He and his wife, Jan, have one daughter, Jamie, 18 months old. Mrs. Britton is a registered nurse. They have moved to Winters.

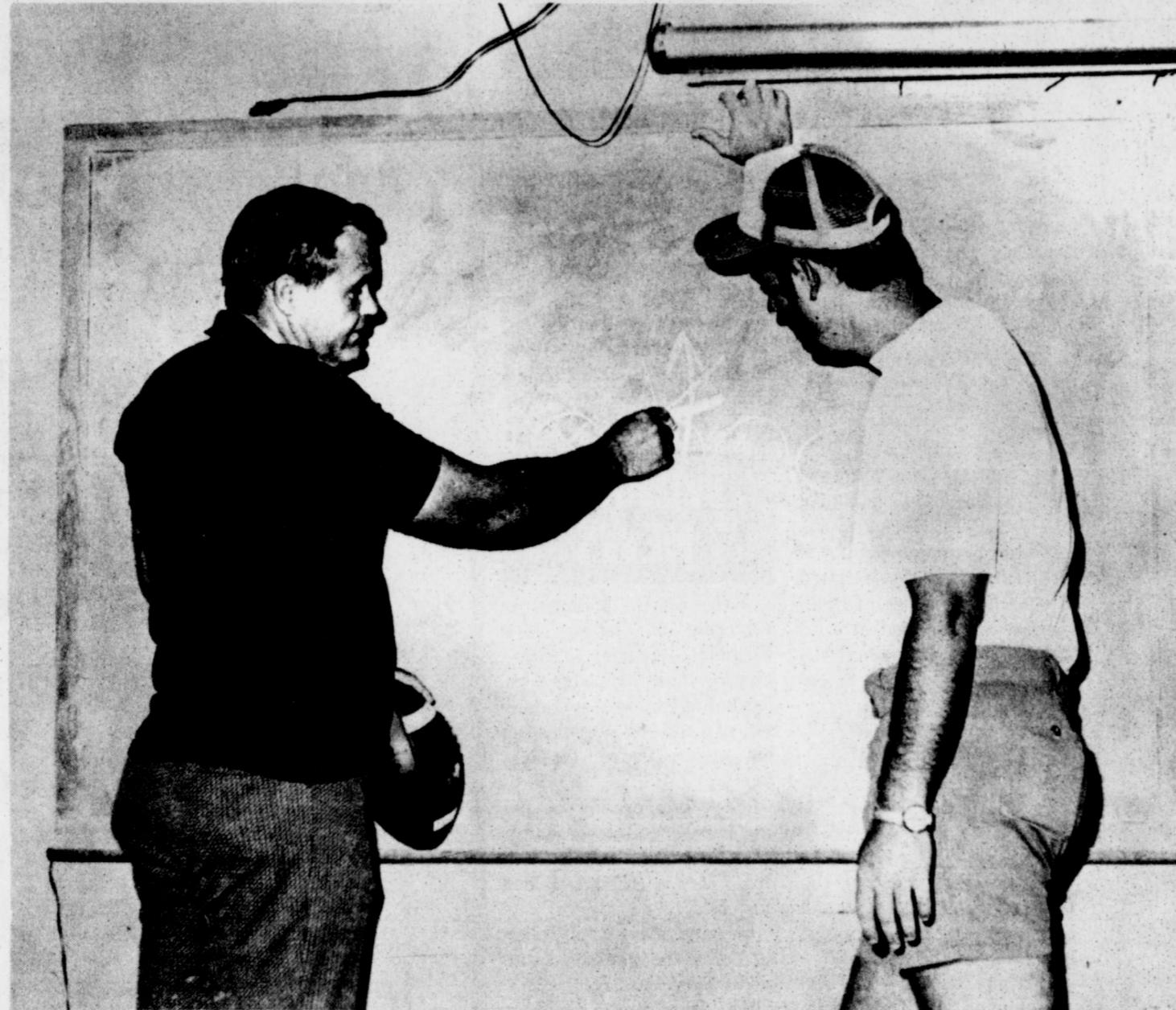
## New Students

## Teachers Will Go To Work Next Wednesday

The 1977-78 school year for Winters Public Schools will get underway next Wednesday, August 17, with a general faculty meeting at 9 a.m. in the school cafeteria.

Teachers and aides will be welcomed by Billy J. Colburn, president of the board of trustees, and Mike Tuggle, president of the Winters Chamber of Commerce. Introductions will be made by Bill Graves, superintendent. The Rev. Fred Thomas, pastor of the First Baptist Church, will give the invocation and bring a devotional.

Supt. Graves will conduct a general faculty meeting at 10 a.m. The meeting will be devoted to a study of new policies and educational procedures for the coming year.

Teachers will continue with a work day August 18, with meetings scheduled at 8:30 by school principals. In-service meetings will be held in the

cafeteria at 9:30 a.m., and at 1 p.m. Thursday. Teachers will begin Friday preparing for the opening day of school, Monday, August 22.

Earlier in the year, August 17 had been tentatively set as the first day of school, but the special session of the State Legislature trimmed five days off the required number of school days for the year, and the opening date was set up to August 22.

Supt. Graves indicated that all teacher positions and other employee positions have been filled.

The board of trustees of Winters Independent School District will meet Thursday, August 18, in the administration building, to consider a proposed budget for the 1977-78 school year.

## Blizzards In Two-A-Day Workouts This Week

The 1977 Winters Blizzards turned out for pre-season football workouts Monday, facing two weeks of grueling sun-scorched two-day workouts before going into regular season action.

Coach Jimmy Stubblefield reported 56 potentials reporting Monday morning. Non-contact workouts were

scheduled for the first few practice sessions, with players to don pads later during the workout sessions. Workouts have been at 7 a.m. and 6 p.m. this week.

A practice scrimmage will be held with Comanche there August 19, and the Brady Bulldogs will visit Blizzard

Field August 26 for a pre-season scrimmage session. The first game of the regular season will be against Clyde at Clyde Sept. 2.

Coach Stubblefield said that prospects are favorable for the 1977 team, with eleven returning lettermen and five starters from last year. One of those starters will be Phil Colburn, 6-3, 225 lineman, who was named as a "blue chip" player by top scouts and key Texas high school coaches.

Coach Stubblefield looks at Colorado City to be the team to beat in District 6-AA this season.

Coaching staff for 1977 will be Stubblefield, athletic director and head coach; Sam Scott, first assistant, working with linemen; Eddie Knight, working with the backfield, and scouting; Phil Swenson, "B" team and scouting; Randy Britton, 8th grade coach and scouting; and Bill Cathey, 7th grade coach and scouting.

## Football Tickets On Sale Wednesday

Sale of reserved seat tickets for the 1977 Winters High School Blizzard football season will begin Wednesday, August 17, at the school business office, and books of tickets will be offered through Friday, August 26.

Sale of reserved seat tickets will be on a first come, first served basis, the school business office said.

All reserved seats in the east bleachers—the home side—will be between the 33 yard lines. Season tickets will be sold as a book of five and will include all home games. Price per book will be \$7.50.

Fans can save money by purchasing a book of reserved seat tickets for the season. Season tickets will sell for \$1.50 per game. After season ticket sales, reserved seats will be \$2 each.

Throughout the season, tickets will go on sale each Wednesday at 8 a.m. and will be offered through Friday noon at the school business office for the game to be played that week.

Student general admission, pre-game, .75 cents; at the gate, \$2. Adult general admission, \$2.

Reserved seat, pre-game, \$2; at the gate, \$2.

## Dry Paint Department Rebuilding Underway

The crash rebuilding program instituted by Dry Division, Wallace Murray Corp., following last Tuesday night's fire which destroyed the division's paint department, is a study in precision planning by private enterprise.

Although the fire virtually destroyed the building housing the paint department, and most of the equipment, Hal Dry, vice president and general manager of the local division, said Tuesday morning that the rebuilt paint department will be in limited production by the middle of next week, and full production is expected to be realized by the next week.

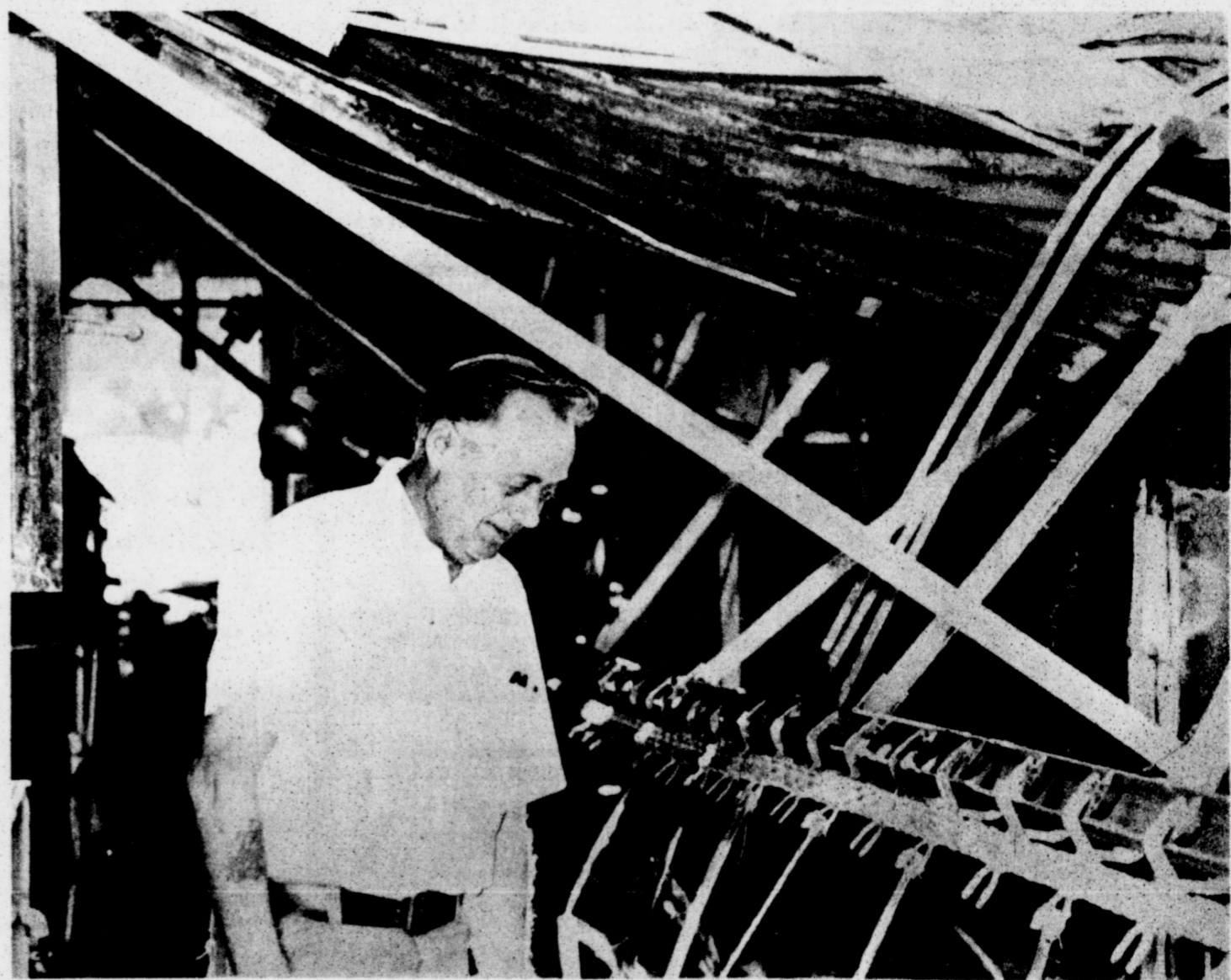
Production in all other departments has continued normally, Dry indicated, since the fire last Tuesday night.

Estimated loss has been put at about half a million dollars, according to Dry, down somewhat from the estimate made immediately after the fire was extinguished.

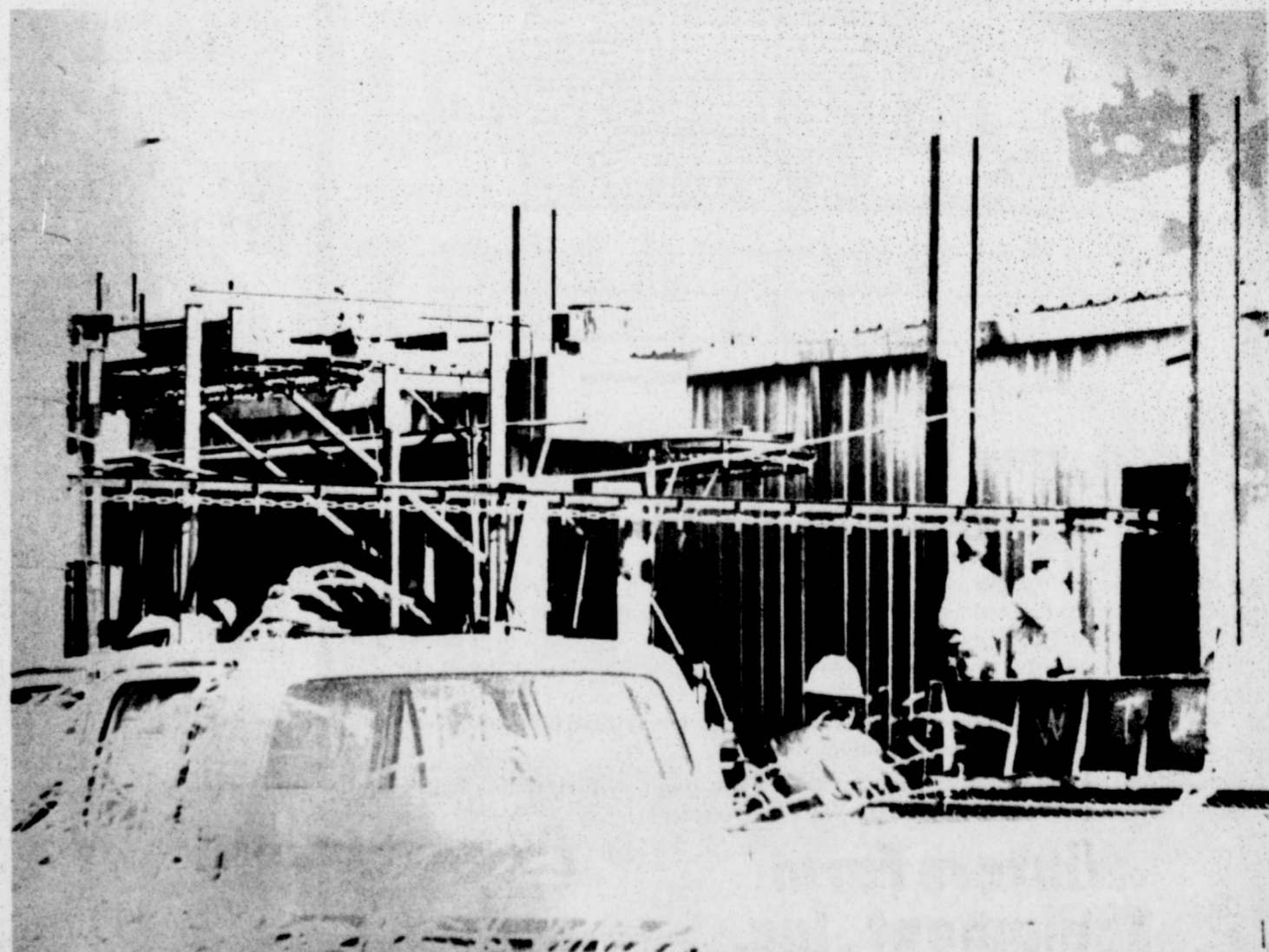
The fire, which destroyed the paint department adjacent to the assembly and shipping plants on the Wingate

highway on the western edge of Winters, was discovered about 6 p.m. Tuesday of last week. All units of the Winters Fire Department were called out, with all volunteer firemen being assisted by other citizens in fighting the blaze. Firemen managed to contain the fire in the paint department building, and minimal damage was observed in the main assembly plant building. Water and smoke damage was kept to a minimum in the main building.

Huge columns of smoke, which could be seen for many miles, marked the fire site Tuesday, and exploding chemicals caused mushroom clouds to billow out of the building. Although firemen worked in sometimes hazardous situations at times, there were no reports of injuries or smoke inhalation. Some of the firemen and others helping to fight the fire experienced times of exhaustion during the fight, but no serious incidents were reported. An ambulance of Runnels Emergency Medical Service was standing by during the entire time.

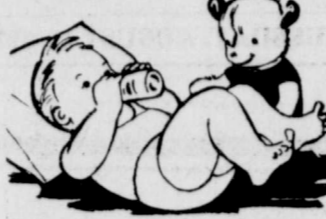

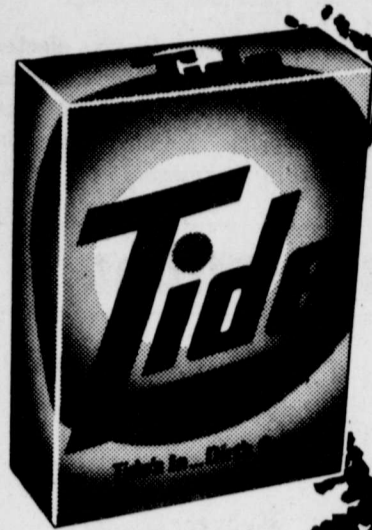

Krueger's Kolumn

What follows is the full content of a statement I issued after legislation in which I have played a vital role for almost three years, was defeated this week in Congress. I hope you find the statement important and I hope it clarified both my position on deregulation and the very complex legislative machinery which has surrounded it in this session of Congress.

THE FOLLOWING IS A STATEMENT ISSUED BY U.S. CONG. BOB KRUEGER OF TEXAS AFTER CONGRESSIONAL VOTE ON DEREGULATION OF NATURAL GAS PRICES.

The U.S. House of Representatives voted against the American consumer. The House of Representatives voted against jobs for Texas.

The nation and Texas both lost in the vote against deregulation of natural gas prices. It was a vote to give the power to federal bureaucrats not just to set prices for energy but to allocate energy supplies and jobs to other states.

In the winters ahead, as the dwindling supply of natural gas fails to meet our nation's needs, as Texas loses jobs and economic growth, I hope we will remember the circumstances that caused opponents of deregulation to reach the conclusion reflected in this vote.

Our loss might very well have been prevented, I believe, if two things had happened:

-if the Administration had offered a better, more realistic gas pricing policy; and

-if the issue had remained non-partisan, as it ought to have.

Instead, people put obligation to party ahead of obligation to country.

For weeks, I had sought a method of compromise in implementing a plan that would hold true to two essential principles:

-eventual removal of federal price controls, or deregulation, and

-the denial of federal authority over our state's intrastate gas supplies.

Both those principals were served in my deregulation bill in 1976, which lost only 205-201. At that time, many Democrats, including myself, worked with a Republican President to fashion non-

partisan energy policy. On this vote partisanship on both sides prevailed and the loss was substantial.

After the initial Krueger bill to deregulate natural gas won in subcommittee by a vote of 12-10, I knew that it would be harder to win in full committee. I felt that by phasing out price controls, over several years, however, we could win deregulation in full committee.

But the Republican leadership insisted instead upon holding to the official Republican policy of immediate deregulation of new natural gas, coupled with windfall profits taxes. That strategy lost by a vote of 23-20.

I then negotiated with Republicans and Democrats, seeking to offer phased out price controls before the full House of Representatives.

That seemed to me the only strategy capable of victory.

Unfortunately, in the Rules Committee the Republican leadership combined with Democratic supporters of the Administration's policy to deny me the

opportunity to offer the only amendment that would have won. In my judgment, the

Republican leadership consciously offered a losing strategy so that they could blame President Carter for the defeat of deregulation.

**Poe's Corner**

Mrs. Pearl Hodges who resides in the Senior Citizens Nursing Home will be 92 years young on August 14.

She has always had a great interest in poetry, art and music, and stays young because she has kept up her enthusiasm for these subjects as well as in other phases of her life.

"I've never had any instruction of any kind because my parents were unable to provide it. But they both loved music and as far back as I can remember, my two older brothers and I sang for guests in the home," she recalled.

They often had company because of the country roads and slow means of travel at that time. Her father never turned anyone down who wanted to spend the night.

Very early in life Pearl developed a desire for guitar. Her parents would have bought her one if they had been able, but she knew it was out of the question. She began to study the catalogs and found an offer from Lee Manufacturing Co. that was appealing. She rode from house to house on her pony and sold \$15.00 worth of baking powder to receive her premium of a guitar. She picked out the cords from the book of instructions that came with it and could soon sing and harmonize on the instrument. Her favorites were the love songs and cowboy tunes. Another song she learned was the "Spanish Fandango", "but I can't do it anymore, my fingers won't mind me," she said.

Her father traded a mare for a pump organ, and she soon began to play it. The older brothers owned a harmonica and when they were absent from the house she would blow it, that was all she could do. But when she taught herself to run the scale it wasn't so bad.

She recalls part of the first song she learned, "I am longing for the coming of that snow white angel band, That shall bear my weary spirit to that sinless summer land."

After Pearl began to play the harmonica, her brothers built a wire rack for her shoulders so that she could play it and second on the organ at the same time.

Three of Mrs. Hodges children have musical ability. A. J. plays the mandolin in the Winters String Band. She accompanies them sometimes on the accordion, or harmonica, or by keeping time with the spoons. A son in Alabama plays the accordion and his children are all musical. A daughter near Abilene plays the piano.

Mrs. Hodges has some 60 poems that she has composed. She wrote her first poem entitled "Memories" while recovering from double pneumonia. All of her children received a copy of her poems as a gift, a year ago last Christmas, through the courtesy of a daughter-in-law who had them made into a book.

She wrote a poem on her 89th birthday which pretty well sums it up:

**TIME AND LIFE**  
Time is an element of life,  
Time brings us joys, and brings us strife.  
Time flies away as if on wing,  
Time never waits for any thing.  
When I look back across my years,  
I recall many joys, and days of tears.  
Eighty-nine years is a long, long time,  
And mountains of trials I've had to climb.  
Now I'm nearing the end of the way,  
My steps are feeble, my vision is dim,  
But still I can see to follow Him.  
By faith I'll follow as best I can,  
And try each day, to hold His hand.

And when the trials of this life are o'er,  
I hope to rest on that peaceful shore.  
If I have run a victorious race,  
I then shall see Christ face to face.  
And dwell with him forever more.

Mrs. Hodges got an idea for another career while visiting her son in California. They went to a museum in San Francisco and there she saw large stuffed animals in glass showcases. She began thinking how to imitate this in a small way. Coming home, she began constructing box pictures out of materials at hand such as driftwood from the ocean, careless weed stalks, also small animals and birds from the dime store and magazines. These are arranged against a painted background of sky and water. She makes them all except the frames and calls them her "trash" pictures. She has sold some \$80 worth and gives many away as gifts.

She took me to the dining room to see one of her pictures hanging on the wall. She stopped on the way to pull up one of her stockings and remarked, "I'm going to sue my garters for non-support."

Born in Montague County on Aug. 14, 1885, Pearl

moved with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. J. F. Haile, to Throckmorton Co. soon after, where they lived until she was 14. They then moved to Dickens Co. Her father was a farmer. She had nine brothers and one sister. "I'm the only one living and none reached the age of 90," she said.

She was married to William J. Hodges in the Croton Community, in Dickens Co., at her sister's home just after a severe snow storm and freeze. The ceremony was performed by the county judge as they stood near an old boxwood stove. Her sister and the children too young for school were the only witnesses.

The couple left immediately in a covered wagon for their new home on a farm Mr. Hodges had rented on the halves. From there they moved about 30 times to farms and ranches in different locations and in different counties wherever he could secure work. They had nine children, seven of them are living.

Mrs. Hodges says she has 32 grandchildren. She has lost count of the great-grandchildren, but has between 60 and 70, and a few great-great-grandchildren.

After Mr. Hodges death in 1950, she continued living at Clyde. She had lived there 32 years when she moved to Winters in 1966. She lived on North Fannin St. until entering the home in 1974.

She has a tape recorder which her son in Calif. sent her and they exchange tapes on many subjects. She
