Winters Schools Retain Double-A Classification

Winters schools will retain a Double A classification for at least another two years, Bill Graves, superintendent of the Winters district, was notified Monday, and the local school has been returned to UIL District 6-AA for the next two years.

Schools are classified according to the previous two-year average of the average daily attendance in high school. Minimum for Class AA schools has been raised from 240 to 255, it was understood.

In the classification and district assignments from the University Interscholastic League, all present schools in District 6-AA for the past two years were reassigned to the district, and Anson, which had dropped to Class A two years ago, was raised to Class AA and assigned to District 6-AA.

Council Looks At Dog Control

Disturbed and warned by reports of positive cases of rabies in the area, Winters City Council Monday night began a study of possibilities of enactment of ordinances designed to control the dog and cat population in the community, and especially to eliminate stray animals.

Donald R. Stewart, Abilene, of the Bureau of Veterinary Public Health of the State Department of Health, met with the council to discuss ways and means of affecting control of animals in the community. County Commissioners were also represented by Charles Bradshaw, Ballinger.

Stewart told the council that in towns of this size, with no adequate control measures in effect, the dog and cat population would be about 40 percent of the human population. He said that in Winters, there probably would be about 120 dogs and at least 30 cats loose on the streets at any given time.

It was also stressed by the Health Department representative and Dr. Jimmy Smith, Winters veterinarian, that less than 50 percent of the "owned" dogs, and less than 1 percent of the "owned" cats had been vaccinated for rabies. Certainly none of the stray animals had received rabies vaccinations, it was said.


Stewart said that throughout the state, animal control has become a No. 1 problem, and because of the increasing reports of positive rabies in domestic animals, along with a noticed increase of the disease in wild animals, officials should show increase concern.

When asked about regulations concerning construction and maintenance of animal shelters, where a strong enforcement program is put into effect. Stewart said there are no Federal or State statutes on minimum shelters. Each locality is really on its own to plan and construct and operate such shelters.

However, Stewart pointed out to council members, enactment of ordinances on animal control would be useless without strong enforcement. Such a program would cost a considerable amount of money, it was said, but a possible program of cooperation between the cities and the county government would reduce the costs, and also make a control program much more effective.

Speaking of the costs of such a control program, Stewart reminded the council that it would be minimal when compared with the cost of treatment of persons who might be exposed. It would cost about \$500 minimum to treat each person who might be exposed, he said, and the cost could not be compared with the cost in human suffering which might be the alternative.

In the absence of the mayor, James West, mayor pro tem, appointed Alderman Buddy Miller, Dr. Jimmy Smith, and City Secretary Buford Baldwin to a special committee to study possible ordinances, and to contact county officials regarding a joint county-city program of animal control.
