2 teaspoon pepper
- In a large saucepan mix together eggplant, zucchini, green pepper, onion, tomato, garlic, corn oil, salt, basil and pepper. Cover and cook over medium low heat about 30 minutes or until all vegetables are tender. Cover and chill in refrigerator. Makes 14 (1/2 cup) servings.
