

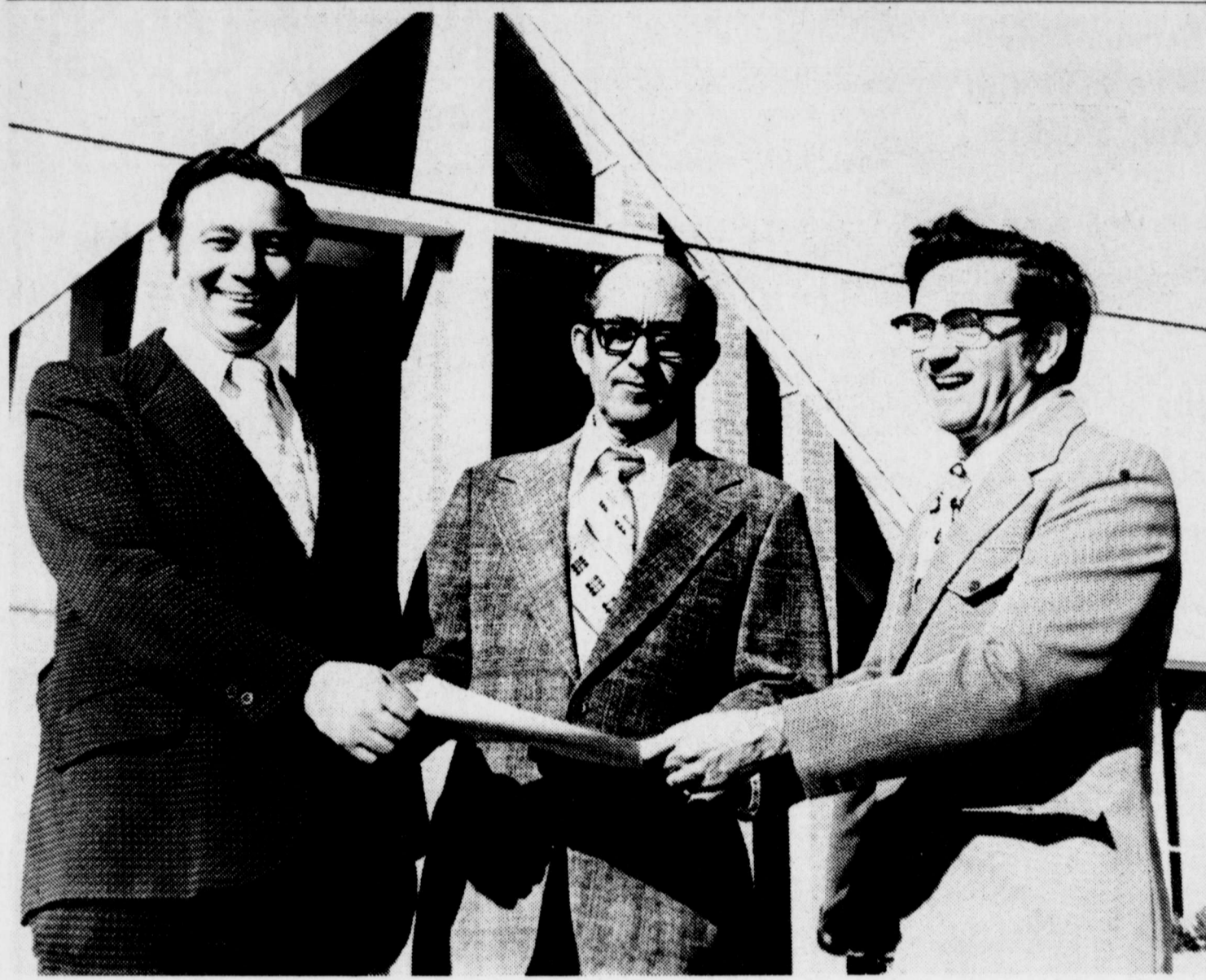

WHS Blizzard Band To Sun Bowl Parade

Possibly the most extensive trip ever made by a Winters Blizzard Band will get underway at 6 a. m. Friday, when approximately 100 band members and eight sponsors leave on a trip to El Paso where the prize-winning band will march in the Sun Bowl Parade.

The group will meet at the band hall at 5:30 a. m. Friday, leave at 6 a. m., and eat lunch in Odessa or Pecos. Cost of the meal will be borne by the Band Boosters.

The band is scheduled to arrive in El Paso about 6 p. m. (MST). After checking into the motel, individual members of the band will be on their own for the evening meal.

Saturday, the group will attend the Sun Bowl football game. Tickets for the game have been provided. Following the game, and supper, the

group has been invited to attend a New Year's Eve party at the University of Texas-El Paso, for all the bands which will march in the parade.

Sunday morning, a devotional will be conducted for those wishing to attend. At 11 a. m., chartered buses will take the group across the border to Juarez for sightseeing. They will visit such places as the bull ring and the Old Market, and the shopping area in Pronaf. The group will return to their motel in the late afternoon. A funtime is planned at an amusement complex Sunday evening.

Monday's schedule calls for the band to arrive at the parade site at 8 a. m.

The parade will begin at 10 a. m., and will be almost three miles long.

WHS Band Director Mike Ford said the group should complete their parade march by 1 p. m., depending upon their position in the parade.

The group will leave El Paso about 3 p. m., have supper in Pecos or Odessa, and will arrive in Winters late Monday night. The band and sponsors will make the trip by chartered bus.

Sponsors who will accompany the band will be Mr. and Mrs. Mike Ford, Mr. and Mrs. Tommy Lancaster, Mr. and Mrs. James Bomar, Mr. and Mrs. Robert Pruser, and Dr. and Mrs. Tommy Russell.

Work Days Set To Prepare For Show

With the annual Winters Junior Livestock Show only days away, activity around the show barns will increase, especially during the two-day work day period scheduled for Jan. 4-5. Preparations must be made for the show, and the show barns and pens must be made ready for the 210 entries expected to be exhibited.

The annual livestock show will be held January 2-9, with young exhibitors residing within the Winters and Wingate school districts eligible to enter livestock.

The actual show will be held in the new school bus barn, located adjacent to the older show barn and the stock pens.

Members of the Winters Livestock Association, sponsor of the annual junior show, and others interested in the promotion of the show are urged to work during the two work days to get ready for the show.

R. Q. Marks is general superintendent of this year's show, and will be assisted by Raymond Schwartz.

Reveive Degrees

Two students who listed their home town as Winters, were included in 135 undergraduates and 27 graduate students at Tarleton State University who received degrees during winter commencement exercises held on the TSU campus Dec. 18.

City Receives \$11,053 From Sales Tax Rebate

The City of Winters last week received a check in the amount of \$11,053.07 from the State Comptroller, as the city's rebate from the one-cent city sales tax for the previous month.

This brings the total 1977 payments to \$69,432.17, a 20 percent increase over the same period of 1976.

State Comptroller Bob Bullock announced that some 890 Texas cities would be receiving rebates totaling \$53.8 million for the period.

"These figures indicate that 1977 was a banner year for merchants and other sales tax permit holders in Texas, and we expect the coming year to be as good or better," Bullock said. The local option sales tax is collected by local merchants and other sales tax permit holders and returned to the cities monthly by the comptroller's office.

1977 Rainfall

Winters' rainfall in 1977 has not only been below the 1976 total, it has not even equaled the annual average for the area, as of Dec. 27. The greatest amount of rain fell in the first half of the year, while the opposite occurred in 1976.

Average rainfall for this area is 26 inches, with last year's total slightly above that amount, and this year's total more than seven inches below.

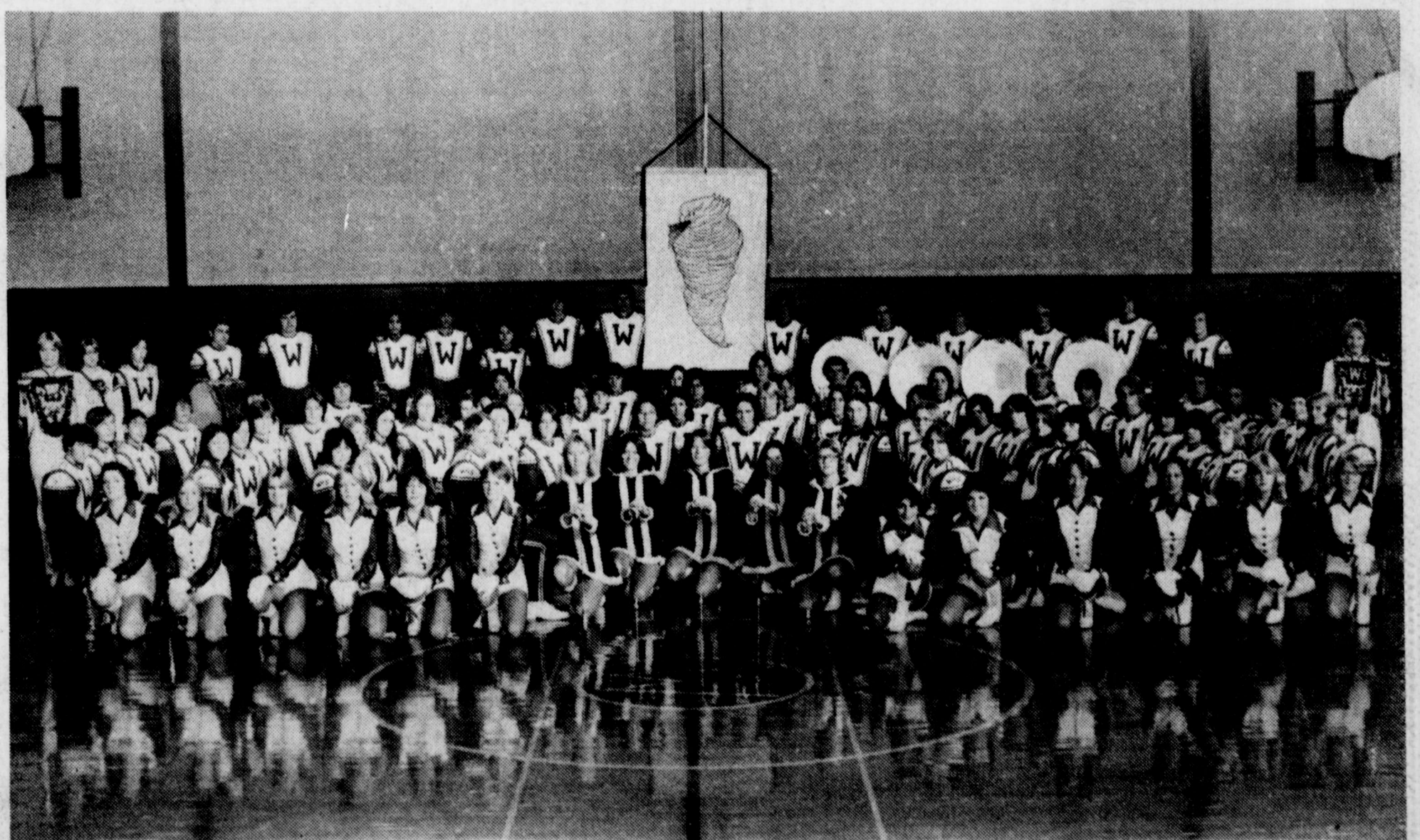
First 1978 Baby To Receive Gifts

Services for Wreck Victim Held Friday

Funeral services for Marcus (Ted) Tubbs, 63, of Odessa, were held at 2:30 p. m. Friday in the Winters Funeral Home Memorial Chapel. The Rev. Virgil James, pastor of Wilmeth Baptist Church, officiated. Burial was in the Wilmeth Cemetery.

Mr. Tubbs was killed in a truck accident at 8:20 p. m. Wednesday of last week 18 miles west of Robert Lee on State Highway 158.

Marcus Tubbs, formerly of Wilmeth, was killed when a bearing apparently broke on the wheel of his pickup, causing him to lose control of the vehicle, Coke County Deputy Marshall Millican reported. The truck overturned and Tubbs was thrown from it, Millican said.

Mr. Tubbs, the lone occupant of the vehicle, was pronounced dead at the scene by Robert Lee Justice of the Peace Opal Jochy.

Born April 4, 1914, in the Norton community, he had lived in the Norton-Wilmeth area until moving to Odessa five years ago, where he was in the construction business.

He was a member of the Baptist Church, and was an Army veteran of World War II.

Survivors include three brothers, Marvin of Show Low, Ariz., Homer of Winters and J. A. of Ballinger; two sisters, Elsie McDonald of Mineral Wells, and Laveta Kennemer of Snyder; and several nieces and nephews.

Krueger's Kolumn

"Texas! The Superstate" is the banner across the cover of a December issue of Newsweek magazine.

I think Newsweek has got our number! And while I can't claim to be a totally impartial observer when it comes to our state, the more I travel Texas the more I continue to appreciate its resources.

Texas produces over 80% of America's beef and wool, provides more than 40% of its cotton, contains a quarter of our country's oil and 35% of its natural gas. These are the figures Newsweek emphasizes. They are impressive figures.

Something that impresses

me more is Texas' most important resource—its people. A state is no better than the people who live in it and only super energy and effort on the part of people can produce a superstate.

Texans have shown their brand of fiery independence, with its historical roots in courageous days at the Alamo, many times this past year.

While traveling the state, I've met hundreds of young Texans. They are an impressive group. Unafraid and openly curious, they've put questions to me and demanded frank answers. These I give willingly. They, like all Texans, need candid answers. They should understand how our country's government works. They have a right to know where their representative stands on issues.

Like their Texas counterparts, young people throughout the nation are keenly interested in and definitely opinionated about issues. A poll showed that teenagers are concerned about issues like energy, big bureaucracy and national defense.

According to the poll, 77% say they would like the budget for national defense increased or maintained at the current level. A majority of those polled want government reorganization and a balanced national budget. Three-fourths are interested in and care about who represents them in Congress.

This interest in issues is good. The fact that Texas students I have met are informed enough to ask questions is especially encouraging. It indicates that a new generation of Texans is coming along that will be every bit as knowledgeable, independent and willing to speak out as their parents.

At this time of year when we traditionally review our year's work and then look to the future, I think we can look at our young Texans and be proud. And I think we can look ahead to their coming of age and be even more proud.
