On the faculty are Jane Wyatt, kindergarten and first grade; Pam Jones, second and third grades; Susan Mostad, science; Andrea England, language arts and coach; Tonya Hoeflein, social studies; and Virginia Lee, migrant teacher.

Other school employees are Shirley Hill, tax assessor-collector and bookkeeper; Sharon McGinnis, migrant aide; Janice West, teacher aide; Sue Baize, Title I reading; Carolyn Sims, migrant nurse; Bill Roberts, special education; Manuel Ververde, custodian and bus driver; Anna Faye King, dietician; and Bennie Walker, assistant dietician.

Supt. Schoenfeld also coaches. The school district operates one bus route.

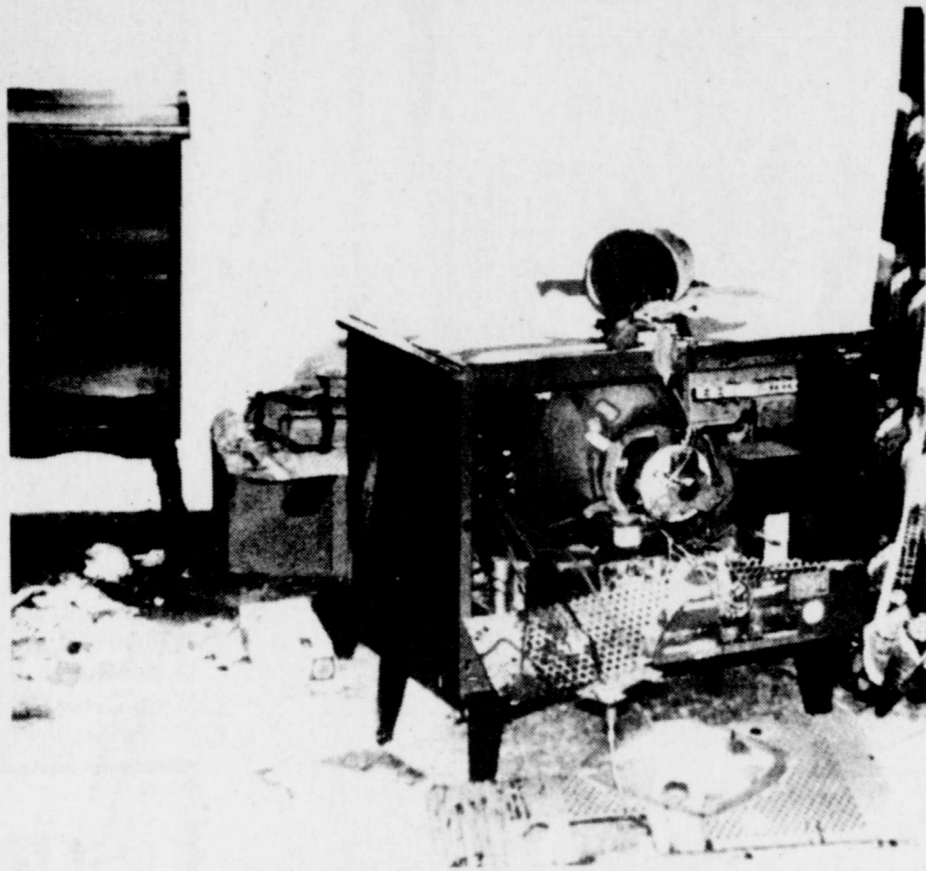

Home Ransacked

Few things in the house were left untouched and undamaged Saturday night as some person or persons entered the home of Betty Sue Gray in South Winters and committed acts of vandalism

but in the picture of the destroyed television set one can see the floor which had been thrown on the carpet. Ms. Gray said a clock had stopped at 10:57 p.m. on the night of the vandalism.

which are indescribable.

Every room in the house was visited, and most every item was damaged or destroyed. Flour was thrown on the carpets and floors of each room; a television set was kicked in and destroyed; chairs and sofas were upset and the upholstery cut or ripped. In the kitchen, the refrigerator had been opened and contents removed; catsup and syrup had been poured over the cooking range and floor; electrical cords on small appliances had been cut.

In a back bedroom, a water bed had been slashed allowing the water to run all over the room. Prized lamps were broken, along with other room furnishings. Bed linens were ripped or cut with a sharp instrument. Radios had been destroyed, and clothing ripped or slashed.

In another bedroom, the mattress had been slashed, and bed linens slashed. Other items in the room had been smashed and destroyed. Not one item of clothing in a walk-in closet was missed as the vandal slashed into everything, probably with a sharp knife.

School Begins Sept. 4

Teachers who will staff Winters Public School for the 1979-80 school year have been attending inservice training and teacher work days this week, and the school year will begin next Tuesday, Sept. 4.

Buses will run on schedule, with classes to begin at 8:30. Classes will be dismissed at 2:30 p.m. Tuesday afternoon, and buses will make regular runs. The regular schedule will be resumed on Wednesday.

Most high school students have

been pre-registered, and many elementary and junior high students have registered. However, those students who will be attending for the first time in Winters Public Schools are asked to register this week if possible, so that schedules can be made.

Parents who have doubts about required immunizations for children entering schools should contact the school principals.

Students in the elementary

grades and in junior high will find their names on the doors of the classrooms to which they have been assigned.

Superintendent of Schools Tommy Lancaster reports that all vacancies have been filled on the faculty, and teacher assignments have been completed. Fund Drive To Begin For Hospital Equipment

A campaign will begin within the next few days to attempt to raise funds to purchase at least two pieces of much-needed equipment for the laboratory of North Runnels Hospital, Ted Meyer, chairman of the special hospital equipment fund committee, announced this week.

At least \$14,000 will be needed, Meyer said, to purchase an automatic cell counter and a sodium-potassium testing machine.

Clay Miller, supervisor of the hospital, and Meyer said the cell counter is more accurate than the manual method now used in the

hospital lab. Also, they said, testing is more rapid and the machine would provide much more information. They said the lab technician can perform other duties while the machine is in operation. Cost of this machine would be approximately \$8,000.

The second machine needed, they said, is one which would test for sodium and potassium. Blood for sodium-potassium tests is now forwarded to Abilene, which causes delays in receiving results, it was stated. Results of these tests would be doubly delayed if specimens were sent to Abilene at the start of the weekend, they said. Cost of this equipment

would be approximately \$6,000, it was said.

A concentrated drive will begin within a few days in an attempt to raise the needed funds, it was stated. Those wishing to make donations to the fund for these particular items may contact Miller at the hospital, Nelan Bahlman at Spill Furniture, Ted Meyer at the Winters Funeral Home, or send contributions to P.O. Box 395, Winters, Tex. 79567.

Drive committee members said that recognition plaques will be placed at the hospital for those individuals or businesses making contributions of \$1,000 or more.

The use of the Scan-O-Preg machine to determine pregnancy in sheep will be demonstrated by Dr. George Ahlschwede, Sheep Specialist, on Tuesday, Sept. 4 at 6 p.m. on Mrs. Bill Bredemeyer's farm, 2 1/2 miles west of Winters (off the old highway).

The Scan-O-Preg is very accurate at 75-90 day pregnancy if proper technique and procedure

is used, according to Allen E. Turner, County Extension Agent. Turner stresses however that any person planning on using the instrument needs to attend and receive the instruction.

Dr. Ahlschwede will also speak briefly on ways to increase lamb crop percentages and factors influencing fertility in sheep. The program will last approximately one hour.

The keynote speaker will be State Representative Dan Kubiak. Sponsors are Texas Farmers Union and the Center for Energy Research at Texas Tech University.

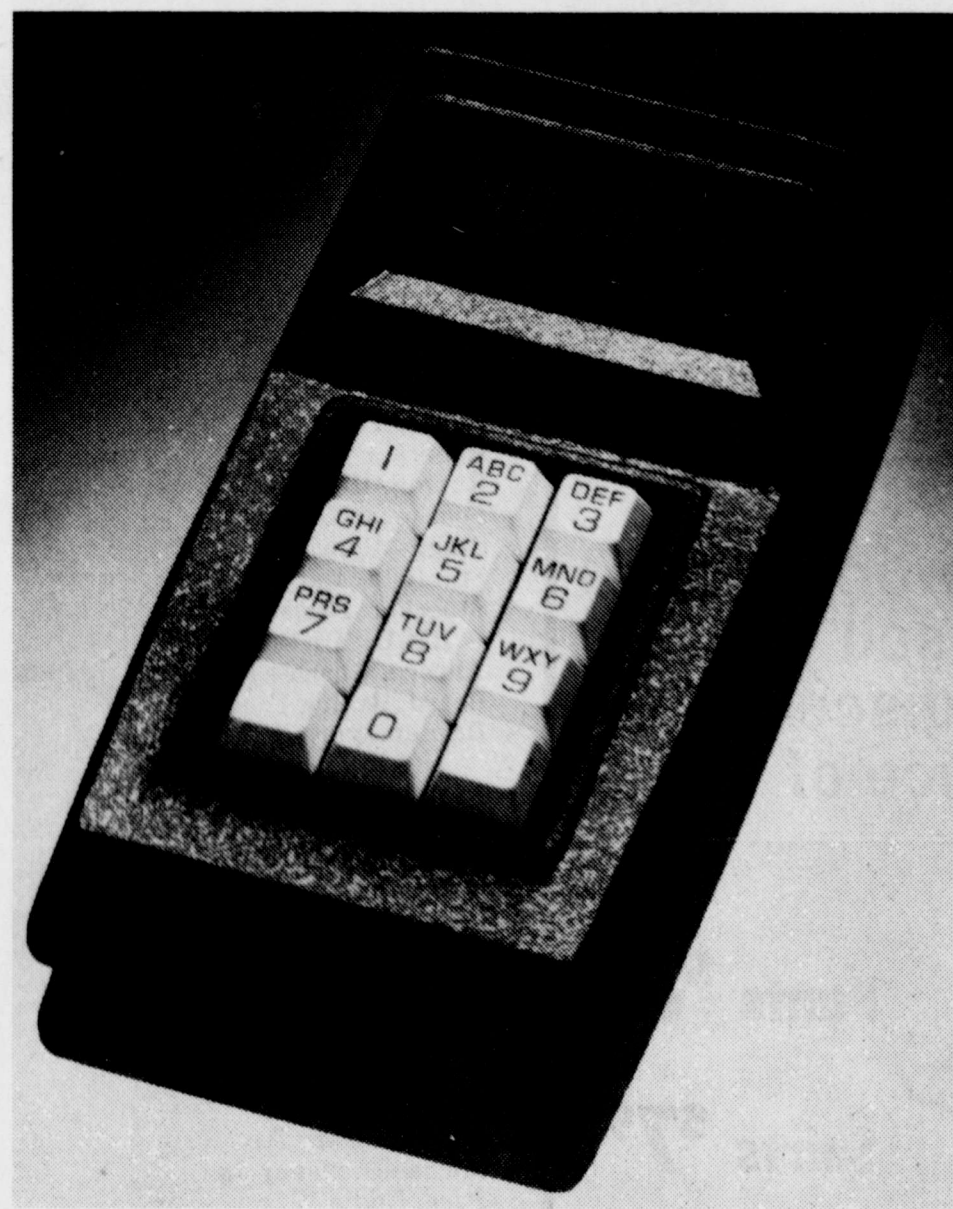

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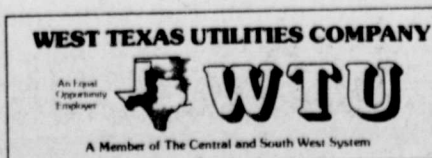
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40 Years

City Gets \$6,195 From Sales Taxes

The City of Winters has received \$6,196.45 as the city's share in the one-percent city sales tax for the August allocation from the State Comptroller's office. This is an increase from the net payment of \$3,054.90 for the same period in 1978. A total of \$51,650.63 has been received by Winters during 1979, a 23 percent increase over the \$41,759.86 for the same period last year.

State Comptroller Bob Bullock said the August allocations for the more than 900 Texas cities are running about 12 percent higher than August payments last year, and that the yearly total is up 25 percent over the amounts cities received during the same period in 1978.

Total monetary damage could not be estimated by Ms. Gray, as everything

of any value in the house had been damaged or destroyed.

In more than 40 years of viewing damage done by vandals, this reporter has never seen anything comparable to the wanton destruction in the Gray home.

Local police were called, but said they could find no clues. It was not possible, they said, to lift identifiable fingerprints, either on the premises or from bottles they took to police headquarters.

Police said they had no suspects, but will continue the investigation. Ms. Gray had named a possible suspect, and police advised her to notify the police in the city where the suspect supposedly lives; they said they could not notify the other police because they had no "probable cause."

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
