## Work On City Park Will Get Underway

After many months—actually years—of planning, and changing of plans, changing of drawings, and re-applications for funds, hopes of Winters residents apparently are going to be realized. The City of Winters this week is advertising for bids for certain construction work on the proposed new city park, which includes renovation of the present park.

Applications for matching funds from a federal agency have been approved, according to city officials, and the city is ready to begin work. The federal funds are being administered by the State Parks & Wildlife Dept.

Cost of the project will be \$64,500, according to officials, with the city providing one-half of this amount. However, the city's share may be "in kind"—that is, work done by city crews will be counted as cash spent on the project.

According to the plans (see accompanying drawing) the existing tennis courts will be resurfaced, with concrete, and an additional tennis court will be constructed north of the present courts. The road leading into the park will be changed, and the present entrance which circles the gazebo will be eliminated. That area will be grassed.

The entire parking area around the Community Center will be paved, with steel posts and steel pipe protecting the tennis courts, the picnic and playground areas, and the community center from traffic. They also are to pave the street leading from Novice road to the entrance of the park.

The entire park area will be surrounded with chain link fence, and there is some talk that the one entrance into the park will be

so constructed that a steel gate can be installed, so the park will not be accessible after late evening hours.

Plans are to light the two south tennis courts, and lights will probably be installed at other places in the park.

Preliminary dirt work should begin at the park within a few days, and bids for the concrete work will be opened May 21.

Aldermen Randy Springer and Jim Hatler have been instrumental in getting this park project moving.

### Animal Control Officer Had Busy Month

Franklin O'Dell, Winters' Animal Control Officer, has made his presence felt among the stray dog population, and had an extremely busy month in April.

During the month, O'Dell has picked up 123 stray dogs, 12 cats, and of great importance, has destroyed 18 skunks within the city limits. Reduction of the skunk population within the city will make a big difference in the danger of rabies among domestic animals, it was indicated. However, it has been stressed, for every skunk seen there probably are many more in hiding. Residents should be very cautious around these animals, it was warned.

From all indications, the animal control department of the city has been receiving cooperation from most everyone. There still are many dogs running loose—owned and strays—which will be caught. Pet owners have been reminded by city officials that the animal control ordinance calls for confinement of all dogs, and use of leashes when dogs are out of pens or yards. Stiff penalties may be imposed on violators, it was warned.

Valedictorian and salutatorian of the Class of 1979, Winters High School, were named this week. Reggie Boles is valedictorian of the class, and Terry Gerhart is salutatorian.

These students and others will be honored at a special awards assembly in the high school auditorium next week.

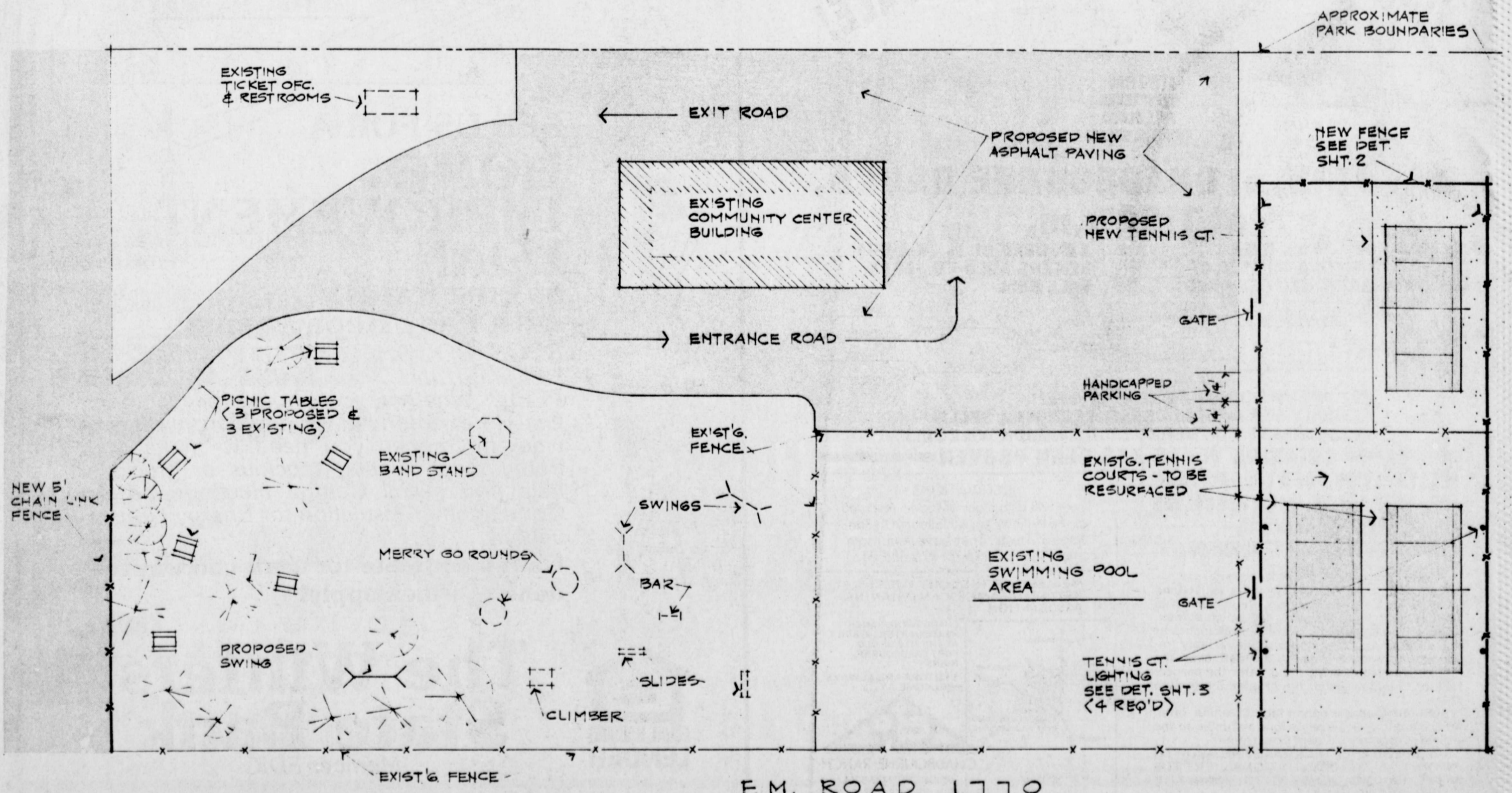
### Ladies' Golf Tournament Set Saturday

### Small-Size Envelopes and Cards To Be Outdated July 15

"Use your small and undersized envelopes and cards before July 15," Winters' Postmaster H. M. (Jiggs) Nichols reminds customers. That is the date when the Postal Service's new size standards become effective.

The Winters postmaster said that after July 15, envelopes and cards measuring less than 3 1/2 inches high or 5 inches long will be returned to the sender if mailed.

Nichols said that because the envelope and greeting card industries have had more than three years to prepare for the new standards, few retailers should still be selling undersized pieces.

"Many consumers, however, are likely to still have smaller envelopes and cards in their supply of stationery," Nichols said.

The regulations also

prohibit flimsy cards. In the future, they must be at least seven-thousandths (.007) of an inch thick. An official postal card, for instance, has a thickness of nine-thousandths of an inch.

Undersized pieces and flimsy cards are being banned because they can become trapped in other mail, tear and jam mail processing machinery. As a result, the letters of others can also be damaged.

"The standards also affect oversized and odd-shaped pieces of mail," Nichols said. For first class mail weighing one ounce or less, there will be a surcharge of 7 cents for pieces more than 6 1/8 inches high or 11 1/2 inches long.

For more information, the postmaster suggests customers check with a post office window clerk.

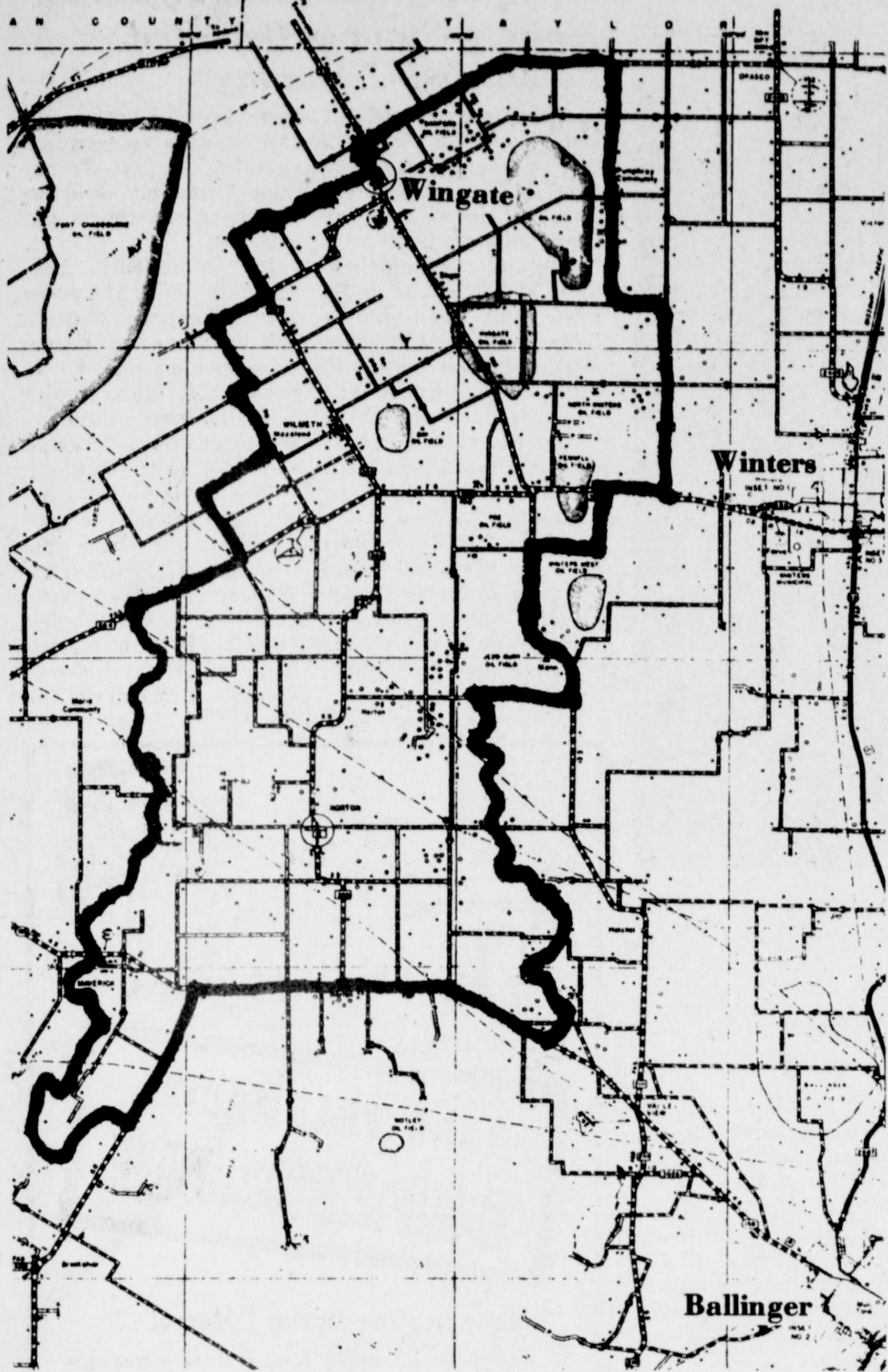

## Some Types of Sprays Prohibited

All spraying of hormone type herbicides in part of northwestern Runnels County is prohibited between May 10 and Sept. 1, according to county extension agent Dale C. Brandenberger.

A resolution was passed by the Runnels County Commissioners' Court some years ago to prohibit such spraying. The action was taken following recommendations of a committee named to study the effects of this type of herbicides. The order still is in effect, it was announced.
