## Water Board Hearing Has Been Cancelled

The road Winters has been traveling for many long months in a desperate search for additional and adequate water supplies, has been rocky, with many obstacles, and many detours.

The latest obstacle—or detour—is the cancellation of a supposed public hearing before the Texas Water Development Resources board, which city officials had said would be held Sept. 19 at Austin.

Plans had been made locally to send a delegation of local citizens to Austin to attend the hearing, in addition to the officials who were supposed to testify at the hearing. Plans were even underway to charter a bus or buses to transport those interested, to display a community interest and

unity in the project.

However, according to information obtained from Mayor Homer Hodge Monday just before he departed for a tour of the Middle East, the requests for permits and financial assistance for the proposed Winters project was never out on the state board's agenda, "due to the nature of the requests to be made by the City of Winters."

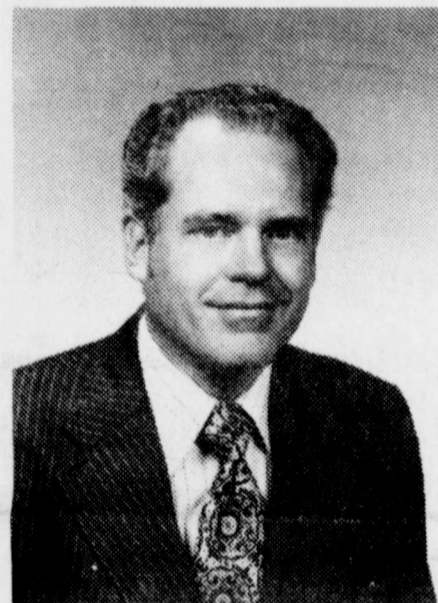
Mayor Hodge said the application for a permit for additional water will be presented Sept. 19, but there will be no public hearing at that time. He said the request will be forwarded by the Texas Water Development Resources board to the Texas Water Rights Commission for consideration. If the commission approves of the request, he said, then a public hearing

will be announced, at which time representatives of the City of Winters will be given a chance to be heard. That date for a public hearing will not be within the next few weeks, it was understood.

Following approval of the application for the permit—if it is approved—the mayor said, an application for funding assistance will be made, to the Water Development Resources board.

Mayor Hodge, and Alderman Jim Hatler, along with representatives of the engineering company doing the planning for the City of Winters, and Don Reese, the city's attorney, and others, met informally Friday with members of the staff of the Texas Water Development Resources at

### Rev. C. Frisch Guest Preacher At St. John's

### Comptroller Representative To Visit Winters

State Comptroller Bob Bullock will have a representative from his San Angelo office in Winters Monday, Sept. 11, to assist local taxpayers and answer questions about state taxes.

Bullock said Enforcement Officer Dusty Cain will meet with local taxpayers on the second floor of the Winters City Hall from 11 a. m. to 12:30 p. m.

"If Winters area merchants, or anyone else for that matter, have any questions about state taxes or need help in preparing tax forms, Ms. Cain will be there to assist them," Bullock said.

"We're trying to cut the red tape in this office, and we believe these face to face sessions with taxpayers help do just that," Bullock said.

The San Angelo office serves San Angelo and surrounding counties.

## Blizzards Host Clyde Friday

The Winters Blizzards, under a brand new head coach this season, will pry the lid off the 1978 football season Friday night, as they meet the Clyde Bulldogs on Blizzard Field at 8 p.m.

Head Coach Les Fisher and an almost completely new staff of coaches—five of seven are new to the system this season—have been working with the Blizzards for some weeks, and have guided them through two pre-season scrimmages to test their mettle. Coach Fisher says they are ready for regular play to begin, although there still are some kinks to be worked out, especially in the offensive lineup.

Because of the re-shaping of District 6-AA this year, the Blizzards will get only three non-conference games before district competition begins. Anson was brought back into the 6-AA fold for the next two years. Other district teams are Ballinger, Coahoma, Colorado City, Stamford, Merkel, Wylie, and Winters.

Coach Fisher said he expects "tremendous effort out of the boys Friday night, and all season." "They're not worried about Clyde, just because they're big," the coach said.

Also, Fisher said "We're going to play one game at a time this year!"

Scrimmages and regular practice have left their marks, the coach indicated, with "some ankle and knee problems," but those should be cleared up before the starting gun Friday night, and he expects all to be ready to start.

With the exception, perhaps of

Scott Billups, backup quarterback, who had his bell rung in the scrimmage with Hawley Friday night. He was taken to the hospital for observation, and there were no serious injuries. The trip to the hospital was only for precautionary measures, Fisher said. Billups probably will be out this week, but is expected to be ready the following week.

Also, Scott Hall received a groin pull in the scrimmage, and may not see action this week. This, again, the coach explained, is not a serious problem.

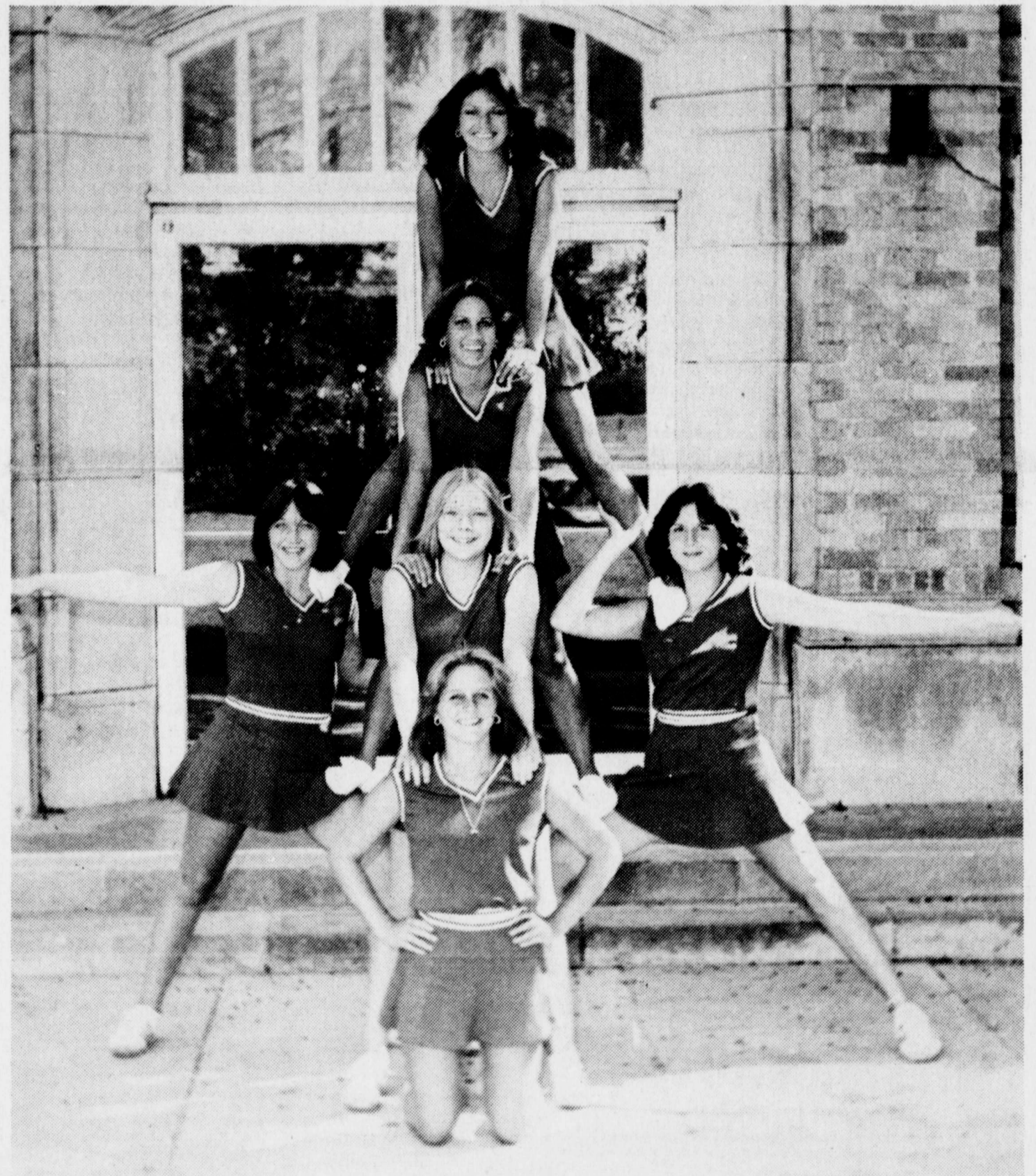
### New Day Care Center Being Opened Here

**Mark Bryan  
Victim of  
Auto Accident**

Mark Allen Bryan, 21, of Wilmeth, was killed in an automobile accident at 3 p.m. Sunday about seven miles northwest of Ballinger on FM 2111.

According to reports, Bryan, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Joe Bryan of Wilmeth, was driving a late model pickup when it and another vehicle, driven by Marvin Hollis Power of Ballinger, were in collision. DPS Trooper Ed White investigated the accident.

Bryan had been returning from a dove hunting trip at the time of the accident.

Power was not injured in the collision.

Both vehicles were headed north, White said. After the collision, the pickup rolled over at least three times before landing in a culvert, White said. Bryan's body was thrown about 63 feet from the truck, he said.

It was said that Bryan's truck was "demolished" but the only damage to Power's car was a destroyed front bumper.

Bryan was pronounced dead at the scene by Justice of the Peace Oliver Petty of Ballinger.

Funeral services for Mr. Bryan were held at 10:30 a.m. Wednesday at the Main Street Church of Christ, with Clyde Duke, minister of the North Side Church of Christ of Robert Lee, officiating. Burial was in Wilmeth Cemetery under direction of Winters Funeral Home.

Mark Allen Bryan was born at Lubbock, June 27, 1957. He had lived in the Wilmeth community all his life. He was a member of the Church of Christ. He had been in the custom combining business.

He is survived by his parents; one brother, Douglas; two sisters, Rebecca and Lisa, all of the home; and grandparents, Mrs. O. F. Bryan of Winters and Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Shelton of Ballinger.

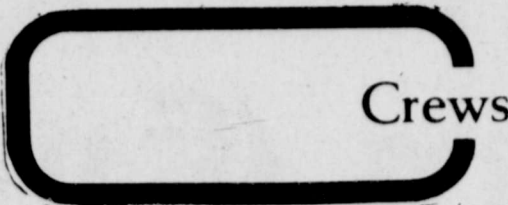
Kelly Wayne King of Winters was among the 755 students who filed for diplomas awarded in summer commencement ceremonies August 19 at Southwest Texas State University.

### Have You Registered To Vote?

What would you say if on election day you were told you could not vote? How precious would this right become if you no longer had the option to exercise it? Many people in this state have made this decision, most unknowingly, and removed themselves from the electoral process by not registering to vote. On election day the highest percentage of citizen participation is in voter apathy. People have found it easier to not be involved in the politics and policies of their community, state and nation. But these citizens fail to realize this democracy in which we live affords us the proposition of governing ourselves through the rightful election of our leaders. With this freedom comes the responsibility to choose the best one. If a candidate for public office is mediocre, this is his fault; but if the mediocre candidate wins, this is the fault of the free system which elected him.

By saying 'I don't vote because my ballot does not count' and then exercising this prerogative, you have automatically removed yourself and your voice from the political decisions which will affect you directly. This vacancy at the poll is, and will continue to be, filled by a small percentage of citizens who take the time to vote. It will be their decision, made by ballot, which will determine the political destiny of your community, by deciding your elected leadership. The first part of a voting equation is registering to vote. Texas, through recent changes in its voter registration laws, has made

registration easier and more convenient than ever before. The voter registration application is postage-free, bilingual, and available at many locations frequented by the public throughout this state, or at your county tax assessor-collector's office.

Today, there are over eight million eligible voters, but only five million have registered to vote. This leaves over three million eligible citizens who are not registered to vote and are therefore silent on election day. I do not believe these unregistered citizens have made a deliberate commitment to not exercise their franchise and register to vote. I do not believe these citizens represent a conscious expression of a loss of faith in our democratic form of government. I do believe these unregistered citizens were unknowingly disfranchised, and given the opportunity, will reinstate themselves in this state's electoral process.

There are only a limited number of days in which you can register and be eligible to vote in the November 7th general election. All voter registration applications must be received no later than midnight, October 8th. The time is short, but with your support and assistance

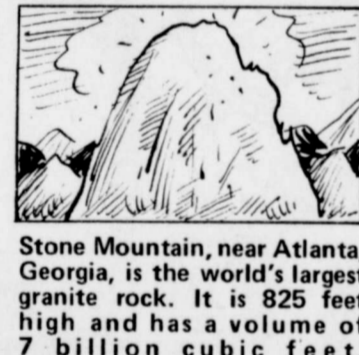

## Poe's Corner

**Runnels County Courthouse**  
 Although Runnels County has had two county seats, only one courthouse has been built and it is still in use. On January 3, 1888, the morning following the removal of county records from Runnels City to Ballinger, the commissioner's court met in Ballinger and leased the two-story Dan Sullivan building at Broadway and Park Avenue. The building rented for \$26 a month and was to be used as a courthouse and offices. The purchase of furnishings was as follows: one desk, \$12; one walnut chair, \$2; three chairs, \$3; and a table, \$3.50 was authorized at this meeting. In August, Eugene T. Heiner, architect, submitted plans for a new courthouse which were approved by the court. Heiner was to receive 3 1/2 percent of the cost of the building for the plans and 1 1/2 percent for superintending the construction. Cost of the building was limited to \$30,000. Three days later a bond issue was authorized to pay for the courthouse construction and the tax raised fifteen cents on the \$100 to pay for same. A contract was awarded the firm of Lovell & Miller in October to build the courthouse, the bid being \$29,015. The cornerstone was laid by the Grand Lodge Masons of Texas and the Ballinger Masonic Lodge No. 648. On September 16, 1889, the courthouse was completed. After construction of the new building, the old county building was moved to the corner of Hutchings Avenue and Seventh Street, where it served as a hotel and saloon until it was destroyed by fire. In May of 1901, the courthouse and jail were wired for electricity. Ten lights were installed at a cost of ten dollars, and rental on them was \$1.75 per month. Additional globes were to cost \$1 and the rental charge of 12 1/2 cents monthly. Four lights were installed in the jail at the same rates. The contract was entered into between the court and W. J. Miller. A remodeling program of \$65,000 was completed in 1941, in bringing the then 62 year old building up-to-date. E. C. Grindstaff was county judge. Commissioners were Dee Oliver, Precinct 1; F. D. Bedford, Precinct 2; Ralph Burns, Precinct 3; and R. A. Perry, Precinct 4. The architect was Roy Lane of Dallas and contractor was Oscar Rose of Abilene. On January 6, all the offices were moved out of the courthouse and assembled in the old Currie building on 7th St. across from the courthouse.

The building was completely renovated on the inside, including the roof. Wooden floors were replaced with steel and concrete, walls replastered and new doors and millwork installed. Aluminum windows, new electrical wiring, and plumbing were also added. The roof line, as on all courthouses built in the early days, was a pitched roof framed out of wood with a large cupola on top. This was removed and replaced with steel beams and joists with a concrete slab poured over the steel joists and finished with a flat roof. A cupola on the jail, corresponding to the one on the courthouse, was also replaced with a flat roof. A place for hanging of convicted persons who had received the death sentence was discovered in the jail cupola. Since no one could remember that the construction had ever been used, it was done away with. The courthouse grounds are beautifully landscaped, being sodded with grass in 1952, and pecan and live oak trees set out the following year. Again in 1956 the courthouse was repainted and redecorated with a new lighting system installed throughout. Overnight accommodations for mixed juries was provided with three new dormitories on the third floor. Seven other offices moved to the third floor from first floor were the surveyor, auditor, treasurer, the county agent and the home demonstration agent. A elevator was also installed. The most unusual feature in the lawn is a sculptured bronze statue of a cowboy and his horse by Pompeo Coppini of Chicago, which draws much attention from visitors and passersby. Many tourists stop to view this work of art. The monument was erected in 1919 by Mr. and Mrs. Gus Noyes as a tribute to their son, Charles, and all Texas cowboys. Charles died when his horse fell while rounding up cattle on the Noyes ranch. Coppini studied horses two years before attempting the statue. Reference: Runnels is My County.

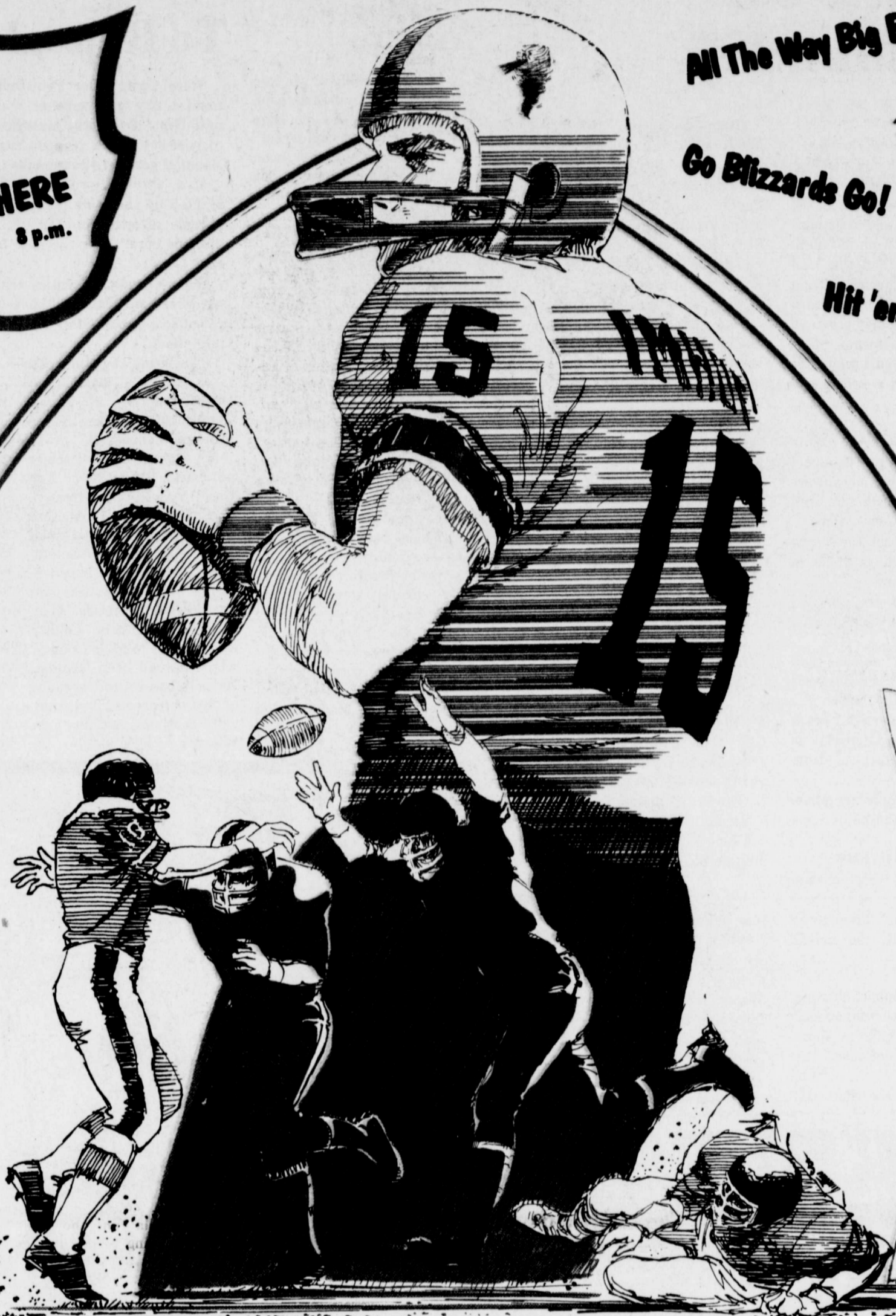

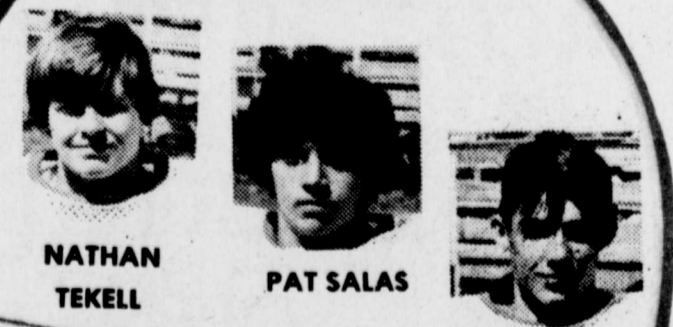

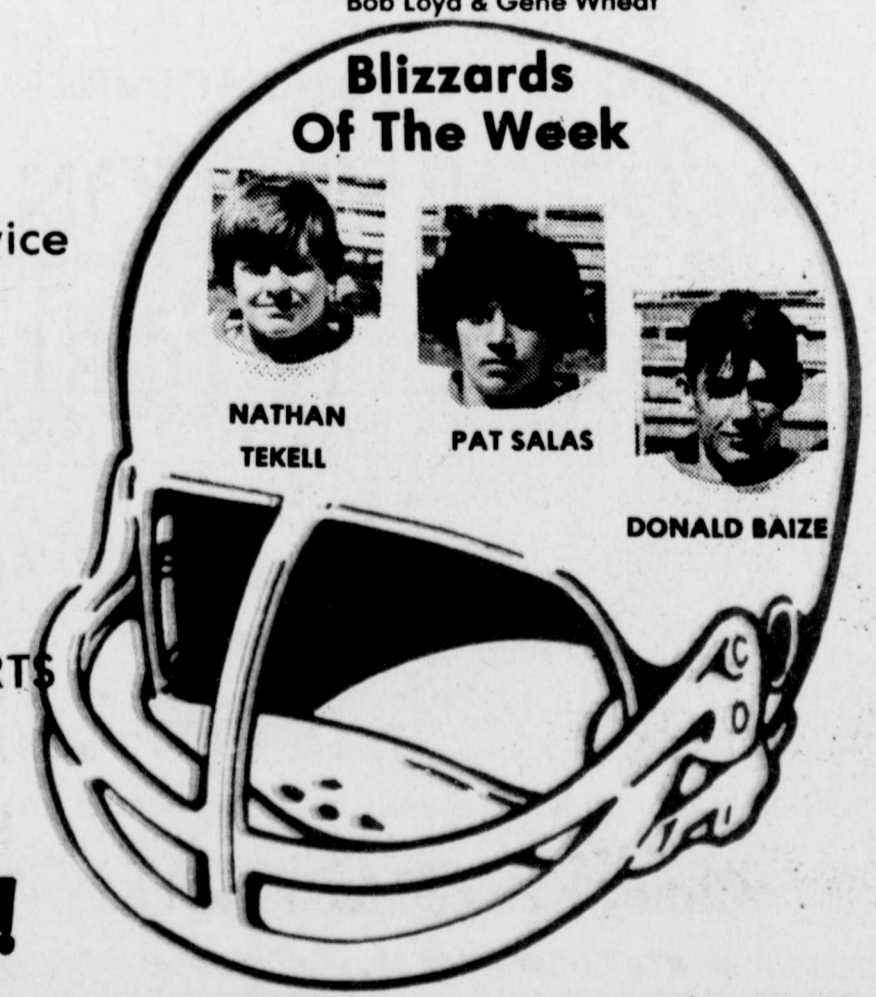

## Sept. 10 Last Date For City To Repeal Utilities Sales Tax

State Comptroller Bob Bullock has reminded city governments that they have until Sept. 10 to notify his office if they wish to repeal the one percent city tax on residential gas and electric bills Oct. 1.

"It's absolutely essential that we be notified by that date if the tax break is to become effective on Oct. 1, the earliest possible date under the new law," Bullock said.

Bullock said those cities that repeal the tax after that date will have to wait a full calendar quarter before the tax break goes into effect.

The Texas Legislature passed a law during

its recent special session repealing the four percent state tax on residential utility bills effective Oct. 1.

That law also automatically repeals the one percent city tax on residential utilities Oct. 1, 1979, unless the city government votes to continue the tax.

Cities that wish, however, can by majority vote of the council repeal the city tax effective Oct. 1, 1978—the same day the state tax exemption becomes effective.

Bullock said that 39 cities have informed his office they intend to repeal the city tax, while another 45 said they will retain it.

What about the Clyde Bulldogs? Well, Coach Fisher sees them as a good, sound club. "We expect a good offensive effort from them," he said.

Scouting reports indicate the 'Dogs run a veer set offense, with good personnel to run. The quarterback has good speed and likes to run, and the Blizzards defense will have to key on him to keep him from running.

Also in the backfield, the Bulldogs have a 175-pound running back who has good speed, and who appears to be the quickest on the 'Dog offense. "We'll have to swarm him to tackle him," Fisher said. He is used for quick pitchouts on outside options, and on

inside plays.

Another running back—at 185—seems to be the Bulldogs' strongest back. They like to use him on powers and veers, scouting reports said, and he is big enough to run over people.

The Bulldog quarterback can throw well, and probably will establish a running game, then throw.

The Bulldog linemen are big and quick and move off the ball quickly, scouts said.

The Bulldogs run a 27 defense, and this will be the first time the Blizzards have offense against a 27, which is a good defense for the veer, the coach said. The Bulldog middle linebacker is strong, and makes tackles from sideline to sideline.

Clyde has a strong punting game, but will try to control the ball with a talented backfield.

Austin, and were given the word regarding the previously publicized public hearing Sept. 19. They were told, according to information relayed by the mayor, that applications for the permit and for funding must be amended before filing. This is caused

by recent changes in procedures adopted by the TWDR, the mayor said.

Cancellation of the public hearing, which had been previously announced by city officials, "will give us more time to make a more solid case," the mayor indicated.

Meanwhile, plans for the chartered

bus phase of the water drive have been scrapped. However, petitions which have been in circulation for several days, calling upon the Texas Water Development Resources to take favorable action toward the requests made by the City of Winters, will be completed, and forwarded with the application for the permit for additional water, it was said.

## KRUEGER OF TEXAS

As the most fundamental document of our democratic nation, The United States Constitution should be altered only at crucial times and for the most vital reasons.

That time is now; the reason? Our economy.

I have decided to sponsor a constitutional amendment to require a balanced budget by 1983.

House Joint Resolution 130 would require that the budget be balanced within five years of enactment. And, going a step further, the amendment also requires that the national debt, now over \$800 billion, be paid off over the succeeding twenty years.

The effects of the federal deficit are obvious. People talk about them every day; but rhetoric produces no change. The deficit grows larger, and unemployment and inflation result. The average rate of economic growth continues its decline.

Yet the Congress has failed to take action to pay off the national debt and

balance the budget.

I myself introduced an amendment to the First Concurrent Budget Resolution in May to cut federal spending and reduce the deficit by \$7 billion. This amendment failed along with others designed to stop unnecessary federal spending.

My experience in Washington leaves little doubt in my mind—the Congress is not capable of cutting the budget on a program-by-program basis.

The recourse is enactment of House Joint Resolution 130, which will, through specific language added to the Constitution, prevent such fiscal irresponsibility from occurring again.

No corporation, business enterprise or family could expect to last long if they followed the spending example set by the U.S. government.

Deficit spending, once thought to be a way of improving our economy, has proven instead a dismal failure. We cannot afford to view government spending as the major, permanent, stabilizing and growth-promoting agency for the nation as a whole, because we simply cannot afford continuous jumps in the national deficit.

The evidence is in. The budget must be balanced, national debt paid off, and inflation halted.

Enactment of H.J. Res. 130 is the first step toward these goals. The deficit grows larger even as I am writing this to you; surely now the time for talk has ended and the time for constitutional change has arrived.
