

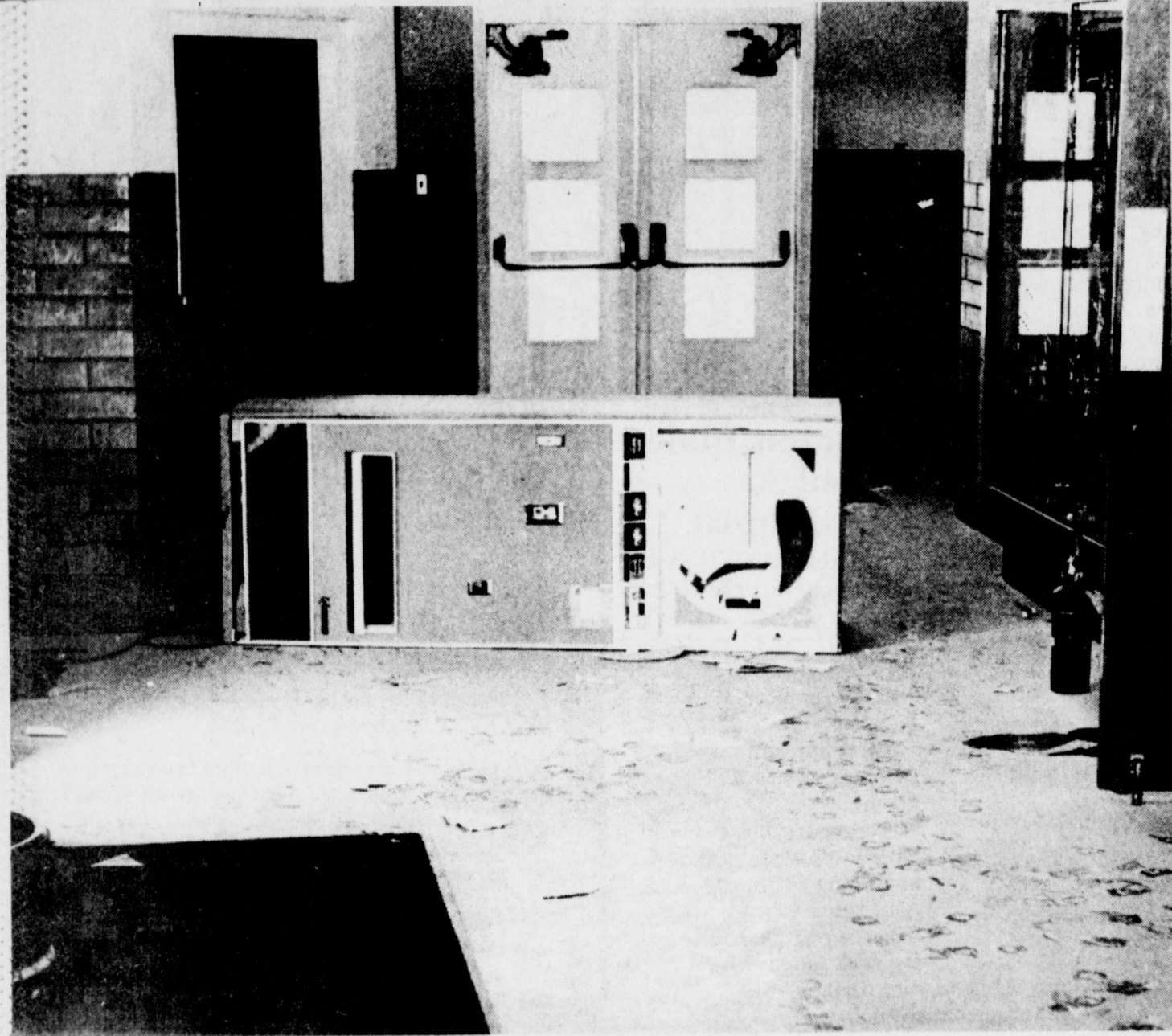

Vandals Hit School Saturday Night

Classes in Winters Public Schools were dismissed last Friday afternoon, but on Saturday night there was considerable activity in the high school building and the high school gymnasium.

Vandals hit the school building and gym, leaving behind a trail of broken windows, scattered papers, broken plumbing, and opened snack and drink dispensing machines.

Superintendent of Schools Tommy Lancaster discovered the damage early Sunday morning, and called law enforcement officers, who this week are searching for the offenders.

Entry into the high school building was through a window, which was damaged little; but inside, it was a different story. The vandals broke a glass leading to the office of the school counselor, and broken glass was all over the outer office floor and the hall

floor. In the counselor's office, the desk had been searched, papers strewn about, and two small metal cash boxes were left on top of the desk. Lancaster said he did not think there was much cash in the boxes, however.

In the chemistry lab, the vandals broke a water faucet from a sink, and scattered papers. In a third floor classroom, a drawer had been pulled from the teacher's desk, and papers scattered about the room. In the teachers' lounge, grade cards had been thrown about, and other papers were scattered.

Two dispensing machines in the students' lounge had been opened, and there may have been some small change taken, it was said. However, there was no evidence that the doors on the machines had been forced. Supt. Lancaster

said the vandals undoubtedly had known where the keys were kept, and opened the machines.

In the lobby of the gym, a soft drink dispensing machine had been pushed over onto its side, but indications were that it had not been opened. The vandals also forced open a ticket window in the gym, and had done considerable damage to contents of the coaches' office. The vandals also took a fire extinguisher from the wall and sprayed the gym lobby and about half the gym floor with the foam.

Police officers noted some tracks in the foam dust in the gym, which may serve to lead to the apprehension of the vandals.

There was no structural damage done to the buildings, it was indicated.

Group Forms To Promote Museum

Winters has promise of a museum, the realization of a dream of many people in this area for years.

At a meeting last Wednesday evening, a group of people interested in forming a museum foundation met in the Chamber of Commerce offices and laid the groundwork for the organization, electing temporary officers and a nominating committee to recommend permanent officers. The group named Marvin Jones temporary chairman, and Mrs. Edna England temporary secretary. The nominating committee was to meet Wednesday of this week to pick a list of officer candidates for the permanent board.

However, the highlight of last week's meeting was the promise of a building to house the proposed museum. Mrs. Z. I. Hale told the group she and her daughters

will offer the building used by her late husband, Dr. Z. I. Hale, as a clinic, "so long as the building is used as a museum site." The two-story building is located on the second block of West Dale Street, and is ideally situated. There are several rooms on each floor, it was noted, and there would be little renovation necessary to accommodate a museum. Also, it was noted, there is additional open ground space adjacent to the building which could be utilized in the future.

At the meeting Wednesday, after the group learned of the offer made by Mrs. Hale and her daughters, it was suggested that the museum be named the "Col. Z. I. Hale Museum." Dr. Hale, an optometrist, was a veteran of World War II, was in the U. S. Air Force during the war, and was in the Air Force Reserves for many

years, and retired as a Lieutenant Colonel.

Marvin Jones explained some of the things which should be done in forming a museum foundation, and members of the group plan to visit other museums in the area to become familiar with what can be done.

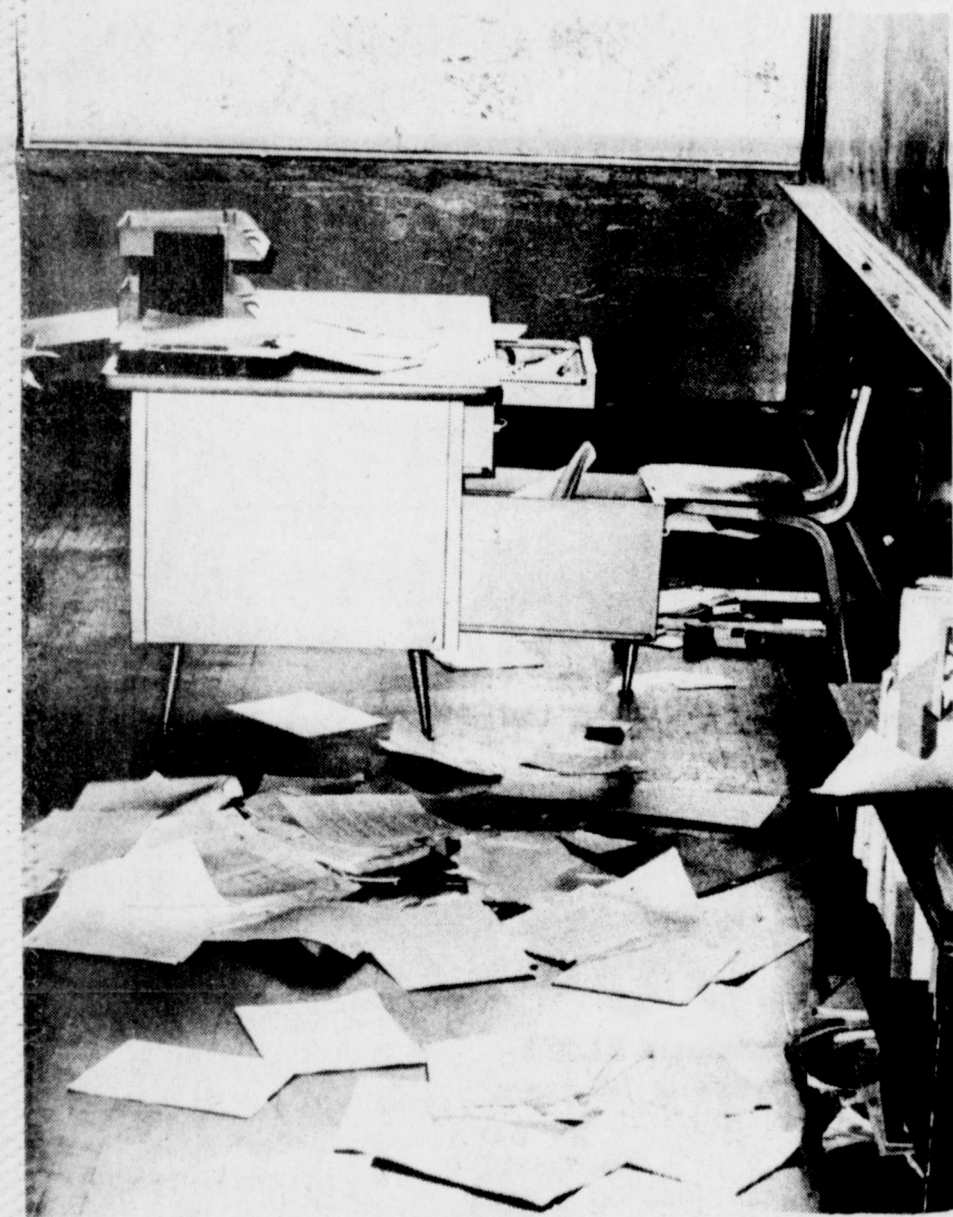
Funeral services will be at 10:30 a.m. Friday in St. John's Lutheran Church in Winters.

He married Esther Eswine in 1977 in Ohio.

Survivors include his wife; a son, Theodore of Seguin; three daughters, Mrs. Russell Schneider of Johnson City, Margaret Kieke of Florida and Esther of Austin; a stepson, Thomas L. Eswine of Amherst, Ohio; two stepdaughters, Mrs. James DiRizza of Golden City, Colo., and Mrs. Charles Peters of Towell, Ohio; three brothers, Dr. Paul Wolber of Hagerstown, Md., the Rev. Herbert Wolber of Endlewood, Fla., and the Rev. David Wolber of Lake Park, Fla.; a sister Mrs. Karl Behling of Oconomowoc, Wisc., and five grandchildren.

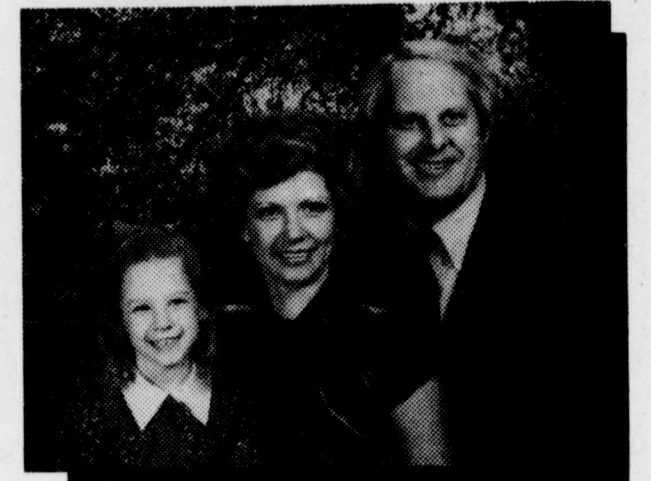

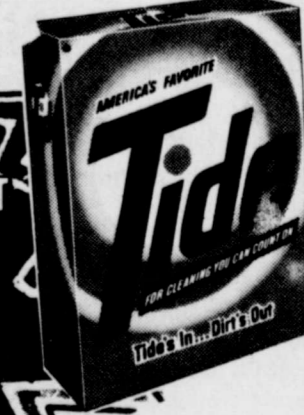

Public Hearing Notice

The City of Winters, 310 South Main, Winters, Texas 79567, has applied to the Texas Department of Water Resources for renewal and amendment of Permit No. 10320-01, which presently authorizes a discharge of treated domestic sewage effluent, during an interim period, at a volume not to exceed 160,000 gallons per day average and an ultimate volume not to exceed 390,000 gallons per day average, from the sewage treatment facilities located southeast of Winters, approximately 4,000 feet east and 1,000 feet south of the intersection of FM Road 53 and U. S. Highway 83 in Runnels County, Texas. The expiration of the existing permit is August 27, 1979. It is proposed that the expiration date be specified as midnight, five years after the date of Commission approval.

Since the existing facility regulated by the permit is an oxidation pond plant, the applicant has also requested that the interim effluent limitations in the permit be amended consistent with current oxidation pond effluent standards in Texas Department of Water Resources Rules 156.18.05.001-.004. The requested amendment would increase the presently authorized 30-day average total suspended solids limitations from 30 milligrams per liter to 90 milligrams per liter and would delete chlorination requirements. The currently authorized interim effluent discharge volume of 160,000 gallons per day would be increased to 220,000 gallons per day, but the pattern and place of discharge would not be changed by the amendment. The proposed amendment would also extend the proposed interim effluent discharge limitations until completion of proposed construction of new facilities, at which time the authorized ultimate discharge volume of 390,000 gallons per day would be reduced to 320,000 gallons per day and the final effluent discharge limitations would become effective.

The effluent is utilized for irrigation on adjacent cropland, but the permit authorizes discharge into Bluff Creek; thence to Elm Creek; thence to the Colorado River.
