The Winters High School girls' basketball team is on a peak right now, and stand a very good chance of going higher and higher.

They wrapped up the championship of District 8-AA games back, and this week are keeping in shape before they enter bi-district play, against an opponent yet undetermined, and on a day and at a place not yet determined.

The girls have a record which would be the envy of many schools and teams — 25-3 for the season, and 13-1 for district.

It hasn't come easy, though. There are no real "tallies" on the Blizzardette team — stand them beside some teams, and they appear to be fairly short in stature for basketball champions. But height is not everything; it takes spunk, for one thing; and it takes desire; and it takes teamwork; and it takes coaching; and it takes two-way respect between team members and the coaches; and it takes a lot of respect among players themselves. These things seem to be present, and the results are in.

The community seems to be behind these girls, and will be with them when they go into bi-district, and then, hopefully, into regional, and on up the ladder. The girls and the coaches deserve the support — and the congratulations — of everyone in the community. I think they'll get it.

The boys' basketball team has been going great guns, too, and (at this writing) have some more playing to do . . . and could end up on top of the heap. The boys also have experienced their "valleys" in the past few seasons — but this could be a turnaround year.

Wouldn't it be great to have two district champion teams in one season?

Lady cagers to bi-district

The Winters High School girls' basketball team has wrapped up the District 8-AA championship, and are awaiting word on which team they will play in the next step up the ladder — bi-district.

The Blizzardettes' bi-district opponents will not be known until after Friday night. District 7-AA is locked in a tie situation, and the Winters girls could meet either one of three teams — Haskell, Munday or Quanah. The 7-AA winner will be determined Friday night.

Following the completion of 7-AA's playoffs, coaches and school administrators of the teams to represent that district and Winters will determine the site of the bi-district contest, and also the date on which it will be played. The game could be next Monday night or next Tuesday night.

The Winters girls were to meet the Blanket girls here Tuesday at 5 p. m. for a practice game, and will go to Comanche Friday for a practice session, before going into bi-district next week.

The Blizzardettes ended the regular season with a 25-3 record, and a district record of 13-1; they were 6-1 in the first half of district play, and 7-0 in the second half.

GT says one problem has been solved

Officials of General Telephone of the Southwest said Friday that one problem affecting Winters' telephone service has been found and corrected, and work is continuing to locate and correct other problems that have been plaguing the area.

Melvin Jennings, GT's Southwest Division manager, told *The Enterprise* that some late-night work had paid off when maintenance personnel using special equipment found a problem in the long distance service originating in Winters. The defective equipment in the Direct Distance Dialing (DDD) system was replaced, he said. The telephone company manager also said that additional personnel had been assigned to the local problems after *The Enterprise* had called attention to the problems. The work on solving the problems, Jennings said, is continuing on an around-the-clock basis.

March 2 is a tentative date for telephone company officials to meet with the Winters City Council to discuss the problems, the division manager said, and "what is being done to correct them," and to talk about new equipment due to be installed next summer.

Wingate teacher killed in highway accident

Funeral services were held Wednesday at 10 a. m. in Buffalo Gap Baptist Church for Imogene Lois Rayburn, 54, a resident of Buffalo Gap and teacher in the Wingate School. Burial will be in Okmulgee, Okla., under direction of North Funeral Home of Abilene and Hart Funeral Home of Okmulgee.

Mrs. Rayburn died late Monday in Hendrick Medical Center in Abilene of injuries sustained in a three-vehicle crash Monday afternoon about 25 miles south of Abilene on Highway 277.

Investigating Highway Patrol Trooper David Poeschel of Tuscola said that a car driven by 19-year-old Debbie Lynn Phillips of Abilene was southbound on the Abilene-San Angelo highway when the young woman apparently ran off the road, lost control of her vehicle and crashed headon into the car driven by Mrs. Rayburn. Trooper Poeschel said that a pickup driven by a Buffalo Gap man, Ace Henry, also was involved in the crash.

Mrs. Rayburn was transported to the Abilene hospital by a Winters unit of the Runnels County Emergency Service.

Mrs. Rayburn was born April 20, 1924; she was part Cherokee Indian and was reared in Oklahoma. She was a graduate of Angelo State University and of Sul Ross University, and had taught in the Big Spring schools for nine years before moving to Buffalo Gap. She was in her first year of teaching social studies in the seventh and eighth grades in the Wingate School.

Survivors include her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Elmer Frisby of Talequah, Okla.; a daughter, Patricia Blackshear of Buffalo Gap; three sons, John Rayburn Jr., of Ft. Bragg, N. C., Tommy Rayburn of Muskogee, Okla., and James Rayburn of Hutchinson, Kans.; and four sisters and a brother.

Mrs. Melanie Wade has accepted the chairmanship of the 1981 Cystic Fibrosis Spring Special Event to be held in Winters.

Proceeds from the fund-raising event, which will be announced at a later date, will support the research, education and care programs of the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation.

Cystic Fibrosis (CF), the number one genetic killer of children, is an inherited, incurable disease affecting the lungs and digestive system of its young victims. CF claims three lives every day.

Approximately one in every 20 Americans is a symptomless carrier of the recessive CF gene. At present there is no test to identify these 10 million people who might pass on the gene or the disease to their children.

Children born with CF today have a 50 percent chance of reaching their nineteenth birthday.

A Night Out

Some of our greatest pleasures happen when unexpected opportunities come our way.

Friday was such a day when Frances Campbell called to say she had tickets for a travel show of Britain and Ireland presented in Abilene by the Kodak Company. "Would I like to go with a group of women?"

Of course, you know my answer. There were five of us: Ethel Mae Sawyer, Addie Beth Stanley, Ethel Bridwell, Frances and myself.

Naturally, we wanted to go early so that we could eat out. Three of the women had lunch at the activity center at noon, and on the way there was talk of the excitement when "Charlie" the weatherman was introduced as the Valentine Sweetheart of the Senior Citizens. He was presented some "critters" as a gift and Martha Leeson was there taking many pictures of the event for the news.

We were all bemoaning the fact that the 10 o'clock news would probably be over before we returned home. Especially Ethel Bridwell, because she wanted to see herself on television.

While we were standing in line at Wyatt's Cafeteria, Mrs. Sawyer, our driver and the resourceful one, decided to take a little exploration trip and she found several TV sets on at Thornton's where we could see the six o'clock news.

We left our places in line at the cafeteria, to the delight of people standing behind us, and dashed in to see the news. Sure enough, when Charlie finished giving the weather forecast, it was all there in living color!

Ethel was on, but somehow she missed her shining hour and didn't see herself. However, we saw Lucille Virden, Mrs. Travis Downing, Mrs. Frank Mitchell and others as big as life; also Rosemary Bennie presenting Charlie with his gift.

Believe it or not, we spotted some bargains on the way into Thornton's and did a wee bit of shopping before we returned to the cafeteria line. We were just in time to get behind a large group of young people, but we were more ready to eat when our time came.

All of this, and we were able to reach the Community Center in time for the travel show. Dick Tarpley from the Abilene Reporter-News introduced the show which he said was the ninth one sponsored by the newspaper.

The audiovisual spectacular was presented by two Kodak Photo specialists. Six Carousel projectors were set up in three pairs to project slides onto a 12 x 36 foot screen. One pair of projectors for each third of the screen. When one projector in a pair is projecting a slide, the other is changing slides. A dissolve control then turns the light off in one projector and on in the other, making a smooth transition from one slide to the next. Automatic slide changing by a computerized dissolve control center synchronizes with taped music to complement the narrator's comments. A 16mm pageant sound projector projects short movie sequences onto the center area of the huge screen, while a seventh projector pictures a border for the movie image.

To film Britain and Ireland — an adventure in pictures, several photographers traveled thousands of miles on several trips to visit Britain and Ireland. Since they are also a part of Britain's United Kingdom, Scotland and Wales were also included.

Later the Kodak team spent many weeks arranging the still and movie images into a parade of exciting sequences that capture a colorful cross section of the countries. They presented some photo tips for those who want to bring home good pictures of their vacations.

England is a country of royalty and pageantry. Pictures of the trooping of the color on the queen's birthday added excitement and impact to the pictures. Picturing Stonehenge, bare stones on a rocky coast, as a sunset silhouette gave a dramatic effect.

The local costumes of Scotland such as the Highland Kilts and the bagpipes made unusual and colorful pictures. There was a portrayal of a young man making bagpipes. He wouldn't stop his work for the interview. Children in school are taught two years on a single pipe before they are allowed to handle the larger instrument. The Scottish dances and athletic contests were also picturesque. A glorious sunset on the Isle of Skye was captured by the camera.

On Wales there were close-ups of the people which added charm and warmth to the travel pictures. A person on a ledge looking into the scene of a valley and river below added size and depth of field. The picture of a Welsh train against the green hillside was made more spectacular by the puff of steam.

Photographs of historic subjects in Ireland added a change of pace to the pictures. In the 6th century, the front portion of Dunluce Castle slid into the sea during a banquet, part of the old castle is still standing. A touch of charm was added when the turf farmer's wife brought him a cup of tea. Turf is cut in squares and dried to make peat which is used for fuel.

One thing that all the islands have in common is sheep raising and their love of horses and horse racing. They are very active people.

We all had a part in "Sing Along." It was a refrain from the Irish song "The Wild Rover":
"And its no nay never
No nay never no more
Will I play the Wild Rover
No nay never no more."

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Are damages tax deductible?

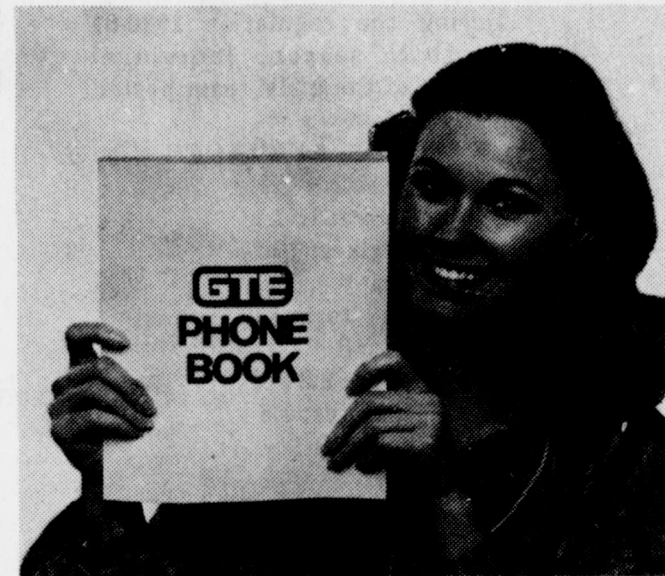

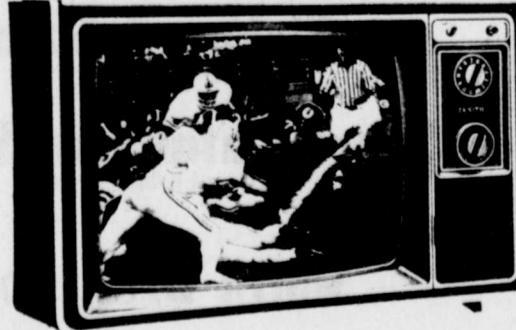

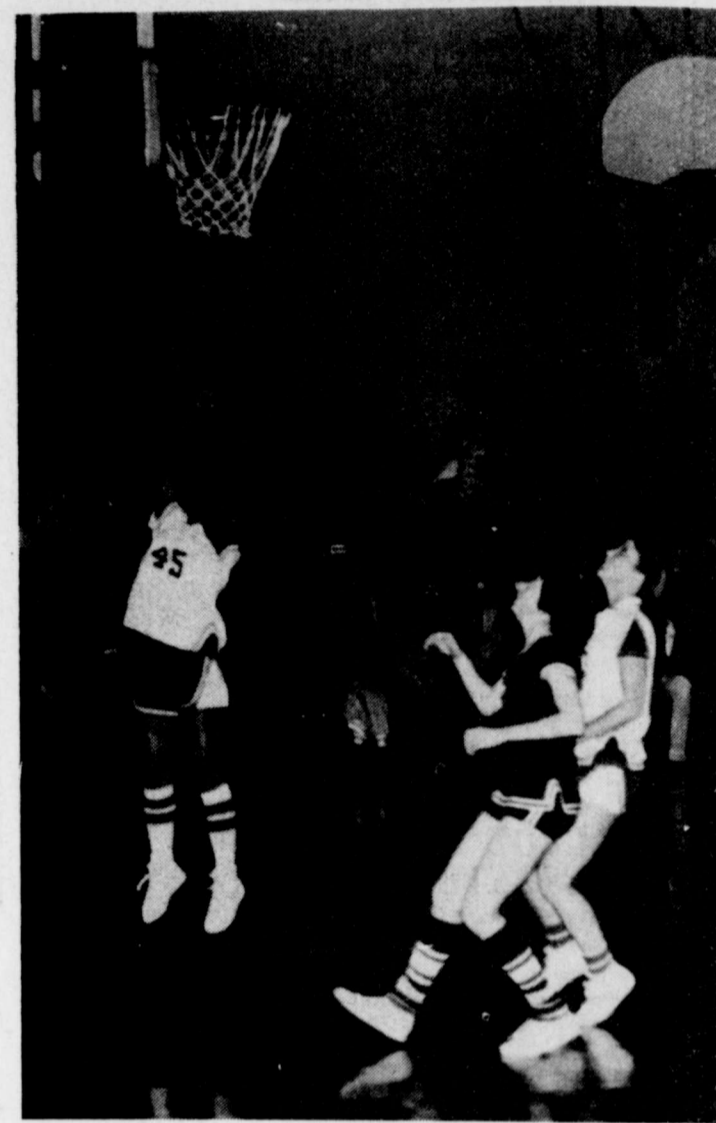
