
He and his wife, Jan, have one daughter, Jamie, 18 months old. Mrs. Britton is a registered nurse. They have moved to Winters.

Teachers Will Go To Work Next Wednesday

The 1977-78 school year for Winters Public Schools will get underway next Wednesday, August 17, with a general faculty meeting at 9 a.m. in the school

Teachers and aides will be welcomed by Billy J. Colburn, president of the board of trustees, and Mike Tuggle, president of the Winters Chamber of Commerce. Introductions will be made by Bill Graves, superintendent. The Rev. Fred Thomas, pastor of the First Baptist Church, will give the invocation and bring a devotional.

Supt. Graves will conduct a general faculty meeting at 10 a.m. The meeting will be devoted to a study of new policies and educational procedures for the coming year.

Teachers will continue with a work day August 18, with meetings scheduled at 8:30 by school principals. In-service meetings will be held in the cafeteria at 9:30 a.m., and at 1 p.m. Thursday. Teachers will begin Friday preparing for the opening day of school, Monday, August 22.

Earlier in the year, August 17 had been tentatively set as the first day of school, but the special session of the State Legislature trimmed five days off the required number of school days for the year, and the opening date was set up to August 22.

Supt. Graves indicated that all teacher positions and other employee positions have been filled.

Dry Paint Department Rebuilding Underway

The crash rebuilding program instituted by Dry Division, Wallace Murray Corp., following last Tuesday night's fire which destroyed the division's paint department, is a study in precision planning by private

Although the fire virtually destroyed the building housing the paint department, and most of the equipment, Hal Dry, vice president and general manager of the local division, said Tuesday morning that the rebuilt paint department will be in limited production by the middle of next week, and full production is expected to be realized by the next week.


Production in all other departments has continued normally, Dry indicated, since the fire last Tuesday night.

Estimated loss has been put at about half a million dollars, according to Dry, down somewhat from the estimate made immediately after the fire was extinguished.

The fire, which destroyed the paint department adjacent to the assembly and shipping plants on the Wingate


highway on the western edge of Winters, was discovered about 6 p.m. Tuesday of last week. All units of the Winters Fire Department were called out, with all volunteer firemen being assisted by other citizens in fighting the blaze. Firemen managed to contain the fire in the paint department building, and minimal damage was observed in the main assembly plant building. Water and smoke damage was kept to a minimum in the main

Huge columns of smoke, which could be seen for many miles, marked the fire site Tuesday, and exploding chemicals caused mushroom clouds to billow out of the building. Although firemen worked in sometimes hazardous situations at times, there were no reports of injuries or smoke inhalation. Some of the firemen and others helping to fight the fire experienced times of exhaustion during the fight, but no serious incidents were reported. An ambulance of Runnels Emergency Medical Service was standing by during the entire time.

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

Mrs. Pearl Hodges who resides in the Senior Citizens Nursing Home will be 92 years young on August 14.

She has always had a great interest in poetry, art and music, and stays young because she has kept up her enthusiasm for these subjects as well as in other phases of her life.

"I've never had any instruction of any kind because my parents were unable to provide it. But they both loved music and as far back as I can remember, my two older brothers and I sang for guests in the home," she recalled.

They often had company because of the country roads and slow means of travel at that time. Her father never turned anyone down who wanted to spend the night.

Very early in life Pearl developed a desire for guitar. Her parents would have bought her one if they had been able, but she knew it was out of the question. She began to study the catalogues and found an offer from Lee Manufacturing Co. that was appealing. She rode from house to house on her pony and sold \$15.00 worth of baking powder to receive her premium of a guitar. She picked out the cords from the book of instructions that came with it and could soon sing and harmonize on the instrument. Her favorites were the love songs and cowboy tunes. Another song she learned was the "Spanish Fandango", "but I can't do it anymore, my fingers won't mind me," she said.

Her father traded a mare for a pump organ, and she soon began to play it.

The older brothers owned a harmonica and when they were absent from the house she would blow it, that was all she could do. But when she taught herself to run the scale it wasn't so bad.

She recalls part of the first song she learned, "I am longing for the coming of that snow white angel band, That shall bear my weary spirit to that sinless summer land."

After Pearl began to play the harmonica, her brothers built a wire rack for her shoulders so that she could play it and second on the organ at the same time.

Three of Mrs. Hodges children have musical ability. A. J. plays the mandolin in the Winters String Band. She accompanies them sometimes on the accordian, or harmonica, or by keeping time with the spoons. A son in Alabama plays the accordian and his children are all musical. A daughter near Abilene plays the piano.

Mrs. Hodges has some 60 poems that she has composed. She wrote her first poem entitled "Memories" while recovering from double pneumonia. All of her children received a copy of her poems as a gift, a year ago last Christmas, through the courtesy of a daughter-in-law who had them made into a book.

She wrote a poem on her 89th birthday which pretty well sums it up:
