Fund Drive To Begin For Hospital Equipment

A campaign will begin within the next few days to attempt to raise funds to purchase at least two pieces of much-needed equipment for the laboratory of North Runnels Hospital, Ted Meyer, chairman of the special hospital equipment fund committee, announced this week.

At least \$14,000 will be needed, Meyer said, to purchase an automatic cell counter and a sodium-potassium testing

Clay Miller, supervisor of the hospital, and Meyer said the cell counter is more accurate than the manual method now used in the hospital lab. Also, they said, testing is more rapid and the machine would provide much more information. They said the lab technician can perform other duties while the machine is in operation. Cost of this machine would be approximately \$8,000.

The second machine needed, they said, is one which would test for sodium and potassium. Blood for sodium-potassium tests is now forwarded to Abilene, which causes delays in receiving results, it was stated. Results of these tests would be doubly delayed if specimens were sent to Abilene at the start of the weekend, they said. Cost of this equipment

would be approximately \$6,000, it was said.

A concentrated drive will begin within a few days in an attempt to raise the needed funds, it was stated. Those wishing to make donations to the fund for these particular items may contact Miller at the hospital, Nelan Bahlman at Spill Furniture, Ted Meyer at the Winters Funeral Home, or send contributions to P.O. Box 395, Winters, Tex. 79567.

Drive committee members said that recognition plaques will be placed at the hospital for those individuals or businesses making contributions of \$1,000 or more.

City Gets \$6,195 From Sales Taxes

The City of Winters has received \$6,196.45 as the city's share in the one-percent city sales tax for the August allocation from the State Comptroller's office. This is an increase from the net payment of \$3,054.90 for the same period in 1978. A total of \$51,650.63 has been received by Winters during 1979, a 23 percent increase over the \$41,759.86 for the same period last year.

State Comptroller Bob Bullock said the August allocations for the more than 900 Texas cities are running about 12 percent higher than August payments last year, and that the yearly total is up 25 percent over the amounts cities received during the same period in 1978.
