## City Water Tower Is Being Repaired

Winters City Council last Thursday approved a contract with Allied Tank Service of San Angelo to completely clean the inside of the south water storage tank, and re-line the inside with a fiberglass material. Contract also calls for welding in areas where the legs of the tower attach to the storage tank proper, and to paint the outside of the tank and the tower. In addition to the overall painting, the name "Winters" will be painted on the tank sides, along with the "Blizzard" emblem.

Cleaning and re-lining the inside of the tank, along with the welding repairs, will take about two weeks, weather permitting, it was indicated, with the painting to wait until warm weather—perhaps in the spring or summer.

Cost of the project will be \$20,000. The tank repair work, including fiberglass materials, has been contracted for \$16,500, with the painting to be \$3,500.

Council approved the project following an inspection of the tank last week. Allied Tank Service sent a crew in to inspect the condition of the inside of the tank. They said the quarter-inch metal of the tank proper was badly pitted and corroded; it was evident that a sharp punch with an instrument such as a screwdriver would drive a hole completely through the metal. Also, the heavy rivets holding the legs of the tower to the tank were badly eaten away, and needed replacement. These places will be welded, it was said.

During the inspection, crew members climbed the tower and entered the tank. They sandblasted several areas inside, in order to see the condition of the metal. After cleaning the metal, the crews focused a closed-circuit television on the area being inspected, and members of the council were able to see the condition on a TV set in the mobile office on the ground.

According to the contract, the 100,000 gallon tank will be sandblasted inside, and a fiberglass material will be blown onto the surface of the metal to about one-eighth of an inch thickness. Curing of the covering material will take only a few days, it was said, before water can be pumped back into the storage tank.

A list of telephone numbers Wingate area residents can use in case of fire is published elsewhere in this issue. This list can be cut out and placed near telephones for emergency use.

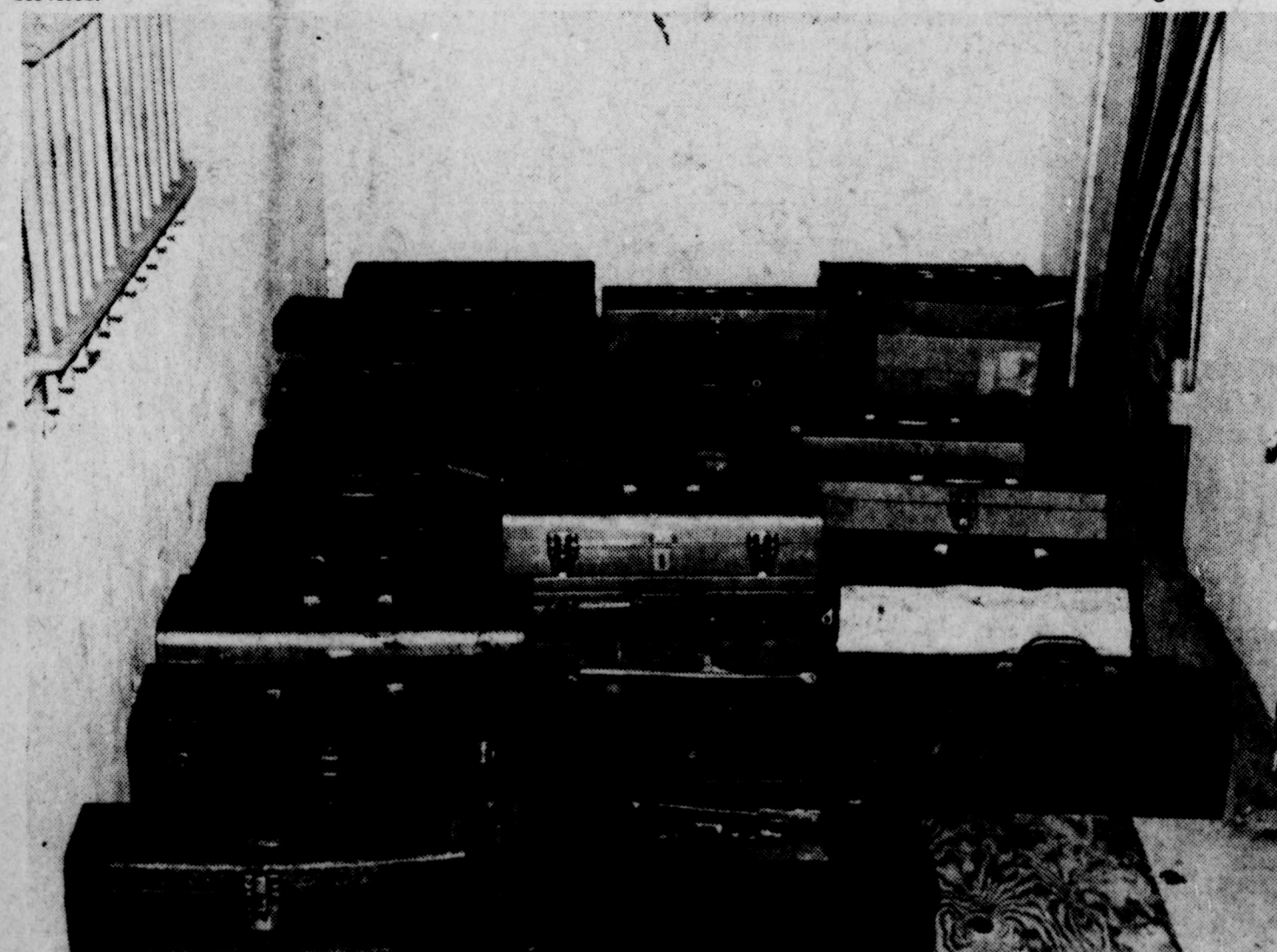
## Officers Find Cache Of Missing Tools

Runnels County Sheriff's Department officers over the last weekend discovered a cache of hand tools, tool boxes, and many other items, possibly clearing up many reports of missing tools received over a period of years.

The tool boxes and tools were found in a farm building east of Winters Sunday, and other items, which were suspected of having been stolen, were found the first of the week.

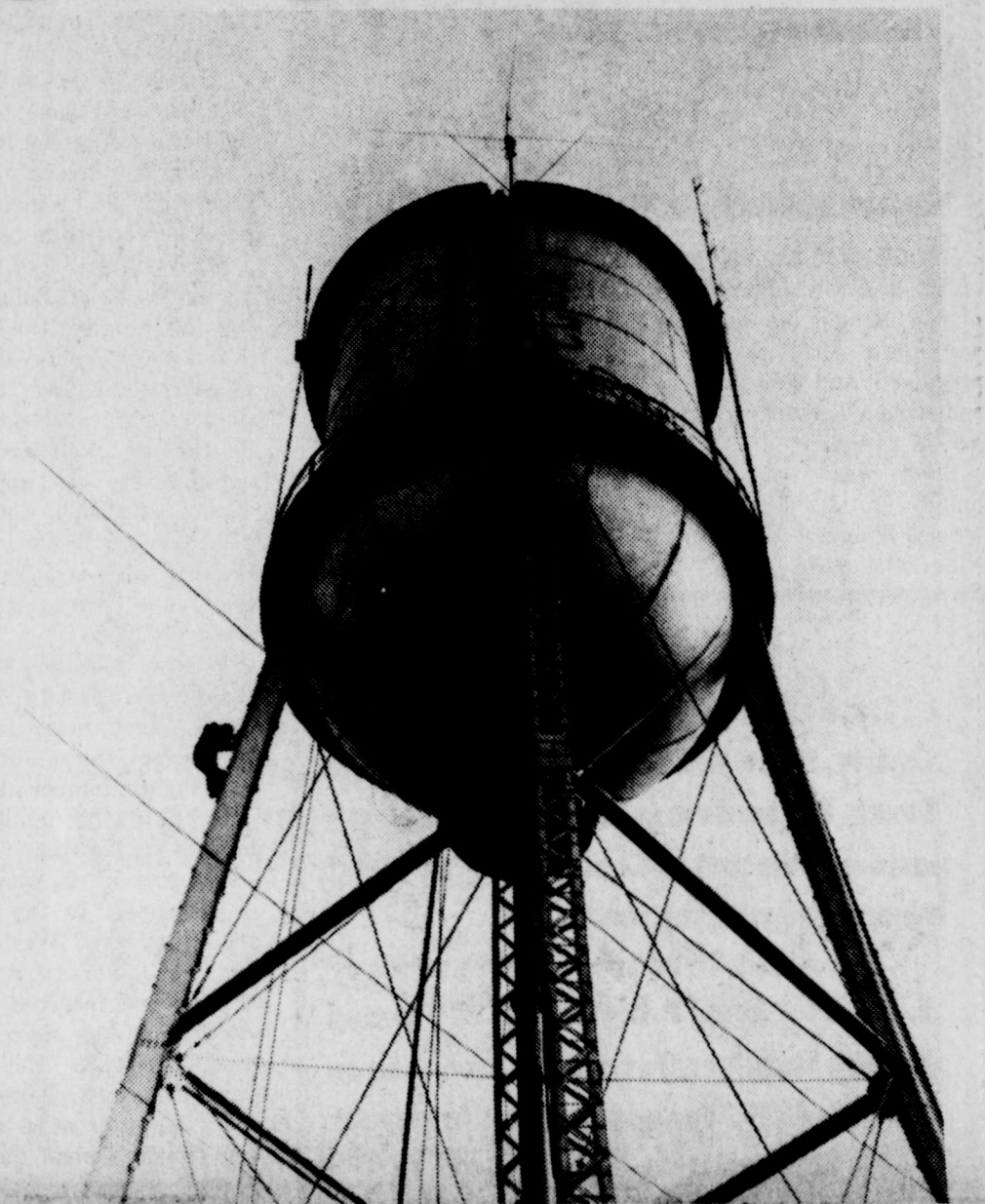
County Sheriff Hershall Hall arrested John J. Johnson, 45, who was charged with felony theft. Charged in the court of Justice of the Peace Oliver Petty of Ballinger, Johnson was released on \$5,000 bond, Sheriff Hall said.

More than 60 tool boxes were found, along with the hand tools and other items, such as chain saws, gas cans and extension cords. Officials estimate—See TOOLS Page 8

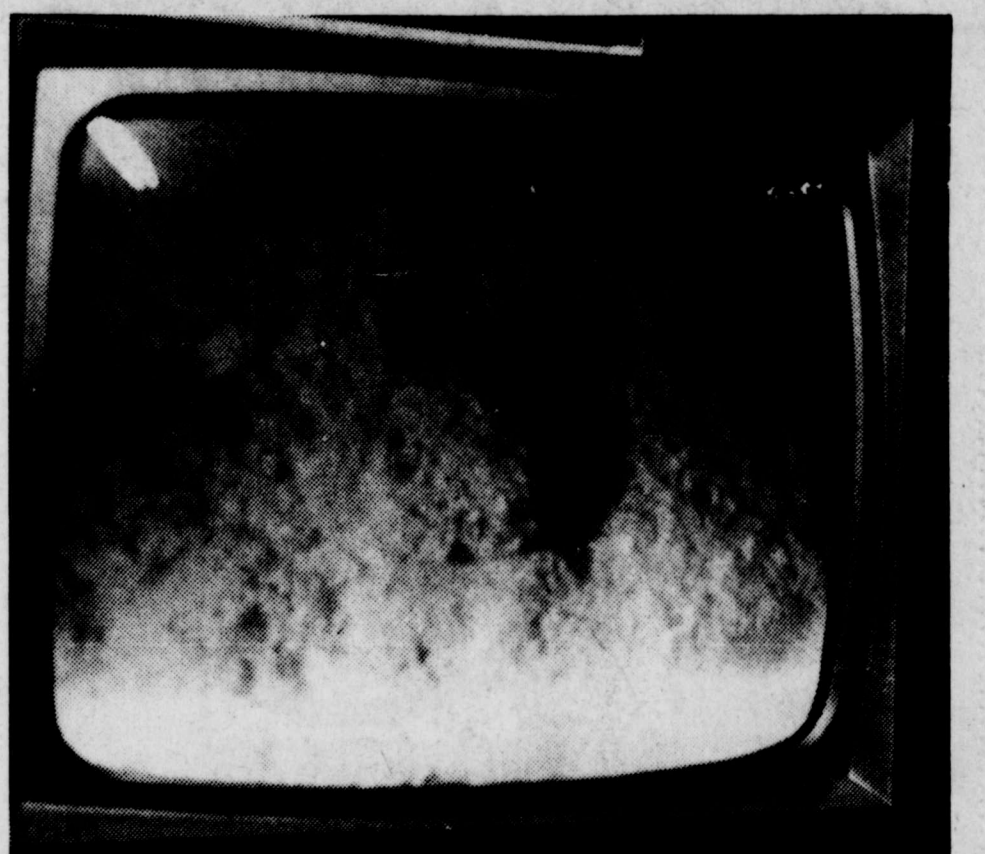


TOOL BOXES—Shown are some of the tool boxes, most filled with tools, recovered by the Sheriff's Department over the weekend, recovery of which,

HIGH CLIMBERS—Three crew members of Allied Tank Service clamber about the tower of Winters' south water tank, in the process of making an inspection.

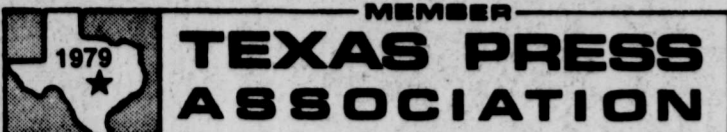

## Poe's Corner

### JUDGE W. J. WINGATE

When a town or community is named for someone, we know that person is prominent and well liked but sometimes his background is lost in antiquity.

Such was the case of Judge W. J. Wingate for whom Wingate was named when the pose office was

established in 1892.

Little was known about him until some information provided by a daughter Ila Wingate Foster was compiled by Agnes V. Frizzell of Houston and presented to Frank Jenkins, a member of the County Historical Commission.

Judge Wingate is listed in

the Runnels County Ledger as a candidate running for District Judge of the 35th District on the Democratic ticket, November 4, 1892. According to the results of the election in Texas State Election Returns, Wingate received 531 votes, J. O. Woodward received 145 votes and R. P. Conner 36 votes.

As early as 1887 in advertisements in the Ballinger Eagle Wingate was an attorney, land agent and insurance underwriter; was on the board of Examiners for Public Schools, and road overseer. He is referred to as "Judge" Wingate in two articles in the Ballinger Eagle but there is no evidence that he held this office in 1887. Three years later he was listed in the Texas Gazeteer as an attorney in the firm of Wingate and Guion.

In 1896 he was the owner of a boot and shoe store. He sold his office location on Hutchings Street to his father, D. R. Wingate and some acreage to his brother, D. R. Wingate Jr. of Uvalde. He evidently left Ballinger to live in Orange at this time.

Active in Democratic Party politics in Orange, by 1902 Judge Wingate advertised as an attorney in Orange newspapers. He was appointed county judge upon the death of Stephen P. West in June. He held this position until he died of a heart attack on April 11, 1908.

Walter Jourdan Wingate was born August 14, 1848 on Pearl River near Jackson, Mississippi, the son of David R. Wingate, lumberman.

By 1870 the family had moved to Newton County, Texas and W. J. was listed as a farmer. In the fall of 1873 he entered Washington and Lee University. Bachelor of Laws was received.

Wingate was married to Agnes Virginia Smith at Orange in 1883. Three sons and a daughter were born to the couple and died in infancy before a daughter, Ila Mae, was born in 1892. A son, W. J. Wingate Jr., was born in 1894 and a daughter, Mattie Elizabeth, was born in 1900 after the family had returned to Orange to live.

### Naomi Circle Meeting Recently

Naomi Circle of United Methodist Women met recently in the home of Mrs. Eva Kelley with twelve members present.

Mrs. M. G. Middlebrook had charge of the meeting and the program. She read a list of missionaries with each.

After the death of his wife in 1904, Judge Wingate was married to Viva Slaughter and they had one son, David Robert.

In addition to being county judge while living at Orange, Wingate was also superintendent of county schools. He was so successful in raising the standard of county schools that every community was organized into a school district, with a special school tax, the average school term more than six months, and every school under the direction of a competent teacher.

Judge Wingate was a member of the Methodist Church, and the board of stewards. He was also a Mason and belonged to the Oddfellows Lodge.

We don't know just when Judge Wingate came to Runnels for he is listed as a lawyer, banker and collecting agent in the Texas Gazeteer in 1884 living in Orange. Sometime between then and 1886 he moved to Runnels City because he moved to Ballinger in 1886, and had his home moved onto a "free" lot given by the Santa Fe railroad.

The name of Wingate was well chosen.

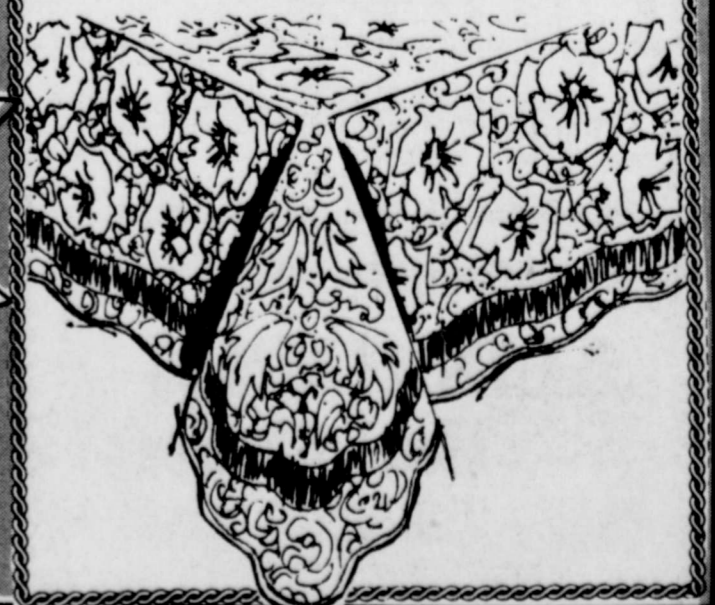

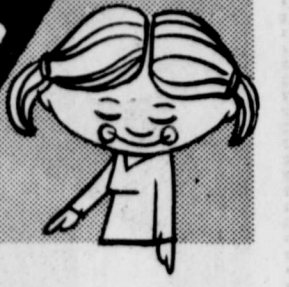

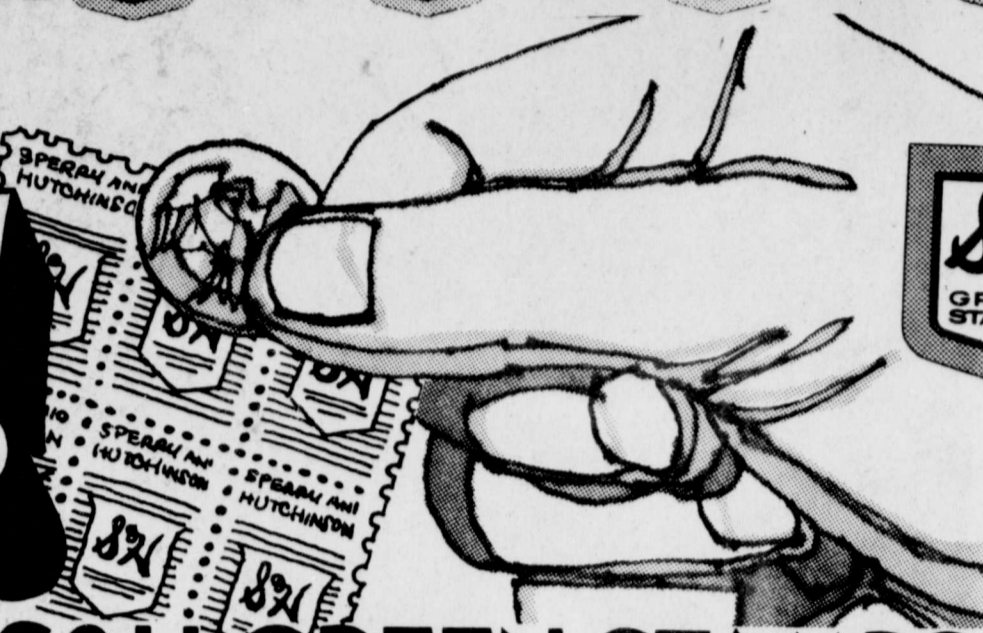

### Tax Credit On Energy-Saving Improvements

Homeowners who have made energy-saving improvements may claim a tax credit when filing their 1978 income tax returns.

The Energy Tax Act of 1978 provides for such a tax credit on energy-saving home improvements installed since Apr. 19, 1977, points out Ashley Lovell, economist in management with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

An individual may claim a credit of 15 percent of energy-saving expenditures made between Apr. 20, 1977 and Dec. 31, 1978. The maximum credit allowed is \$300 and can be claimed on IRS Form 5695.

What type of energy-saving property is eligible for tax credit?

Lovell lists the following:

- Insulation for ceilings, walls, floors, roofs, water heaters and related areas.
- Exterior storm (or thermal) windows or doors.
- Caulking or weather stripping for exterior windows or doors.
- A furnace replacement burner to reduce fuel usage.
- A device to make flue openings (for a heating system) more efficient.
- An electrical or mechanical furnace ignition system to replace a gas pilot light.
- An automatic energy-saving setback thermostat.
- A meter displaying the cost of energy usage.

To be eligible, these improvements must be installed in or on an individual's principal residence, either owned or rented, notes Lovell. The individual must be the first person using the item, and it must have an expected use period of at least three years.

Additional information on tax credits for energy-conscious homeowners is available in IRS publication 903, "Energy Credits for Individuals."

To save space when freezing cut-up poultry, freeze only fleshy pieces. Cook the bony pieces, such as wings and backs, for immediate use or store as cooked meat picked off the bone.

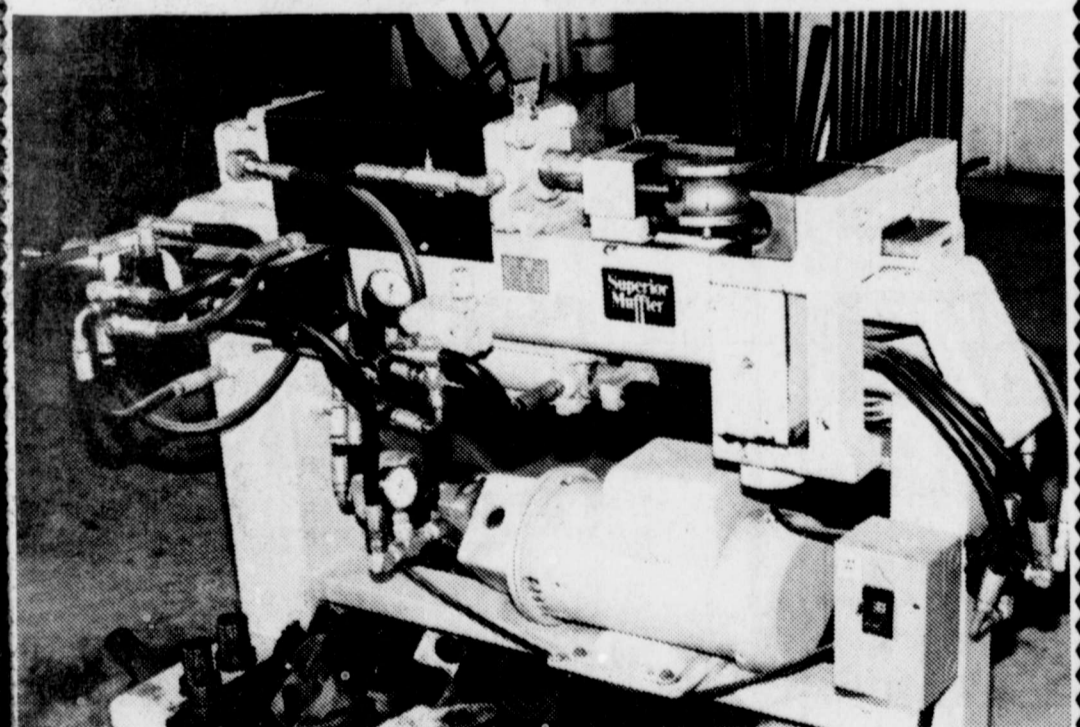

## City Officials To Water Permit Hearing, Austin

Mayor Homer Hodge, Aldermen Randy Springer and Jimmy Hatler, and City Attorney Don Reese, will attend the hearing in Austin Friday when the State Water Commission will be presented an application from the City of Winters for an amendment to the present water permit, allowing the city to impound and use more water.

The hearing is another step in the long road in the search for additional water resources for the Winters area. If the application is approved, the City will go ahead with plans to construct another dam below the present Lake Winters dam, to impound additional water which is needed to meet the demand of Winters residents and water users in the North Runnels Water Supply Corp. system.

(Continued From Page One) ed that the value of the property recovered might go as high as \$20,000. Some of the tools and tool boxes have been identified by owners, the sheriff said, but there still are many which have not been traced to ownership. Hall said his department, and other law enforcement agencies, have received many reports of loss of tool boxes and tools within the past few years. Discovery of the cache of tools was the end result of a long investigation, the sheriff said.

The property has been stored in the Prec. 2 county barn in Northeast Winters, and persons who have had tools taken within the past few years may inspect them and provide proof of ownership.

City officials, and legal and engineering representatives of the city, have expressed doubt there will be opposition to Winters' application for additional water, inasmuch as no formal notice of opposition has been forthcoming. However, opposition could arise during the hearing, it was said.

If permission to impound additional water is approved, then the city will instruct engineers to go ahead with dam plans, which will include core testing, and then the task of obtaining financial assistance will be confronted, officials said.

The home of Mrs. Clyde Sears, about 12 miles north of Wingate, received heavy damage by fire about 7:30 a.m. last Thursday.

## Feed Beef Herd According To Need

For a sound winter nutrition program, beef cattle must be fed according to their nutritional requirements to achieve proper maintenance and production of the herd.

"This means that cattlemen must know the nutritional requirements of their herd and those factors influencing those requirements so they can separate cattle into production groups and feed accordingly," points out Dr. Larry Boleman.

"It is impossible to properly feed a herd where bulls run with cows all year, calving occurs year-round allowing for cattle in all production stages, and cattle are not separated based on their individual needs and nutrient requirements," says the beef cattle specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Since feed requirements of different animals vary so much, cattle of different ages and production status must be fed separately to realize high productivity at minimum feed costs. Boleman suggests a number of factors for producers to consider when separating cattle according to their stage of production and nutritional needs;

—Protein, digestible energy and mineral requirements are about the same for weaned heifers, pregnant heifers and pregnant cows. However, older cattle consume more, so younger animals must be fed higher quality feeds with more protein and energy.

—Lactating cattle require much larger amounts of protein, energy and mineral.

—Herd bulls have a requirement similar to lactating cattle.

—Cows with first calf or young heifers may not receive their share of supplement if fed with bossy, older cattle.

"Nutrient requirements of beef cattle depend on age, condition, weight, stage of production and environmental conditions," points out Boleman. "Young stock must be separated from older stock to be fed for proper development. Otherwise, older animals will dominate and consume the younger animals' share."

Proper development over winter is important in young heifers, and studies indicate they should gain three-fourths to one pound per day during their first winter as weaner heifers. Normally, growing heifers require about one pound of crude protein and between 12 to 14 megacalories of digestible energy per head daily.

"Nutrient requirements of cows depend on size, condition entering winter, stage of production and milking ability during lactation. Fat cows should make only small gains before calving while thin cows may need to gain 100 to 150 pounds by calving time," explains the specialist. "Average conditioned cows need only gain 60 to 80 pounds over winter. These cattle have about the same protein and energy requirements as growing heifers."

Stage of production is one of the most important factors in determining a cow's nutrient requirements. After calving for the first three or four months, a cow needs 60 percent more energy and more than twice as much protein per day as the rest of the year. Basically, a lactating 1,000-pound cow requires about 2 pounds of protein and 28-30 megacalories of digestible energy daily.

"With such diversity of nutrient requirements in the beef cattle herd, it's quite apparent that animals must be separated and fed accordingly," emphasizes Boleman. "To achieve a healthy, heavy calf each year, a producer must understand nutritional needs of his herd and establish a sound nutrition program."

## Pickled Shrimp Hors D'Oeuvres

Gulf shrimp and seasonings combine to make lively hors d'oeuvres the hostess can prepare ahead of time.

In fact, the longer the shrimp are allowed to marinate, the more flavor they will absorb, says Annette Reddell, seafood consumer education specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

This easy-to-fix appetizer goes well with any beverage or other snack food, she adds.

2 medium onions, cut into rings  
1 1/2 cups vegetable oil

## Loeffler Appeals To O.M.B. For Goodfellow

Congressman Tom Loeffler has written a strong letter to the President's Office of Management and Budget concerning his desire to keep Goodfellow Air Force Base in operation as a training center for military intelligence.

The text of the letter follows:

Office of Management and Budget

Washington, D.C. 20503

Dear Mr. Director:  
Last April, prior to my election to the Congress, the Department of the Air Force announced that Goodfellow Air Force Base in San Angelo, Texas, was to be included in a study of military installations being considered for closing.

Since that time, Mayor Parrett of San Angelo, the City Commissioners and hundreds of citizens of the City have eloquently informed appropriate officials at the Department of Defense of the reasons why it makes no budgetary sense whatsoever to close Goodfellow. Instead, Goodfellow should stay open and serve as a consolidated training center for military intelligence. Along with budgetary considerations, this consolidation also makes sense from a public relations viewpoint since the relationship between personnel stationed at Goodfellow and residents of the City of San Angelo is a model for Air Force installations nationwide.

Aware as I am of the role which the Office of Management and Budget will ultimately play in this matter, I feel it is imperative for you to have personal knowledge of the factors involved. Rather than reiterate the arguments in this letter, I direct your attention to an article which appeared in the January San Angelo Standard Times written by Mrs. Le Kilgore, which provides an excellent and detailed account of the entire situation (copy attached).

I would be grateful if you would request the Department of the Air Force to respond to each of the points in the article and to share their comments with both of us. Following that, I would welcome the opportunity to meet with you personally for the purpose of further discussion.

I expect to play a major role in eliminating unnecessary Federal spending. Goodfellow Air Force Base, however, does not in any way fall into that category. Your review of the matter will surely prompt you to agree.

I look forward to hearing from you.
