Joe Harrison, junior student at McMurry College, was recently initiated along with 22 others into the James Winford Hunt chapter of Alpha Chi, national scholarship society.


Last Rites Held For Jewel Tate

Don't Feed Cattle Grubs
College Station—There is no profit in feeding cattle grubs and they can be very effectively controlled, says James A. Deer, assistant extension entomologist of Texas A. & M. College.

The losses caused by cattle grubs are borne by the livestock producer and only the livestock producer can reduce them, adds Deer. These losses annually amount to about \$65 million and according to Deer, most of this could be added to the national farm income if cattle producers would use the following control measures.

He recommends the use of a power sprayer—with the pressure of 200 to 400 pounds. Lower pressures decrease the effectiveness of the treatment, he says. Spray the animals in a chute and hold the nozzle no farther than four inches from the backs of the animals. It is best, he says, to use a full gallon of spray on each animal and from 10 to 15 seconds are required for the application if you want to get the best results.

The spray material should consist of 7½ pounds of 5 percent rotenone dust for each 100 gallons of water. Mix it thoroughly, he adds. This is the cheapest and most effective treatment you can use, he says.

Make the first application as soon as the grubs appear and repeat the treatment at three week intervals as long as needed. Usually not more than three or four treatments are needed. Deer says grubs are beginning to make their appearance now in some sections of the state and control measures should be used if the grubs are to be controlled.

He says if you'll use this spraying program now, you may not have to spray the same animals again for grubs. A good control job should increase your cattle weight gains by about 20 percent and also the value of the hide and animal when you go to market. The dairyman with a grub free herd can expect a good increase in milk production. Deer says if you need additional information on how to control cattle grubs, your local county agent will be glad to help you.

OUR FAVORITE RECIPE MEAT STEW

2 lbs shoulder cut into 2 inch cubes
½ cup flour
1½ teaspoons salt
3 tablespoons shortening
2 cups water
1 bay leaf
Celery seed, marjoram, or thyme to taste
Dredge meat in flour. Brown on all sides in shortening. Season. Add water. Cover and simmer 2½ hours or until tender. About

45 minutes before the end of cooking time add onions and sweet potatoes. Cook beans separately and serve with stew. Thicken liquid with gravy.

Early Eye Treatment For Children Advised

AUSTIN, TEXAS, Oct. 24.—Emphasizing the urgent need for parental supervision of all phases of child health, Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer said today, "Much of the impaired eyesight of advanced years could be prevented if sufficient interest in early life were applied and a correction by means of temporary glasses made when required."

Parents, Dr. Cox asserted, should be watchful for danger signals in the child such as frowning, squinting, persistent headache, eyeache, and watery eyes. If the youngster reads too closely or too far away from the face, that situation may also be significant of trouble.

"No child likes wearing glasses, nevertheless, it is the obligation of those responsible for the future of young folks to have their eyes examined by a reputable specialist if there is a suspicion that normal vision does not exist. It is much better for a child to wear glasses for a few years during



For those vitamin-conscious cooks who are always looking for a recipe packed with nourishment, here is one called Raisin-Carrot Muffins. Cream 1/2 cup sugar into 1/4 cup shortening, creamed. Add 1 egg, lightly beaten, and beat together until blended. Mix 1 cup shredded carrot with 3/4 cup milk and pour into the batter. Sift together 2 cups flour, 3 tsp. baking powder, 1/2 tsp. salt. Add 1/2 cup raisins and stir into batter until barely moistened. Do not beat. Put into gas oven at 375° F. for 25 minutes. Makes about 12 muffins.

Delicious addition to pork chops: Top with orange slices before putting into the broiler about 4 inches from the flame.

Before you start using your gas space heater again, check the burner ports for scaling. A wire brush will clean them so that the flame will not be obstructed.

When starching curtains, make enough starch for all curtains in one room so they will have identical crispness.


