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## Only Two Candidates For Three City Seats

With filing deadline less than a week away, one seat on the Winters City Council still remains without a candidate. Next Tuesday, Feb. 28, will be the filing deadline, according to City Secretary Buford Baldwin.

Terms of office for three aldermen—James West, Buddy Miller and Jim Hatler—expire in April. Jim Hatler, who is presently serving a short

unexpired term, has announced for re-election. West and Miller both have announced they will not seek return to office.

Randy Springer has filed as a candidate for one of the seats to be vacated, but by Tuesday noon of this week, there had been no other candidate filed for the other seat.

## Another Candidate For School Board

Further interest was added to the already active race for three places on the board of trustees of Winters Independent School district this week, as another candidate signed up for one of the places.

Sealy Bryan, Rt. 3, Winters—west of Winters—early in the week signed as a candidate for Place 5 on the board, the third candidate for that place. This brings to nine the number of candidates for the three places. Bryan will oppose Wesley M. Hays,

incumbent, and Lynn Billups for Place 5.

In the Place 3 race, there are three candidates, Roscoe Morrison, incumbent, and Scotty Belew and Calvin Helm.

Place 4 also has three candidates, Gary Pinkerton, Pam Connor and Freddie Bredemeyer. The incumbent trustee holding Place 4, Wesley Vogler, has said he will not be a candidate for re-election.

The school board election will be held April 1.

## Four To Be Elected In Hospital District

Terms of office will end in April for four members of the board of directors of North Runnels County Hospital District, and the regular election has been called for April 1.

Directors whose terms end include Lynn Billups, Bobby Rogers, Nelan Bahlman and Lee Harrison.

Prospective candidates for the hospital district board must present a petition signed by 10 qualified taxpaying electors to be included on the ballot. Term of office is two years.

Incumbent directors whose terms expire have made no public announcement of intentions.

## Former Teacher Killed In Plane Crash

Jerry Neely of San Marcos, a former teacher-coach in Winters High School, was one of two men killed in the crash of a small plane sometime Friday night near Wimberly.

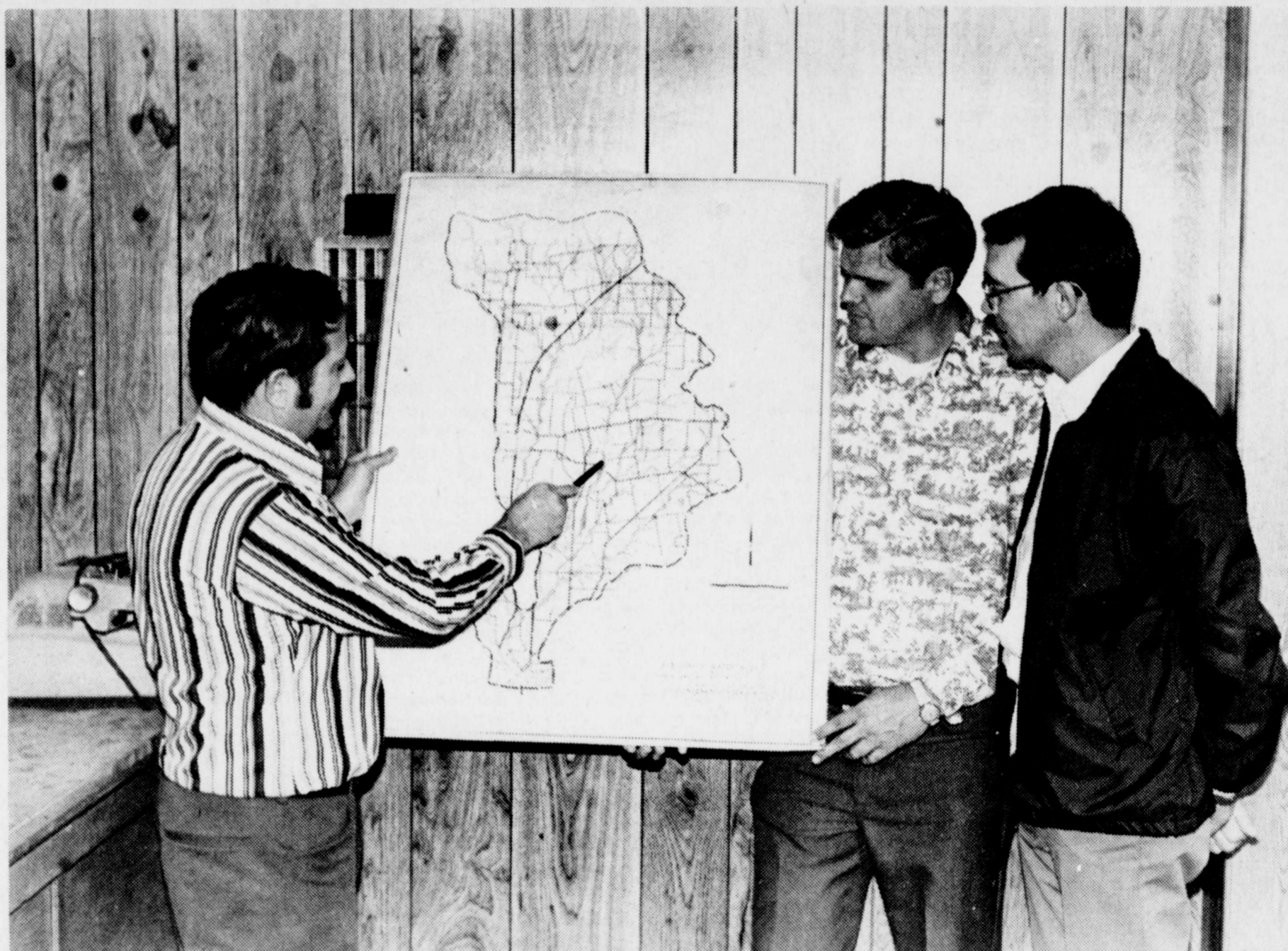
The other occupant of the plane was Bill Horlen of San Antonio.

The plane was reported missing after taking off from Edinburg Friday night, and searching aircraft did not find the wreckage until Monday night.

Funeral services were tentatively set for Thursday or Friday at San Marcos.

According to news reports, Jerry Neely, pilot of the plane, and Bill Horlen of San Antonio, refereed the Denver-Pan American basketball game Friday night in Edinburg. No flight plan had been filed, it was reported, but Neely reportedly planned to fly to San Marcos, from where Horlen would drive to Waco to referee Saturday's Southern Methodist-Baylor game. Neely was to have called the St. Edward's Texas Lutheran game Saturday night in Austin.

Planning for the Elm Creek watershed is about 85 percent

completed, it was said. Northcut said a new part has been added to the overall project, in a cost-share program to treat critical sediment sources on the watershed. The federal government will provide 80 percent of the costs, and the landowner 20 percent, he said. This latest addition

to the watershed project, which began in 1967, will not be a requirement for completion of planned structures, but may be advantageous to the entire project.

## Local Farmers Get Warm Reception In Washington

Two Winters farmers, who represented other Runnels County farmers in the American Agriculture Movement "March To Washington," said this week they received a warm reception from every national figure they visited with during the five days they were in the nation's capital, and that all were in sympathy with the economic position of the farmers and ranchers, contrary to some reports which had indicated national figures were not paying much attention to the nationwide movement.

Bobby Blackwood and Robert Parramore left Winters Sunday, Feb. 5, for Washington, D.C., and returned last weekend. They visited with both U.S. Senators from Texas, John Tower and Loyd Bentsen, Cong. Bob Krueger, Cong. Omar Burleson, and with congressmen from other states.

They also discussed the problems of agriculture with officials of the ASCS, and the U.S. Department of Agriculture, and the federal departments handling export and import commodities.

The two Winters men said they received warm receptions in all offices they visited, and had long discussions with many of the officials. Some of the congressmen from non-agriculture districts had not been aware of the many problems besetting farmers and ranchers until the present Agriculture Movement began, they indicated, but promised thorough studies of the situations.

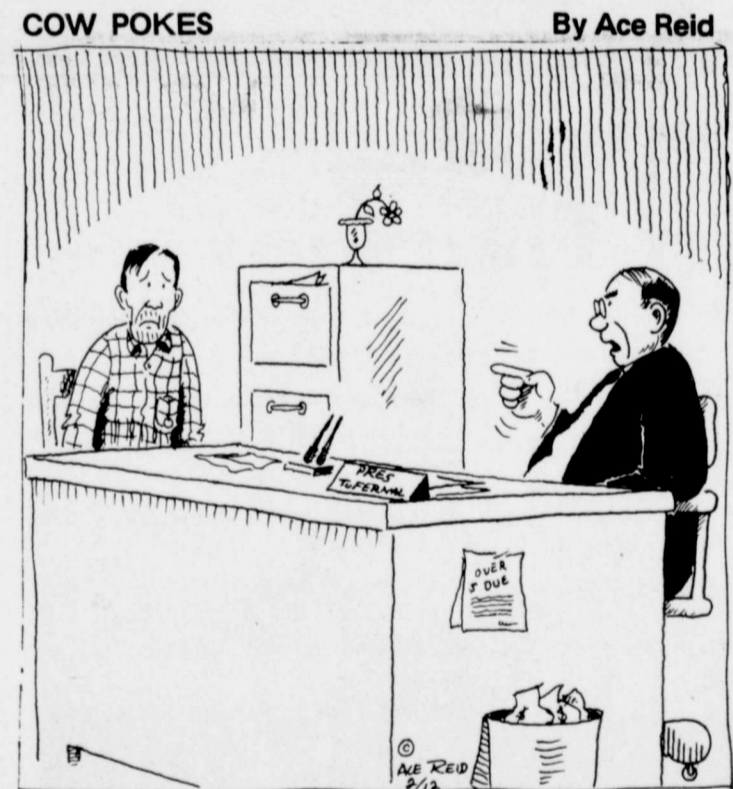

### Farmer Urged To Use Grain Program

Beginning March 1, farmers will no longer have to wait for their 1977 crop barley, oats and wheat loans to mature, or for their purchase agreements to expire, to participate in the grain reserve program, according to Barney C. Puckett, Chairperson of the Runnels County Agricultural Stabilization and Conserva-

tion Committee. Secretary of Agriculture Bob Bergland has announced that starting March 1, these 1977 crops may be placed immediately into the grain reserve. Early entry of the 1977 crop corn and sorghum will be announced later, he said.

The grain reserve program serves as a new marketing tool for farmers. "Instead of selling their grain at low market prices, farmers can place it in the reserve program, receive storage payments, and wait for prices to increase", he

said. By using the reserve to isolate supplies from the marketplace when they are excessive, farmers are helping to get grain prices up, he added.

Under the program, farmers enter into a contract with the government for a three-year period, and receive annually, in advance, a storage payment of 25 cents per bushel for wheat, corn, sorghum and barley, and 19 cents per bushel for oats. Farmers, in return, must agree to hold their grain off the market at least until the price reaches an established level or the contract expires. Farmers with 1976 crop barley, oats and wheat not yet under loan may file a purchase agreement by February 28, 1978, obtain a loan and immediately enter the reserve. The final date to obtain a loan and become eligible to enter the reserve on 1977 crop barley, oats and wheat is March 31, 1978.

Puckett also announced a change in the farm storage facility loan program that will increase the amount of storage for which reserve program participants may qualify. "Under the change, a farmer will be able to obtain a loan for storage structures to store two years' crop production, however, in determining eligibility, existing capacity used to store grain in the reserve program will be excluded", he said. Previously, in determining eligibility, all existing facilities were included.

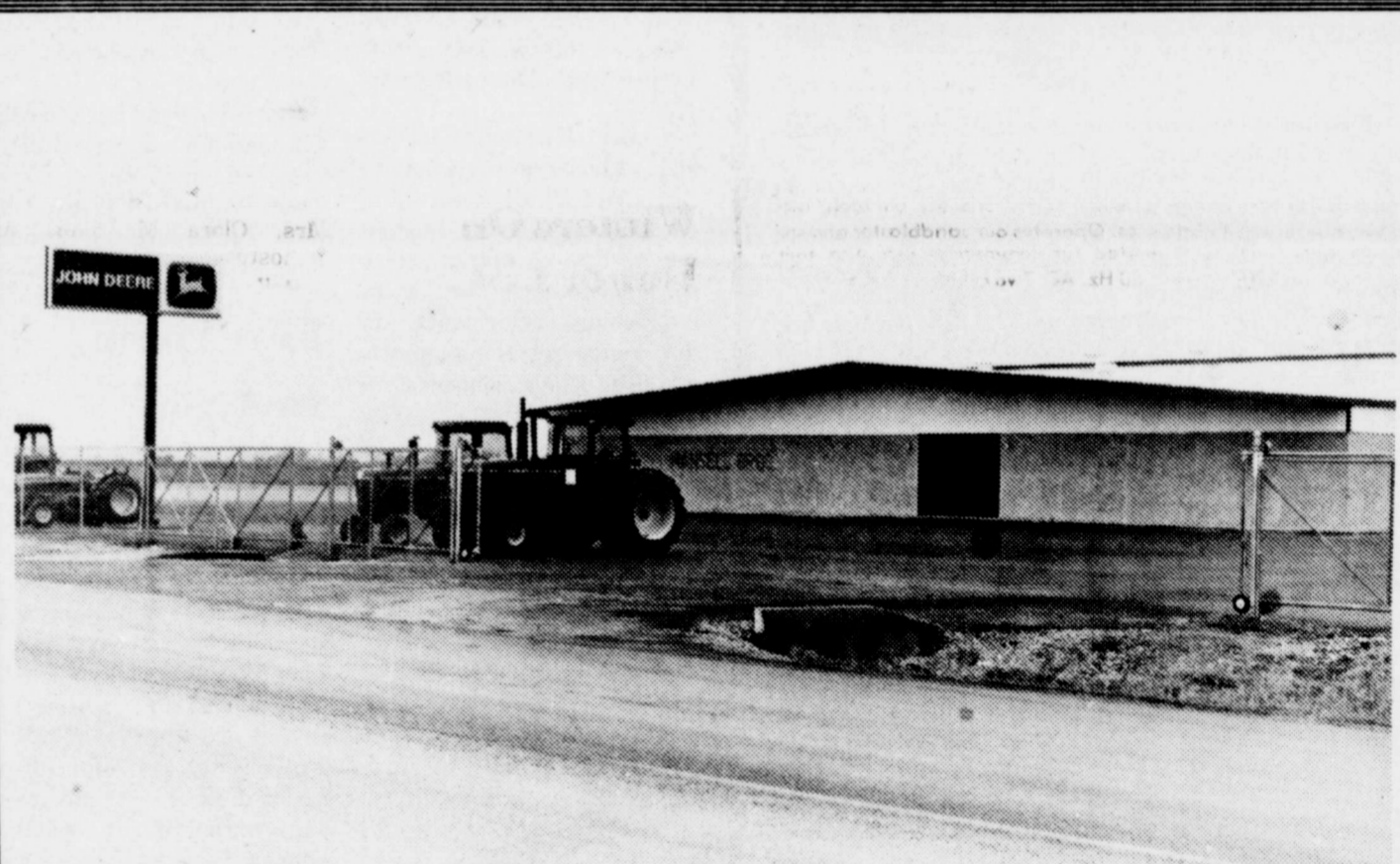

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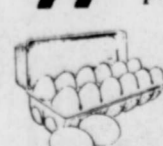

**Killed In Crash-**

He married Miss Ruth Cooley of Abilene in 1969. She was Miss Abilene of 1969, and also a McMurtry graduate. They have a two-year-old son, Craig. His mother, Mrs. Ruth S. Neely, is housemother of William C. Martin Memorial Dormitory at McMurtry.

Mr. Neely was a nephew of Mr. and Mrs. Gattis Neely of Winters.

Vocational agriculture or agri-business by the National Vocational Education Acts through the U.S. Office of Education, state departments of education and the local school systems. Advancement through the degrees in the organization from the Green Hand through the Chapter Farmer State Farmer, and American Farmer or Agri-businessman is based on achievement in farming, ranching, or agri-business careers. Nearly 8,500 public high schools have FFA chapters.
