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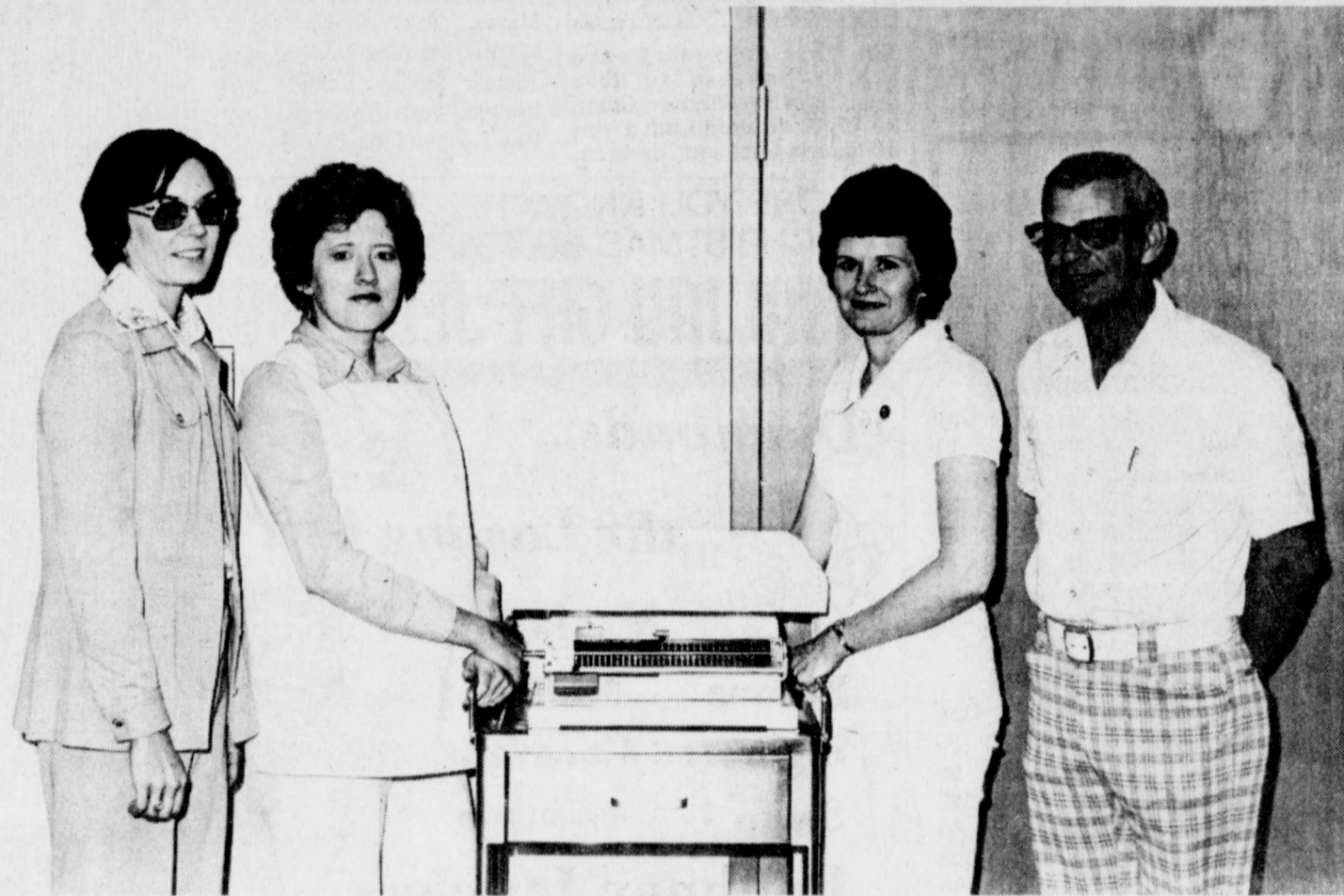
## Young Homemakers Purchase Special Hospital Equipment

New equipment used in the care of newborns at North Runnels Hospital was recently purchased by funds provided by the Winters Young Homemakers organization. Money for the project was raised through the sale of cookbooks.

The new equipment, a new baby scale, replaces an outdated model which had been in use for some time. A stainless steel utility table for use in the delivery room also was purchased by the Young Homemakers, and replaces an older model table.

Clay Miller, hospital administrator, said the hospital is currently attempting to update much of the equipment to provide better patient care and to meet requirements of federal and state agencies. Financial assistance in purchasing much of this equipment has been made available through organizations such as the Young Homemakers.

Sharon Deike is president of the Young Homemakers, and Susan Conner is Project chairman.

## Important Question To Voters

Probably the most important question Winters voters will be concerned with Tuesday, Nov. 8, will be the proposition to sell the municipally-owned electric power plant.

The proposition will be included on the City Election Ballot, along with the special election to name a city councilman to fill an unexpired term. The City Election will be held separately from the General Election, in which several state Constitutional amendments will be decided upon.

Because the city-owned light plant was voted in by the people more than 30 years ago, it cannot be disposed of without consent of the people, it was stated.

Although the City Council and West Texas Utilities Co., proposed purchasers of the light plant, have been making proposals and counter-proposals on the sale of the plant for more than a year, there has never been a figure announced as a definite offer from WTU. Last week, however, the council had in hand a sales contract with a definite offer, and other contractual agreements. It was understood that the Council would accept and sign this contract offer, subject to approval by the people in the Nov. 8 election. The contract and terms also must be approved by the State Public Utilities Commission, the council said.

Under the terms of the contract, the City of Winters would agree "to sell its municipal electric system" to WTU, "for the sum of \$40,000 in cash plus a promissory note from (WTU) equal to the outstanding balance of the 1960 Refunding Series Bonds of the City of Winters and the 1972 Electric Plant Revenue Bonds of the City of Winters (\$210,000 before the \$10,000 principal payment which is due on Dec. 1, 1977.)"

(A copy of the Installment Note which is a part of the sales contract is reproduced on the back page of this issue.)

The sales contract stipulates that the "City shall convey to (WTU), free and clear of any and all encumbrances, all facilities and equipment associated with the municipal electric system, including generation equipment, electric lines and poles, street lighting system, rights of way and metering equipment." However, some equipment, such as the city's bucket truck, a 16,000 gallon storage tank and a 20,000 gallon storage tank, are not included in the sale contract.

Also excluded from the sale will be all buildings and all land owned by the City.

The purchasing company would remove the electric facilities from the city's buildings within a period of twelve months following the date of sale.

At the time of the sale of the

electric light plant, the city also would extend WTU's franchise for a period of 30 years, making the expiration date of the franchise Sept. 25, 2017. WTU also agrees to offer employment to the city's electric system employees at locations where the company has similar type work available.

Most important in the proposed sale of the light plant system, officials pointed out, is the agreement contained in the sales contract that the "Company agrees to apply its standard rates to all customers in the City of Winters. Rates charged in the City of Winters shall not be higher than rates of company for comparable services in effect in cities of approximately comparable size."

If the light plant should be sold to WTU, the city could purchase electricity from the company for all municipal services such as street lighting, water pumping and other municipal requirements, at standard municipal service rates.

City officials have stated that electric rates charged by the City at the present time are higher than WTU's rates in comparable towns. Local rates of WTU are the same as City rates, because the City Council sets and approves all rates charged by WTU here. Because of the lower rates

## Rains Bring Relief, But More Is Needed

The long dry spell, which has prevailed in this area for some months, was dented to some extent last week—enough to bring some of the small grain up, but not enough to sustain growth for many weeks.

Area rainfall reports for the last week were:

Wingate 1 inch  
Bradshaw 2 inches  
East of Winters 1.9 inches  
Crews 1.5 to 3.4 inches

In Winters proper, 1.65 inches was reported over a 2-day period by Roy Rice, official Weather Service recorder. This makes the total for October 1.81 inches, as compared to last year's particularly wet October when rains amounting to 5.79 inches fell in Winters. The year's rainfall total now stands at 17.94 in Winters, compared with 27.66 for the first 10 months of 1976.

Immediately following the dinner, vets will go to the football field where a special pre-game ceremony and program will be held. Honored veterans will assemble on the football field.

This special Armistice program will honor all veterans of Runnels County.

Transportation will be provided for all the veterans to the Winters school cafeteria, and from the cafeteria to the football field, following dinner. There will be no admission charge for the veterans to the football field; they will travel in a group from the cafeteria to the football field.

## Blizzards Host Coahoma

The Winters Blizzards are past the half-way mark in district football competition, and will meet the Coahoma Bulldogs on Blizzard Field at 7:30 Friday night to begin the second half.

The Blizzards are now 1-2 in district, and have a 3-4 record for the season. Coahoma has a 2-1 district record, and a 3-3 record for the season.

Coach Jimmie Stubblefield said this week that the biggest problem the Blizzards have faced this year has been a lack of depth; there is only a limited number of boys eligible. "We must forget about our past losses and pull together to win against Coahoma," the coach said.

The Coahoma squad is big, probably bigger than any team the Blizzards have faced this season. Their defense runs a split-6 formation, and is powerful. The Bulldog offense runs options with a lead blocker, from a straight T-formation. Their quarterback is speedy and likes to run on keepers.

Although their season record perhaps will not reflect it, the Bulldogs are capable of winning any game they begin. They can explode at any time, plowing under opponents before anyone realizes what is happening.

Coach Stubblefield has indicated

that the Blizzards can contain the Bulldogs, if the home team can pull together and prevent mistakes.

James Blackwell, son of Mr. and Mrs. Stanley Blackwell had the reserve champion Chester barrow, and also placed a crossbred barrow 4th.

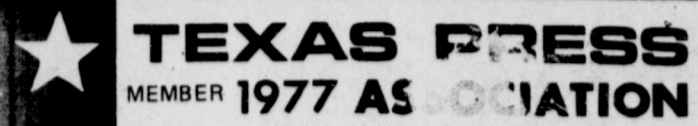
All the placings received ribbons and prize money, and all of the entries were brought back with the exception of three.

claimed possible after the proposed sale, electricity users within the city would save approximately \$93,1666 annually on their electric bills. This figure was arrived at in comparing the City's charges for the 12 months average ending Sept., 1976.

City officials have said for many months that costs of operation have increased so much within the past few years, and threats of inflationary pressure in the future make the future of the city-owned light plant very bleak. If the City should continue to operate the power plant, officials stated, tremendous increases in rates would be necessary to remain in operation.

According to the last audit, as of Sept. 30, 1976, the light plant realized a loss of \$17,370.31. The previous year, loss was \$6,899.09, according to the audit.

The last audit available listed total assets of the Winters Electric Power Plant at \$749,858.89. Land owned by the light plant is included in the assets but the main building occupied by the generating equipment and engines is not included in the assets figures.

Officials have stressed that the City Council is powerless to effect a sale of the municipal property without proper consent of the people. They also pointed out that even if the vote was favorable for the sale, and something came about which would change the basic terms of the proffered contract, the Council would have the authority to refuse further action.
