City Council Receives RDS **Annual Audit Report**

The City of Winters took in more money during the fiscal year ended Sept. 30, 1976, than was received during the previous fiscal year, and spent less. However two departments of the City-the Water Department and the Electric Department-showed deficits for the reported period.

In the annual financial report to the City, prepared by a Certified Public Accountant firm of San Angelo and presented to the City Council last week, auditors showed that total receipts for the City during the reported period totaled \$743,557.76, compared to \$698,268.28 for the previous fiscal period ended Sept. 30, 1975. Added to the beginning cash balance at the beginning of the last fiscal year, total funds available totaled \$921,706.83, for all funds.

Total disbursements for the period were \$702,290.22, compared with \$757,957.05 for the previous year. (A reproduction of a Comparative

Two revenue bearing departments, the Water Department and the Electric Department, showed deficits for the period. The Water Department showed a net loss of \$1,525.50 over revenues for the reported fiscal year. Operating revenues totaled \$108,403.58, while operating expenses were listed at \$75,913.58; balance for debt service, \$32,490.00. Non-operating expenses (including depreciation) totaled \$34,015.50, leaving a deficit of \$1,525.50. The previous fiscal year's net income was \$763.37.

The Electric Department showed a \$17,370.31 deficit figure for the fiscal period. Revenue was \$277,961.90, with operating expenses, \$245,410.42. Nonoperating expenses totaled \$49,921.79, including \$37,338.05 depreciation.

A huge increase in cost of gas fuel, from \$71,198.19 the previous fiscal year to \$123,436.91 for the reported period, was responsible for a big part of the increase in total operating expenses from \$188,716.10 to \$245,410.42. Many other items in the expense column also took a raise, including salaries. Plant maintenance

also was responsible for an increase in operating expenses for the period, from \$9,016.05 to \$12,821.47. Uncollectible accounts almost doubled for this department, from \$645.61 the previous year, to \$1,158.53 for the reported period.

In the General Fund, taxes collected during the reported period rose from \$104,198.00 the previous year to \$129,101.94, and city sales taxes took a jump from \$46,516.73 to \$57,245.25.

The firm of Eckert, Story, Ransom & Ingrum of San Angelo prepared the audit report for the City of Winters.

School ADA Down **From Last Year**

Average Daily Attendance in Winters Public School for the first three 6-weeks periods of this school year is down about 20 from last year, according to school officials.

ADA for the first six weeks period was 789; for the second period, 782; and for the third, 775.

These ADA figures will not necessarily have an effect on the classification of the school, it was explained.

> weaker points of a ridge. In such cases spot repair may correct the eroded situation. The front-end tractor blade or pull-type dirt drag are useful tools in making such repairs.

Proper use of crop residues can aid a terrace system in accomplishing it's design purpose. Residues can speed up the entry rate of water into the soil and at the same time increase the volume of water the soil can hold. Holding the majority of rainwater where it falls will keep the terrace system from being overloaded. Chiseling on the contour is another good farming practice that compliments a terrace system. These two farming practices are widely used in this area and both cut down on terrace maintenance costs.

Burst Water Pipe Repair

High up on the list of emergency situations that call for fast repairs is a burst water pipe.

This in no time to panic, however. Move quickly and turn off the water supply. Obvious? You might think so but people have been known to desperately wrap tape or rags or anything else they can get hold of while the water spurts out.

First choice is the shut off valve for the affected line. If it doesn't have one, or you can't spot it right away, turn off the main valve. This is found where the water line These fit around the pipe enters the house.



Kruger's New Bill: **Answer To Gas Crisis**

Congressman Bob Krueger are available in the intrahas introduced new legislation in Congress designed to end the continuing problem of natural gas curtailments and resulting shortages throughout the United States. The bill also contains emergency provisions to assist the FPC in meeting current crises throughout the Nation.

"Unfortunately, we cannot do a great deal about the current situation," Krueger said, "but we can take some emergency action, so long as we couple that action with long-term deregulation of new natural gas. This is the only real solution to these recurring shortages." Krueger's bill proposes

that "distressed pipelines" which cannot presently obtain gas to serve high priority customers, be permitted to make emergency purchases of natural gas at market prices wherever excess supplies of natural gas

state market. The bill insulates currently unregulated marketers of such gas from other requirements of the Natural Gas Act, however. "One of the bill's most important provisions," Krueger added, "is its statutory mandate for priority use of gas for agriculture, including fertilizer production and food processing."

The Texas legislator encouraged other Members of Congress to support his legislation, stating, "The American people expect and deserve no less than Congressional action to guarantee them an adequate supply of natural gas for residential heating and industrial purposes.


