## Search For Water

In stepped-up efforts to provide adequate municipal water supplies for Winters and the rural water distribution system getting water from Winters, the City Council Monday night, following reports and recommendations from engineers and financial advisors, advocated organization of a "crusade" of interested and concerned people to the preliminary hearing before the Texas Water Development Board on August 15.

The hearing will be held in the offices of the Texas Water Resources Commission in the Stephen F. Austin Building in Austin. Council members and other interested parties will attempt to organize a large delegation of area residents to attend the hearing, in addition to appointing qualified and knowledgeable witnesses to appear before the board.

At the hearing, Winters representatives, and representatives of the Runnels County Water Authority, will present applications for a permit to construct a dam and reservoir on Elm Creek, just below the present Lake Winters dam, and for financial assistance for the project.

W. E. (Buck) Tinsley, financial advisor for the City of Winters on this project, explained that the City of Winters, working through the Runnels County Water Authority, should request that the Water Development Board transfer a commitment for financial assistance which had been made for the joint Winters-Ballinger project two years ago, now defunct, to the RCWA for use by the City of Winters. He will act on behalf of the City and RCWA at the hearing, to present evidence of need for the financial assistance.

Because of the bonding limitations which would restrict the City of Winters in selling revenue bonds to partly finance such a project, the Runnels County Water Authority is being asked to act as an agent, obtaining the loans and/or grants from cooperating agencies, build the reservoir, and contracting with the City of Winters for purchasing of the water and taking over the debt service. The board of RCWA plans to meet next Monday night to act on this question.

Tinsley explained to the council that it would be necessary for the city, in order to obtain the financial assistance needed for the proposed project, to make a substantial increase in the water rates, which are said to be presently much lower than the rates of many comparable cities.

## Tri-Cities Contests

Hijinks and hilarity will be the order of the evening Saturday, July 29, on the Blizzard football field in Winters. For at 8 p.m. on that date, representative teams from three cities will clash in combat in what is hoped—and planned—to become an annual affair . . . Almost Anything Goes contests.

The Tri-Cities Almost Anything Goes contests have been in the

planning stage for some time. Teams from each of the three cities will compete for a traveling plaque trophy, with the winning city allowed to display the plaque during the next year, until the second contests are held.

Teams representing Ballinger, Coleman and Winters will go through a variety of competitive stunts calculated to tickle even the dearest of funnybones. There will be watermelon-eating races, pitcher filling contests, slip-and-slide contests and a variety of other events.

Teams from Coleman and Ballinger have won in their own city contests, and will meet the Blue Bombers of Winters, the winning team from the Winters Almost Anything Goes contests held two weeks ago.

The contests are being sponsored by the Chambers of Commerce of the three cities. Admission will be \$1 for adults and 75 cents for students. Tickets may be purchased at the gate on the evening of the contests.

Concession stands will be operated by the Blizzard Band Boosters, who

will offer charcoal grilled hamburgers, hot dogs and cold drinks.

If plans are carried out, the contests will be held in either Ballinger or Coleman next year, following local contests to pick winning teams.

## Football Field Being Watered From School Well

In anticipation of just such an emergency period as is now being experienced—dry weather—the board of trustees three years ago authorized drilling of a water well in the vicinity of the school football field. That foresight is now paying off, it was reported this week.

Although the well is not producing a great amount of water, there has been enough to keep the field in fair condition, during this rainless period. The well is located just south of the east bleacher at the field.

In addition to using the well to water the grass on the football field, plans are being made to haul several truckloads of water in.

## Rain Peppers Some Areas

Squall line showers peppered some parts of the Winters area Sunday, dumping water measuring from a trace to more than 3 inches in some places—by no means ending the dry

spell which has had this section in a tight grip for many months.

Rainfall was spotty, but there were reports that some stock tanks received some amounts of runoff from the quick showers. Winters received only a sprinkle—just enough to spot auto windshields, but not settle the dust.

Some areas to the west and north, around Wingate, received up to 3.7 inches, but the area wet down was small. On the Suvern O'Dell place west of Wingate, a reported 3.7 inches was received. East of Wingate, on the O. I. Phillips place, 1.2 inches fell Sunday afternoon, and .3 inches was received during a quick shower Monday.

The squall line seemed to travel in a narrow belt from about the Wingate area, toward Tuscola. In the Shep community, 2 inches was received on the Kobert Paschal place. On the

Virgil James place in South Taylor County, 2.6 inches was received Sunday, with enough to put some water in stock tanks.

E. F. Albro at Wilmeth reported only a spotted trace, as did Ronnie Poehls just south of Wingate. Only light sprinkles were received in the Bradshaw and Drasco communities, with David Ledbetter reporting nothing.

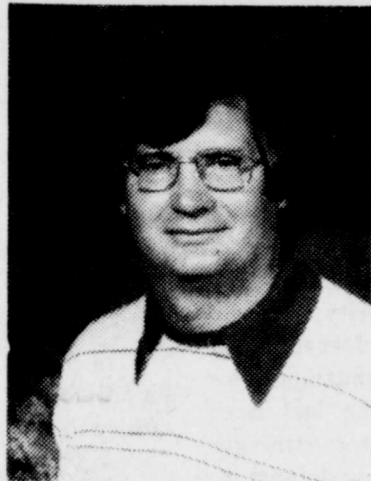

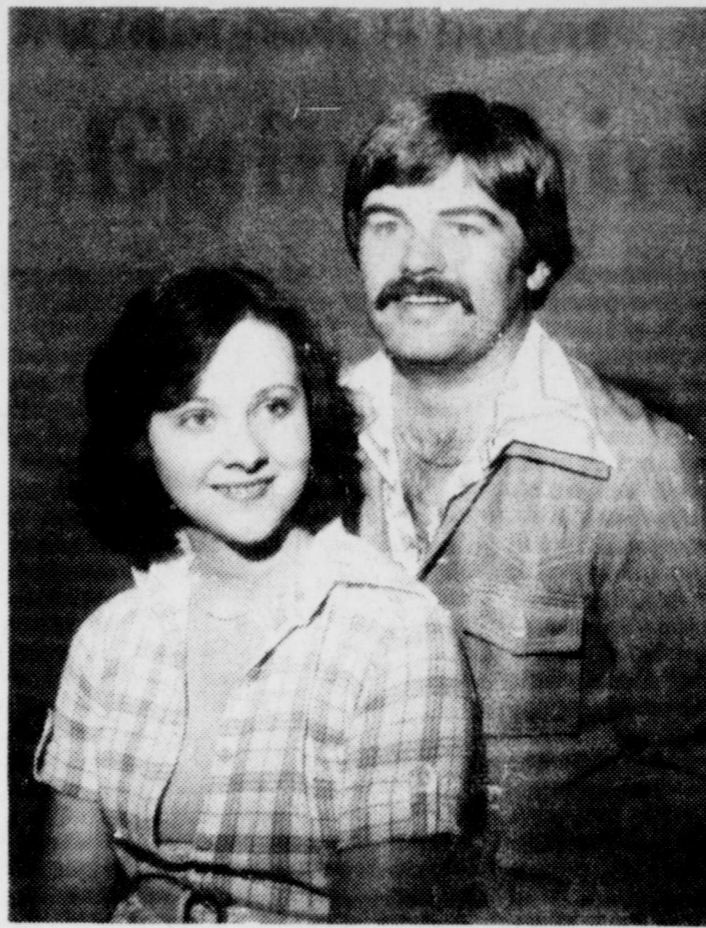

### BRAGGING on AGRICULTURE with

**Toxaphene Bait For Grasshopper Control**  
Grasshoppers have been appearing in abundance in several areas of Runnels County, according to Glenn Bragg, County Extension Agent. In some of the area, economic damage has been

reported. Currently recommended insecticides have been for the most part ineffective. Most of these compounds have relatively short residual qualities and although seemingly produce mortality immediately after applications, do not remain effective long enough to reduce grasshopper migration from hatching areas into growing crops.

Insecticidal baits have been employed successfully for grasshopper control in the past. The literature indicates baiting was used as early as 1923. These baits usually contained compounds having a long residual. The feeding habits of grasshoppers and their migrating nature place particular importance on economic poison that will not degrade appreciably under normal environmental conditions and that can be applied in a formulation attractive as an ingestant.

To prepare a wet bait, mix the following ingredients in the correct proportions. Stir Toxaphene 6E into the amount of water and molasses specified and mix with mill-run bran to make a crumbly mash. The finished bait should be uniformly moist and yet will scatter into small flakes when broadcast.

Mill-run bait, 100 lbs\*;  
Toxaphene 6E, 1 1/2 pt.;  
Water, 7-8 gal.; Blackstrap molasses, 2 gal.

Sawdust may be substituted for up to 3/4 the mixture, i.e., 75 lbs. sawdust plus 25 lbs. bran.

**Rates and Methods of Application**  
Spread the bait uniformly, by hand or with a broadcasting machine, at the rate of 10 to 20 pounds per acre. The most effective applications are made in the morning hours and when the bait is still moist.

**Treatment Areas**  
Make applications to roadsides, ditch banks, field margins and idle areas bordering fields. See restrictions on label regarding application to crops.

Toxaphene bait is intended as a barrier treatment to reduce migrations into fields. Crops already infested should be treated with recommended insecticides to reduce grasshopper populations in conjunction with the bait applications.

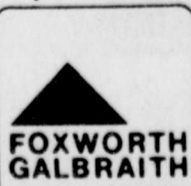

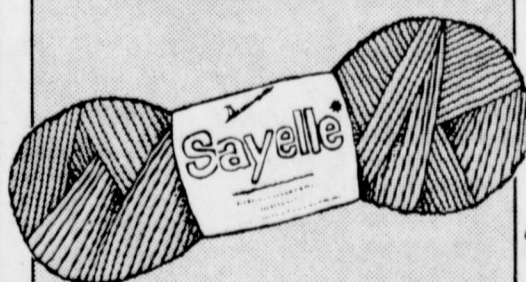

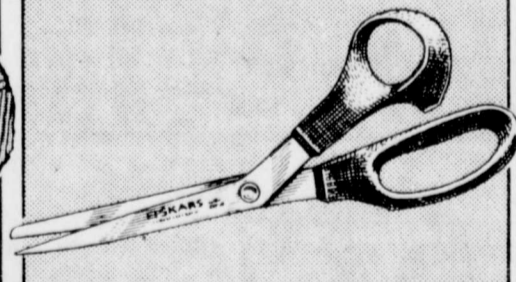

Mike Willatt, Austin attorney, will be legal counsel for the City at the Austin hearing August 15, in the request for financial assistance, and in the matter of requesting an amendment to the city's present water permit. It is expected that there will be some opposition from the Lower Colorado River Authority. Willatt explained that the request for the amendment to the present permit does not have to wait until financial problems are worked out.

Robert E. Hogan, project engineer for Henningson, Durham & Richardson of Dallas, engineers employed by the city to plan the dam and reservoir, said preliminary plans will be ready in time for the August 15

hearing, and that complete plans would be made for the final hearing on the project, which is expected to be scheduled in about six months.

Representing the Runnels County Water Authority at Monday night's meeting, but taking no official action, were Arnold Frerich of Rowena, chairman; James Mueller of Ballinger, secretary; and members, George Ruppert of Rowena, W. M. Hays, Ray Alderman and Ernest Thormeyer, all of Winters. This board will meet next Monday night to study and act upon the proposed contract between the City of Winters and the RCWA.

E. F. Albro, president of North Runnels Rural Water Supply Corp., and LaDell Davis, manager of the rural water system, explained to the council the present needs

of the rural distribution system, and anticipated needs for the future.

It was understood from members of the board of Winters Chamber of Commerce that attempts will be made to charter buses for those interested in making the trip to Austin for the August 15 hearing. It was explained that the better representation shown at the hearing, the better the chances for Winters' requests to be honored.

### Proper Nutrition For Athletes

Well-balanced diets—not fad foods—insure athletes of the proper nutrition they need, says Mary K. Sweeten, foods and nutrition specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

Athletes may find food fads attractive because of the pressure on them for physical fitness.

Because of this pressure, they often accept any formula which promises quick results. They believe in any food or vitamin supplements they feel will improve their performance, she points out.

However, no dietary special foods or vitamin pills give the athlete competitive skill.

Well-balanced foods are the best source of nutrients for the athlete.

Vitamin pills are unnecessary for a healthy individual and add neither extra energy or pep, Mrs. Sweeten says.

Selections from the basic four food groups are the best insurance of a well-balanced diet.

Eat four or more servings each of the fruit-vegetable and bread-cereal groups, two or more servings of the milk group and two and one-half to three ounce servings of meat group foods every day, she recommends.

In addition, eat very modest amounts of foods
