

Water Board Hearing **Has Been Cancelled**

The road Winters has been traveling for many long months in a desperate search for additional and adequate water supplies, has been rocky, with many obstacles, and many detours.

The latest obstacle-or detour-is the cancellation of a supposed public hearing before the Texas Water Development Resources board, which city officials had said would be held Sept. 19 at Austin.

Plans had been made locally to send a delegation of local citizens to Austin to attend the hearing, in addition to the officials who were supposed to testify at the hearing. Plans were even underway to charter a bus or buses to transport those interested, to display a community interest and

unity in the project.

However, according to information obtained from Mayor Homer Hodge Monday just before he departed for a tour of the Middle East, the requests for permits and financial assistance for the proposed Winters project was never out on the state board's agenda. "due to the nature of the requests to be made by the City of Winters."


Mayor Hodge said the application for a permit for additional water will be presented Sept. 19, but there will be no public hearing at that time. He said the request will be forwarded by the Texas Water Development Resources board to the Texas Water **Rights** Commission for consideration. If the commission approves of the request, he said, then a public hearing

will be announced, at which time representatives of the City of Winters will be given a chance to be heard. That date for a public hearing will not be within the next few weeks, it was understood.

Following approval of the application for the permit-if it is approvedthe mayor said, an application for funding assistance will be made, to the Water Development Resources board.

Mayor Hodge, and Alderman Jim Hatler, along with representatives of the engineering company doing the planning for the City of Winters, and Don Reese, the city's attorney, and others, met informally Friday with members of the staff of the Texas Water Development Resources at

Comptroller Representative **To Visit Winters**

State Comptroller Bob Bullock will have a representative from his San Angelo office in Winters Monday, Sept. 11, to assist local taxpayers and answer questions about state taxes.

Bullock said Enforcement Officer Dusty Cain will meet with local taxpayers on the second floor of the Winters City Hall from 11 a. m. to 12:30 p. m.

"If Winters area merchants, or anyone else for that matter, have any questions about state taxes or need help in preparing tax forms, Ms. Cain will be there to assist them," Bullock said.

"We're trying to cut the red tape in this office, and we believe these face to face sessions with taxpayers help do just that." Bullock said.

The San Angelo office serves San Angelo and surrounding counties.

Mark Allen Bryan, 21, of Wilmeth, was killed in an automobile accident at 3 p.m. Sunday about seven miles northwest of Ballinger on FM 2111.

According to reports, Bryan, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Joe Bryan of Wilmeth, was driving a late model pickup when it and another vehicle, driven by Marvin Hollis Power of Ballinger, were in collision. DPS Trooper Ed White investigated the accident.

Bryan had been returning from a dove hunting trip at the time of the accident.

Power was not injured in the collision.

Both vehicles were headed north, White said. After the collision, the pickup rolled over at least three times before landing in a culvert, White said. Bryan's body was thrown about 63 feet from the truck, he said.

It was said that Bryan's truck was "demolished" but the only damage to Power's car was a destroyed front bumper.

Runnels County Courthouse Although Runnels County has had two county seats, only one courthouse has been built and it is still in use.

On January 3, 1888, the morning following the removal of county records from Runnels City to Ballinger, the commissioner's court met in Ballinger and leased the two-story Dan Sullivan building at Broadway and Park Avenue. The building rented for \$26 a month and was to be used as a courthouse and offices. The purchase of furnishings was as follows: concrete slab poured over one desk, \$12; one walnut the steel joists and finished chair, \$2; three chairs,



month was trades day and all kinds of animals and possessions were brought to the courthouse grounds for trade. Second Monday was

always trades day at Winters. And many people remember Fred Bedford's mule barn where trading here took place.

A two-story wing was built on each end of the courthouse and constructed from stone out of the original quarry, which is located to the right of the Paint Rock highway, just after crossing the Colorado River. Dee Oliver recalled the location of the old quarry and showed the contractor how and where to secure the rock. The new stones looked bright and shiny and the old building was sandblasted to correspond to the new additions. Even at that time, stone cutting was almost a lost art and stone cutters had to be imported from various parts of Texas to cut and carve the stone.

One of the most colorful characters during this period of history was a justice of the peace named B. W. (Chop) Pilcher. Pilcher ran a doon in the early days of Ballinger. He was a rough and ready character that could meet and command any situation that might arise in his business or elsewhere. Whenever he called the court to order he always had one opening remark. He rapped the gavel top the bench and on exclaimed, "Me and the state is ready, what sayeth the defendant?"

The courthouse grounds are beautifully landscaped, being sodded with grass in 1952, and pecan and live oak trees set out the following year. Again in 1956 the courthouse was repainted and redecorated with a new lighting system installed throughout. Overnight accomodations for mixed juries was provided with three new dormitories on the third floor. Seven other offices moved to the third floor from first floor were the surveyor, auditor, treasurer, the county agent and the home demonstration agent. A elevator was also installed.

The most unusual feature in the lawn is a sculptured bronze statue of a cowboy and his horse by Pompeo Coppini of Chicago, which draws much attention from visitors and passersby. Many tourists stop to view this work of art. The monument was erected in 1919 by Mr. and Mrs. Gus Noyes as a tribute to their son, Charles, and all Texas cowboys. Charles died when his horse fell while rounding up cattle on the Noyes ranch. Coppini studied horses two years before attempting the statue.

A contract was awarded the firm of Lovell & Miller in October to build the courthouse, the bid being \$29,015. The cornerstone was laid by the Grand Lodge Masons of Texas and the Ballinger Masonic Lodge No. 648. On September 16, 1889, the courthouse was completed. After construction of the new building, the old county building was moved to the corner of Hutchings Avenue and Seventh Street, where it served as a hotel and saloon until it was destroyed by fire.

In May of 1901, the courthouse and jail were wired for electricity. Ten lights were installed at a cost of ten dollars, and rental on them was \$1.75 per month. Additional globes were to cost \$1 and the rental charge of 121/2 cents monthly. Four lights were installed in the jail at the same rates. The contract was entered into between the court and W. J. Miller.

A remodeling program of \$65,000 was completed in 1941, in bringing the then 62

year old building up-to-date. E. C. Grindstaff was county judge. Commissioners were Dee Oliver, Precinct 1; F. D. Bedford, Precinct 2; Ralph Burns, Precinct 3; and R. A. Perry, Precinct 4. The architect was Roy Lane of Dallas and contractor was Oscar Rose of Abilene. On January 6, all the offices were moved out of the courthouse and assembled in the old Currie building on 7th St. across from the courthouse.

A place for hanging of convicted persons who had received the death sentence was discovered in the jail cupola. Since no one could remember that the construction had ever been used, it was done away with.



> My experience in Washington leaves little doubt in my mind-the Congress is not capable of cutting the budget on a program-by-program basis.

The recourse is enactment of House Joint Resolution 130, which will, through specific language added to the Constitution, prevent such fiscal irresponsibility from occurring again.

No corporation, business enterprise or family could expect to last long if they followed the spending example set by the U.S. government.

Deficit spending, once thought to be a way of improving our economy, has proven instead a dismal failure. We cannot afford to view government spending as the major, permanent, stabilizing and growth-promoting agency for the nation as a whole, because we simply cannot afford continuous jumps in the national deficit.

The evidence is in. The budget must be balanced, national debt paid off, and inflation halted.

Enactment of H.J. Res. 130 is the first step toward these goals. The deficit grows larger even as I am writing this to you; surely now the time for talk has ended and the time for constitutional change has arrived.
