## Council Makes No Change In Tax Structure

In a last minute act before the end of the present fiscal year—Sept. 30—Winters City Council Monday night approved a tax ordinance for 1978, setting the rate and valuation percentage, and designating amounts to specified funds.

Council made no basic changes in the tax structure, fixing the rate at \$1.20 per \$100.00 valuation, and fixing percentage collectible at 75 percent of true value. This is the same rate and percentage used for the past few years.

The only changes made were the lowering of the amount designated for General Fund purposes and increasing the percentage to be assigned to interest and principal of bonded indebtedness.

Seventy-eight cents of the \$1.20 levied has been designated for General Fund purposes, and \$.42 per \$100.00 valuation will be assigned for payment of interest and principal coming due for the year 1978 on 1960 Refunding Bonds, 1951 Water and Sewer Improvement Bonds, 1951 Street

Improvement Bonds, 1951 City Hall and Fire Station Bonds, and Street Improvement Bonds, series 1967.

No other changes were made which will affect the amount of taxes levied and collected from Winters taxpayers. The administration now will process and mail tax statements to individual taxpayers.

In other business, the Council accepted a bid from Robinson Chevrolet Co. for a 1978 Chevrolet Impala to be used by the Police Department. Bids had been submitted

by Robinson Chevrolet and Bishop Boys Ford.

Council also heard a short report on the status of planning underway to apply for an amendment to the city's water permit and preparation of applications to state agencies for financial assistance for a water impoundment project. Council was told that an informal briefing conference with engineers and legal consultants will be held by Sept. 22 to discuss filing for the permit. It was hoped that a public hearing before the

Texas Water Resources board would be scheduled within three months.

Council also approved drawing up of a contract between the City of Winters and Van Whittenburg, granting the City easement and right-of-way for water lines and wells on the Whittenburg property southeast of town. The city drilled three wells and laid a pipeline from that site to the main line from Winters City Lake earlier in the summer, to supplement then dwindling water supplies from the surface reservoir. Pumps were

installed, and some water was pumped from the wells into the main lines, before rains on the lake's watershed filled the lake.

The city will retain the right-of-way easement for a period of three years, under provisions of the contract, and if there is need to draw upon the wells to supplement the lake water, will pay Whittenburg .10 cents per thousand gallons for the water. Water use priority will be retained by the city, and all lines and pumps remain the property of the city, according to the contract.

## Blizzards Travel To Roscoe

The Winters Blizzards take to the road for the first time this season, traveling to Roscoe Friday night for their third game which will be the last non-conference contest before District 6-AA play.

This will be the first contest between the Blizzards and the Class A Plowboys in several years.

Following the 53-0 drubbing at the hands of the Coleman Bluecats last Friday night, Coach Les Fisher indicated Monday this week will be spent in getting the team back "up" before the Roscoe contest. He said the Blizzards were "down" for the Coleman event, and made many mistakes. The Bluecats "capitalized on our mistakes," and it is difficult to keep going after several.

QB Chuck Evans received a bruised knee in Friday night's encounter with Coleman, but the coach expects he will probably be ready to play by this Friday. No other injuries are hampering the Blizzards, Fisher said.

Roscoe will be a tough opponent this week, the coach indicated. The Plowboys run out of a power "I," and make use of some weight and power in the backfield. One back, Pieper, a 200-pound junior, is used to power the ball off tackle. Hernandez, a 201-pound sophomore, is a blocking back, and can run with the ball. No. 27, Jackson, senior quarterback, is only 150 pounds, but likes to run sweeps and options.

The offensive line "possibly will be the best line we've faced," the coach said. No. 64, Brown, a 165-pound senior guard, and No. 74, Richburg, 185 senior tackle, flop to the strong side in power plays. Mullins, No. 67, 200 pound senior guard, can demolish opposition.

The guards are quick, and are used to block outside on power plays.

## City Has Received \$54,654

The City of Winters has received \$54,654.22 in rebates from collected sales taxes through August, 1978, according to State Comptroller Bob Bullock.

The August payment was \$12,894.36, above the \$12,122.21 received for the same period in 1977. The city has realized a 5 percent increase in the one percent sales tax in 1978 over 1977. Total for 1977 was \$51,710.51.

The sales tax is collected by merchants and other sales tax permit holders along with the state sales tax and rebated monthly to the cities in which it is collected by the Comptroller's office.

The Plowboys have eight seniors, two juniors, and one sophomore on the starting offense.

Although the Roscoe backfield is a powerful running bunch, they don't have Coleman's speed, the coach said. "We'll have to swarm them because of their size and strength."

On defense, Roscoe has three linebackers who tilt the bar over 200 pounds: No. 65, Elsmore, 206; No. 67, Mullins, 200, and No. 30, Pieper, 200. "They are aggressive and go to the ball well," Fisher said.

No. 27, Jackson, playing strong safety on defense, and No. 31, Madison, will flop and go to the secondary on many plays. The Plowboys' defensive ends are "good at reading outside plays, and providing support."

The Blizzards will have to "stop the off-tackle power runs, and the quarter back sweeps," the coach said. "Roscoe has a big club, they run the ball well, and play a ball control type offense. They come off the ball quick and their defense is strong enough to hold you to a few yards."

Proable starters for the Roscoe game will be about the same fielded in the first two games, it was indicated, with perhaps some changes at the last moment.

## City Acts To Control Speeding Near School

Winters City Council Monday night took definite action to control traffic in the vicinity of the schools, to reduce the danger to students in the area.

Council elected to build several "speed reducing bumps" on streets in the immediate vicinity of the school, to slow traffic, which has been described as "fast and dangerous." The "bumps" will be built across the street at strategic locations, to force motorists to reduce speed in the area to at least 15 MPH. The bumps will be about four inches high, and will be so located that motorists cannot miss them when driving in the area.

The "speed reducing bumps" will be built on Heights, Rogers, and Jones streets, and perhaps some of the other streets in the immediate vicinity of the school, officials said.

The "bumps" will not be installed until proper warning signs are in place to warn motorists of the hazard of high speed driving, but these signs should be received and in place within a short time, it was said.

The action comes following suggestions by local residents that something be done to reduce traffic hazards

around the school, and after a study of the situation by the council. Although the police regularly patrol the area during heavy-traffic periods, drivers have continued to travel at high rates of speed, endangering the lives of pedestrian students and others in the area, officials said. Installation of the "speed reducing bumps" is calculated to slow the traffic, it was said. Most residents of the area have been contacted, councilmen said, and they approve of the plans undertaken by the city.

Superintendent of Schools Tommy Lancaster met with the council Monday night, and endorsed the plan to install the "speed bump." He also recommended that the council take action to close to through traffic, one block of Fannin St., which separates the high school building and the Homemaking Cottage and Band Hall. Council will study this proposal.

Meanwhile, councilmen said they would study the traffic situation on North Main (US 83) which is only one block from the school campus, and presents a dangerous problem, it was said. It was suggested that city officials contact the highway department, and request that changes in the speed limits in the area be made. It was pointed out that because the

highway is a federal highway, it would be next to impossible to get the speed limit changes made. However, the council was reminded that because of the danger to students during school hours, assistance from congressmen and legislators could be sought. One child was hit on the highway on the first day of school.

## Revival Set At First Baptist Church

The Rev. Dan Vestal of Ft. Worth will be the evangelist for a series of revival services at the First Baptist Church, beginning Sunday, Sept. 24, and continuing through Friday night, Sept. 29.

Bill Denton of San Angelo will conduct the music for the revival. Two services daily are planned, with morning services at 10 a.m., and evening services at 7:30.

The Rev. Vestal has been in full time evangelism for more than 30 years, and has held revivals in many states and several foreign countries.

Denton has served a number of churches in Texas as minister of music, and is now active as soloist for the First Baptist Church in San Angelo.

The public has been invited to attend these revival services.

## Ministers Schedule Fellowships

The Winters Ministerial Alliance is a clearing house for local churches who sponsor after-game fellowships following home games of the Winters High School football team.

The First Baptist Church sponsored the affair Sept. 8, and the Pentecostal Church of God and Assembly of God churches were hosts Sept. 15.

First United Methodist Church will host the after-game fellowship Oct. 6. Sponsors for Oct. 20 and Nov. 10 have not been scheduled. Churches desiring to sponsor a fellowship on these dates are asked to call the Rev. Charles Steinberg or the Rev. Fred Thomas to avoid date conflicts.

## Proposal To Remove Utility Tax Tabled

Winters City Council Monday night postponed "until January" action on a proposal to remove the city's one percent sales tax on utility bills for residential customers.

Through action by the State Legislature, cities were given the option to drop the tax or retain it. They have until May, 1979, to take action to retain the tax or it will be automatically dropped, according to Buford Baldwin, city secretary.

The legislation provides that utilities drop the state's four percent tax on residential consumers, and gave the cities an option. According to information received, most towns and cities are electing to continue the tax. Winters will take final action on the proposition in January, 1979, according to decisions made Monday night.

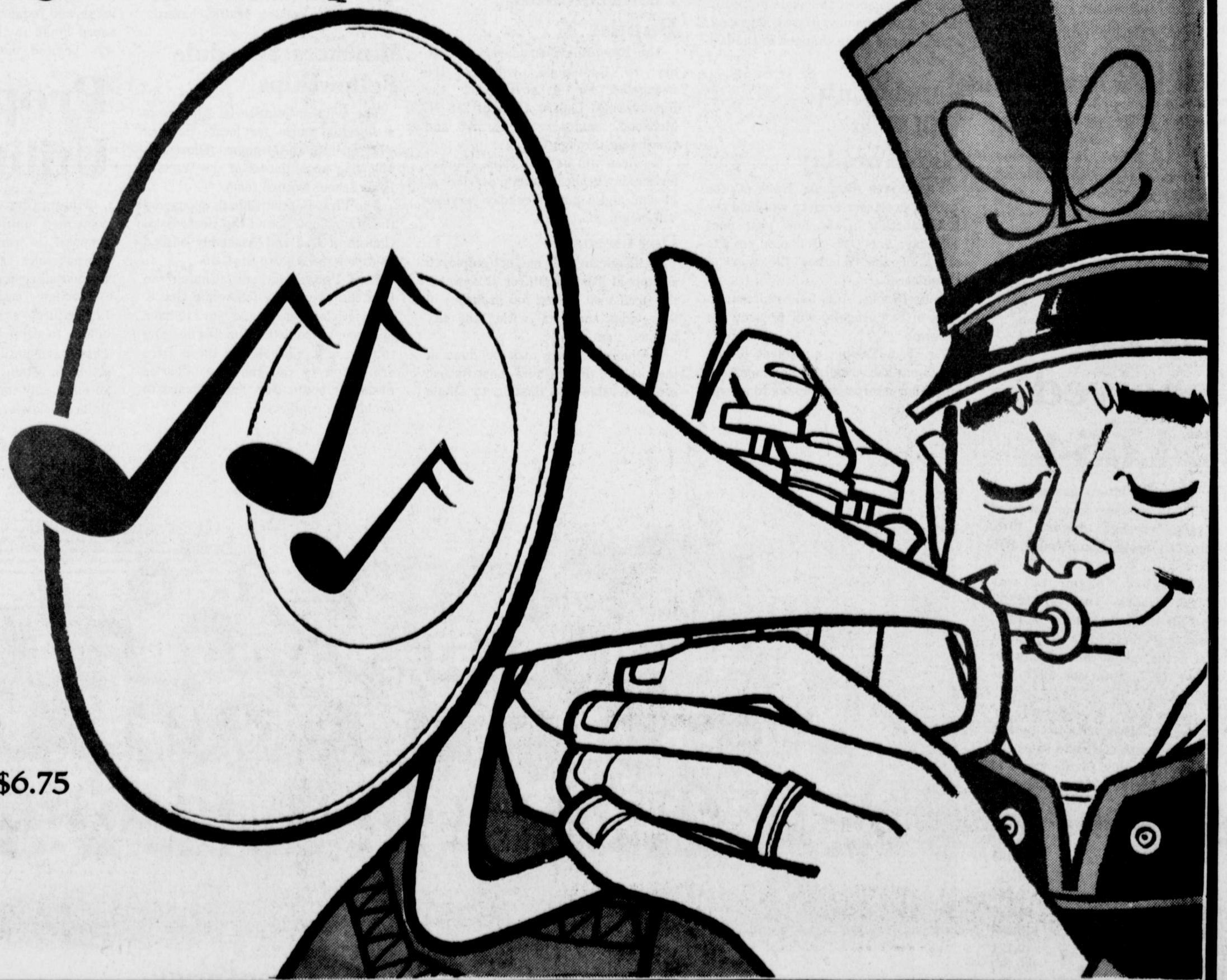
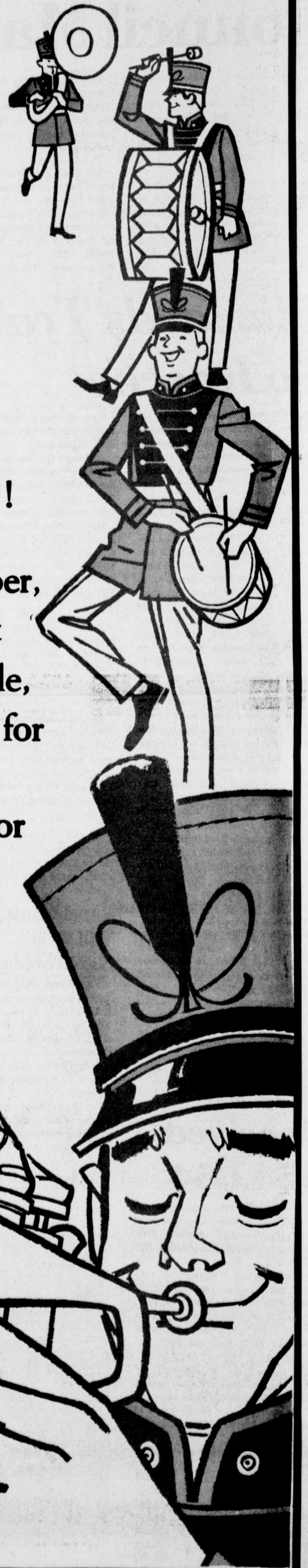

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

## AVISO PUBLICO

### UN RESUMEN DE LAS ENMIENDAS PROPUESTAS A LA CONSTITUCION ELECCION GENERAL 7 DE NOVIEMBRE DE 1978

#### LA ENMIENDA PARA ALIVIO DE IMPUESTOS (H.J.R. 1)

H.J.R. 1 propone una enmienda a la constitucion de Texas permitiendo a la legislatura que exente propiedad personal intangible; requiriendo que la legislatura exente ciertos articulos caseros y efectos particulares; y permitiendo a la legislatura que exente todo o parte de la propiedad personal del hogar seguro, de la imposicion de impuestos estatales y locales sobre propiedad.

La enmienda requiere a la legislatura que disponga la imposicion de impuestos sobre tierras agricolas y rancheras basada en su capacidad productiva en vez de su valor de mercado y permite a la legislatura que disponga la imposicion de impuestos a bosques de madera basada en su capacidad productiva.

La enmienda permite a los gobiernos locales que extiendan la exencion actual de no menos de \$3,000 del hogar seguro residencial para personas de 65 años o más de edad para incluir ciertas personas incapacitadas.

La enmienda concede una exencion de \$5,000 en el valor de mercado del hogar seguro residencial en los impuestos para escuelas públicas sobre propiedad. Autoriza a la legislatura que conceda una exencion adicional de los impuestos para escuelas públicas sobre propiedad de una cantidad que no exceda \$10,000 del valor de mercado de hogares seguros residenciales de personas 65 años o más de edad y ciertas personas incapacitadas. Si la persona de 65 años o más de edad es elegible para esta exencion la cantidad total de los impuestos para escuelas públicas sobre el hogar seguro de aquella persona no puede incrementarse.

La enmienda previene que gobiernos locales incrementen los impuestos sobre propiedad a menos que el cuerpo administrativo provea aviso público y lleve a cabo una audiencia pública. La enmienda requiere a la legislatura que disponga por ley que cada propietario reciba aviso de la revaluación de su propiedad y la cantidad de incremento en sus impuestos.

La enmienda limita las apropiaciones de los ingresos de impuestos estatales en una cantidad que no exceda la tasa de crecimiento económico estatal que se anticipa, con la legislatura autorizada para conceder exenciones de emergencia.

La enmienda prohíbe la valuación de propiedad inmueble a través del estado para los fines de impuestos sobre propiedad. Se requiere que la ejecución de

#### competencia concurrente con ambas cortes, cortes de condado, y cortes de distrito, cuando la cantidad en controversia sea entre \$500 y \$1,000, a menos que la legislatura conceda a la corte de condado o distrito competencia exclusiva.

#### NO. 6 (S.J.R. 45)

S.J.R. 45 propone una enmienda a la constitucion de Texas para permitir que la legislatura aumente el número de jueces en cualquier corte de apelaciones civiles. Al presente, cortes de apelaciones civiles están limitadas a un juez presidente y dos jueces asociados. La enmienda también permitiría a las cortes que sesionen por secciones, con la concurrencia de una mayoría de los jueces en la sección siendo necesaria para decidir una causa.

#### La terminología de la enmienda propuesta tal como aparecerá en la boleta es como sigue:

"La enmienda constitucional permitiendo que la legislatura aumente el número de jueces en cualquier Corte de Apelaciones Civiles, permitiendo Cortes de Apelaciones Civiles sesionen por secciones, y requiriendo la concurrencia de una mayoría de jueces para decidir una causa."

#### NO. 7 (S.J.R. 48)

S.J.R. 48 propone una enmienda a la constitucion de Texas eliminando la Comisión de Edificios del Estado y el Fondo de Edificios del Estado. La autoridad de la Comisión de Edificios del Estado ha sido trasladada por ley a la Junta de Control del Estado.

#### NO. 4 (S.J.R. 53)

S.J.R. 53 propone una enmienda a la constitucion de Texas para permitir que la legislatura exente de la imposicion de impuestos, aparatos para energia o de viento.

"La enmienda constitucional autorizando a la legislatura para exentar de impuestos aparatos de energia solar o de viento."

#### NO. 5 (H.J.R. 37)

H.J.R. 37 propone una enmienda a la constitucion de Texas para conceder competencia exclusiva a jueces de paz en causas civiles cuando la cantidad en controversia no excede \$200, a menos que la legislatura conceda competencia exclusiva a otra corte.

## PUBLIC NOTICE

### SUMMARY OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS GENERAL ELECTION NOV. 7, 1978

#### "The Tax Relief Amendment" (H.J.R. 1)

H.J.R. 1 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution allowing the legislature to exempt intangible personal property, requiring the legislature to exempt certain household goods and personal effects, and allowing the legislature to exempt all or part of the personal property homestead from state and local property taxation.

#### The amendment requires the legislature to provide for the taxation of farm and ranch land on the basis of its productive capacity instead of its market value and allows the legislature to provide for the taxation of timber land on its productive capacity.

#### The amendment permits local governments to extend the present exemption of not less than \$3,000 of the residence homestead of persons 65 and older to include certain disabled persons.

#### The amendment grants an exemption from public school property taxes of \$5,000 of the market value of the residence homestead. It authorizes the legislature to grant an additional exemption from public school property taxes of an amount not to exceed \$10,000 of the market value of the residence homesteads of persons 65 years of age or older and certain disabled persons. If a person 65 years of age or older qualifies for this exemption, the total amount of public school taxes imposed on that person's homestead may not be increased.

#### The amendment prevents local governments from increasing property taxes unless the governing body provides public notice and conducts a public hearing. The amendment requires the legislature to provide by law for each property owner to receive notice of the reevaluation of his property and the amount taxes will be increased.

#### The amendment limits appropriations from state tax revenue to an amount not to exceed Texas' estimated economic growth rate, with the legislature authorized to make exceptions for emergencies.

#### The amendment prohibits the statewide appraisal of real property for property tax purposes. Enforcement of uniform standards and procedures for appraisal of property for property tax purposes is required to originate in the taxing

#### authority where the property tax is imposed.

#### The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

#### "The constitutional amendment providing for tax relief for residential homesteads, elderly persons, disabled persons, and agricultural land; for personal property exemptions; for truth in taxation procedures, including citizen involvement; for a redefinition of the tax base; for limitations on state spending; and for property tax administration."

#### NUMBER ONE (S.J.R. 50)

S.J.R. 50 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution to delete an archaic reference to the "Deaf and Dumb Asylum." The amendment would allow the State of Texas to purchase products and services done by handicapped individuals in nonprofit rehabilitation facilities without complying with bid requirements applicable to other state contracts. The amendment also would eliminate the formality of the approval of certain state contracts by the Governor, the Secretary of State and the Comptroller of Public Accounts.

#### The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment deleting the archaic reference to the 'Deaf and Dumb Asylum,' allowing certain products and services of handicapped individuals to be used by agencies and departments of state government, requiring the procurement of other products and services required in the operation of state government to be made under bids awarded to the lowest responsible bidder, making all such procurement processes subject to laws enacted by the legislature, and eliminating the requirements that the Governor, the Secretary of State, and the Comptroller of Public Accounts of Texas be personally involved with such transactions."

#### NUMBER TWO (S.J.R. 55)

S.J.R. 55 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution to permit local governments to issue bonds for the reconstruction or acquisition of facilities (land, equipment and improvements) designed to develop employment opportunities. These

#### bonds would be payable solely from the revenue from the sale or lease of these facilities. The building or acquisition of such facilities must be determined by the local government to be necessary to develop employment opportunities.

#### The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to provide that the legislature may permit political subdivisions to issue revenue bonds to develop employment opportunities for its citizens."

#### NUMBER THREE (S.J.R. 44)

S.J.R. 44 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution which would allow the legislature to authorize cities and towns to issue tax increment bonds to finance the redevelopment of blighted areas. The bonds are to be paid solely from revenue from municipal tax increments. Payment cannot be made from the revenue of municipal taxes, utilities, or other services.

#### The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to give the legislature the power to authorize cities and towns to issue bonds to finance the redevelopment of blighted areas and prohibiting any city or town from granting its money or lending its credit for such purposes."

#### NUMBER FOUR (S.J.R. 53)

S.J.R. 53 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution to exempt from taxation solar or wind-powered energy devices.

#### The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to exempt from taxation solar and wind-powered energy devices."

#### NUMBER FIVE (H.J.R. 37)

H.J.R. 37 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution to grant exclusive jurisdiction to justices of the peace in civil cases where the amount in controversy does not exceed \$200, except where the legislature gives exclusive jurisdiction to another court.

#### The amendment grants justices of the peace concurrent jurisdiction with county courts where the amount in controversy is between \$200 and \$500, except where the legislature gives the county court exclusive jurisdiction.

#### The amendment also grants justices of the peace concurrent jurisdiction

#### with both county and district courts where the amount in controversy is between \$500 and \$1,000, except where the legislature gives the county or district court exclusive jurisdiction.

#### The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to extend the jurisdiction of justices of the peace in civil cases."

#### NUMBER SIX (S.J.R. 45)

S.J.R. 45 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution to allow the legislature to expand the number of judges on any court of civil appeals. Presently courts of civil appeals are limited to a chief justice and two associate justices. The amendment would allow the courts to sit in sections, with the concurrence of a majority of the judges sitting in the section necessary to decide a case.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment permitting the legislature to increase the number of justices on a court of civil appeals, permitting a court of civil appeals to sit in sections, and requiring a concurrence of a majority of justices to decide a case."

NUMBER SEVEN (S.J.R. 48)

S.J.R. 48 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution eliminating the State Building Commission and the State Building Fund. The authority of the State Building Commission has been transferred by law to the State Board of Control.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to repeal the constitutional authority for the State Building Commission and the State Building Fund."

NUMBER EIGHT (H.J.R. 42)

H.J.R. 42 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution allowing certain political subdivisions or districts in the state that can presently issue bonds or otherwise lend its credit to engage in fire-fighting activities and to issue bonds or otherwise lend its credit to support such activities.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

**THE SEARCH**

Who but an old Texas boy would start from scratch to locate his war buddies after he had lost his address book.

And who but a Texas boy could go to a dance in New York in white shirt and blue overalls and wind up being the most popular man there.

Alvis Jobe traveled over 65,000 miles in 48 states and took six different trips to locate those who had served with him in the 35th Engineer Combat Division.

Jobe saved his money and retired in January of 1976 at the age of 62 to follow his life's plan of "hunting up the boys." He bought a new car and he and his wife started on the search in March.

"I knew one of the men lived in Quitman. I didn't know his name but I found him. He was Joe Wright and he had no addresses of the men. He died the next year. Then I went to see a man who had visited me, A. W. Barclay in Clinton, Ky., and he didn't have any addresses

either. I went through ten states and didn't find anyone but those two men," said Jobe.

But the tour was not a total loss. Jobe and his wife went sight-seeing along the way. They visited the Grand Ole Opry in Nashville and Disney Land in Florida. In Atlanta, Ga., they saw Stone Mountain and Lookout Mountain and headed back to Texas. They came by Corpus Christi looking for Homer H. Brazil, but after two trips he hadn't been found until the last few days when he telephoned Jobe that he lives at Pharr.

Ending with an excursion to Mexico, the Jobses started for Winters. He lost his pocketbook and didn't miss it until he arrived home. Remembering where he had last opened it, he went back and found it with \$700 still in it.

Jobe took time out to cut his grain and break land and again headed for the open road. The second time out he

was on the road 29 days and found one man. He went to Carlsbad, N.M., and on to Colorado and from there to Cheyenne, Wyo. Looking in courthouses, phone books and nursing homes, Jobe finally located Willard T. Larson in Butte, Mon., who had an address book and he gave it to him.

After securing the addresses, Jobe was successful in finding seven buddies from there on the way back to Texas. But first he went to Tonasket, Washington and located a man who can't come to the reunion because he is an apple grower and will be harvesting. From there he went to Oakland, Ca., where he located a member of his company at the same old address. He found no one in San Jose or Kingston but later located the Kingston man in another California town. He came to Modesto looking for Lawrence Loftin and learned that he had moved to Long Island, N.Y.

The Jobses returned home from that expedition.

The next tour was north and mostly just driving: Oklahoma, Kansas, Black Hills of North Dakota and back to Nebraska. Jobe hadn't found anyone until he reached Sioux Falls looking for Arthur Curtis. His wife said he died the year before.

Locating Bill Farr eight miles west of Omaha, Jobe discovered that the man didn't have as many addresses as he had already accumulated. However, Farr started the idea of a reunion—but he won't be here—he died two months later.

Jobe came to Oklahoma and found Charley Sprague, who said he would attend the reunion. After visiting his wife's sister in Little Rock, they came home through Albany and saw a Mr. Scott who has since died.

On the fourth jaunt which was the second one in 1977, Jobe had 68 names to start with and got some more from Tucker. The first man he found was Sgt. Lester Floyd in Haworth, Okla. Traveling through several more states, he arrived in Winston Salem and began the search for James Everett Nance. Larson said that Nance was dead but Jobe kept looking. There were about 26 people in the phone book with the same name but Jobe found the right one and Nance is coming to the reunion.

The Jobses went on to Long Island, N.Y., to see Lawrence Loftin and got lost but after a phone call, Loftin and his wife came to meet them. The Loftins were on their way to see a Guy Lombardo show out on the water called "Pot of Gold at Foot of the Rainbow", and they took the Jobses with them. "It was the thrill of a lifetime," said Jobe.

"I'm a white collar man," says Jobe, "but I wear blue overalls and this is the way I went to the dance afterwards with the Loftins. It ended up with the girls asking me to dance and I danced until it was over. We sure had a good time."

The next man that Jobe located was Charles W. McLellan in Champlain, N.Y., and he suggested that a good time for the reunion would

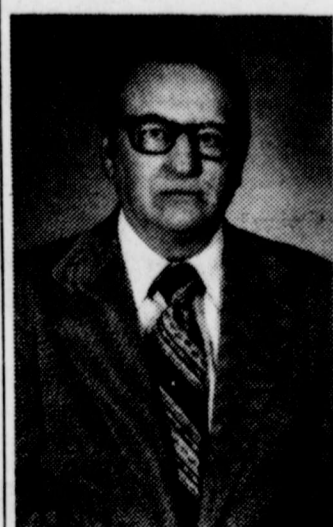

## WTU Will Bill For Utility Sales Tax Through Oct.

The state's four percent sales tax on utility bills for residential customers will be dropped after Oct. 1, but an overlap for billing periods beginning during the month of September will cause the tax to appear on all bills received during October and on some received in November.

Fred Foy, supervisor of statistics and state taxes for West Texas Utilities Co.,

said that instructions issued by the State Comptroller are specific on how the recently approved tax exemptions are to be applied.

"A lot of people apparently think that October billings will not include the tax," Foy said, "but this is not the case."

"The law states that the exemptions shall apply to each regular monthly billing period beginning on or after

Oct. 1. This means that if we bill a customer for service from any time prior to Oct. 1, the four percent sales tax will be applied to the total bill."

Citing an example, Foy said that if a meter is read on Sept. 29, that particular customer will be taxed on the bill he received in October and also on the bill he receives in November, since his November bill is for service from Sept. 30-Oct. 29.

The tax exemption was enacted during the special session of the Legislature this summer and applies to residential use of electricity and natural gas. Residential use is defined as "a family dwelling, a multi-family apartment, a housing complex, or building or portions of a building occupied as home or residence."

The Legislature provided a local option on the one percent city sales tax on utilities, but most of the towns in the West Texas Utilities area have indicated they will continue the tax. Foy said that so far, Junction is the only WTU town which has announced it would abolish the tax.

"Our company will continue to collect the tax for the cities that wish to keep it," Foy said.

Office To Open Here

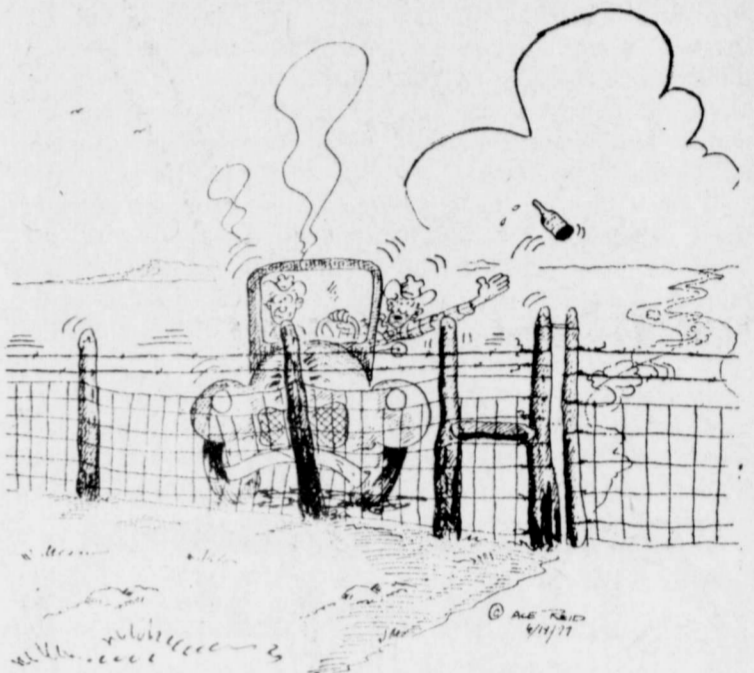

## New Executive Director Named For Housing Office

Vera J. Lafoon has been appointed executive director of the Housing Authority of the City of Winters, effective Oct. 1, Gattis Neely, chairman of the board of the Authority, has announced.

Ms. Lafoon will succeed Oliver Wood, who will retire Oct. 15. Wood has been executive director for the Authority since its beginning several years ago.

Ms. Lafoon has been with the State Cosmetology Commission for several years, and was an examiner for the commission. She retired in 1976, and has been making Winters her home. She is a graduate of Winters High

School and Cameron College. Winters Housing Authority controls 46 units of low cost housing, for the elderly and for low-income families. Thirty-six of the units are single bedroom units, with the rest multiple bedroom units.

For several months, the Authority has been planning to add another 12 units, with assistance from the Farmers Home Administration.

Members of the board at the present time, appointed by the Winters City Council, are Neely, Ralph Lloyd, Gene Wheat, Walker Tatum, Charles Hudson, J. W. Bahlman and David Carroll.

## City Employees Receive Pay Increase

All employees of the City of Winters were granted a 6.5 percent across-the-board pay increase through action of the City Council Monday night.

The increase is designed to meet the increasing cost-of-living rates, city officials said.

In addition, the City Council approved a proposal to establish a "merit system" for pay increases for employees on an "individual" basis. Amount of increase to be realized by those employees "meriting" additional increases was not designated, but it was indicated that the amount "probably" would give some employees an overall 10 percent raise, if merited. Effective pay period was not announced.

## A. E. Turner New County Extension Agent

Allen E. Turner, an area leader in agricultural extension education, has been appointed Runnels County Extension Agent.

The appointment, effective Oct. 1, was announced by John Purifoy, Runnels County judge, and Dr. Uel R. Stockard of College Station, state agent for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Turner has supervised since 1970 agricultural agents as they planned, executed and evaluated educational programs in the 17 counties making up District 7 of the Extension Service.

In Runnels he succeeds C. Glenn Bragg, who resigned to enter private business.

Turner began his Extension Service career in Wichita Falls on graduating from Texas A&M University with the bachelor's degree in animal science. He has since earned the master's degree at A&M, and has completed other graduate studies.

Turner was assistant agent in Wichita and Taylor counties and agent in Menard and Tom Green counties before he became district Extension agent.

He received in 1968 the Superior Service Award from co-workers in the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, and in 1966 the Sheep and Goat Raiser's Award from the Texas Sheep and Goat Raiser's Association.

# KRUEGER OF TEXAS

During the past twelve months, the severity of problems facing farmers has prompted marches on Washington, tractor blockades throughout the nation, threats of no spring planting, formation of the American Agriculture Movement, and, finally, questions from consumers. Exactly how much of what we pay for food goes

to the farmer? In instance after instance, the answer is that although latest farm harvests have been among the farmer's greatest, the return on those harvests have been among the lowest.

My decision to co-sponsor House Joint Resolution 1093, which raises farm prices to 90 percent of parity, is a response to the grim statistics which prove that as farm debt has more than doubled in the last five years, farm income has continued its decline, forcing farmers into bankruptcy at up to five times the normal rate.

Only legislation such as H.J. Res. 1093, which mandates an increase in target prices, can help save the American farm family from financial ruin. And only

passage of this legislation quickly—before Congress adjourns for the year—can provide help before it is too late for those families who have managed to survive until now.

Cong. Richard Nolan, who introduced this measure in the House, estimates the increase in market prices resulting from 90 percent parity levels as provided in the resolution would be only a few cents a pound for each of the farm products included in the bill—that is, for milk—plus \$.0286/lb., wheat—plus \$.0332/lb., corn—plus \$.0216/lb., soybeans—plus \$.0252/lb., and cotton—plus \$.2444/lb.

As evidenced by these figures, the correlation of today's farm prices and consumer food costs is a study of contradictions; severely depressed crop prices presently plaguing farmers have not resulted in a corresponding drop in grocery costs. The price of food continues to skyrocket, and the average food bill is expected to be higher this year than last.

In an effort to help clarify exactly how much the cost of farm products comprise the price of the groceries we buy, I am also co-sponsoring the "Bread Labeling Act," a measure to require that bread labels indicate the cost of farm products contained in each packaged loaf of bread sold in the United States.

This measure will not, in itself, solve all the communication problems between farmers and consumers. However, it is a first small step towards helping us all to know how little of what we pay for at least one valuable food staple actually goes to the farmer for supplying the ingredients.

Working against the tremendous odds presented by the forces of nature such as drought, flood and insect infestation, the farmer should not face an additional foe in the form of insensitive government policy.
