## Town Topics

THE NEWS was glad to call attention two weeks ago to the fact that the government was ready to make any legitimate additions to our recent count in Dimmitt, and with that in view, we made an urgent appeal for all who had not been counted, to so advise this office, with proper information, and we would pass it along thru the proper channels, where the community would be benefited. In spite of the fact that a number of our citizens remarked casually to us that they had been missed, we received no report of omissions in the count as taken in this city. So the figure, the rather disappointing, must now stand at 830, as announced, and we find that there was very little interest shown among our citizens as to the population.

West Texas' candidate for governor, Clint Small of Wellington, is making splendid headway in his campaign, and reports coming from other sections of the state indicate that this capable candidate is going to do some running in other parts, other than his own bailiwick. In fact, as the News predicted a few weeks ago, his entrance in the race has changed things somewhat in several political camps.

One of the greatest improvements in recent months in Dimmitt is the system of sidewalks leading to the local school buildings. To the new high school we have walks from two sections of the city, and practically every church is accessible on a concrete walk. The citizens of Dimmitt are to be congratulated for the cooperation in affording these conveniences from the business section to the schools and churches.

The words, "Serve and Obey" have, according to news dispatches, been stricken from the Methodist nuptial ceremony. Now those few who may have paid some attention to said words, will not seek out the Methodist pastors for their matrimonial mergers, we opine!

The movement of a systematic decorating scheme for Dimmitt by the American Legion, is a good one, and the purchasers of flags will appreciate this as they become accustomed to the regular use of them. The benefit to the town, from a publicity standpoint, will be much more than the small investment involved.

The acceptance of Plainview to entertain the Basket Ball tournament of the American Athletic Union next year, with Dimmitt as official sponsors, was hailed here as good news, and we assure the Plainview people of every possible cooperation in making it the greatest meet ever held by the association.

## West Texas C.-C. Meets In Abilene May 29, 30, 31

Fourteen resolutions, having to do with the development of West Texas and of the State, have been submitted for consideration of the Abilene convention of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, being held in Abilene Thursday, Friday and Saturday of this week. These will be debated on the floor of the convention, voted on by member towns and the result is to be the work program of the organization.

Governor Dan Moody is on the program to deliver the principal address on the opening day, Thursday, of this week.

## Deaf Smith Census Count Shows 5,981 White Inhabitants

Preliminary census reports on the population of Deaf Smith county give our neighbors a total of 5,981 whites, with over 2,000 residing within the city of Hereford.

According to the Hereford Brand, a substantial increase was shown in Hereford, and an increase of 2,234 in the county since the 1920 count was made by the government.

## IMPROVEMENT IN PHONE SYSTEM UNDER WAY

West Texas Telephone Company Improving All Lines and Exchanges in Castro.

A commodious addition is being added to the telephone building on North Sixth street, which will be furnished as living quarters for operators employed by the company. The present building, built last year, will be devoted entirely to switchboard, operating units, and offices, according to T. A. Singer, owner of the company.

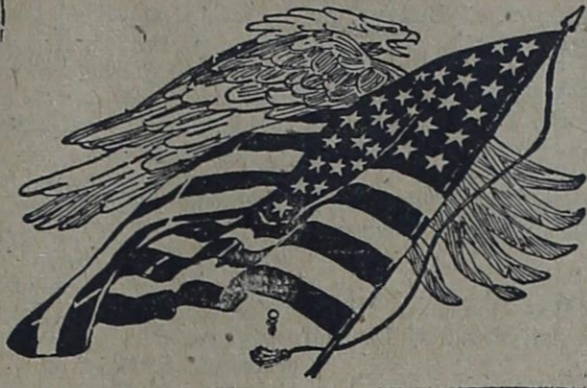
The Nazareth exchange, also owned by Mr. Singer, was provided with a new switchboard, installation being completed last Saturday, with fifty drops, and which will afford the community with better local and long distant service.

Other improvements now in work is the rebuilding of the local line to Hereford, from a point ten miles north of Dimmitt, and which will afford an improved service from this city to that city and intermediate lines.

The application of Stalcup & Webb, of Dimmitt, for a truck line between this city and Plainview, was heard Tuesday, with no opposition voiced, and it is thought that this permit will be issued also. Hez Wright, I. B. Brooks and Ray Cowser went before the commission in behalf of this application.

## VOLUNTEER FIRE DEPARTMENT TO BE ORGANIZED

With Completion of City Building, Volunteer Organization to be Perfected.

With the completion, early in June, of the city pump station, now being erected by the Manning Construction Co., of Lockney, Dimmitt will have its first organized fire department. The fire truck, purchased last year, will be housed in the new building, which is of brick, one story high, and 26x40 feet. It will face the east on 5th street, and besides providing sleeping space for two firemen, truck room, and the city water pump, will contain a supply and repair department for the municipal water system.

The building will cost approximately \$4,000.00.

The organization of the volunteer fire department, which will include 21 men, will probably be under the supervision of the concern from whom the equipment was purchased.

## MEET HELD NEXT MARCH

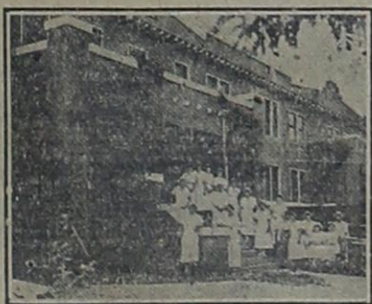

## CHARLES S. WALKER

(An Obituary)

Charles S. Walker was born in Ben Lemond, Arkansas, in 1877 and was accidentally killed May 13, 1930, when a truck in which he was riding, overturned. He grew to manhood in Arkansas, and married Miss Ella Beck in 1898. Eight children were born to this union, three having died in infancy.

Mr. Walker, with his family, moved to the Jumbo community in 1920, coming here from Wellington. He did much in helping to develop this community. He was a member of the school board for several years, and was our Sunday School superintendent for a long time. Mr. Walker was a Christian in the truest sense of the word, having been converted in early life, and joined the Presbyterian church in 1911, uniting with the Methodist church later. Funeral services were conducted by Rev. Z. B. Pirtle at the Methodist church at Hereford, Texas, Friday afternoon, May 16.

Mr. Walker is survived by his wife, Mrs. Ella Walker, and five children, Mrs. Bessie Booth of Farwell, DuBois, of Hereford, Lowrey, of Bovina, and Eunice and Clinton, who lived at home. He also leaves a number of other relatives and friends, who mourn his untimely death.
