

## Mrs. H. Throne Burned Seriously In Flash Explosion

Mrs. Howard Throne was burned, seriously in a flash fire Friday morning at 5:30. The accident occurred at the Howard Soggin farm eleven miles northeast of Dimmitt.

Mrs. Throne turned on the light switch in the front room which set off a terrible explosion. The top of the roof over the front room was blown off and all of the windows in the house were shattered. Fire was blown throughout the house by the explosion. The home burned almost instantly.

The Throne family escaped with just the clothes they were wearing according to Mrs. Howard Scoggin. Mrs. Throne received serious third degree burns as her clothes caught fire.

She was taken to West Texas Hospital in Amarillo by ambulance where she is still in critical condition. According to doctors' reports, Mrs. Throne has a chance for survival.

The Throne family assumed the cause of the fire and explosion was from butane which had accumulated in the house, say Mrs. Scoggin. The spark from the light switch ignited the gas.

## Fertilizer Meeting Brought to a Successful Close

The last of a three-series fertilizer meeting was conducted in the South Grade School cafeteria, last Wednesday night. Charles Hottel, county extension agent reported approximately 110 men received certificates.

Jim Richey of the John Deere Chemical Corp. and Jim Valentine, Extension Soil Chemist from Lubbock were special speakers at the first fertilizer meeting. They spoke concerning the fertilizer, nitrogen.

Dr. Bill Bennett, soil chemist for chemical Corp. brought the speech for the second meeting. His topic the International Mineral and was "Phosphate and the manufacture of Phosphate".

In the third and final meeting, Dr. R. L. Beacher, Agronomist National Plant Food Institute, Atlanta, Georgia was one of the featured speakers. He brought a lecture on "Soil Testing".

Dr. W. O. Trogdon, head of the Soil and Crop Sciences Department A & M College, brought the second lecture of the evening on "Fertilizer Use in a Sound Soil Management Program". He commented, "the best preparation for the competition of farming is a study of the science of agriculture so the successful farmer can practice the art of agriculture better than the average farmer does it".

Dr. Trogdon went on to, "The basis of good farming is good management". He said good management requires a knowledge of favorable and unfavorable factors such as weather, the supply and demand situation on the farm produce markets, insect pests, plant and animal diseases, the reliability of crop seed and variety, and the fertility factor of the soils on each farm.

The doctor said, "Profits in farming, like in any business venture, are the direct results of proper management and marketing".

At the close of this final meeting, Sherman Clark, secretary-treasurer of Texas Plant Food Educational Society presented the men with their certificates. Approximately 75 of the men receiving certificates were dealers or worked for a dealer. Eleven of the men were agency personnel. The remainder were area farmers.

Men were enrolled from Castro, Deaf Smith, Parmer, Swisher, Randall, Lamb, and Bailey counties.



## Farmer's Union Makes Resolutions For Convention

Farmer's Union Resolution Committee met last Wednesday evening in the Community Room of the First State Bank where they passed resolutions which would be taken to the Annual Convention for approval.

The following resolutions were adopted:

**Feed Grains**  
We of the Resolution's Committee (Castro Co.) Farmers Union advocate the following for Legislative purposes.

1. We are in favor of a mandatory program with a minimum of 20 per cent deduction, with payment for diverted acreage.

(a) Also with the option to each grower to divert an additional 30 per cent with payment.

2. A clause stating that should cotton be destroyed by adverse weather conditions the acres destroyed could be replanted in Feed Grain as a substitute crop and the grain produced on these acres could be sold, without penalty at the open market price.

3. We are in favor of the County Committee having the authority to adjust individual farm quotas for losses due to adverse weather conditions. Payment on Dv. Acres to be divided by the same percent as the crop rent payment crop rent payment, now is the time (a) We also recommend that Grain Sorghum be supported in relation to corn according to its competitive feed values.

What can I do? This question was asked several times after the film "The Ultimate Weapon" was shown to the High School. The film contained the studies of Dr. William E. Mayer. He had taken a survey of the Prisoners of War after they were returned from Korea.

Most P.O.W.'s unite in prison camps but the film brought out the fact that in the Korean War they didn't neither did they try to escape.

Completely new tactics were used with the prisoners. They expected harsh and cruel treatment, even torture. They were surprised when they were told that there were no work camps and that they would be let alone. However, when one strong member would try to organize the P.O.W.'s he was isolated from the rest of the group.

Once in a while they got mail, not the usual letter of encouragement from home, but the one of discontent. It was during this period of unorganization and hopelessness that most men died a "give-upitis".

After a few months they started having anti-capitalist class in which prisoners took part in discussion. Then there were confession periods in which each prisoner told something, usually a lie. As time went on they started telling the truth such as stealing food or medicine from the sick. These confessions made for less unity in camp.

The communist gave 4 reasons why the U. S. men wouldn't unite. They were:

1. The average American can't think independently - he prefers to go along with the group.
  2. He lacks confidence in his ability to solve problems on his own.
  3. He is self-seeking—lives only for himself.
  4. He has no standard of right and wrong—he will do anything for a price.
- Still you ask the question "What can I do?"
- What makes this question so overpowering is the loneliness it is born of, and that it produces. Often despair turns to hope when you learn that many other thoughtful Americans are growing concerned about the erosion of the American character. Effective action ignites from the shared thought more readily than from the secluded thought.
- When you begin to consider what you can do to help strengthen the moral fiber of America, remember that it was unraveled by individual acts. We must restore it in the same way.
