## Three Men On Ballot For Hospital

There will be three candidates for three positions on the board of directors of North Runnels County Hospital District in the April 7 election.

Hollis Dean, Roger Robinson and Morris Robinson, all incumbents, will be candidates for return to the board.

The hospital district administers affairs of North Runnels Hospital in Winters. The district is made up of most of North Runnels county, and encompasses the area covered by the old Precincts 2 and 3.

## Four Seeking Two City Council Seats

## Wingate Baptist Church Celebrates Homecoming

Wingate Baptist Church held a special homecoming observance Sunday, to commemorate the church's 87-year history.

The Rev. Charles Myers, pastor of the church since 1957, spoke briefly about highlights of the church's history, and one former pastor, the Rev. J. W. Partin, now of Abilene, was present.

The church was organized March 20, 1892. After meeting for several years in a school house, the church constructed its own

building in 1910. That building served until 1960, when it was replaced by the church's current brick building. During its history, the church has had 41 pastors.

Wingate Baptist Church is a missionary church which has its own Latin American mission and supports a church in Washington state and missionaries in Brazil. Last year the church gave 47.3 percent of its total income to missionary endeavors.

## Football Field Leveled, Will Be Grass-Sprigged

As archeologists use the different levels of ground fill to determine the story of historic sites, so have workmen determined, to some extent, the past many years' history of the Winters High School football field.

When dirt-moving equipment was moved in to the site several days ago and started leveling the playing field, all sorts of things were turned to light—such as coins, metal bull rings, buckles, metal saddle and harness parts, and even fence posts. "A handful of coins" was turned up during the dirt-moving process, according to one source. Someone with a metal detector surveyed the ground, and found the coins.

## Auxiliary Will Sell Cookbooks

North Runnels Hospital Auxiliary will present for sale the first edition of their new salad cookbook, "Auxiliary Cooking," at their spring salad luncheon next Thursday, March 22, in the dining room of the First United Methodist Church.

Serving at the luncheon will be from 11:30 a. m. to 1 p. m., with luncheon tickets at \$2.50 each. Tickets may be obtained from Auxiliary members, or at the door.

The new cookbook, which has just come off the press, is filled with "tried and true" recipes from members of the Auxiliary and their friends. Cost of the cookbook will be \$2, and they will be on sale at the luncheon, or may be bought from members later.

All proceeds from the luncheon and the sale of the cookbooks will go toward purchase of a ventilator which will be used on the anesthetic machine at North Runnels Hospital. The Auxiliary is committed to buy this piece of equipment for the hospital, members said.

As before, members of the Auxiliary said, they are again soliciting help from their friends who have furnished salads for the luncheon. Those who plan to bring a salad are asked to call Sandy Griffin at 754-5171.

Through the years, the center of the field has been built up, with a cap about 38 inches higher than the sides of the field. This crown has been removed, and the field leveled, leaving a crown of about 12 inches, which will be more suitable for football, and make water and maintenance much easier.

After the field is allowed to settle, and a good seed bed is available, the area will be seeded. The school board was to decide Tuesday night what type of grass to sprig. They were to look at possibilities of sprigging a new grass developed at Texas A&M University, especially for football fields, called "Tuften." Cost of the sprigs will be about \$800, about the same amount, it was understood, it would take to sprig

Bermuda. The new type grass is being used in San Angelo and Lubbock, and on other football fields about the country, it was said. After sprigging—which will not be attempted for several weeks—it will take about six to eight weeks to have a playing turf, it was said.

The buildup of the extremely high crown on the football field has been the result of many years of grass growth, with soil being constantly added. Also, for many years, the field was used as a rodeo ground, and extra dirt sometimes was hauled in to spread over the turf.

Runnels County Prec. 2 personnel and equipment was used to blade off the field, under direction of County Commissioner David Carroll. Also, much of the work is being done by regular school maintenance personnel.

## Wallace Murray Will Again Offer Scholarships Here

The Wallace Murray Foundation has announced that a number of scholarship awards of up to \$2,000 each will be made available to children of employees of the Wallace Murray Corp. Awards will be made for scholastic achievement for the academic year beginning September, 1978.

Dry Manufacturing Div. of Winters has been allocated funds for this purpose.

Awards will be made on the basis of scholastic ability and leadership qualities as outlined in the program.

These funds may be used to pay for tuition, room, board, textbooks, laboratory fees and other similar expense incident to attendance at an accredited college, technical or trade school of the applicant's choice. Funds not used the first year may be carried forward to the second, or sophomore year.

High school students who will graduate in May/June, 1979, certain students who have completed associate degrees at two year institutions and desire to continue

into a four-year program, and certain students having completed four year degree work who plan to seek a master's or higher degree, are eligible.

To qualify, the student must meet the following requirements: —Be a child or ward of a full time employee of a Wallace Murray division or subsidiary as of Jan. 1, 1979, or thereafter.


—Have appropriate scholastic ability.

—Be accepted at an accredited college, university, junior college, technical or trade school as a freshman in a course leading to a degree or its equivalent, or as appropriate in the other categories.

—Be selected by the Wallace Murray Scholarship Committee composed of qualified educators outside the corporation.

—Complete and submit an application not later than April 7, 1979.

**Poe's Corner**

**WINGATE BAPTIST HOME COMING**

Many former members returned for the homecoming fellowship held at the Wingate Baptist Church Sunday to celebrate the 87th anniversary of the church's organization.

The modern red brick building was filled with the 137 people who registered and others who failed to register. Lunch was served at the church after the morning services and a special celebration followed.

As I sped over a paved highway to reach Wingate in a matter of minutes, I thought of my grandfather, Robert

Cooke, who drove from Winters on country roads in a buggy when he pastored the church in 1915 and wondered how long it took him to make the trip.

Reminiscing was part of the fellowship at the well laden tables while some told of their early experiences. Bessie Mosley, daughter of Enoch Smith, a former pastor, said that she joined the Sunday School in 1905 when they were meeting in the school house and united with the church in 1911. When the church dedication was held in 1910 there was such a crowd that she and other children had to sit on the rostrum. Her family moved to Winters when she was 13, but after her marriage to Allen Mosley they returned to Wingate in 1916. Mr. Mosley was ordained as deacon with three others in 1924, Charlie Smith, Ross Badgett and John Gannaway, deceased. The Mosleys now live in Sweetwater.

G. W. Keel, father of Mrs. Oliver Wood, was ordained as a deacon when he moved to Wingate in 1915 and elected church clerk at the same time. Mrs. Wood said she became a member in 1923. Mr. and Mrs. C. J. Cornett became members soon after their marriage 35 years ago. C. J. is a teacher of senior adults and also serving as a deacon. Mrs. Cornett recalled that the church received a real boost when the Humble camp came there in 1951. The attendance jumped to more than 100, which before had been about a dozen.

During the dark days of the war when most of the men were in the service and it was difficult to pay the preacher even the \$10 a Sunday that he received when he came twice a month, it was thought that the church doors would have to be closed. On alternate Sundays members walked across the street to attend church with the Methodists.

Mr. and Mrs. John Gannaway who were married in the church in 1910 and remained staunch lifetime members were driving to church. Mr. Gannaway told his wife that there was no way to keep the church open, they would just have to close its doors. But when they arrived Veta Wheat was sitting on the steps waiting for Sunday School to start, and he said, "As long as that little girl is sitting on the steps waiting for us, we'll see that the church stays open."

The afternoon speaker was a former pastor, J. W. Partin of Tuscola, who brought the message after a brief history by Pastor Charles Meyers.

Rev. Meyers said he had remarked to his wife, the first time he saw the Wingate church, that he was glad he wasn't pastor for he would have to start a building program and since he had been in several he didn't want another. But he did become pastor and he said building the church was the easiest project he ever had because the people were so cooperative. They have since bought an organ and air conditioned the building.

"I'm finally reaping my vision of a mission-minded church," said Rev. Meyers. "Last year the church gave 47.3 percent of its total income to missionary endeavors. We have our own Latin American Mission, support a church in Washington and missionaries in Brazil."

Rev. Meyers paid tribute to Leila Harter who was elected pianist in 1924. She accompanied for the afternoon services and also played a solo. Gene Wheat led the singing and Mrs. Meyers was at the organ. Bill Wheat played a piano solo.

All deacons attending were recognized. Former deacons were Allen Mosley, Charlie Smith, Troy Harter and Thurman Blalock. Present deacons are Gene Wheat, C. J. Cornett, Gilbert Smith and Survern O'Dell.

The church was organized on March 20, 1892. The first pastor was J. W. George who served until 1893. The first offering was \$1.75. Fifty cents of this was used to buy the element for the observance of the Lord's Supper. The balance was sent as a gift to Baylor University.

Church met in the school house until May 7, 1910 when a church building was erected. It served the church until the present building was erected in 1960.

The first recorded salary for a pastor is that of \$100 per year for S. S. Sullivan in 1901. The church went from one fourth to one-half time September of 1911 and remained half-time until the 40's when it became a full-time church.

In 1972 when the 80th anniversary was observed the Sunday School was fully graded.

During the 87 years of the church's history, they have had 41 pastors. Rev. Meyers has been pastor since May 26, 1957.

Other services were held at 10:30 a.m. Thursday in Winters Memorial Chapel with Johnny Green, a grandson, officiating. Both services were under direction of Winters Funeral Home. Burial was in Wingate Cemetery. Grandsons were pallbearers.

She was born Mary Lee Owens in Mills County May 9, 1895. The family moved to Runnels County in 1909, settling in the Wilmeth-Wingate area, where she lived until 1947 when they moved to San Angelo. For the past four years, Mrs. Blackwell had lived in the Rio Concho Manor in San Angelo.

She married John Ellis in Winters in 1910; he died in 1917. In 1919, she married George W. Blackwell at Ballinger. He died in 1950. Three children also preceded her in death.

Survivors are one son, Bill Blackwell of Littlefield; seven daughters, Mrs. Christine Cason of San Angelo, Mrs. Cleo Bishop of Dallas, Mrs. Lorece Ashley of Huntington Beach, Calif., Mrs. Ruth Cone of Rockdale, Mrs. Wanda Daily of Austin, and Mrs. Tommie Brown of Soldotha, Alaska; a son-in-law, Carl Green of Wingate; a daughter-in-law, Mrs. Bernice Blackwell of Big Spring; a brother, Lester Owens of Wichita Falls; two sisters, Mrs. Ireland of Wichita Falls and Mrs. Bernice Bell of Lubbock; 25 grandchildren, 26 great-grandchildren, and 3 great-great-grandchildren.



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

### New Books For States High Schools

The State Board of Education will call for new textbooks in six high school subjects for use in Texas public schools beginning Sept. 1, 1980.

The 1979 textbook proclamation, approved Saturday (March 10) by the Board, will carry an estimated price tag of \$6,821,669.

Additional costs, including re-adoption of current textbooks, additional purchase of books now in use, Braille and large type books, and freight will boost estimated 1980-81 costs to \$23,415,491, or \$7.82 per student.

The new text materials are scheduled for six high school subjects, including

Texas Lions Camp for Crippled Children at Kerville will open its first two-week session June 3.

Activities include beginning typewriting, advance typewriting, health education, computer mathematics, civil government, and automotive trades. There are no elementary subjects on the list.

Materials to be submitted by national publishers will be reviewed by the new State Textbook Committee throughout the summer. The 15-member committee, all professional administrators and teachers now serving in Texas public schools, will be appointed by the Board at its April 14 meeting.

All books submitted for the Texas adoption will be reviewed by members of the State Textbook Committee and their advisors from the schools throughout the summer. At the same time, sample copies will be available for review by interested citizens at each of the state's 20 regional education service centers.

Dr. M. L. Brockett, Texas Commissioner of Education, and the State Textbook Committee will hold a joint public hearing on the materials August 13-17 in Austin.

The State Textbook Committee will meet September 10-12 in Austin to select the books to be recommended for adoption. Brockett may remove materials from this list before sending his final recommendation to the State Board of Education. The Board may also remove books from the list. However, none may be added once the State Textbook Committee has made its selection.

The State Board of Education will hold a final public hearing on the 1979 adoption November 8 in Austin. The Board will adopt books at its regular meeting on November 10.

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

### FM Seeking Support Of Ag Legislation

Runnels County Farm Bureau has been in contact with Rep. Lynn Nabers of Brownwood, urging his support of legislation that would give tax relief to agricultural landowners, according to Edward Bredemeyer of Winters, county FB president.

According to Bredemeyer, FB supports provisions of HB 759, either separately, or as part of HB 1060, a tax relief package bill that has been reported out of committee in the Legislature.

Bredemeyer said that HB 1060 needs amending in four areas to conform to provisions of HB 759:

Language ensuring that taxes are not raised by the Act; a capitalization rate of 15 percent (the higher the rate, the lower the tax value of the

land); administration by the State Comptroller other than the School Tax Assessment Practices Board; and language clarifying definition of "net to land" to ensure that cash lease or share lease terms would be the first priority rather than owner-operator budget.

### Cattle Buildup Possible

The liquidation phase of the current cattle cycle may be ending and some herd buildup may begin during 1979, believes a livestock marketing specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Dr. Ed Uvacek foresees this possibility after analyzing the latest U.S. cattle and calf inventory report released by the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

"The most surprising statistic in the report was the 5 percent drop in the 1978 calf crop compared to 1977," notes Uvacek.

He says this lower calf crop accounted for the large drop in numbers of calves held over on Jan. 1. When compared to the number of cows and heifers that have calved on Jan. 1, the calving percentage is as bad as that reported in 1975 and is only slightly better than the 1977 level.

"Overall, the decrease in cattle and calf numbers during 1978 was much less than in 1977," says Uvacek. "In fact, seven states actually recorded gains."

While total numbers of beef cows were reported down 5 percent, there were 13 states which had just as many or more beef cows than a year ago. Similarly, even though beef replacement heifers were down 6 percent nationally, 15 different states reported gains.

Uvacek points out that a substantial proportion of "other heifers" can be shifted into the replacement category if producers so choose. Also, many heifer calves under 500 pounds could find their way into breeding programs during 1979.

"The possibility of a nationwide gain in cattle numbers during this year looks quite likely," contends Uvacek.

"Pecans with their many problems still represent a profitable part of any home garden

or fruit planting," believes Johnson. "The important thing is to make the right variety selection to help insure your chance of success."

## Accent On Health

Hurry! Hurry! Step right up and get the miracle potion guaranteed to cure your backache, tuberculosis, asthma and chest pains! Does this sound like something out of a traveling medicine show from days gone by?

These so-called miracle cures, unfortunately, do exist in the minds of many, and at least one of them can cause liver damage when consumed in large quantities.

A tea popular with Chicanos and some native American Indian tribes—especially those in the Southwest—is purchased in Mexican markets and as far north as Chicago, says one medical researcher, Dr. Ryan Huxtable, pharmacologist at the University of Arizona, says "the tea—gordolobos—can cause severe liver damage and lead to death, especially when the folk remedy is given to children." He says it "may be carcinogenic when taken in smaller doses over extended periods and can damage the endothelial lining, and ultimately can cause pulmonary obstruction."

"Along the Texas-Mexico border, use of the gordolobos tea is proving of consequence in treatment of tuberculosis," says Dr. Earl Gorby, Medical Director for Tuberculosis Control of the Texas Department of Health's Public Health Region 3 in El Paso.

Dr. Gorby said the tea can do strange things to the liver, and he cited the case written up in the September issue of AMA Medical News of a six-month old girl with cirrhosis caused by the folk medicine. In another case mentioned in the magazine, a two-month old baby was given gordolobos, became unconscious and could not be revived when brought to the hospital.

Patients taking potent medications for tuberculosis must be checked for any signs of side effects from the drugs, said Dr. Gorby. "When a patient under treatment is taking both TB drugs and gordolobos, it is hard to sort out which is causing the problem. In some cases we may have to abort treatment," he said.

"Use of herbs is in widespread practice along the border as folk medicine. In fact, it's almost universal," said Dr. Gorby. "And, it isn't limited to the less educated and those in the lower economic groups. Many of the more well-to-do still use grandma's old medicine, figuring it

guaje (calabash, or gourd) and leave overnight. The concoction was to be sipped three times daily.

"He promised me a cure for tuberculosis in three months," said Lane. "I was told the tea was good also for backache, asthma, tuberculosis or any chest problem."

Dr. Gorby further stated, "The realization of the effects of gordolobos may lead to a change in interviewing tuberculosis patients. We don't ordinarily take a herb medical history, but we may start doing it."

The plants from which the teas are derived grow throughout Mexico, as well as in the Southwest and Western United States.

The tea goes by the common names of tansy ragwort, fat wolf herb, groundsel and mullen. It contains the toxic substance pyrrolizidine, an unusual class of alkaloids.

During a recent visit to El Paso, several Texas health workers made a trip across the border to Juarez in search of a herbalist selling the raw products for the tea. They included Dr. Gorby; Kathy Penrose, TB nurse consultant in Region 8, Houston; Larry Sobera and Lee Lane of TB Control, Austin, and Carmen Quezada, R.N., and Sylvia Albreo, L.V.N., El Paso.

Lane said the herbalist, speaking through Ms. Abreo as an interpreter, made many claims about the curative powers of the tea. The ingredients were bought for a dollar. Lane said he was told to boil the gordolobos and, when cool, to pour it into the

### Select Disease-Resistant Pecan Trees

Pecan trees can add significantly to any home landscape or home fruit planting. However, special attention should be given to selecting disease-resistant varieties, says a plant pathologist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

that Texas homeowners have to control on pecans is pecan scab," points out Dr. Jerral Johnson. "Pecan scab is caused by a fungus. Once infection occurs, small black spots form on the shucks and tree foliage. Heavily infected pecans drop prematurely or may be poorly filled."

Trees infected with pecan scab early in the season often become severely defoliated, says Johnson. This defoliation

can reduce the quality of the current season's pecan crop and can also reduce crops for the next two to three years.

"A number of excellent varieties are resistant to this fungus, including Choctaw, Cheyenne, Shawnee and Desirable. Homeowners that annually receive 28 inches or more rainfall should select varieties within this group," recommends Johnson. "These four varieties have good size and will perform well in most areas of Texas."

In western areas, scab is not a major limiting factor, so other varieties can be used with good success, according to the plant pathologist. Varieties such as Wichita and Western can be grown in these areas with little chance of loss due to scab. However, these varieties have a disease known as stem end blight. This is caused by a fungus that results in severe loss of pecans late in the season. This loss can amount to as much as 25 percent of the crop.

Although certain varieties have resistance to pecan scab, a limited spray program will normally have to be followed if they are to be grown profitably in humid areas of Texas, contends Johnson. By using a resistant variety, the spray program in many areas can be reduced from seven to four or possibly three applications during a season. In drier areas

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
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# Cancer Crusade Begins

## Burning lignite

AUSTIN, Texas (Spl.)

University of Texas engineers are engaged in a major research effort to study the conditions necessary for successfully producing gas by burning lignite underground.

The process of underground coal gasification (in situ — or in place — gasification) has the potential for recovering energy from deep deposits of coal at least 200 feet below the surface where it is not economical to mine by conventional methods. Dr. Tom Edgar, a UT chemical engineer, believes commercialization of the process may be possible by the mid 1980's.

Gas produced by burning lignite underground could be used to generate electric power or in the manufacture of chemicals.
