Two candidates for Runnels County Judge have another three weeks of uncertainty after no candidate received a majority of the votes cast in Saturday's Democratic primary.

B. B. (Bill) Stultz and incumbent John Purifoy will contest for the winning votes to be cast in the June 3 runoff. The winner will face Republican Woodrow Hoffman in the general election in November. Hoffman was the lone republican running in the primaries May 6.

In Saturday's voting, Judge Purifoy received 721 votes, with Stultz claiming 813.

Michael Murchison came in third with 560 votes. Don Atkins, a former longtime sheriff, was also on the ballot but died before the election. He received 30 votes.



It is true, the spokesman said, that the case on the court docket shows that North Runnels Hospital has charged firms in Abilene and Minneapolis, Minn., with negligence in connection with a fire at the hospital July 22, 1976, involving a piece of laboratory equipment. However, it was stated, the suit was not filed by the hospital board, but by an insurance company in the name of the North Runnels Hospital, a common procedure, according to the hospital's legal counsel. The insurance company already has paid a damage claim to the hospital, and in the suit is seeking to recover damages from the two equipment firms. According to the hospital board spokesman, no one on the board, nor the hospital administration, had been notified by the insurance company that the suit had been filed, and no news medium had sought additional information concerning the case from the hospital, until Monday of this week. The published information obviously was taken from the filed petition, it was explained, and no other background

article served to be misleading to those who were not fully informed about the situation.

According to the article, defendants in the case are Pako Corporation, a Minneapolis firm which manufactured the equipment involved in the fire, and X-Ray Enterprises of Abilene, which contracted June 16, 1976, to service the equipment.

The suit petition maintains that the equipment was serviced July 21, 1976. The next morning, it was said, a hospital employee turned on the equipment to heat up chemicals. Shortly afterward, a fire broke out. It was later determined, according to the petition, that no chemicals were in the machine, resulting in the heating elements causing the fire.

Plaintiff—the insurance company in the name of North Runnels Hospital seeks to show the fire resulted from defects in material and workmanship since there was no safety switch, and from negligence by the Abilene firm.

Damages were said to amount to \$3,279.78, and under the Deceptive Trade Practices Act which provides for three times the amount of actual damages, the amount sought in the suit would be \$9,839.34, plus \$3,000 attorney fees.

The hospital board said the hospital already has received payment from the insurance company. A complete schedule for the 1978 season may be found elsewhere in this issue of The Enterprise.

## Coach Warren Bell Died In San Antonio Wednesday

Warren Bryan Bell, who was employed by the Winters school about two months as head football coach and athletic director, died Wednesday afternoon of last week in a San Antonio hospital, victim of an apparent stroke.

Bell, 35, was taken to the hospital after being found by police in his motel room unconscious and moaning. He had been traveling to Charlotte to visit his family and stopped at a San Antonio motel. Tenants in an adjoining room heard him moaning and called the police, it was reported.

Funeral services were held at 10 a.m. Friday at Charlotte First Baptist Church. Roland Doizer, pastor, officiated. Burial was at 10 a.m. Saturday at Rest Haven Cemetery in Lubbock.

Born April 9, 1943, at Stanton, he was a 1961 graduate of Borger High School. He attended Frank Phillips Junior College in 1961 and 1962; Howard Payne University in 1965 through 1967; and East Texas Baptist University 1968. He graduated from West Texas State University in 1973 with a bachelor of science degree in physical education and a minor in history. He had a teaching certificate in both fields.

Before moving to Winters, Bell was athletic director, head football coach, head basketball coach, and head track coach for the Charlotte Independent School District. He had been employed several weeks ago to head the athletic department of Winters Public Schools, succeeding Jimmie Stubblefield.

Bell was a member of the Texas High School Coaches Association. He was director of the Small School Football Association in 1971 and 1972; assistant coach of West All-Star Small Schools Football in 1972; and head coach in 1973.

Survivors include his wife, Linda, of Charlotte; a 10-month-old son, Chay Brett of the home; an 8-year-old daughter, Laechele of the home; his father, Warren H. of Brownwood; his mother, Frances of Farmington, N.M.; maternal grandmother, Mona Scott of San Angelo; and a sister, Judith R. Sherman of Lubbock.
