Town Topics

THE WATERWORKS

The completion of Dimmitt's municipal waterworks system will mean much to the city, as well as the entire County. With an adequate supply of water, a building program will be started here that will not only give employment to a large number of workmen, but will provide housing facilities, the lack of which has injured the town during the past year.

It will make possible the construction of a sewer system, an urgent need of the city, and desired by the majority. It is understood by the News that the city commission has this in mind, and will take definite action when the desires of the majority of property owners is ascertained.

The water system will be an incentive for property owners to beautify their yards by the planting of more trees, thus beautifying our city. And the News has it upon good authority that water rates will be fixed with this in mind, permitting owners to properly care for their plants, at a minimum cost. And this should call for a Beautiful Yard contest this summer.

And with adequate fire protection, provided by the water system and an approved fire truck, the latter at present ready for use, thousands of dollars will be saved yearly on the fire insurance rates in Dimmitt.

The News has heard some talk about the drilling of a second well, to augment the city's water supply in a few years, when it is contended that the present well will not be sufficient to supply all residents with sufficient water to permit them to care for their lawns, and domestic and commercial uses. We believe that the men at present conducting city affairs are in a better position to procure figures and facts touching upon the possibility of our supply of "H-2-O" becoming inadequate in a few years, contemplating, of course, a substantial growth of Dimmitt.

In the matter of the petition that has been circulated, relating to the placing of certain names on the ballot at the municipal election to be held in April, the News believes that a good move has been started. In electing the three gentlemen again to their respective offices, we are of the opinion that it will mean much to the development of the city of Dimmitt in the next two years. These men are entirely familiar with the affairs of the city, and with the many projects which will be brought before the commission during the next twelve months, their experience will be invaluable to the taxpayers of Dimmitt.

One of the greatest contributing factors to the success of the Dairy Day Program in Dimmitt last Saturday was the fact that Mr. Weaver, the Chamber of Commerce, and the News, had the cooperation and support of Dimmitt's most progressive business concerns. An invitation was extended by the firms in the interest, solely, of promoting an industry in the county that will mean much to every farmer and business man in the Community. The word has been printed. We trust that the farmers took note of those who were behind the movement to promote something that will benefit the entire community. Last week's Castro County News will make a good reference to our farmers, when the Dairy Industry in this County has grown to larger proportions!

At present the city official family, elective, is composed of: A. M. Brownlee, Mayor. George Barnett, Commissioner. Edgar Ramey, Commissioner. A petition has been circulated by parties interested in the welfare of the city, asking that the names of all of the above named officials be printed on the ballot of the coming election. It is understood that this petition, which contains about 25 per cent of the city's qualified voters, has been filed with the city secretary, Bert Huckabee.

BOBCATS BRING TROPHY FROM DALHART MEET

Bobcats Attend Dalhart Tourney and Girls Win Meet While Boys Drop One Game.

Dimmitt High's Bobcats returned Sunday from the Dalhart tournament, held last Friday and Saturday, with another cup for their growing collection. This was won by the girls, undefeated this season, and entrants in two tournaments, winning a cup in each meet, the other one being at Panhandle.

In the finals, the Bobcats defeated the Dalhart cagers by the close margin of a 24-30 score. In the other game, to quote the Amarillo News-Globe of Monday: "Dimmitt swept Dalhart off its feet in the first half, scoring 26 points to Dalhart's 2. In the last half, Dalhart brought its to-

Luther Webb is Victim of Auto Casualty Tues.

Son of Dimmitt Couple Killed Instantly in Car Mishap Tuesday Afternoon.

Luther Webb, age 23, and son of Mr. and Mrs. Wm. Webb, residents of Dimmitt since last June, was killed instantly Tuesday afternoon about 5 o'clock, a mile east of town on the highway, when a light truck he was riding in overturned.

With him were Earl Vaughan, living southeast of here, and Emmitt Jourdis, of Tulia, the latter escaping injury, and Vaughan suffering minor bruises about the head and arms.

There were no eye witnesses to the tragedy, but it is thought that Webb was driving the car, which was badly wrecked, and the property of an implement firm of Tulia, for whom the deceased was employed as mechanic.

Burial was made in the Dimmitt cemetery Wednesday afternoon, services being held at the Baptist church, by N. M. Gilbert, pastor.

Surviving him besides his parents are W. C., and Spurgeon Webb, both of this city, and the latter a senior in the Dimmitt high school.

Announcement is made in this issue of the return to Dimmitt of the Willson & Son Lumber Company, one of the best known firms in the Panhandle.

N. G. Jackson, of the Tulia branch, was in Dimmitt Monday and announces that a large stock is being moved this week, and that the local yard will be ready for business about March 10.

They will be located on the same property that they formerly occupied, southeast of the court house, and the Dimmitt branch will be in charge of Mr. O. Stevens, of Floydada, and who has been connected with the firm for several years. Mr. Stevens will probably arrive with his family early next week and assume charge of the business.

This concern is well known in Castro County, having left here only three years ago. They will handle a complete line of lumber and building material of every kind, including heavy hardware, plumbing fixtures, and also wind mills.

A movement was started at Plainview on Wednesday of this week which, if successful, will give Dimmitt a thru train service from Dallas to Tucumcari, N. M., the proposal being made that the Denver line, owned by the Burlington System, be extended to the New Mexico point from Dimmitt.

This move was started last week by the Stamford Chamber of Commerce, and was joined by the Plainview body, with the result that the following towns interested, were represented at the meeting in Plainview Wednesday:

Dimmitt, which was represented by T. A. Singer, Vice-President of the Castro County Chamber of Commerce, Bruce McLean, of the First State Bank, and Ernest Medkief, of the Crump-Medkief Motor Co., Carroll Gunter of the Gunter Drug Co., and B. G. Damey, real estate dealer, Hart, Friona, Olton, Tucumcari, Plainview and Stamford, and many other towns, there being about 225 delegates present.

Besides the rail extension from Dimmitt, other projects were taken up, affecting the towns named above, and not on the line from this city.

Resolutions were adopted asking any railroad, including the Denver, to build the proposed extensions, covering territory west, northwest, and southwest, from Plainview, and from Fort Worth into Stamford.

All delegates were asked to prepare tonnage reports from their respective sections, to be used later.

Heavy Loss in Farm Fire Last Week

A train of fifteen cars, containing 632 head of cattle, left Dimmitt Wednesday afternoon, for Chicago. It is understood that the stock were purchased from Pool & Goodman, of east of this city, and shipment was made by Byron Bunter, representing the northern buyers.

This train was pulled by one of the Burlington's 400 class engines, it being the first time a locomotive of this class has ever been used on this end of the Division.

The train was in charge of Conductor B. B. Burton, Engineer W. D. Cambell, and Fireman B. B. Reed.

FARMERS OVER COUNTY TAKE UP DAIRYING

Farmers From Over County Become Interested in Dairy Program in County.

The Dairy Day Program, announced last week in the News, and carrying an invitation of Dimmitt's most progressive business concerns, was a success in every way, according to T. V. Weaver, and chamber of commerce officials, who are interested in the ultimate success of the Dairy Program inaugurated by the former several months ago, in the Farmers Free Night School.

Over two hundred farmers and others interested in dairy stock, from all sections of the county, were here to view the car of registered animals, received on Friday from the A. F. Collett dairy herd of San Angelo.

The herd received last week consisted of 7 cows, 3 heifers and 5 bulls, and they were purchased by the following:

G. L. Blanton, one cow, one bull, and one heifer. T. W. Malone, one cow, one bull and one heifer.

Richard Greathouse, one cow. J. H. Alldredge, one cow. W. J. Jordon, one bull. W. H. Hulen, one cow. Claude Duran, one bull. A. J. Keele, one cow. M. A. Ferguson, one cow. A. J. Baker.

All of the bulls purchased here were extreme winners at San Angelo, Amarillo, Dallas, Lubbock, and Waco, last year, and all of the stock are state and federal accredited.

In order to make production more uniform in the county, and thru the cooperation of Mr. Weaver, all stock purchased will be uniform, that is, from herds as near alike as possible. The benefits of this plan will be seen in later years.

The entire herd, from which the stock came, averaged three gallons of milk per day for the last year and half, according to Mr. Collett, the owner, and who was in Dimmitt for several days recently. Their butter-fat test ranges from 5.4 to 6.2. The herd is principally of Oxford family, descendants of Fern's Golden Lad, one of the most noted males of Jersey Island. All females thus far shipped here from the Collett herd were bred to Model Fox Pet 2nd, Mr. Collett's herd bull.

It was also stated by Mr. Collett that some of his herd made as high as 750 pounds of butter-fat in 365 days.

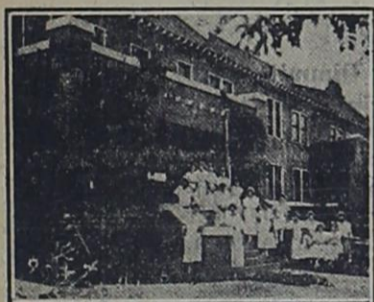

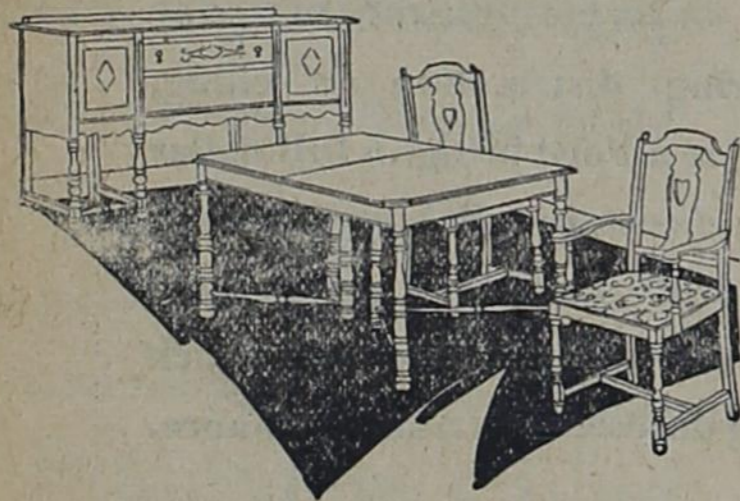

one day recently and proceeded to tell some of our merchants why newspaper advertising did not pay as well as the wonderful service he was peddling. In fact, to one business man, who happened to be a regular advertiser in this paper, he stated that only five per cent of the people read the ads in the newspaper.

It so happened that the merchant referred to above was a consistent and regular patron of the advertising columns of Your Home Paper. After a well-prepared discourse on the subject, he tried to sell said advertiser his service, to cost in the neighborhood of ten dollars per month. But due to the splendid results that he had obtained thru the exclusive use of the columns of the News, regularly, the merchant gave him his view of how to advertise, and of the results he had obtained, with the result that said knocker, come to Dimmitt in the clothing of a so-called salesman, left without a signature on the dotted line.

According to President Smith of the chamber of commerce, any families contemplating being absent from the county during April, may file their data with the organization, as a cooperative measure with the census bureau.

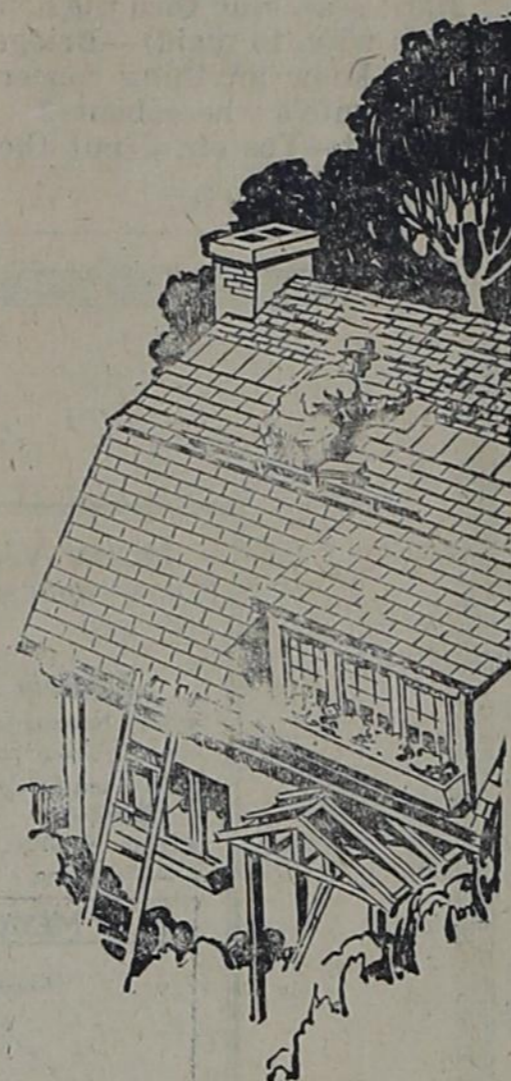

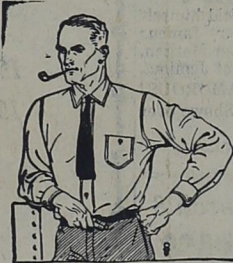
