There are 10 candidates for the top office. Elec-

tion will be held Friday at Lubbock. Candidates are spending this week campaigning and soliciting votes from the several thousand FFAers in convention, and participating in other organization activities.

Gerhart not only is representing Area IV, and the Big Country District, he will be representing the FFA chapter which holds the No. 1 charter in the state, the Winters Future Farmers of America chapter.

Answer To Come Friday On EMS

Runnels County Judge Bill Stultz said Tuesday he will make his decision and vote Friday of this week to break a tie vote among the county commissioners on the matter of leasing the County Emergency Medical Service to a private individual.

In a called meeting Monday to deal with the leasing proposition, commissioners voted two for and two against accepting the proposal submitted by Glenn W. Pratt of Sweetwater to take over the emergency service. Judge Stultz said after the tie vote that he wanted some time to study the proposal before making a decision, and said he may break the tie during the regular meeting Tuesday. However, shortly after noon Tuesday, he said he would call another meeting for Friday, at which time he would announce his decision.

Commissioners heard two proposals Monday, from persons seeking to take over the emergency service, to operate with a subsidy from the county. Proposals

were from Pratt and Bob McDaniel of Ballinger. After hearing and examining the proposals Monday morning, Commissioner Pat Pritchard from Precinct 3 moved that the county accept the proposal made by Pratt; this motion was seconded by David Carroll, Commissioner from Prec. 2. On vote, Pritchard and Carroll voted aye, with Commissioner Charles E. Bradshaw, Prec. 1, and Commissioner Marvin Salling, Prec. 4, voting against Pratt's proposal, leaving the final decision to the County Judge.

The proposal submitted by McDaniel was not called to the floor and not voted upon.

Several weeks ago, the commissioners accepted a similar proposal made by Pratt, but later were informed that their action was not legal inasmuch as a call for bids or proposals was not advertised for a specified length of time, as required by state statute. The commissioners wiped the slate clean, rescinding all previous action, and met Monday to deal with the matter.

PRATT'S PROPOSAL

In his proposal, Pratt, asked for a five-year contract with the county, with an annual subsidy of \$69,600 to be paid by the county. He proposed to purchase two "high top" ambulance units, to be stationed at Winters and Ballinger, for a total of \$34,000. This would come from the annual subsidy. These units would meet federal specifications, he said, and would allow the emergency technicians room to work and provide the best care to patients, with room for proper equipment.

Pratt proposed to hire three people to man the Ballinger unit

on a rotating basis, and two for the Winters unit. These people would be highly trained and properly certified to operate the emergency ambulances, he indicated. He also indicated he would upgrade the service to provide the best of service to the people of Runnels County, and would require crews to maintain and improve qualifications. It was understood that he would spend full time in operating and administering the service.

McDANIEL'S PROPOSAL

In his proposal—which was not acted upon by the commissioners Monday—Bob McDaniel asked for a three-year contract with the county. McDaniel asked for an annual subsidy of \$64,200. He said the ambulance service would be "kept as it is with units in Ballinger and in Winters." He also said the best of service and trained personnel would be provided for both Winters and Ballinger units.

Also, Director Pace said, a pre-school meeting will be called for beginning band members, on a date to be announced. At that time, all beginners and their parents will be asked to be present to make plans for the year, and to discuss instruments, etc.

When I met Margurite Noble in Huffman's Cafeteria back in the summer of 1977 with a copy of my article on Nancy Parker clutched in her hand, I learned that she was a granddaughter of Mrs. Parker.

Her sister from Santa Monica, California sent her the story and she had driven a thousand miles from her home in Parson, Arizona to see the cabin. We spent a pleasant afternoon reviewing the Parker history and both Mrs. Noble and her husband photographed the

cabin and surroundings from all angles.

Mrs. Noble was a daughter of Daniel Parker and her family was having a reunion as soon as she reached home. She also mentioned that she had written a short memoir for the New York Times about her early life.

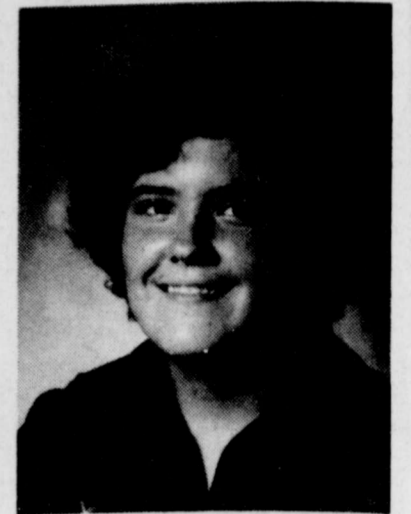

delight, Cynthia, also a writer, presented me with a complimentary copy of FILAREE, which had just been published by Random House.

Soon to be a CBS television mini-series starring Lily Tomlin, Filaree, says Publisher's Weekly, is "American social history in its best fictional expression... a memorable portrait of a woman fighting to survive."

FILAREE is the Spanish-American name for a tenacious livestock forage that survives, even thrives, against all odds—just as does Melissa Baker, the heroine of the novel, who spends barren, work-worn years, with a position little above that of chattel, married to a man she does not love.

Margurite Noble was born in 1910 in the rugged, remote Tonto Basin area, where her parents had a cattle ranch. The last of eight children, she attended a one-room school and grew up in the unsettled frontiers of Arizona cow country.

She came to write Filaree because she has always been at odds with the popular notion that the West was won by men. Her early childhood left her with vivid memories of the role of women and their share in calming this pioneer territory.

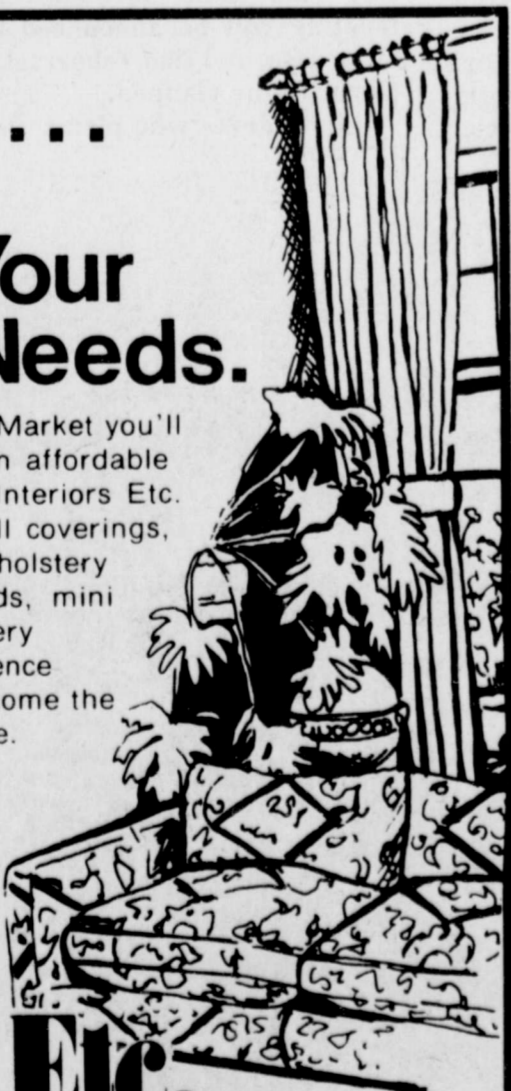

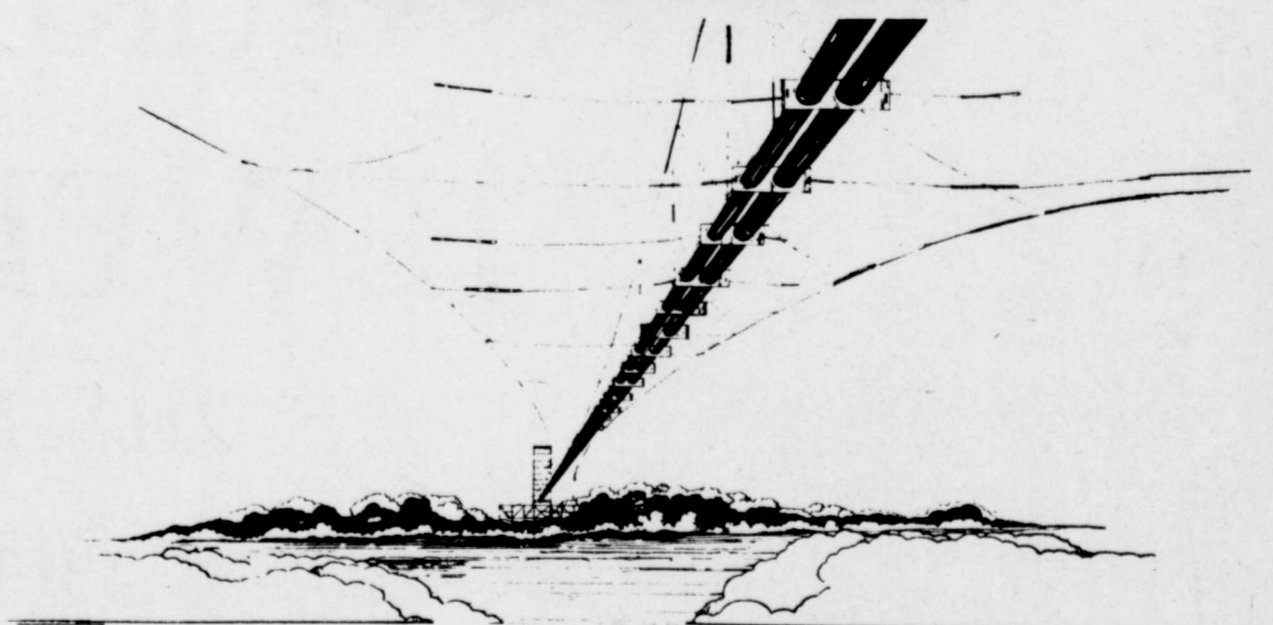
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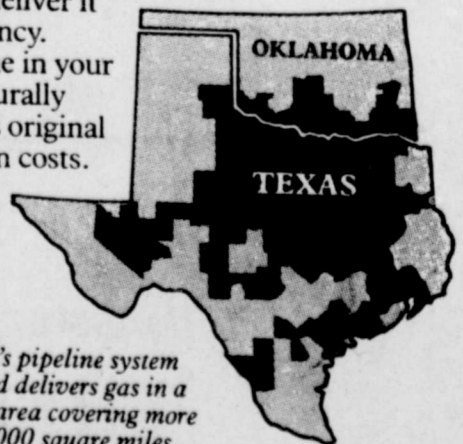

Don't store canned goods in a hot place, cautions Mary K. Sweeten, a foods and nutrition specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

Whether moving, going on vacation or having just too many canned goods on hand, storing them in the trunks of cars, garages, attics, near steam pipes, radiators, furnaces or kitchen ranges is not recommended, the specialist points out.

The best storage for all canned goods is a

moderately cool, dry place.

The increase in temperature caused by storage in warm places may permit thermophilic organisms to grow. They grow best at temperatures between 15 and 250 degrees F. (8.3 to 13.9 degrees C.).

In canned goods, these thermophilic bacteria can survive the heating process. They cause gas formation in the canned good and a poor-quality product, Mrs. Sweeten explains.

However, they do not cause any significant public health threat.

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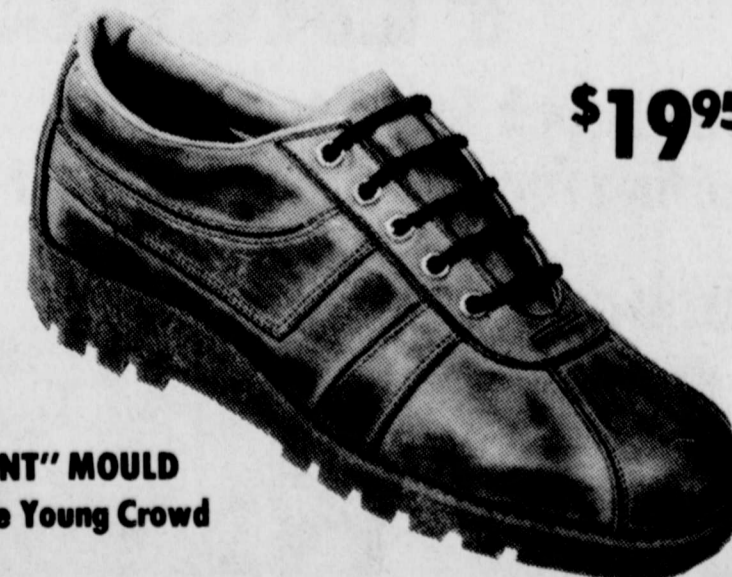
