## Important Question To Voters

Probably the most important question Winters voters will be concerned with Tuesday, Nov. 8, will be the owned electric power plant.
The proposition will be included on the City Election Ballot, along with the special election to name a city
councilman to fill an unexpired term. The City Election will be held separately from the General Election, in which several state Constitutional amenments will be decided upon. Because the city-owned light plant was voted in by the people more than 30 years ago, it cannot be disposed of
without consent of the without consent of the people, it was
Although the City Council and West Texas Utilities Co., proposed purchasers of the light plant, have been making proposals and counter-propothan a year, there has never been a figure announced as a definite offer from WTU. Last week, however, the council had in hand a sales contract with a definite offer, and other contractural agreements. It was understood that the Council would
accept and sign this contract offer, subject to approval by the people in the Nov. 8 election. The contract and terms also must be approved by the State Public Utilities Commission, the council said.
Under the terms of the contract, the
City of Winters would agree "to sell City of Winters would agree "to sel
its municipal electric system" WTU, "for the sum of $\$ 40,000$ in cash plus a promissory note from (WTU)
equal to the outstanding balance of the 1960 Refunding Series Bonds of the City of Winters and the 1972 Electric
Plant Revenue Bonds of the City of Winters ( $\$ 210,000$ before the $\$ 10,000$ principal payment which is due on Dec. 1, 1977.)"

 But More Is NeededThe long dry spell, which has months, was dented to some extent last week-enough to bring some of the small grair up, but not enough to sustain growth for many weeks.

In Winters proper, 1.65 inches was reported over a 2 -day period by Roy
Rice, official Weather Service recorder. This makes the total for October 1.81 inches, as compared to last year's particularly wet October when rains amounting to 5.79 inches fell in Winters. The year's rainfall total now stands at 17.94 in Winters, compared with 27.66 for the first 10 months of
1976.

annually on their electric bills. This figure was arrived at in comparing the City's charges for the 12 months average ending Sept., 1976.
City officials have said for City officials have said for
many months that costs of many months that costs of
operation have increased so much within the past few years, and threats of infla-
tionary pressure in the tionary pressure in the
future make the future of the city-owned light plant very bleak. If the City should continue to operate the power plant, officials stated,
tremendous increases in rates would be necessary According to the last audit, as of Sept. 30, 1976,
the light plant realized the light plant reaized a loss
of $\mathbf{\$ 1 7 , 3 7 0 . 3 1}$. The previous year, loss was $\$ 6,899.09$, according to the audit. The last audit available listed total assets of the Winters Electric
Plant at
$\$ 749,858.89$ owned by the light plant is included in the assets but the main building occupied by the generating equipment and enginet is not
in the assets figures. in the assets figures
