School Round-Up May 4

Next Wednesday, May 4, will be an important date in the lives of children who enter Winters Elementary School kindergarten, or the first grade, for the first time next school year.

These children will be "rounded up" at the school cafeteria at 2 p.m. next Wednesday, to register for the next school year.

A schedule will be arranged during this meeting for conferences with the school nurse, George M. Beard, principal, said.

Each child who will enter the kindergarten or first grade in August, and their parents or guardians, are urged to be at the school cafeteria for the "round-up," Principal Beard said.

For the next school year, beginning August 17, there will be a kindergarten program for children born between Sept. 1, 1971, and Sept. 1, 1972. Parents who are interested in sending their children to this kindergarten are asked to contact Principal Beard as soon as possible, or attend the "round-up" meeting.

The 1977-78 school year will begin August 17, with the first semester ending January 13, 1978. The second semester will begin January 16, and end May 25, 1978.

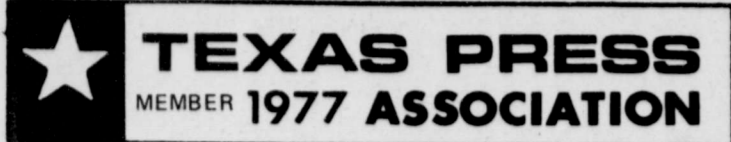

Mrs. Charles Kruse Jr., displayed the Alpha Rho plaque which is to be presented to a Winters High School senior on Awards Day in May.

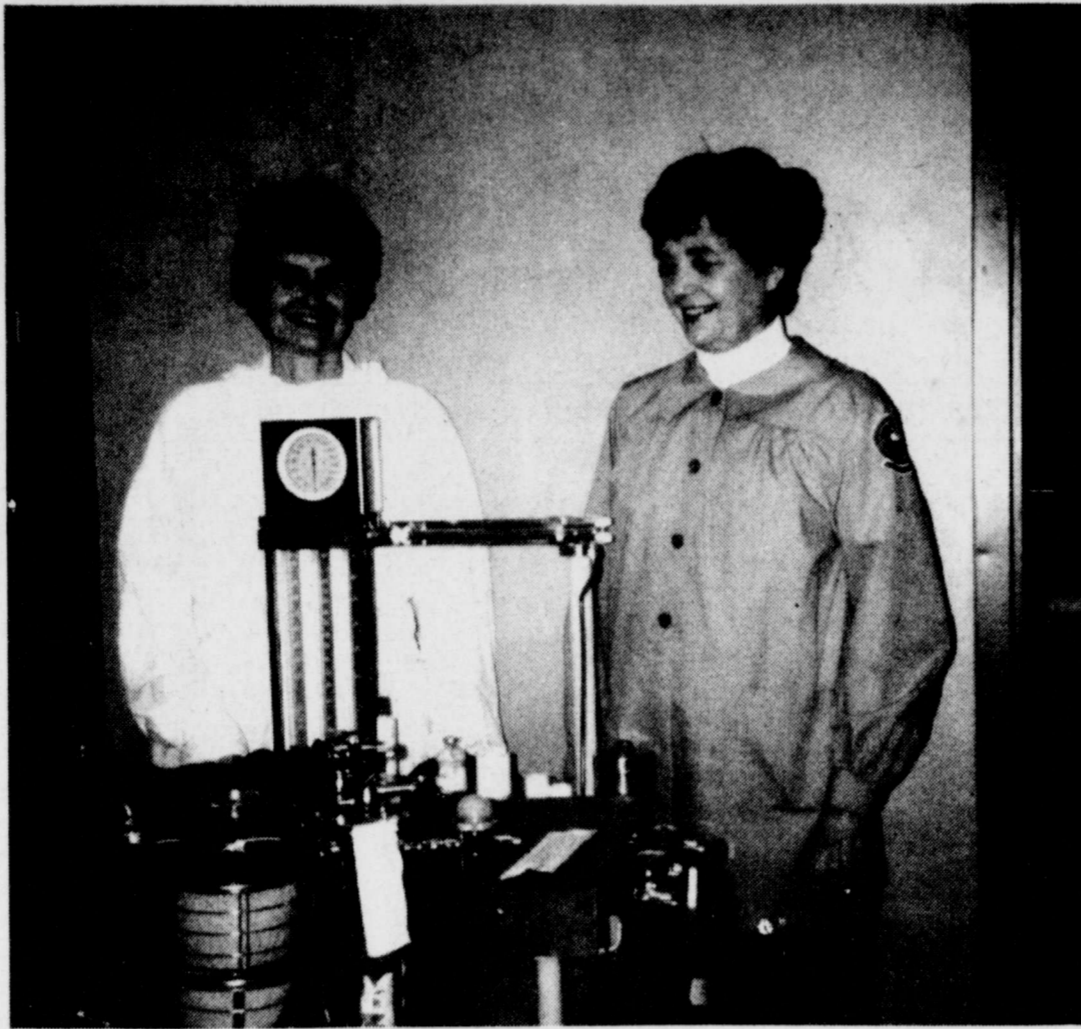
Mrs. Earl Dorsett, delegate to the District convention in San Angelo, gave a report on the convention.
