Suspects In Winters Burglary Nabbed In Abilene

Abilene police Monday raided a motel in Abilene, and recovered many items said to have been taken in a burglary of the Western Auto Store in Winters sometime last Thursday night, and three men are being held as suspects.

Runnels County Sheriff Hershal Hall Monday obtained warrants for three men from Ballinger Justice of the Peace Oliver Petty, and placed a hold order with Abilene authorities, on charges of burglary. Although no announcement was made, law enforce-

ment officials anticipated clearing up other area burglaries through arrests of the three men Monday.

Held as suspects in the Winters burglary case were Gary L. Mainer, 19, Michael D. Dearman, 17, and Robert Paul Hayes, 19.

Mrs. June Hays, who with her husband W. M. Hays, owns Winters Western Auto, identified the many articles taken from the store, including 24 rifles and shotguns, several gun cases, 8 CB radios, 5 watches, and a portable television set.

Mayor Hodge Is Candidate

Winters Mayor Homer Hodge this week signed as a candidate for re-election to office, "reluctantly," he indicated.

With the Wednesday, March 2 deadline fast approaching, no one else had stepped forward as a possible candidate for the office, he said, and he felt that even though he desired to step aside, there had been so much work begun and unfinished—such as planning for additional water supplies—he felt compelled to continue in office, if the people dictated, and to offer his services in an effort to complete the projects.

Mayor Hodge had announced several weeks ago he would not be a candidate for re-election.

Mayor Hodge has been instrumental in planning for a proposed new dam and water reservoir which would

serve not only Winters, but Ballinger and much of Runnels County. He has attended many planning meetings of state and federal agencies concerned with the water project, and has spearheaded drives to get the project off the ground.

Two other City Council offices will be filed in the April 2 election. Terms of office of Aldermen Alvin Scates and Earl Roach end in April. These incumbents have signed as candidates for re-election.

As of late Tuesday, no other persons had signed as candidates for any of the three offices on the City Council.

Board Members To Convention

Four members of the board of trustees of Winters Independent School District, the superintendent of schools, and the high school principal, have been attending the annual National Association of School Administrators convention in Las Vegas, Nev., last week and the first of this week.

They planned to return to Winters the middle of this week.

Attending the convention were school board members Billy J. Colburn, Delbert Kruse, Roscoe Morrison, and Wesley M. Hays; Superintendent of Schools Bill Graves and High School Principal Tommy Lancaster.

Race Seen In April School Board Election

Byron Douglas Jobe, 19, of Rt. 3, Winters, Monday signed application for a place on the ballot for the school board election set for April 2.

Two places will be filled in the April 2 election. Terms of office of Delbert

Kruse, Place 1, and Gene Wheat, Place 2, will expire. Both incumbents already have signed as candidates for re-election to office.

Jobe has signed as a candidate for Place 1 on the board.

Dynamite Mystery Exploded

The mystery of the middle-of-the-night explosions in a downtown Winters alley some weeks ago has been solved, and those responsible apprehended and punishment prescribed.

Glenn Owen, 20, of Winters, and Wyman Burson Jr., 19, also of Winters, pled guilty of a Class A misdemeanor, criminal mischief, and were assessed \$1,000 fines each, plus costs, and placed on two years probation. In addition, they were ordered by County Judge John Purifoy to pay for all damages caused by the explosion when several sticks of dynamite were exploded in an alley north of West Dale Street. Windows in several buildings in the vicinity were shattered.

In working on the case, the Runnels County Sheriff's department recovered 28 sticks of dynamite, along with blasting caps and priming cord in a sack in a trailer house in Ballinger, Sheriff Hershal Hall said. County Chief Deputy Sheriff Johnny Wilson of Winters made investigations in the case.

City, County Officials Discuss Combined Law Enforcement Dept.

A possible combining of all law enforcement bodies within the county—city police and sheriff's department—was discussed during a meeting in the County Judge's office Friday afternoon of last week.

Officials of the county and the cities of Winters and Ballinger, and other interested parties, discussed a proposition to combine all enforcement bodies under one county head, and do away with separate departments, in order, it was suggested, to create

better law enforcement and better coordination.

Ernest Cadenhead, County Attorney of Brown County, met with the group and explained the plan of Uniform Law Enforcement. It was understood that the City Brownwood and Brown County are working on a proposed contract to that end.

Under the proposal, it was explained, there would be no police chiefs as such in either of the cities, but police forces would remain as they are and

would come under the jurisdiction of the county law enforcement officials. City Councils of the two cities and the Commissioners' Court would be responsible for agreeing to a contract. As it was explained, there would be no additional costs to the county or to the cities.

Several officials from Winters and Ballinger and from Runnels County were present for the discussion. Winters officials present said the proposition would be taken under advisement.

Farmers, Ranchers Take Pesticide Course

More than 300 farmers, ranchers, dealers, and other interested individuals attended a short course on use of pesticides last Thursday afternoon, and then completed a test, which will qualify them to handle and use pesticides.

The short course, sponsored by the Runnels County Extension Agent's office, was held in the Winters Community Center, with representatives of the State Department of Agriculture and the Extension Service giving instructions and showing slides.

Questionnaires completed by those attending the course will be evaluated, and certificates issued to those eligible to handle pesticides.

New Federal regulations concerning pesticides affect any individual who uses or sells pesticides, County Agent C. T. Parker said. The Federal Insecticide, Fungicide and Rodenticide Act includes among other requirements (1) the classification of all uses of pesticides as either restricted use or general use, and (2) certification of applicators (private and commercial) as a requisite to the use of supervision of use of restricted pesticides.

Hanscomb was the last postmaster at Blue Gap.

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being appointed Jan. 26, 1880, and serving until the post office was opened by Daniel W. Hale April 12, 1882 in his store at Content. Hanscomb served as postmaster at Content in 1891, and again in 1904 and 1905, when he decided the people were not contented and changed the name to Token, but the community continued to be called Content as it is known today.

Enlisting in the Union army, Hanscomb was a private in Company L. 1st Heavy Artillery, New Hampshire, Sept. 27, 1864 - June 15, 1865, he reenlisted and it is not known how long he served.

Suffering from attacks of what he called "lumbago", Hanscomb made his way south for his health and landed in Content sometime before 1880.

The first entry in a diary kept by Hanscomb is the account of the death of his wife on Sept. 13, 1888. She was buried at 4 p.m. on the 14th and he went to Ballinger where he stayed for several days in Brown's hotel.

Pioneers in the Content area said that Hanscomb's romance was "mail order." He advertised for a bride through the newspapers. His wife lived less than a year. He mentions at the death of his friend, A. J. Rosson, in March of 1893, that he had united him and Mrs. Zella S. Hastings of New York in the bonds of matrimony in Feb. of 1888. He also stated that Rosson had been a magistrate and notary public for the county for more than 8 years.

Hanscomb's diary gives an account of some of the events of early days, how the people lived and the great importance that weather played to animals and the settlers as well.

On April 26, 1893, Hanscomb went to Hylton in Nolan County to a Universalist Convention (the doctrine that all men will eventually be saved) where he remained until May 1. The Rev. James Billings and his wife, both ordained Universal ministers, from Hico were at the meeting and returned to



Content with Hanscomb. The Rev. Billings preached for the people at Content for several days. Hanscomb took him to Ballinger to catch a train for Hico and on his way home he had a terrible accident which nearly ended his life.

"My reins slipped from my hands and fell down on the tongue. I leaned over to get them and lost my balance, went headlong under the mules heels, it was the last I remembered for several hours. It was supposed that the mules kicked me. They ran a short distance dragging me by the reins, being around me. The team was stopped by Steve Babstone who, with his father, was with me on the road, each had a team. They took me up and placed me in the wagon. I soon became conscious and felt as tho' I was broken all to pieces. I therefore could not travel anymore that day.

"The old gentleman, Babstone went in to get Mr. Wiley to come and drive back the team and get me home. Steve Babstone stayed with me the rest of that day and night. The next morning, Newt Wiley came and took me home. It seemed as tho' my right lung was badly injured."

May 11 - "I am feeling very sore and can scarcely move. When I do, I suffer excruciating pain in my right lung. Dr. examined me and pronounced one of my ribs broken and otherwise badly injured internally."

However, he planted his early Rose Dent corn and Snow Flake corn that day. Also his cantaloupes on the 17th. On May 31, he says he

is still improving, slowly. And that night he had a gathering of musicians and singers, "and we had a jubilee!"

In June of 1893 Hanscomb took the notary public oath of office. The next year he was appointed to the board of managers for election day, Nov. 6, and carried the returns to Ballinger along with the U.S. mail.

July 11, 1893 - "Had a party at my house tonight, dancing the order of enjoyment—kept it up until morning light appeared. Messrs. Woodrow and George and Will Duncan dispensed delightful music from their violins. All said they had the best time they ever had in Content."

Aug. 1, 1893 - "Still hot and dry—everything is parching up for want of rain—people moving away—many wanting to sell out—no prospects of rain. Everyone crying water, water! Driving stock 8 and 10 miles to water, cannot get enough good, clean water to drink. Walter Edwards and Charley Woodrow started for Indian Nation today. More will go in a few days."

Aug. 6, 1893 - "Commenced raining this morning about 4:30 a.m., and a very heavy cloud from the S.W. accompanied with thunder and lightning overspread the heavens and a glorious, heavy rain is now falling, which will fill the water holes at least, if not the creeks to running. This will cause all creatures to be glad for the suffering has been great."

Feb. 11, 1894 - "A black,

thick cloud appeared in the north about sunrise and in a few moments a strong norther struck us and which increased very fast and grey cold rapidly, and sleeted until the ground was almost covered—water froze 2 inches thick today. It has been several degrees colder today than anytime this winter. The stock—the poor stock—Oh, how they will suffer tonight."

March 18, 1894 - "A tremendous sandstorm sprang up from the north about 9 o'clock this morning, very cold wind. The heavens were darkened with sand—continued all day. Dr. Barnett pulled my wisdom tooth."

Aug. 8, 9, 10, 1894 - "Rain, rain, lots of it! Creeks all running, tanks are full, and the people happy."

Nov. 11, 1896 - "Bought a new sack of flour today. See how long a sack lasts me."

Jan. 27, 1897 - "Opened a fresh sack of flour today. A sack of flour lasts me two months."

In 1898 on May 25, Hanscomb began taking the scholastic census as he was appointed numerator by the county judge. On July 1, the mails commenced to be carried daily.

On March 21, 22, and 23 of 1897, Hanscomb was prostrated with lumbago. He called in Dr. Barnett. By the 25th he was a great deal better, up most of the day and set a hen.

Before his death in 1908, Hanscomb sold his land where the Blue Gap post office still stands to a Mr. Goetz. Roy Smith's heirs now own the land.

The month of April has been designated Cancer Crusade Month, and members of the North Runnels Unit of the American Cancer Society last week began making plans for the drive.



Sights On Safety

Climbing Up the Ladder Successfully


Every year, 30,000 to 40,000 Americans are injured by falling off of ladders. Depending on how you use it, your ladder can be a convenient means for carrying out home improvement ideas, or a springboard for a free fall.

Ed Killoren, an Underwriters Laboratories safety engineer, urges that you use a ladder that is long enough for your purposes. "My experience has been that most accidents result from having too short a ladder," Killoren states. "This results in the user standing in a position where he has limited stability — a big problem when using stepladders."

When doing roof repairs, an extension or straight ladder should extend at least three feet above the eave, gutter, or roof line. Killoren adds that in this latter situation, the consumer should practice the "four-in-one" rule: the base of the ladder should be placed one foot from the wall for every four feet of ladder height. "In other words," Killoren adds, "a sixteen foot ladder with its top placed against a vertical wall should be positioned so that the base is four feet from the wall."

Killoren proposes that the following steps be taken before making your climb:

1. Set up the ladder on firm, level ground.



2. Inspect for structural damage or deterioration. If you are using a stepladder, make sure the spreader is locked before beginning your climb. Otherwise, your ladder could fold—with you on it. If you are using a metal ladder, remember to keep it away from electrical installations. A UL Listed metal ladder has a marking cautioning you against this.

Once on the ladder, Killoren reminds you not to overextend your reach. Take the time to move the ladder to a convenient location. The extra time spent could save you some extra bills—hospital bills, that is. To have a safe, successful climb, think of safety before you ascend.

Fix-It Tip

When your floor squeaks, understand how a floor is constructed to help you understand the repair procedures. The floor consists of two parts — a subfloor of wide boards that are nailed to the joists and, on top of this, a finished floor made of narrow strips of hardwood. Joists are wood beams that support the floor.


If the squeaking is slight you might be able to slam the floor back to where it belongs. Use a block of wood (to protect the floor) and a hammer and pound the boards wherever they squeak. Often this will reset the original nails.

Weights and Measures Important to Consumers

AUSTIN--National Weights and Measures Week may seem an unimportant occasion to most people, but without the attention of inspectors to the scales used in Texas, consumers and merchants could be seriously short-changed.

March 1-7 is celebrated annually to recognize the impact that accurate weights and measures have on the daily lives of all people, Agriculture Commissioner John C. White stated.

The emphasis this year is on the conversion to metric standards that the U.S. is now undertaking. Plans are being made to aid the average consumer in making an easier transition to thinking in metric terms.

The Texas Department of Agriculture is responsible for maintaining standards and

checking virtually all the scales and measurements used in commerce in Texas.

Packages and labels of all types must state the weight or measurement of the commodity, and these also come under the scrutiny of Department inspectors, both at the wholesale and retail level, Commissioner White stated.

"Thus nearly everyone, from the child who buys a package of candy to the manufacturer who orders 1500 pounds of peanuts is affected by our work."

"When we get into serious metric conversion in Texas, the Department will certainly play a part in helping people avoid making mistakes with the new weights and measurements standards."

Krueger's Kolumn

"TV VIOLENCE"

Sometimes I am asked why the government does not do more to stop the violence in our society. While there are things the government can and should do to reduce violence and crime, one of the most powerful means of reducing such violence lies in the hands and fingertips of the American people, for those fingertips turn on and off the nation's television sets.

The violence that one sees daily and nightly on American television has, in my judgment, a highly harmful effect on young people in our society and has frequently glamorized violence and crime. The notion that there is no connection between violence witnessed on television and the violent actions of those who watch television is naive and unacceptable. Obviously what people watch on television affects their actions, and television producers know this when they sell their advertising. If items advertised on television did not affect consumer purchases, the private television industry could not support itself. Just as we are affected by commercials, so we are affected by programs.

Many psychologists believe that the major formations of a child's personality takes place before he is six

years old. Yet there are countless children who, before that age, have spent more time before the television set than they have conversing with their parents. It is estimated that before an American youngster graduates from high school, he will have spent more time before the television set than he will with his teachers or with his parents; in fact, more time than in any activity other than sleeping. Studies are filled with examples of young people who, having committed crimes, reported that they got their idea for committing the crime from a television program they saw.

Spending numerous hours before a television set tends to develop in young people a tendency toward passivity. The child watches exciting events happen on the screen, but experiences no real joy or pain, and is required only to observe, not to create for himself. Thus, the creative actions required either from playing games, finding one's own sources for amusement, or developing the discipline through studying to discover answers to problems is discouraged. Instead, the satisfaction comes not from activity, but passivity.

One way to seek correction of this problem would be for the government to set up a board of censors, but I believe such a solution would be contrary to our First Amendment freedoms and contrary to public interest. We do not wish other individuals to decide for us what we can or cannot watch. Certainly we do not wish government officials to make those decisions for us. The alternative is for citizens who do not approve of the violence that they find on their television screens to convey that message to the sponsors of such programs. One way in which we can encourage both freedom of speech and expression and a climate of free enterprise is for individuals to cease buying products from advertisers who support and foster violence through their television programs. Sending a message to these people through the mails and through their pocketbooks will, I believe, be an effective means of lessening the violence on television and lessening the violence in their lives.

Secretary Bergland Pronounces Verdict On Screw Worm Fly

Secretary of Agriculture Bob Bergland has extended his encouragement to ranchers and others who will be launching a drive this week in Texas to make 1977 the year to stamp out screw worms in the Southwest.

Some 1,500 farmers and ranchers are expected for an eradication kick-off conference Thursday, Feb. 24, in Austin sponsored by Governor Dolph Briscoe. They will get information on eradication techniques to take back to fellow ranchers.

Larvae of the screw worm fly constitute a deadly parasitic threat to all warm-blooded animals ranging in the Southwest and Mexico. Screw worms were eradicated earlier from the southeastern United States by dropping sterile flies from aircraft. Sterile males mate with fertile females, but the resulting eggs do not hatch—thus breaking the life cycle.

Secretary Bergland said, "Because of a unique combination of factors, we have an opportunity this year to finish the job begun in 1962 of eradicating screw worms in the Southwest."

"First, there's a plus side to the bitter cold weather we've experienced this winter. The cold has kept most screw worm flies dormant, inhibiting mating, and thereby helping sterile fly drops reduce the number of wild flies ranchers will have to

contend with this spring. "Also, a new screw worm production plant began operation last year in Mexico, with a weekly output of over 200 million sterile flies. Added to the output of our Mission, Tex., plant, this doubles the number of flies available for dissemination in the Southwest and Mexico.

Department of Agriculture scientists have developed a new strain of sterile flies that should help in the eradication effort, some scientists suggest the new strain should be called 'super flies' because they are so highly aggressive in seeking mating opportunities." (Native female flies normally only mate once.)

Bergland urged ranchers to cooperate with state and federal animal health officials who will be carrying out other measures against screw worms. Ranchers for their part can help by:

—Postponing until this fall activities such as castrating and dehorning cattle that invite screw worm infestation;

—Inspecting animals frequently for screw worm infested wounds;

—Collecting worm samples and sending them to the Screw Worm Production Plant at Mission, Tex., for identification; and

—Treating wounds promptly with approved insecticides.

Now Is Good Time To Plan Deferral of Pastures

PLANS FOR DEFERMENT
With the approach of a new growing season, it is a good time for producers to begin thinking of developing a plan for deferral of pastures says Joe Chapman, Range Conservationist with the Soil Conservation Service.

Most forage plants begin their growth in April or May Chapman said with their peak of production, about 60%, being obtained in May to July. From this time until September production and growth is generally restricted.

It is during the growth period that grazing of plants is critical. If grazed the same time each year said Chapman leaf and root development will be seriously impaired. As a result development of a grazing program avoids this repetition in grazing patterns and allows plants to rest and restore lost tissues and rebuild weakened root systems.

There are several methods

by which this may be accomplished says Chapman. One method would be deferral of a pasture the full growing season. Another is short grazing periods followed by lengthy rest periods, but most generally agree the best method is deferral combined with rotation of livestock. This allows staggering of the period in which the pastures are grazed and if properly done will result in pastures being grazed at a different time each year. As a result the appearance and composition of pastures will generally improve and can increase available forage. But for any plan for deferral to work well many factors must be concerned before implementation. In other words the system must be tailored to the operation. For further information concerning deferral plans or conservation practices which may add to ranch or farm efficiency contact the Soil Conservation Service.

Consumer Food News

Consumers may find lower prices on Boston butt (pork) roasts, ground beef, head lettuce and eggs at some Texas grocery markets, Mrs. Gwendolyn Clyatt, a consumer marketing information specialist, reports.

In pork buying, "specials" appear at a number of markets, especially on Boston butt roasts—while scattered features include end and loin chops, quarter-loins cut into chop, bacon and roll sausage, she added.

Mrs. Clyatt is with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

"At beef counters, prices continue in the reasonable range with some good features. Worth considering price-wise are chuck roasts and steaks, round steaks, rib, sirloin and T-bone steaks. Ground beef is sporting attractive prices, too. If home freezer supplies of meat are low, now is a good time to stock up," she advised.

At poultry counters, fryer chicken prices are slightly higher, and only a few features are offered—usually on chicken parts.

Turkeys in the 10-14

pound range reflect special emphasis, however.

"In egg buying, prices generally have dropped a cent or two—and large size is the best value," Mrs. Clyatt said.

In fresh vegetable sections, head lettuce supplies are larger and prices are low. Other more-economical choices are broccoli, cooking greens, cabbage, hardshell squash, turnips, rutabagas and potatoes. Carrot prices are a bit higher, but they remain reasonable, the specialist added.

At fresh fruit counters, orange supplies continue adequate with stable prices. Other seasonal choices include grapefruit, apples, bananas, tangerines, pears, pineapples and strawberries.

Along grocery market aisles, economy "spotlights" are on canned fruit, green beans, corn, peas and peanut butter. Good values appear on cooking oil, pasta products and spices.

At frozen food sections, vegetables head the list of key features.

CONSUMER WATCH-WORDS: Vegetable supplies are ample, but be alert to differing degrees of quality.



Athletes, Weight Control

Too-rapid weight loss by athletes diminishes strength and endurance, Mrs. Mary Sweeten, a foods and nutrition specialist, says.

She specifically cautioned against "too-rapid weight loss by starvation, dehydration, super vitamins and fad diets.

"Instead, the best way to reduce body weight—and achieve a maximum ration of muscle strength to body weight—is by eating a lower-calorie balanced diet and increasing exercise moderately," the specialist recommended.


"That reduces excess body fat and increases muscle strength," she added.

Mrs. Sweeten is with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

On the other hand, athletes wanting to gain weight should increase weight as muscle mass and not fat, the specialist pointed out.


"The only way to increase muscle mass is by exercising more and eating appropriately, because no food vitamin, drug or hormone alone will achieve this increase in muscle mass. Also, a higher calorie diet to increase muscle mass should be low in animal fats and cholesterol."

However, whether the athlete wants to lose or gain weight, the daily diet should include at least two 2-3-ounce
