Dry Paint Department Rebuilding Underway

The crash rebuilding program

Although the fire virtually destroyed the building housing the paint department, and most of the equipgeneral manager of the local division said Tuesday morning that the rebuilt paint department will be in limited production by the middle of next week, and full production is expected o be realized by the next week has continued normally, Dry indicated since the fire last Tuesday night. Estimated loss has been put at about half a million dollars, according o Dry, down somewhat from the estimate made immediately after the fire was extinguished.
