Only Two Candidates For Three City Seats

With filing deadline less than a week away, one seat on the Winters City Council still remains without a candidate. Next Tuesday, Feb. 28, will be the filing deadline, according to City Secretary Buford Baldwin.

Terms of office for three aldermen-James West, Buddy Miller and Jim Hatler-expire in April. Jim Hatler, who is presently serving a short unexpired term, has announced for re-election. West and Miller both have announced they will not seek return to office.

Randy Springer has filed as a candidate for one of the seats to be vacated, but by Tuesday noon of this week, there had been no other candidate filed for the other seat.

Another Candidate For School Board

Further interest was added to the already active race for three places on the board of trustees of Winters Independent School district this week. as another candidate signed up for one of the places.

Sealy Bryan, Rt. 3, Winters-west of Winters-early in the week signed as a candidate for Place 5 on the board, the third candidate for that place. This brings to nine the number of candidates for the three places. Bryan will oppose Wesley M. Hays,

incumbent, and Lynn Billups for Place 5

In the Place 3 race, there are three candidates, Roscoe Morrison, incumbent, and Scotty Belew and Calvin Helm.

Place 4 also has three candidates, Gary Pinkerton, Pam Connor and Freddie Bredemeyer. The incumbent trustee holding Place 4. Wesley Vogler, has said he will not be a candidate for re-election.



Former Teacher Killed In Plane Crash

Jerry Neely of San Marcos, a former teacher-coach in Winters High School, was one of two men killed in the crash of a small plane sometime Friday night near Wimberly.

The other occupant of the plane was Bill Horlen of San Antonio.

The plane was reported missing after taking off from Edinburg Friday night, and searching aircraft did not find the wreckage until Monday night.

Funeral services were tentatively set for Thursday or Friday at San Marcos.

According to news reports, Jerry Neely, pilot of the plane, and Bill Horlen of San Antonio, refereed the Denver-Pan American basketball

game Friday night in Edinburg. No flight plan had been filed, it was reported, but Neely reportedly planned to fly to San Marcos, from where Horlen would drive to Waco to referee Saturday's Southern Methodist-Baylor game. Neely was to have called the St. Edward's Texas Lutheran game Saturday night in Austin.

Local Farmers Get Warm Reception In Washington

Two Winters farmers, who represented other Runnels County farmers in the American Agriculture Movement "March To Washington," said this week they received a warm reception from every national figure they visited with during the five days they were in the nation's capital, and that all were in sympathy with the economic position of the farmers and ranchers, contrary to some reports which had indicated national figures were not paying much attention to the nationwide movement.

Bobby Blackwood and Robert Parramore left Winters Sunday, Feb. 5, for Washington, D.C., and returned last weekend. They visited with both U.S. Senators from Texas, John Tower and Loyd Bentsen, Cong. Bob Krueger, Cong. Omar Burleson, and with congressmen from other states.

Farmer Urged To Use Grain

Program

Beginning March 1, farmers will no longer have to wait for their 1977 crop barley, oats and wheat loans to mature, or for their purchase agreements to expire, to participate in the grain reserve program, according to Barney C. Puckett, Chairperson of the **Runnels County Agricultural** Stabilization and Conserva-

Agriculture Bob Bergland has announced that starting March 1. these 1977 crops may be place immediately into the grain reserve. Early entry of the 1977 crop corn and sorghum will be announced later, he said.

The grain reserve program serves as a new marketing tool for farmers. "Instead of selling their grain at low market prices, farmers can place it in the reserve program, receive storage payments, and wait for prices to increase", he







Puckett also announced a change in the farm storage facility loan program that will increase the amount of storage for which reserve program participants may qualify. "Under the change, a farmer will be able to obtain a loan for storage structures to store two years' crop production, however, in determining eligibility, existing capacity used to store grain in the reserve program will be excluded", he said. Previously, in determining eligibility, all existing facilities were included.






