PROPOSING A CONSTITION-AL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON NOVEM-BER 4, 1930.

Be It Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Article 3 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as fol-

The Legislature shall meet every two years at such time as may be provided by law and at other times when convened by the Governor. When convened in regular Session, the first thirty days thereof shall be devoted to the introduction of bills and resolutions, acting upon emerg- St. Francis. ency appropriations, passing upon the confirmation of the recess appointees of the Governor and such emergency matters as may be submitted by the Governor in special messages to the Legislature; provided that during the succeeding thirty days of the regular session of the Legislature the various committees of each House shall hold hearings to consider all bills and resolutions and other matters then pending; and such emergency matters as may be submitted by the Governor; provided further that during the following sixty days the Legislature shall act upon such bills and resolutions as may be pending and upon such emergency matters as may be submitted by the Governor in special message to the Legislature; provided however, Frances, perpertual vows. either House may otherwise determine its order of business by and affirmative vote of four-

PROPOSING A CONSTITION AL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON NOVEM-BER 4, 1930.

Be It Resolved by the Legisla-

ure of the State of Texas: thereto Section 16, which shall read as follows:

"Section 16. All land mentioned in Sections 11, 12 and 15 Subscribe to Your Home Paper! of Article VII, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, now belonging to the University of Texas shall be subject to taxation for county purposes to the same extent as lands privately owned; provided they shall be rendered for taxation upon values fixed by the State Tax Board; and providing that the State shall remit annually to each of the counties in which said lands are located an amount equal to the tax imposed upon said land for county purposes."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors of the Thate at the next general laction to be held throughout ' State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1930.
